## Commissioners Adopt Fire Call Policy

The County proposes to pay \$100 per fire call outside the city limits and dig at least 20 percent of the pits for solid waste disposal at no cost to the city and dig other pits as the county has time for at no cost to the city.

In dedicating the 100-foot right of way, it was noted that a paving contract for the 10 miles is to be let in December. Upon completion, this will provide a paved highway between SH207 west to the Sherman County line.

Sheriff R. L. McFarlin was authorized to hire a new deputy for his department. Commissioners did not act at this time on consideration of uniforms for the department starting with an outlay of \$400 and then \$100 per year.

Two applicants for the position of agricultural extension agent for the county were interviewed at length by the Commissioners with a decision to be announced at a future date.

Commissioners also accepted the minutes of the last meeting, received the treasurer's report and paid claims for September and part of October as presented.

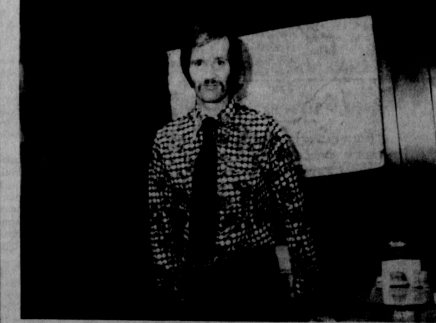

# In Depth with Coach Sherwood

Gregg Sherwood was raised in Panhandle, Texas. Before graduating from Panhandle High School he played four years of both football and basketball.

Coach Sherwood went to WFSU to begin his college education. He majored in Physical Education and in Biology, receiving his degrees in 1959.

He started coaching as a junior high school coach assisting in all sports at Baker Junior High School in Austin, Texas. He was there for one year.

Sherwood's next coaching job was at Comanche, Texas, where he was the high school football line coach at this AAA school for one year.

In the fall of 1961 Coach Sherwood went to Dalhart where he assisted in all sports under Head Coach Doug Ebbidge, who is now at Port Neches Grove. Port Neches has the best record of any AAA school in the state over the last four years.

After assisting at Dalhart for 3 years Coach Sherwood became the Head Football Coach there, where he remained for five years; accumulating a won-lost record of 41-8-1, the best percentage of wins in Dalhart's history.

In 1970 he went to Liberal Kansas as their Head Football Coach. Liberal had not won 5 games of any season prior to his arrival, for 15 years. At the end of Coach Sherwood's first year there, Liberal was ranked fourth in the state and at the end of his second year, they were ranked second in the state.

After Liberal, Greg Sherwood went to Kismet, Texas where they finished second in the district that year. He only stayed there one year.

Coach Sherwood quit coaching and decided to take a job at Vega High School as the Principal. A combination of his missing coaching and some strong encouragement from Mrs. Sherwood that he get back into coaching, prompted his decision to come to Spearman as the Athletic Director and Head Coach.

The halls of Spearman High School were graced with the big coaches presence in the fall of 1973. As Athletic Director his duties include taking care of district and non-district sports scheduling for all sports, acquiring officials for the games (which is done a year in advance), the scheduling of school transportation for all activities; besides being the Head Football Coach and the Head Track Coach. He is also responsible

for delegating all of the other coaching duties to his staff.

As a football parent Coach Sherwood who has two boys that play football, feels that instead of just having the two boys he feels like he is the third parent for 95 boys and enjoys every minute of it. He told us that if he had any goal in life it would just be to have the opportunity (which he has) to work with the young men.

(Editor's Note: Coach Sherwood builds sports dynasties where-ever he goes. His 48-8-1 record at Dalhart is one that would be cherished by any coach, as would be the fact that he took a school like Liberal, Kansas who hadn't had a winning season in 15 years and made champions out of them, and the fact that he has won 44 out his last 50 games here in Spearman. Coach Sherwood doesn't just make winners out of football teams. He surrounds himself with coaches that make winners. Coach Newton took the Lynxettes to state and brought them home as State Champions (Coach Newton was named AA Girls Basketball Coach of the year last year). Coach Williams coached the AA State Champion Pole Vaulters last year and Coach Hamilton had a State Golf Finalist last year. Another little item that

may have gone overlooked by many was the fact that under Head Track Coach Sherwood and his staff, Spearman became the District I-AA Track Champions last year for the first time ever. Mixing separates is another idea. Consider the addition of a jacket, sweater or blouse that can be worn with existing garments creating additional looks.

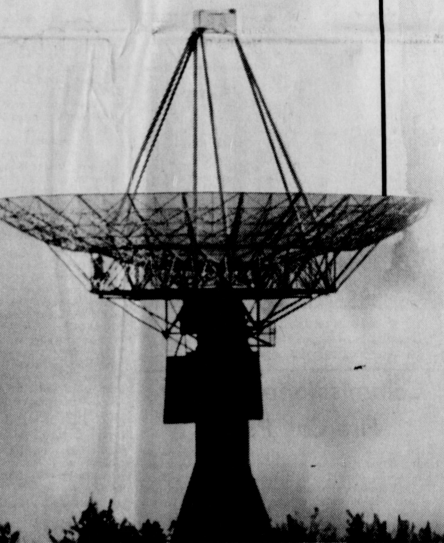

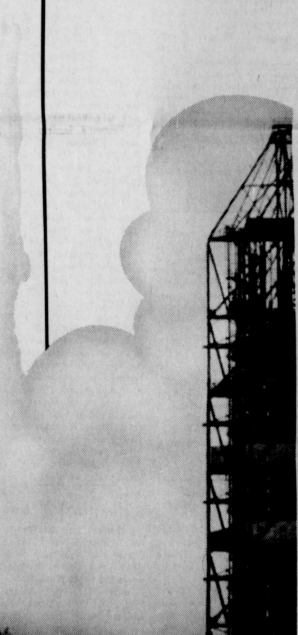

## Our Heritage of Faith

notes from Faith Lutheran Church

October 31 will mark the 460th anniversary of the Reformation. What Dr. Martin Luther started in 1517 was not important only for the Lutheran Church. But what Luther did could be said to have contributed to the formation of all the churches that make up Protestantism, as well as having led to many of the changes in the Catholic Church.

Luther himself, never intended to start a new church. Luther's intention was to renew the church of his day in order that the Word of God might be simply and truly proclaimed and not that the traditions and ideas of men be proclaimed as though they came from God. But when Luther and those who followed his teachings were cast out of the church of that day, they formed a new church and Protestantism was born. There were other reformers who were inspired and encouraged by Luther's actions to speak out against the errors which they saw. But they did not all agree with Luther's teachings so this led to the beginning of other churches.

A divided Christendom composed of many different churches does not seem to be what Christ desired for the Church, nor is it a pleasant existence for us. This division is often times the cause of divisions within families and of loss of friendship, as well as the cause of arguments, confusion, questions, and self doubt. Changes in a church can likewise be a time of hard decisions and may cause divisions.

But it is out of just such unpleasantness and difficulties that God works to bring good. It is not good that the Christian Church should be divided, but it is good if as a result we are led to search the Scriptures for ourselves and are thereby led to make our own decision of what we believe. God has worked this for good if we are not to trust in the church we belong to and in what they say, but rather that we trust only in God and in His mercy revealed to us in Jesus our Lord and Savior as His Word tells us.

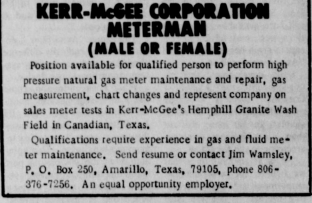

Axial-Flow Combine enables the farmer to harvest more of his crops, more efficiently, and at greater speeds. The name, "Axial-Flow", describes the radically-different threshing and separating system, according to the dealer. While a conventional machine has a threshing cylinder mounted across the unit, the IH Axial-Flow Combine features the single large-diameter rotor, mounted lengthwise. This spinning rotor, the only moving part in the threshing/separating system, creates a gentle rubbing action that is repeated several times as the crop is moved in a

## ALEC GUINNESS IS SPACE WARRIOR IN "STAR WARS"

"I feel movies can be a positive influence in people's lives. Something really good should come from a motion picture," said Alec Guinness, who currently stars in George Lucas' "STAR WARS." "A good story can show how people can overcome obstacles, rise to the occasion. When I read the script for STAR WARS, it had something that made me high, held my attention. It was an adventure story about the passing of knowledge and the sword from one generation to the next." Guinness' new film is an action-filled space fantasy in which he portrays Ben Kenobi, the last of the Jedi Knights, one of the greatest warriors of the Old Republic, who once again leads the fight against the sinister Galactic Empire. Written and directed by George Lucas and produced by Gary Kurtz, "STAR WARS," a 20th Century-Fox release, opened Wednesday at the Lyric Theatre. The film also stars Mark Hamill, Harrison Ford, Carrie Fisher and Peter Cushing. "One of the difficulties of being in my sixties is that I can't pick and choose quite as much as I could in my thirties. But my role in STAR WARS has been described as a blend of the Wizard Merlin and a Samurai warrior, and you can't beat that," Guinness commented. "Unlike most space fantasy, the characters George Lucas has created aren't cardboard. And the story is gripping. There's a quest, encounters with other forms of life, and conflict between good and evil. The good wins, which is a novelty these days." Actually, I think my films have been, on the whole, positive. I think even the comedies, such as The

Captain's Paradise, The Lavender Hill Mob, The Man in the White Suit and Kind Hearts and Coronets showed that anyone with ingenuity and aspirations can do something with their lives. People like to see that. And even though the characters I played often bent the law to achieve their ends, they had a sense of adventure to them. Audiences related to those characters. "I suppose I start from the outside of the character and work in. It's wrong, but I can't stop my imagination," he said as he explained his acting methods. Although he might consider the methods he uses wrong, the results he has achieved have been lauded by critics and applauded by film and theatre audiences throughout the world. When asked to further amplify on his acting technique, Alec Guinness, who is generally reluctant to talk about either his public or private lives, allowed a brief glimpse into what make his characterizations so memorable. "Never having been a handsome juvenile, I've always been a character actor. I've always been determined that my work should be different each time I act. Actors are notoriously and perennially worried about being out of work, but Guinness confided he's being lucky. He has worked continuously since John Gielgud, who took an interest in him when he was starting, cast young Guinness in his production of "Hamlet." "Then Guinness himself got the chance to play Hamlet when the great director Tyrone Guthrie staged the play."

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### Joubert Relates Message

By BOBBUNDY

The Disciples were from all walks of life so it is not unusual for a man to leave one career in order to begin another in full-time evangelism work.

In an age when most people would hesitate before giving up an apparent fixed and comfortable way of life, Corrie Joubert, formerly of South Africa and now of Tulsa, Okla., gave up his activities in a field where he had become established to devote his time and energies to full-time evangelism work.

He is in Spearman for Four Unforgettable Nights of evangelism at the Hansford County Show-barn.

The same motivation which made him successful in his governmental career is the propelling force in his new efforts.

The need for such a mission. Trained as a food scientist technologist, Joubert was instrumental in establishing a food science program for South Africa primarily designed to provide frozen meals for hospital use.

He is careful to explain that the program, which was perfected by 1972, is not just the bulk freezing of meat, produce and other ingredients to be turned into meals later by a hospital cook but is the mass production in a central meal preparation center of individual meals.

The 300 individual meal varieties were perfected into the system and the production was set at the rate of 15,000 meals per eight hour day. And the meals are prepared to fit patient diets while hospitalized.

Why this emphasis on freezing individual meals principally for use by hospitals? Joubert provides the simple answer. A shortage of personnel in food service categories for Saturday and Sunday duty or who don't like to get up at 5:30 a.m. to prepare meals.

During his research, from his headquarters in Capetown City, he traveled to many other countries in studying the techniques used there in similar activities. He found West Germany to be the most advanced at that time. He observed in his trips to the United States that not too many hospitals were using such a system, although it is being used commercially in some other nations.

It was during all his research that he also discovered the path to his present work -- the need for the application of the principles of the Word of God by businessmen in daily living.

His principal approach is to teach the truth of the Bible and that any Christian employing the principles of the Word of God can successfully function.

The Bible message remains true and constant -- everyone can be saved, he emphasizes. And Joubert particularly wants to get his message across that Christianity is the most effective way of life in the world today.

His ultimate goal is the acceptance by the individual of the authority established by God over an individual's talents and then to use those talents with reliance on the Truth of the Bible.

Joubert and his family made no great preparations for their new way of life. Instead, they relied on the Biblical admonition that if you freely give, you also will freely receive.

He is affiliated with Tulsa Lighthouse Ministries and, in connection with his personal appearances around the nation, provides Bible study tapes and accompanying texts to be coordinated with the individual's Bible work.

While primarily interested in evangelism, Joubert also had a word of advice for the educational system in this nation. He

is of the opinion that more discipline is necessary in schools today and he speaks as the parent of four children attending school.

Noting that he has made personal appearances in some 20 states prior to his appearance in Spearman, covering communities from Minnesota to the Carolinas, Joubert is to travel to Greeley, Colorado, from Spearman.

While he is on the road at various times throughout the year, his wife and the children stay in Tulsa, keeping up the work of the Tulsa Lighthouse Ministries.

His Spiritual Renewal Crusade is designed to underline the benefit of being a Christian through daily application of the Word of God as found in the Bible.

This is not Joubert's first trip to Spearman. He was here earlier this year under the auspices of the Full Gospel Business Men's Fellowship International.

During his crusade here this week, his musical support is coming from various Spearman churches, among them being the choir from the First Methodist Church and the Portraits of Proof vocal septet from the First Baptist Church.

After his scheduled appearance in Colorado, Joubert tentatively is scheduled to take his Crusade to Hutchinson, Kansas.

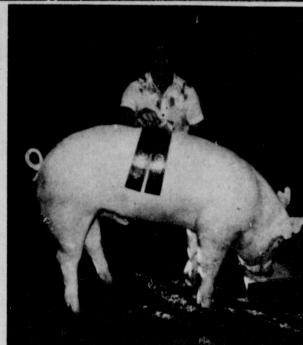


### Sherwood Says

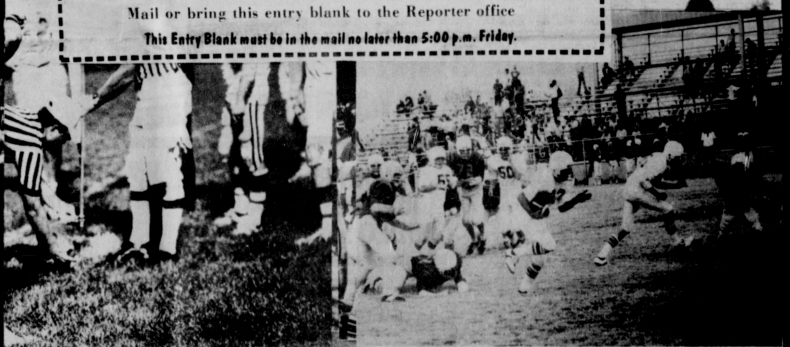
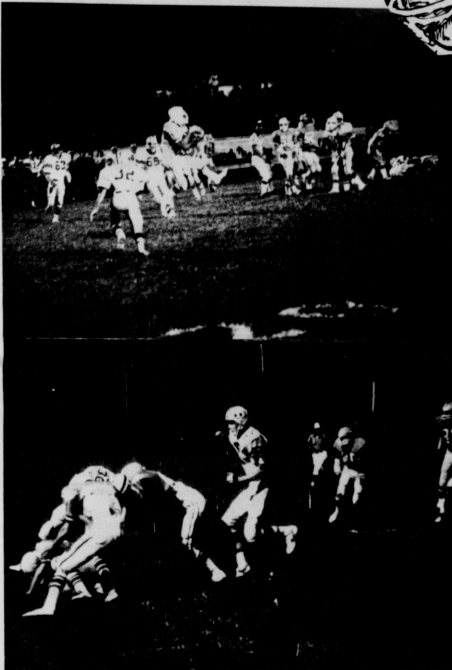

### Tim Assiter Farm Center Role Expanding

The Farmer needs and expects profit. He needs to keep up with the best available programs and products. He also needs a reliable source for the information. One of the farmer's major sources of information is the farm center he happens to choose. As government regulation and production costs increase, the farmer will depend even more on the farm center recommendations and service. Farm center personnel keep up with the best product information and use. Normally we have some use for new products, on certain situations, and therefore, get to compare new products to products we normally apply. These comparisons give the dealer first-hand information to produce use in the local area. Farm centers also work closely with "experts" from suppliers. Supplier personnel and agronomist add to a farm center's work force when special needs or problems arise. So, if we don't have all the answers, we will try to find the help that does. Close contact with farmers is a major advantage. We need information from the farmer, too. We need to know how a certain seed, chemical, or fertilizer program resulted. This allows for further attention to the program or to disqualify it altogether. One last thought—we need to know what services or products you need from us. We have asked for your cooperation, so if you have thoughts or ideas, express them to us. We may need some time to get them together before the season starts.

## Local Male Population Tons Too Heavy

What Hansford County residents weigh, on average, and what they should weigh for proper health, are two different things, it appears. While the problem is a general one, it is particularly evident in the male segment of the population. Men are considerably heavier now than in former years. Much of their extra

weight has been accumulated in the last decade or two. To meet the "desirable weight" standards recommended by medical authorities and insurance companies, the local male population over age 18 would have to shed some 44,000 pounds (around 22 tons). As for the women, they have been gaining, too. But not to

the same extent. They have made more of an effort to stay slim. Fashion has a great deal to do with it. When style dictates a slender look, the proceed to diet and reduce. By the same token, local people have been getting taller, year by year. The average Hansford County man has added 7/10ths of an inch to his height since 1960, the figures indicate. He is now slightly over 5 feet 9 inches tall, without shoes. Local women have also been growing. They now top 5 feet 3 1/2 inches, which is about half an inch more than before. Assumed is that the general national rate applies locally. The findings are based upon a new sample survey conducted by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare and upon similar data gathered in 1960 as part of the Health Examination Survey. A comparison of the two studies shows that the average man over age 18 has put on more than six pounds during that period and now weighs 172 pounds. Applied locally, it means that age men in that age group are 11,000 pounds heavier than they would have been in 1960. As for the women, despite their greater concern with weight, they now average 143 pounds, which is three pounds more than in 1960. For Hansford County's female population over age 18, the overall increase amounts to 6,000 pounds.

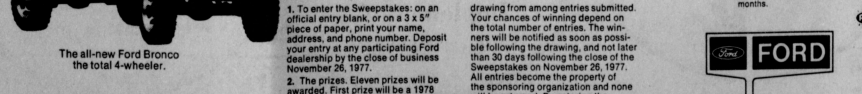
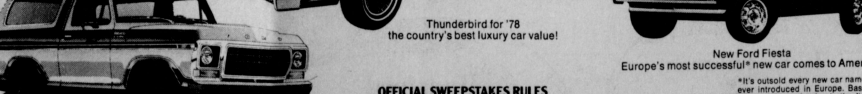
## Halloween Carnival

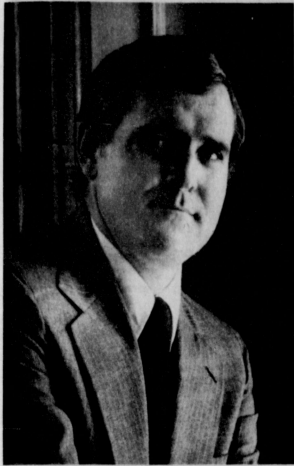

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State Treasurer Candidate Visits

State Treasurer Candidate Harry Ledbetter visited Spearman today, telling local leaders and citizens that his campaign is based upon three key issues: trust, leadership and competence.

A West Texas native, Ledbetter said the Treasurer's Office is important because the Treasurer is the public's banker and all Texans are his stockholders.

"This office, possibly more than any other, demands the

highest standards of ethical performance and conduct," Ledbetter said. "I will earn the voters' trust by doing the job honestly, fairly and openly."

The Democratic candidate said Texas needs "imaginative leadership in the Treasury to keep pace with the state's modern, dynamic economy."

In the important area of money management, Ledbetter said he would review Treasury policies and that "wherever

possible, the taxpayer's money should put to work earning the best rate of return available on the money market."

However, he said, a successful investment policy must be balanced by the needs for security and liquidity and by the fact that state deposits can stimulate local economic activity throughout the state.

"State deposits have an important role in providing available credit for consumer use for agricultural and business enterprises and to stimulate the purchase of local government securities - for example, school district bonds," Ledbetter said.

Born in Abilene and raised in Breckenridge, Ledbetter, 33, is now an Austin financial and business analyst. He received his master's degree in economics and business from Texas A&M, where he quarterbacked the 1965-66 football teams.

Ledbetter said that his education and his nine years' experience in key state government finance jobs with the Legislative Budget Board, Lieutenant Governor's Office and Comptroller's Office fill the need for competence in the Treasurer's Office.

"The Treasurer's job is simply too important to be left to the unprepared or inexperienced," he said. "I've done my homework on the Treasurer's Office and know what needs to be done."

City Upgrading Gas System

At the present time the City of Spearman is upgrading the municipal gas system from an old low pressure (8 ounces) system to an intermediate (15 pounds) system looped with a 40-pound high pressure line in their distribution system. City Manager Mark Neff has announced.

There are some places in town that have had low gas pressure in years past because of inadequate line sizes, low pressure lines and the absence of a loop line to carry enough gas during gales of heavy demand to many areas of the city.

In January of this year, Mayor Ralph Blodgett signed contracts with the Economic Development Administration for water and gas systems improvement projects in Spearman.

T.O.K. Company of Amarillo was the low bidder at \$282,079, \$0 for gas system construction and improvements to the system. Part of the work consisted of installing 17,530 feet of 4-inch line, 4,470 feet of 3-inch line and 45,361 feet of 2-inch line.

All the work is being done in the residential and commercial areas of the City.

Other work consisted of re-building seven regulator stations at various locations throughout the City as well as

conversion of an ounce pressure system to a pound pressure system within the City.

Neff also pointed out at that time that work under this contract was to include installation of cathodic protection on all metal installations left within the system.

A major portion of the work has been done, Neff pointed out Tuesday, Oct. 25, adding that the contractor had 365 days in which to complete the contract. There have been several instances of low pressure on the purchasers side of the meter in the past few weeks. The reason for this is that where customers have been on the old low pressure system they have now been changed over to the new intermediate system.

Neff continued by pointing out that the low pressure system operated on an 8-ounce pressure in the distribution lines in the alley. They now are operating off of a 15-pound line with a house regulator set at 4.5-ounces feeding the customer's homes and appliances.

This pressure is recommended for residential appliances manufacturers for optimal performance. Some appliances will need to be reset by the homeowners to function properly, Neff added.

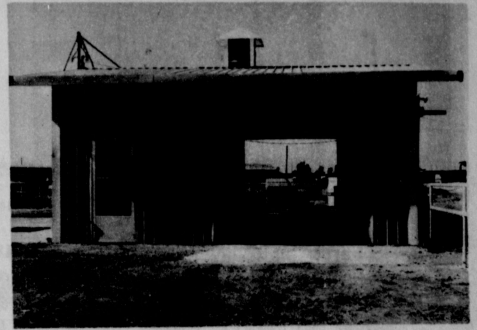

Council Acts On Items

Excel Chevrolet Olds was the successful bidder on a new police patrol car for the city, a change in ambulance rates was recommended and the city's legal staff is to make recommendations for modifying or updating requirements for the solicitors ordinance in Spearman following action on those agenda items Tuesday, Oct. 25, by City Council during the regular session at City Hall.

Excel was one of three bidders and the firm's low bid was \$4,955.27 for the vehicle in compliance with specifications advertised by the City. Delivery of the Nova, four-door sedan, is to be made in four to six weeks. No trade-in allowance was mentioned in the bidding.

Under changes recommendations in ambulance rates, an action taken to provide replacement funds and such other expenses as might occur, the proposed new rate per call is \$30 inside or outside the City limits, a transportation charge outside city limits of \$1 per mile one way, a nurse charge which is extra if a nurse is required and the rate to be decided, and

increasing the charge for oxygen from \$2 to \$5 inside the City limits and \$10 outside the City limits, if used, and the proposed rates to become effective as approved by the hospital directors and county officials required to act on such matters.

City Attorney P. A. Lyon and the municipality's legal department were authorized to begin study on recommendations for updating or modifying the City's solicitors ordinance.
