

# Sherwood accepts Plainview grid job

Spearman Greg Sherwood, whose Spearman football teams haven't lost a District 1-AAA game in five years as head coach here, yesterday accepted the athletic directorship and head football position at Plainview High School.

Sherwood succeeds George Kirk, who resigned after four seasons to accept the head football job at Klein High School.

The Plainview job was offered

to Sherwood Friday, and he accepted yesterday.

"It was a difficult decision," said Sherwood. "Spearman is a very pleasant place to work, and we've had good teams here."

"The advancement into Class AAAA and the challenge is a part of it, and I like the aspect of it being one school in one community. I've had some other AAAA jobs offered, but they were part of multi-school systems."

"Plainview hasn't won (Plainview never has advanced into post-season football play), but I think there's a good possibility they can win. I wouldn't be going if I thought they couldn't win. It might not be right now, but then, it just might be."

"Lubbock Monterey (4-AAAAA football post-season representative three of the last four years) has the tradition of winning district championships, which Plainview doesn't have, but when I came here, Dalhart had the tradition of winning district championships Spearman didn't have."

During Sherwood's five years here, the Lynx have won 47, lost 10 and tied one. Spearman lost three of its first four games under Sherwood, but has won 46 of its last 54.

The Lynx tied for the 1-AAA title in '73, but lost the playoff right by virtue of a coin flip. Spearman was state runner-up in '74, but was knocked off in the bi-district round the next three seasons by Childress. The Bobcats reached the finals two of those seasons and were in the semifinals last year.

Under Sherwood, Spearman rolled up enviable overall athletic success. With Sherwood as coach, Spearman's boys' track team won the school's first loop

title last spring. During his five years here, the girls' golf and girls' basketball teams coached by Ralph Newton won state championships. Girls' track was started. The boys' and girls' tennis teams won their respective district titles each year.

"I've taken a lot of pride in having an all-around program, and I'll strive to do that too in Plainview," said Sherwood.

Sherwood owns 13 years of head-coaching experience, five at Dalhart, two at Liberal, Kan., and one at Kermit. His career record is 107-29-2. He's never had a losing season in football.

He's been an athletic director each of those 13 seasons. "What will I remember about Spearman? Our '74 season is one thing and being able to play well against Dalhart. Mr. (James) Cunningham (Spearman superintendent) has been great to work for too. It's been a very pleasant situation."

Sherwood said he'll have the freedom to bring in some assistant coaches. "But I'll look at the people they have now. I'm sure they have some good coaches there."

Sherwood and his wife, Jacquelyn, have two sons. Scott (a two-year quarterback starter here), 18, and Stan, 15. Scott will be a senior next year.

## Three Men To Washington

The Spearman Chamber of Commerce held a meeting Monday, February 6, at Martin's Steak Garden to discuss the effect the farm situation is having on the economy of the area. Forty-five local businessmen attended this meeting which was conducted by Jim McLean, President of the Chamber of Commerce.

The group decided to send three men to Washington next week to inform the people on Capitol Hill of the plight of the businesses of the area. They will take with them letters of testimony from local businessmen, a report on the areas financial situation, and what the future holds for our area if things continue to go as they are now.

The men to go are now, Ralph Blodgett, Mayor of Spearman and a leading business man, J. L. Brock, Insurance man, and Jim Shirley, Vice President of the First State Bank of Spearman were selected to represent our businessmen in Washington.

## American Ag

SOME WARNINGS  
The USDA just recently tried to pull a "sneaky" on the farmers of America.

You got a notice from the ASCS just recently that you had an opportunity to reduce the length of the loan period on your wheat by 60 days from June 30, '78 back to April 30, '78. No incentive, just 2 months less storage. Why?

It appears that since farmers still control 63% of the wheat nationally they just might fear a shortage. It has come to our attention from a farmer on the South Plains, who is an ex-co-agent and Ag. teacher and has some inside information from Washington, that the USDA says it is too "expensive" for them to carry the "Strategic Reserve" of grain for this nation and the world. Luckily, not one farmer in Hansford County signed to reduce the time on the loan.

This was "sneaky" #1!  
A "sneaky" #2 is a notice the farmers received in the last few days concerning the "Strategic Reserve". You have an opportunity to put your wheat in the reserve until a certain period. "A Deadline" loaded with psychology—a limited amount in a first come, first serve basis. Also, the newspapers have been full of information, no doubt put out by the USDA that they will pick up the tab for the storage at 20 cents bu. There is talk of them raising this to 25 cents. They lead you to believe that they are paying. Don't let them kid you. They loan you the money for this storage and it goes on your other loan and you pay interest in the storage too. Sneaky, yes sir!

This "strategic reserve" is for a 3-year period with penalties for redeeming under certain conditions and when the price gets to a certain point, you will have to redeem it or let them have it.

Oh! If the USDA thinks it is too costly for them—can you afford it?  
Just piling more on your own back. Making the farmers of America carry the reserve of

wheat in case of drought here and abroad.

Study this move, put a pencil to it. Think-and figure what the wheat will have to bring in three years to offset the storage and interest that you will be paying!

It is our thinking, since we have 5 more months on the loans, that the price of wheat might rise to a good profit on what you have in the loan. If you still control it, the "strategic reserve" limits your decisions. We would advise to "STEER CLEAR OF IT!"

Don't be mad at the local ASCS. This writer used to travel the entire North Plains, Oklahoma Panhandle, northeast New Mexico and southwest Kansas selling a product that the ASCS office had a part in. Our local office is the #1 office in being helpful and courteous. Pat them on the back.

## Lions Serve Super Feb. 14

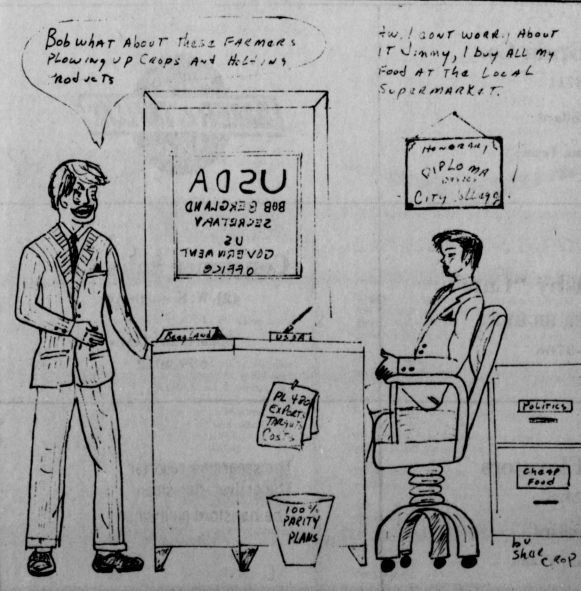
