Harding Urges Settlement

Washington, March 6.—President Harding has informed officials of the railway shopcrafts that he can see no "adequate question of principle" which warrants a further delay in settlement in all districts of last summer's shopmen's strike.

In a letter written just before he left Washington for Florida and made public today at the White House, the president declared that minority of interests involved by their refusal to settle were "largely responsible" for interrupted coal deliveries and other unsatisfactory railway conditions in certain parts of the country.

The total number of men still out over the country has been a matter of dispute, but officials of the International Machinists Union estimated today that about forty per cent of the men who went on strike July 1 have not yet returned.

The president's letter was in response to one from Stephen Conner, secretary of the federated shopcrafts, Central Railroad of New Jersey and was as follows:

"Your letter of March 3 comes to hand just as I am about leaving for the south, but I am glad of the opportunity it affords me to express my sentiment on the subject. You tell me that the shopcrafts of the New Jersey Central railroad are staging a relief fund movement, and ask me to send my autographed photograph. I am gladly complying.

"It is an occasion of intense regret that the settlement of the shopcrafts strike which has been effected on the larger part of the railroad systems and the mileage of the country, has not been found possible on all the rest. I do not find myself able to discern any adequate question of principle which would justify a minority of the interests involved in this distressing situation in refusing to make settlements similar to those which have been made by the majority. The information which reaches me brings the conviction that continued failure to make settlement is largely responsible for unfortunate conditions as to railroad movements in some areas and for interrupted deliveries of coal during the winter months, with resultant suffering in many communities and much demoralization to industry. It is a situation which seems certain to become more serious unless effective measures are found for early amelioration."

(T. U. TAYLOR)

1. West Texas needs a Senior College, for the simple reason that West Texas has a SENIOR problem to solve.
2. West Texas should have a senior college in its territory to teach, foster, and spread the gospel of dry farming. This is one of the big problems that it has to solve.
3. The conservation of the water resources of West Texas should be studied by a college in this territory, to the end that where feasible every canyon should be converted into a storage reservoir to bring into active cultivation the lands in the valleys.
4. West Texas stock raising is a SENIOR problem in itself and this is another function of the proposed college.
5. The economical irrigation of lands from the shallow wells is in its infancy and the study of the beneficial uses of the underground waters is another SENIOR problem that must be studied locally and not by foreign missionaries.
6. In addition to the above reasons a College serves the people as a general thing within a radius of a few hundred miles, and WEST TEXAS is an empire in itself.
7. If you take the two States of Arizona and New Mexico, you will find that West Texas has more population than both combined, and yet there are FIVE educational institutions in these two states not counting normal schools.

To the Editor:

The State Department of Labor has submitted to the Farm Bloc a plan to assist in bringing about a better distribution of laborers, especially during cotton chopping and picking time, and grain harvest periods. This Department proposes to act as a clearing house for such distribution, and it desires to get in immediate touch with some active person in every farming district. This person to take charge of the matter of registering with the State Department of Labor the approximate number of laborers that community will need to chop or pick cotton, or harvest the grain crop.

I am requesting that especially the farm organizations of my district communicate with Joseph S. Myers, Commissioner of Labor, Austin, Texas, and learn from him further details of the proposed plan, and give his Department full cooperation to the end that when the farmers of my district need laborers same will be furnished them. This official would like to have selected a reliable and active person in as many farming communities as possible with whom he can carry into effect the plans he has in mind.

The Farm Bloc of the 38th Legislature has carefully investigated this matter, and heartily endorses the plan.

It has been very difficult to apply for a location for the State Schools unless we had ideal pull, but in this instance we have the promise, that each and every applicant will rise or fall on its merits. The citizens of Big Spring are pardoned by the Directors, in the fact that their claim is in all respects to any, who apply for the location, and we are superior to many, if not all others. GRAPHICALLY; in location we are nearer, or as near the center of the applicant, and as near the NUMERICALLY as any other, we are not the last census before us writing, but when you, Mr. calculate the inhabitants lying west, north and south of Big Spring can be done by the census you will find Big Spring near the

are the only applicant that has national Highways running thru the District, these highways have been laid out and approved by Sam, by the 50-50 contract between the State and United States. Highways are to be prepared for paving public, and by the State traffic carried by any kind of access to it. The highways must be maintained. State, already an amendment to the Constitution is pending that the highways be maintained by the State, that the amendment will be passed to say that the people won't be allowed to do it, which they would do failed to adopt it.

Spring has rock enough, if it is powder, within five miles of the place that would make a permanent bed on each of its highways. The end of the district to the east, west, north and south that last for one hundred years. Can the applicant claim the same? In building the highway from the west end of this county to the west part of County I am informed by the fact that more than half of the same from Big Spring, and one mile. They tell me it is in the middle. If it be true all the necessary to build the foundation of the Technological College, can be laid right here at this place, if the statement is true, and they are to back their statement by it. Then gravel found right here at Big Spring, when made into concrete by a man who understands his business, can make a cement that will last a life time.

Concrete walks right here in Big Spring made from the gravel at this place, that have been standing for years and seems to grow harder with years advance; other points are the same gravel but not so hard as Big Spring.

These highways are finished in accordance with the contract made with Uncle Sam, then what point in the district, for accessibility, will Big Spring? The adopted mode of travel this day is by automobile, merchants, professional man, and farmer have all adopted it. The automobile is being made today as fine as a prior-car on the inside. They have all the facilities of the railroad. All one has to do is to step in the door, and touch a button and they will land you as pleasantly and safely at your journey's end almost as quickly as Steel Beam. Automobiles have today become the home of the traveling Laborer and the pleasure of the Banker. If we convince the Locating Committee of College that we intend to fix highways for business and travel, the fact that we haven't but one road won't weigh heavily against Big Spring as a farming center will be its own, it is not superior in the

raising of Indian Corn, but there is nothing in the Vegetable Line, nothing in the Small Grain Line, that it won't grow and grow in abundance and as to Cotton per acre it is not surpassed. The College, as I understand, will teach everything in the literary line that any other College teaches, and in addition the Technic of the arts and sciences. It will teach the virtue and uses of the soil. One mile north of Big Spring Uncle Sam, at an expense of about one hundred thousand dollars, has already erected a Demonstration Farm, to show what the soils can produce. This can be used as a Laboratory by the students of the College. They will be taught this science. Other applicants for the College may have this advantage, but they will hardly have all the merits that Big Spring has.

If the cattle industry is any part of the College, and we have the curriculum which they have at the A. & M., then we have a superiority in that line at Big Spring. In and around Big Spring the percentage in a calf crop is 95 per cent and it takes about half as much feeding to keep a cow in shape, as it does at most any other point in West Texas. These hills and mountains around Big Spring seem to furnish a Protective home to the cattle family against the beating and blowing winds that streams down from the north in the winter time, and which most all West Texas is subject to, and blowing at a rate of 45 miles an hour, the writer knows something about the effect of winter time on cattle on the plains, he once lived there and owned cattle. Big Spring's advantage over most any other point that is an applicant for the College is superior in that line, and the cattlemen around Big Spring know it. I have talked with some of the cattlemen who have run and owned cattle at most all the points, who are candidates for this school, and they not only know these facts to be true, but have manifested a disposition to let the facts be known.

Who would not. I have not stated a fact in this letter that is not well known to the citizens of Big Spring, or can be known by making inquiry, and who, if he has any home pride, or is entitled to recognition as a good citizen, will not come forward and do all he can for his home. We will need the testimony of the farmer, the cattleman, the man who knows the resources of Big Spring as to the element that makes cement, her resources of water, and the purity of the water; her accessibility to the traveling public, and what Big Spring has done towards developing her highways, and if she has not done all she can, convince that body of Directors that we will do it.

Her healthfulness must be stated in no uncertain way by those who are guardians of her health, and this can be accomplished only by an unanimous meeting of her citizens and a continuation of those meetings until every citizen is aroused until he feels in his heart that Big Spring is superior to other points that are applicants, by this means only can we be successful in this undertaking.

Water Facilities: The wells now used by the city for water purposes, are not the only assets in that line belonging to the town, yet it has annually furnished to the railroad water sufficient to water a city. One mile east of this town there are four little six inch wells. I have seen two of those wells pump a tank, holding ninety thousand gallons, full of water in three days and one-half, and the last stroke of the pump threw as great a volume of water as the first apparently and there was no apparent diminution of the water in the wells at the time. It seems to be inexhaustible. How much water would a six-foot well with a pump commensurate with the size of the wells furnish and how many people would it supply. That

is not all, I am told there are good wells of water in the western part of our city where no effort has ever been made to develop same.

We know that within ten miles of Big Spring, east, what is known as Moss Springs there is a three inch volume of water, that never runs dry. How much water will all these sources furnish. There are experts who can form an estimate when the water is shown them and their evidence and testimony will have weight will no less people than the Locating Committee, who are to locate the College. This will take money perhaps to obtain this testimony, but by who thinks this race is going to be won just with what words had as well go way back and sit down.

Every man's shoulders in Big Spring will have to be put to the wheel in this race, there is no room for Slackers. Let's rally around the editor of our paper and hold up his hands while he fights the Amalekites of opposition. He will put every fact and figure relating to the merits of this place before that Committee or body of Directors, and if we will aid him he will never cease to labor 'till the sun goes down on the proposition.

In point of health I am told by the physicians that Big Spring will challenge all West Texas, that none surpass her. I inquired of a physician who has lived and practiced medicine for thirty-six years at this place in regard to Typhoid fever. He said one year when we had an overflow of newcomers that were settling this and Dawson Counties, that we had several cases of typhoid but before and since that time it had been comparatively nil.

No one can say that any case of Typhoid arose in this town, because its surface is rolling and the water is pure and is daily furnished us by the angel of nature. There is no malaria here; no causes for malaria and our physicians will testify to this fact.

There is nothing so conducive to sickness as stagnant water, lake water, tank water, river water not fed by springs or live water of some kind soon becomes stagnant, full of malaria producing a poisonous effect and it soon becomes necessary to use the strainer. Big Spring has never suffered in that line; the Angel seems to have passed by and struck the rock and said come hither and drink.

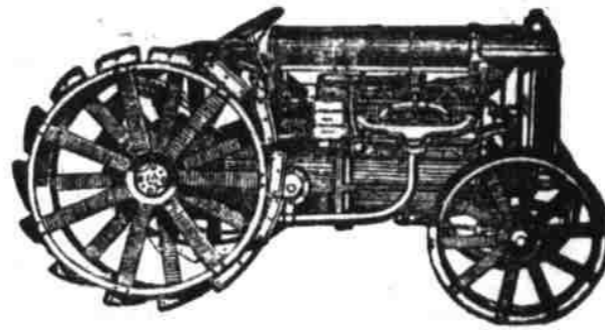

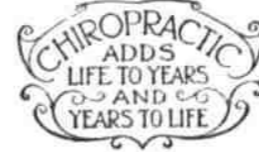

Good Cows Saved the Day for Him
(By E. M. HARMON,
in the Dairy Farmer.)

"What did you buy that old worn out flat for, Mac. It is too poor to even deserve to be called a farm?"

"I know," came the reply, "but it is all that I can afford. Besides the location is fine and with some good cows I'll make a farm out of it."

This is the subsequence of a conversation which occurred in a small southwest Missouri town about ten years ago. A. J. McDowell had just purchased an almost worthless old wornout farm near Fordland, Missouri. It was generally known throughout the community that no one could make a living on that farm. Everyone who tried it was obliged to move within a few years.

Mr. McDowell had lived in this same county most of his life and had always been credited with having even more than ordinary judgment. What had happened that he should decide to move on that worthless piece of dirt? The whole community was puzzled. Some of them were sure that he was losing his mind. And all of them were sure that he would have to leave that farm within the next few years. They thought that no one could make a decent living on it.

But McDowell has some ideas of his own that he was determined to try. As he said he had very little money to start on. That was the reason he had to buy the run down farm.

He had to start everything in a small way. A lawyer by profession, he had lost his health and had spent practically all of his life's savings to regain it. He could not return to the bar. He needed some outdoor life and his observations in other sections had taught him that the business-like dairymen usually came out on top.

So "Mac" started down in those Ozark hills where the sight of a real dairy cow was practically unknown. Most of the cows in that country then looked as tho they were built for speed rather than for either beef or milk production. That made McDowell's beginning even harder. In the first place he was obliged to go to the extra trouble and expense of shipping some cows and a bull from a distance. And in the second place most of his neighbors were sure now that "Mac" needed a guardian and didn't hesitate to tell him so.

McDowell's only response was to borrow more money and plod on. For a while he had only grade Holsteins but a little later he bought three pure-bred females. At that time only a small part of his farm was in cultivation, most of it having been let go back to brush. That which was in cultivation would raise but very little. The old shack of a barn was anything but an ideal place for a dairy herd. It was really a discouraging outlook for most men. But McDowell is one of those men who refuses to be discouraged. He could succeed there with good cows and he was going to do it.

It is seven years now since those three purebred females went on to the McDowell farm. Since that time he has purchased three herd bulls but has never bought any more females. He now has twenty-one head of registered females on the farm and these are gradually replacing the grade herd. He has two herd bulls, one a grandson of King of the Pontiacs and the other a grandson of Fobes Mutual Longfield.

During the past seven years he has sold enough bull calves to pay for the original females and all of his herd bulls and leave a balance of a little over \$400. In addition to that he has kept all of the increase in females and his herd has been very profitable at the milk-pail all of the time. During that time his checks frequently ran over \$300 per month.

If you visit the McDowell farm today you see a different picture. While there has been no money tied up in fancy overhead, yet everything is convenient and modern. The old barn is remodeled so that you wouldn't recognize it. Individual watering cups and a big silo inside the barn are among the conveniences that help to make dairying pleasant there. He has also recently completed a modern milkhouse including a steam sterilization plant. A cozy little home has been built for himself as well as one for his son.

Out back of the barn eighty acres of brush has given way to as fine a permanent grass pasture as one could wish to see. In fact, the whole farm looks different. By crop rotation and conservation of the manure the tillable land has been enriched so that now instead of being the poorest in the county it is as good or better than the av-

erage. And McDowell will proudly tell you how that splendid herd of twenty-five or thirty cows grazing over the pasture actually put him on top in this old world.

McDowell is a stickler for record keeping. The first thing he will do if the subject is mentioned is to tell you of the records he kept on two of his first cows. They were stall mates, and while he says he thought one was a little better than the other, he didn't know. At the end of the year one had produced 89 pounds of butterfat and the other 322 pounds. He attributes his success to the fact that he has always kept only good cows and has eliminated the poor producers. However, a visitor will soon see that hard work and a lot of common sense on his part, especially on investments has played an important part.

The best part of this story is that McDowell's venture has served an even greater purpose. His neighbors are coming to see that it was they and not McDowell who showed poor judgment several years ago. He is now looked upon as a leader and the community is following in his footsteps, many of them coming to him for assistance in selecting foundation stock, planning their barns and other problems. In fact, he has led the way for the building up of a prosperous dairy community. Such demonstrations as this means more than we can estimate in dollars and cents and it is only thru them that we can hope to make of dairying the pleasant and profitable occupation that it deserves to be.

Center of Texas North of Brady

Denton, March 7.—The number of people who can offhand give the geographical center of the state of Texas is undoubtedly a limited one. It is significant that this bit of information is contained in few libraries of the state.

Dr. F. M. Bralley, president of the College of Industrial Arts, had occasion recently to make use of the geographical center of Texas in work which he was compiling. Diligent search of the college library failed to reveal the information, even though the heads of departments were called to aid in the search.

In Austin, soon after, the president called at the state library in order to consult an authoritative source of information, but his trouble availed him nothing. No one knew, Dr. Bralley, former state superintendent of schools, is well acquainted in the state departments, and there came to his mind an individual who in the past possessed a ready answer to similar questions.

He was J. H. Walker, chief clerk in the land office, and—he knew. The geographical center of Texas is on a ranch about twenty miles north of Brady, in McCullough County. Mr. Walker recalled the fact to mind instantly by virtue of the discussion waged years ago over the location of the state university.

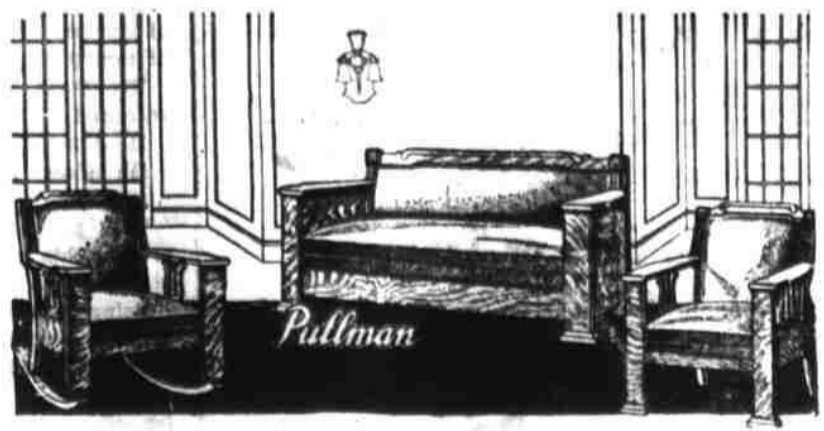

Manure Spreader Pays Its Way.

Few farmers realize the great importance of a manure spreader from the standpoint of increasing the returns to be secured from a ton of manure. Most of them think that the principal value of a spreader is that of saving labor. This is only one of the reasons why a manure spreader is advantageous.

The evenness of spreading and the greater area which can be covered with manure through the use of a spreader, are very important considerations. Experiments have shown that the thinner manure is applied, the greater the return in crop value from each ton of manure. Of course, it becomes uneconomical to scatter manure very thin since it requires so much expense in going over the land, but in most cases, applications down to five or six tons per acre are desirable.

This is particularly true where there is insufficient manure to cover all the land. In other words, if a farmer has 200 tons of manure and forty acres of a crop needing fertilizer, it is usually better to apply this over the whole forty acres at five loads per day than to cover one-half the land at double this application. This can be done only with a manure spreader.—Western Farm Life.
