In America the national game, by common consent, is the getting of money. To win the game one must get a little money and make it go to work and repeat this process until one can while away dreary afternoons by discussing the servant problem.

The alien plays the game better. He waits. Is he a "darned furnisher" when first sets foot on these shores? Never. He is a poor oppressed brother who will do dirty work at \$1.16 a day. It is only when he begins to win and get ahead of American players that he becomes a menace.

Halting Equine Influenza

Dr. Otto Wolfe has been on the jump the past month or more to eliminate the epidemic of equine influenza, or shipping fever, that has been raging in Howard County and many adjoining counties. By vaccinating he has halted the disease and there are only two or three places where animals are affected. He has vaccinated more than one thousand horses and mules in an effort to control the disease. About eighty horses and mules died from the influenza in this county and seven or eight animals were left stone blind after an attack.

The symptoms of this shipping fever are as follows: The animals standing around listless and drowsy; swelling of breast and legs and high fever. Better vaccinate at once.

Dr. Wolfe states that the foot and mouth disease has again broken out among the livestock in California but that every effort will be made to prevent its spread to Texas.

What These Students Have Done Others Can Do.

The State of Texas has adopted the policy of providing for common schools and for the higher institutions of learning but has neglected the high school. Local districts have been expected to organize standard high schools and this, in many cases, has been impossible, especially in rural communities, owing to low valuations of taxable property and the small number of students of high school age and advancement. Many intellectual boys and girls in the country have had the door of hope closed to them because they could not be graduated from an accredited high school.

When the present state superintendent of public instruction, S. M. N. Marrs, was chief supervisor of public high schools, and had charge of the classification and accrediting of the high school work of the state he recognized that one of the weaknesses of the public school system was caused by the effort of small communities to organize four-year high schools when they were neither financially able, nor did they have a sufficient number of students to justify the expense. This resulted in most cases in superficial high school work and lack of thoroughness in the elementary grades due to their overcrowded condition and the employment of cheap, inefficient teachers.

The classification and accrediting committee representing the public schools and colleges agreed for the State Department of Education to offer examinations throughout the State during the second week of May of each year; and for college entrance units thus obtained to be honored by the various institutions, if presented within five years of date of examination. A large number of students have availed themselves of this privilege. It has been decided that such students as passed these examinations and secured sixteen units, three in English, three in mathematics, two in history, should receive a Texas high school diploma signed by the state superintendent and the chief supervisor of high schools.

An inspection of the records in the State Department of Education discloses the fact that Virginia Lee Gusman, of Galveston, and Henry G. Elkins, of Spur, each have obtained

sixteen college entrance units by examination and are entitled to receive the state diploma. They deserve special mention for having prepared themselves for college although they were confronted with many difficulties.

These examinations will be offered again this year, May 12, 13, 14, 15, by each county superintendent and by each classified and accredited high school. For further information write to the State Department of Education, at Austin.

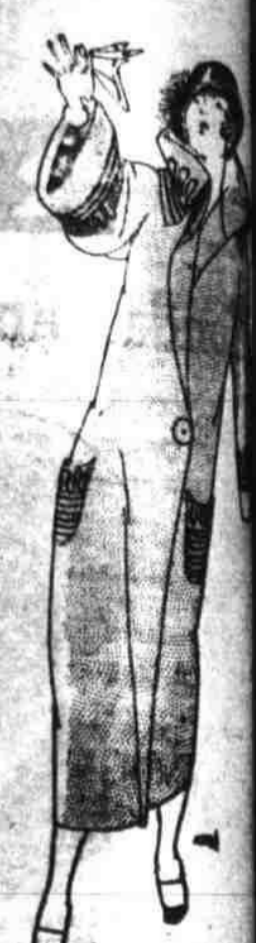

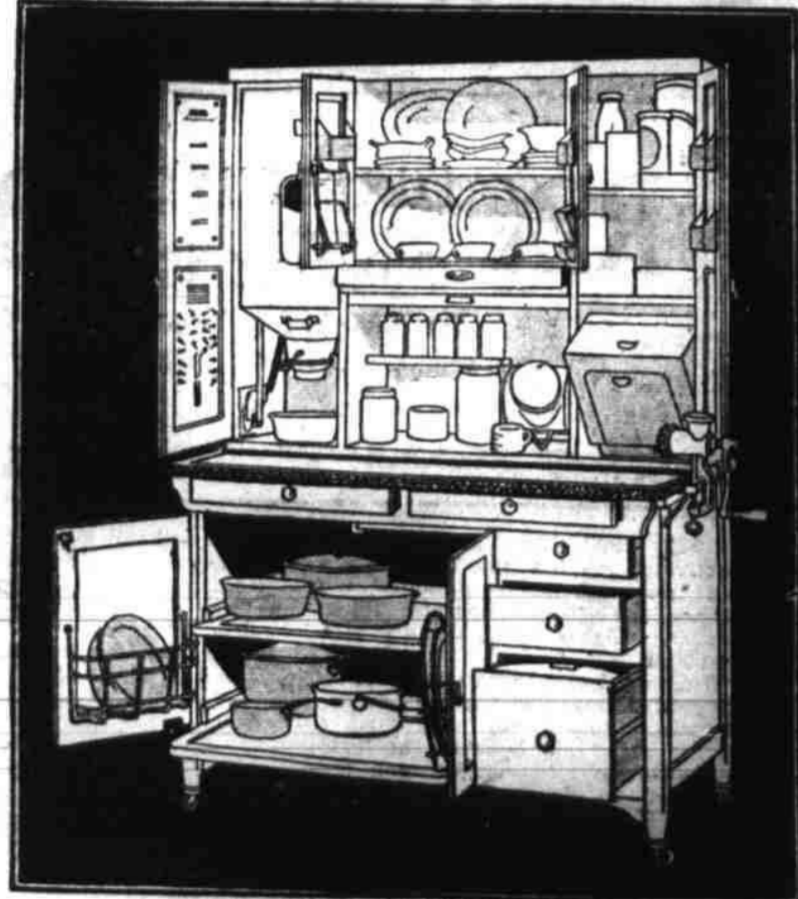

THE DEVELOPMENT OF OUR RAILROAD NET IN TEXAS

(Continued from last week)

The most important assistance to railways during the period of 1870 to 1890 was State aid. This took two forms; one the granting of State bonds, the other of State land. In 1870, an act by the Legislature provided that State bonds should be furnished the International Great Northern railroad to the amount of \$10,000 per mile. An act of 1871 likewise provided that \$6,000,000 of 8 per cent, 30 year State bonds should be furnished the Texas and Pacific Railroad Company. However, neither of these bond issues was made available for railway purposes. There was such opposition that some of the State officials refused to sign the bonds and the next Legislature repealed the law.

From 1869 to 1873 there were no land grants for the benefit of railroad construction. In 1873 an amendment to the Constitution made land grants to railroads lawful. From 1873 to 1875, 42 companies were chartered, 12 of which carried on construction and 10 in sufficient amount to obtain land. Under this law 16 sections were granted per mile constructed. However, the International Great Northern and the Texas & Pacific each received 20 sections per mile. This was because of a compromise after the failure of the proposal to furnish aid to these roads by means of State bonds. The International Great Northern also received tax exemption for a period of 25 years. In 1876 a general railroad incorporation and land grant act provided that a road should receive 16 sections of State land for each mile constructed.

This land was to be sold one-half in six years and all of it in twelve years. Under this law 67 companies were chartered and 12 of them obtained land. From 1852 to 1882, 41 railroad companies received land in blocks from 49,000 acres to 5,167,000 acres. The total given railroads amounted to 38,900,800 acres. Just what this land brought no one has ascertained. It probably averaged not more than \$1.00 per acre, if that much. In 1890 the capitalization of railroads in Texas was as follows:
Bonds \$233,000,000
Stocks \$177,000,000
Other indebtedness. . . . \$ 30,000,000
Making a total of about \$440,000,000. Just what it cost to build these 8,800 miles we had in 1891 has never been determined, and owing to the absence and destruction of records will never be known with accuracy. Since 1891 railway construction in Texas has continued until we now have about 16,000 miles of railroad. The great problem in the early days was to get the railroads built. Now that we have the railway net pretty well developed, the problem is how to obtain the most efficient service at the least possible cost.

A Business Reparation Plan
Finding by the expert commission to investigate the financial condition of Germany is that Germany can easily pay the 132,000,000,000 gold marks assessed against it in 1921 for reparations. The expert commission proposes to put Germany in condition to realize these financial possibilities by making a loan secured by mortgage on the railroads and by the issue of gold-secured currency. This plan is plain business and is practicable if each nation concerned will waive all political objections. France must withdraw from the Ruhr and suppress fear of German economic recovery, and Germany must abandon the pretense that working to pay a debt is slavery. If that were true of Germany, it would be equally true of the United States and of every other nation that is in debt.

The plan depends for success on the will to pay of Germany and on the will for peace of all the nations concerned, for the loan can be raised only in the United States and it will be subscribed only if the minds of those nations are set on doing the things necessary to make the security good, says the Portland Oregonian.

Time to Be Careful

So, whether the winter months are as severe as they once were or not let us keep in mind the fact that we are now getting into a most dangerous season of the year, a season when sickness is most easily contracted, and let's resolve to use extra precaution to guard against illness while these sudden changes are with us.

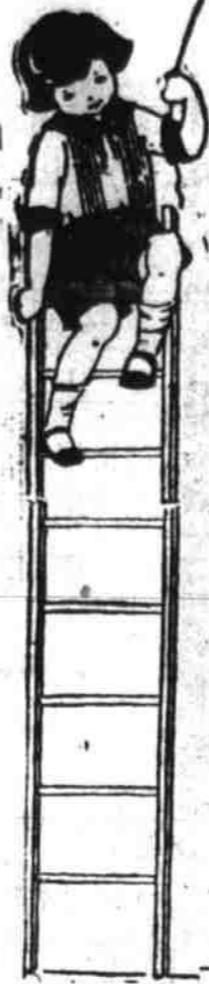

THE PASSING DAY

The investigations being conducted in Washington are revealing conditions that are startling to those of us who like to regard those in high authority as above suspicion. Corruption in high places has become so common that when we meet a man of position we are inclined to look upon him as a suspicious character and wonder whether it will be safe for our own reputations to be seen in his company. The Department of Justice seemingly has been mis-named. Even in our own State we are made to wonder if the Government is being run in the interest of the people or of those whom the people have selected to serve them. "Secret service" has almost become a term of contempt. We have been forced to agree with a statesman who long ago defined "secret service money" as money appropriated by the government to be used for corrupt purposes. But despite the fact that public confidence in officials is being dreadfully shaken, it is probable that good will come out of all this disturbance. "When things get bad enough they right themselves." The American people are not going to lose heart entirely. They are likely to be more guarded in future to see that honest men are in charge of public affairs. "God is in His Heaven; all's right with the world."

Public corruption is due largely to the false conception of what constitutes success. Any nation whose citizens come to measure success in terms of money is certain to go wrong unless it establishes higher ideals. Especially is this true where officials and lawmakers hold such views. As a rule these are elected from the people of moderate means. Official life makes large demands upon the purse, especially where wives and daughters aspire to be leaders in Washington society. The salary of a senator or a congressman or even of a cabinet officer is not large enough to allow wives and daughters to compete socially with the rich, or to allow such officials to put aside any considerable money. The result often is efforts are made to get money by short cuts, get-rich-quick methods, and corrupt practices. It is hard to go straight where there is a constant chase after evasive dollars, especially when temptations are constantly thrust before the dollar-chaser.

The people of Texas are more interested just now in passable roads than in the doings at Washington. The rains and snows of the past winter have put all but the best roads out of business as roads. Most public roads in Texas are now a succession of almost bottomless mudholes. This condition has made the people nearly everywhere more determined to build good roads. Many sections have already voted bond issues. Others have elections on or in contemplation. Road building on an extensive scale will be under way as soon as the rainy season is over. The rains have thrown most farmers behind with their work, and they are getting anxious to get into their fields. Surely Texas is going to be a busy state as soon as the ground dries out a bit, and there is every reason to predict that the year is going to be the most prosperous in its history.

It is wonderful what one can accomplish with enough will power to stick to a thing until it is done. Ruth Cross is a Texas girl who worked her way through the University of Texas, teaching awhile and going to school until her money was exhausted, and then teaching again to make more money. While doing this her eyes failed until she had to have her schoolmates do all her reading to her. With these handicaps, she made the highest honors. She decided to become a writer, and wrote for fifteen years before she had any prospect of success, the total financial results of that long service being \$65.00. Now she is selling stories to the Saturday Evening Post, and is writing plays and scenarios that are bringing in regular returns. Recently Harper & Brothers have published a novel, "The Golden Cocoon," written by her, a story of struggle and achievement in Texas and New York, and 10,000 copies were sold in advance of publication. Ruth Cross is a success because she stuck to what she undertook even under adverse circumstances. It pays to know what one wants to do and to stay at it until success comes. The failures are the quitters, the shirkers.

One Variety of Cotton

The mixing of cotton seed at the gin has given rise to the idea that varieties "run out." There is no doubt about the running out but this is due to "mongrelizing" or mixing rather than any defect or disease in the seed. The proposed remedy of changing the seed does not remove the cause of the trouble, but only invites still more "running out," for the more numerous the varieties in a community, the greater the mixing of the seed at the gin and crossing of varieties in the field. The real remedy lies in the growing of one kind of cotton in the community, so that there is neither crossing in the fields nor mixing at the gin.

In deciding on the variety which is to be grown throughout the community, it is necessary that the farmers meet together and arrange for the making of local variety tests to determine which is the best of a lot of promising varieties. At the end of one year a variety should be selected for general planting in the community, for although several years may be needed to reach a decision as to the best variety, due to seasonal fluctuations, even a rather inferior variety will give better results when grown by the community as a whole than a number of good varieties mixed together. Furthermore, an organized community can change to superior variety when a definite advantage can be shown and seed can be obtained in sufficient quantity. The Pima variety was substituted for the Yuma in the Salt River Valley of Arizona, after a sufficient stock of Pima seed had been raised to plant the entire area.—The Progressive Farmer.

Completing P. S. to G. Highway

No solution has so far been arrived at for the construction of that portion of the Puget Sound to Gulf Highway across the corner of Glasscock County. An appropriation, we understand, has been made by the Commissioners Court of Glasscock County, but not sufficient to complete this stretch of highway. It is going to be up to the Glasscock County citizens living along this route and the citizens of Sterling and Howard County to contribute additional funds if this link in this state and national highway is put in first class condition, so it can be maintained by the State Highway Association.

It will be well if steps be taken immediately to raise the funds necessary to complete this section of highway. The road building crew of Howard County will within the next few weeks complete the Puget Sound to Gulf Highway to the county line and this crew can be employed to continue on with the highway to the Sterling County line if funds are available to pay them at the regular scale they are now being paid.

Committees have been appointed to investigate this proposition heretofore but up to the present no definite action has been taken. We are making a serious mistake if we fail to connect up with Sterling County. The Puget Sound to Gulf Highway should be one of the most popular highways in the State and will be if the counties along the line cooperate by making it a real highway from end to end. If long stretches of it are to remain unimproved it stands to reason that tourists will soon shun it and seek routes where they can be assured a good serviceable road all the way, in any kind of weather. This is a little of everybody's business and we should get busy if we hope to be able to boast of two good highways thru our county.

How About a Bonded Warehouse?

The value of all agricultural products for Texas for the year 1923 is given at \$1,064,775,000 and it is possible that the cotton crop, both lint and the seed, will aggregate three-fourths of this amount.

A staggering sum. Values aggregating approximately one-fourth the total amount of values rendered for taxation, and yet millions upon millions of this amount are lost thru carelessness on the part of our farmers, merchants and bankers.

Agriculture is fundamental, yes the basis of all wealth in the State of Texas, hence the statement that these millions are lost as a result of the farmers, merchants and bankers failing to do their duty.

We wonder whether the merchants of Texas, the bankers of Texas, have ever appreciated the wonderful opportunity that comes to them as a result of the enormous agricultural values of the State.

We believe, if given the opportunity, we could demonstrate beyond any reasonable doubt that the bankers and merchants of Texas could undertake to construct and operate State Bonded Warehouses for the storage of cotton, and operate same without cost to the cotton producers.

The merchants and bankers are creditors and the major portion of the farmers' money finally reaches them.

Cotton left out in the open and exposed to the action of the elements results in the loss of millions of dollars annually and each bale of cotton so left, pending its sale, brings about an expense in handling that runs from fifty cents to one dollar per bale.

In 1919 the country damage to cotton, resulting from storage in the open yards, is estimated at around THIRTY MILLION DOLLARS and the extra drayage expense in taking the cotton from the yard to the compress or the shipping platform possibly aggregated another two million dollars.

And these figures do not represent the loss to the farmers. Regardless of the location of market, regardless of the number of buyers and who these buyers may be, cotton sold on the streets, is seldom ever sold according to grade and staple values, in fact staple values are found after segregation by the local buyers.

This system has prevailed practically from the beginning of the industry. The cotton buying business is entirely legitimate, but this does not warrant a continuance of the

system that serves to make the spinner pay a much higher price for his cotton than is paid to the producer.

We say it is to the interest of the merchant, to the interest of the banker, and to the interest of the farmer that the cotton produced in Texas, in the entire United States as for that, should pass through the bonded warehouse into the markets of the world, and the savings to the industry brought about through better prices to the producer, through the avoidance of country damage and extra expenses, will serve to reimburse the merchants far more than the expense of construction, or at least aiding in construction, of suitable warehouses for the storage of the State's cotton crop pending its final shipment to the markets of the world.

The bonded warehouse is not only an economical avenue to the markets of the world for the cotton producer, but the small merchants throughout the State, not being able to finance themselves in the purchase of carlot shipments, will find the bonded warehouses the very best avenue to cheaper markets for their stocks of merchandise, thus the banker who advances money to the local merchant upon the negotiable warehouse receipt, if necessity demands, may in turn use the receipts as a basis of additional credit, hence cooperation on the part of the farmer, the merchant and the banker in the cotton growing community is fundamentally wise, conducive to better business and moreover is that kind of construction that makes the community itself a better place in which to live.

What do you say, Mr. Banker, Mr. Merchant, Mr. Farmer, will we have a State Bonded Warehouse in your community before the harvest season for the 1924 cotton crop is upon us?—State Marketing Bulletin.

Dallas Shrine Hospital Houses Many Modern Miracles

Two years ago the Nobles of Hella Temple had an idea; today it is a reality. A children's hospital stands in the city of Dallas as a monument to the generosity of the membership of Hella Temple. A beautiful administration building, two stories in height with a basement and with two ward wings on each side, located on a beautiful plot of ground, and equipped with every modern hospital necessity, represents approximately a cost of three hundred thousand dollars. Having been opened for operation on November last, the hospital has been running at full capacity. Fifty-one little patients are now in Hella's hospital, going through the process of being made whole, while thirty-two patients since the opening date have been discharged with extremely satisfactory results. In addition fifteen new cases each week, or a total of two hundred and fifty cases have been handled through the clinic or out-patients' department. Hella's hospital does not restrict its patients in the matter of religious or fraternal affiliation of the parents, nor as to the place of residence. Patients already handled have come from every section of the State of Texas, and some from Oklahoma. A surprisingly small number of admissions are from the city of Dallas, itself. A report of the admissions and discharges shows patients handled from the following towns: Albany, Okla., Avery, Texas, Calvert, Canton, Corsicana, Denton, Denton, Eastland, Farmersville, Ft. Cobb, Okla., New Boston, Petrolia, Paint Rock, Paris, Plano, Ponder, Sulphur Springs, Snyder, Sweetwater, Tyler, Gainesville, Georgetown, Hillsboro, Kerens, Longview, Lyford, Mt. Pleasant, Mexia, Mineola, Myrtle Springs, Mundy, New Ulm, Gunter, Milford, Greenville, Reinhardt, Waco, Fort Worth, Forestburg, Wichita Falls, Dallas, Cleburne, Cumby, Durant, Okla., Teague, Burkburnett, Clarksville, Golden, Raymondville, Bryan, Texarkana, Lewisville, Fowler Home, Alma, Palmer.

Aside from a large contribution made from the treasury of Hella Temple that went toward the building of this plant, the Temple has made large donations on other occasions. Considering also that it will cost approximately sixty thousand dollars per year to maintain the children's hospital, it has been necessary, therefore, to depend upon the individual contributions of the Hella Temple members for its maintenance. The willingness and the extreme generosity of the Hella Shriners in responding to every call for hospital purposes has enabled the Dallas Shrine Temple to offer its wonderful facilities to the afflicted. It will be this same magnanimous spirit on the part of the members of Hella Temple that will keep wide open the portals of its Mercy House for the benefit of the suffering children from everywhere and from every walk of life.

Members of Hella Temple are now engaged in promoting a Shrine circus, a liberal percentage of the proceeds of which will go to the hospital maintenance fund. The quick and hearty response that has been received from the Shriners on the sale of the tickets is excellent indication of their deep interest in the hospital. Quite recently the hospital received a bequest of ten thousand dollars from a prominent Dallas woman who provided this bequest in her last will. It is understood also that quite a number of Hella Temple Nobles and other public spirited people are making bequests in their wills for Hella's Mercy House.

Official announcement has been made of the Ceremonial Session of Hella Temple which will be held on Friday, April 25th at Dallas, and at which time a large number of candidates will be initiated into the secrets of the Mystic Shrine, some times called the playground of Masonry. It is certain that an organization carrying with it the merits of its own purposes, and at the same time fathering an idea so worthy as a children's hospital deserves the enthusiastic cooperation not only of its own members but of the general public as well.

How About Feed Crops for 1924?

For more than a quarter of a century the writer has been able at the beginning of each year to candidly state, "This is one year when the farmer cannot afford to fail to grow all the feeds required to feed well all the livestock on the farm." And we have said and written this plain truth, year after year, with a strengthened conviction of its soundness as a basic principle in Southern farming.

Feed is always scarce and high priced when the time comes around for making the next crop. There is no question about the soundness of the statement that it is best, because safest and most economical, for the Southern farmer to produce the feeds for his livestock, nor is there any question about the statement having been made often enough for all to have heard it. But it is equally certain that many Southern farmers have not fully accepted this statement as facts. They have taken it in many cases as advice which they felt bound to reject.

We are quite well aware of all these things and that probably a repetition of the facts this season will have as little effect as during past years; but again we come forward with the "original" statement that "This is one year when no farmer can afford to fail to produce his own feeds, especially the feeds for his workstock." Why is it "especially important that we grow our feeds in 1924?"

First, because a large part of the South is short of feeds for making the crops in 1924, which means that these crops will be made at a higher cost.

Second, because of the present good prices for cotton there will be an inclination to increase the cotton acreage, which will in itself tend to reduce the acreage to feed crops.

Third, a larger acreage to cotton and a smaller acreage to feed crops, or rather a large crop of cotton and a small crop of feeds, will tend to lower the price of cotton and increase the price of feeds.

Fourth, it is more economical to grow the feeds needed than to buy them, taking one year with another. The only case when this is not true is when the farmer is a poor farmer, or an inefficient producer of feeds.

But there are sometimes efficient cotton producers who will challenge the accuracy of this fourth reason for feed production.

They may be divided into two classes. The first, a very large class, are very poor farmers so far as producing feed is concerned. The other class, a very small one, are very efficient cotton producers. This class is very much smaller than those who think they belong to it generally believe. Most of those who think they are such good cotton farmers that they can afford to buy feeds for work stock with cotton money are greatly mistaken. If feeds were generally cheap when cotton is high priced, their theory would work out more frequently; but where feeds are not produced they are always high priced, and in the South when cotton is low priced because of a large crop, feeds are generally higher priced because of a poor crop. — The Progressive Farmer.

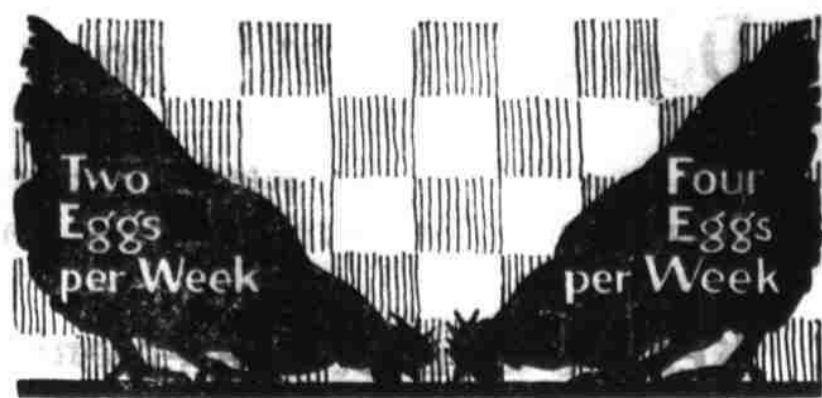
