

some people back to reality. In a Panhandic nursing home recently a Texa Department of Health volunteer learned of a man who stayed on his bed and failed to communicate with anyone. "In effect," said Lucy Hestir, volunteer consultant in the Patient Care Services Division of the Department, "the man had just given up. But this volunteer began visiting and just taking to him. Finally, he started responding, steind responding, again matrixities at the more." again home

In another case, an In another case, an Austin male teacher decided to invest part of his summer vacation in volunteer activities. It became apparent to him, said Mrs. Hestir, that men needed more help than women. Most m e n h a d b e e n accustomed to active business lives and felt pushed aside by their configuration

business lives and felt pushed axide by their confinement. "The teacher interested others in volunifering, and he and his friends started taping conversations of residents concerning the ir previous occupations and travis. Young men in the same or related fields of endeavor were brought into the volunteer program. Before long, said Mrs. Hestir, many young men took advantage of the business expertise offered by nursing the field of alded to the feeling of self-worth among residents."

Volunteer activities aren't new to the Texas Department of Health, since they have been on going in the Department's Chest Hospitals for some 20 years. But, since the Department received additional autonity in the nusing home field, he volunteer program is being expanded and coordinated through the Patient Care Services (PCS) Division, directed

(PCS) Division, directed by Dr. B. D. Pierce. Regional social supervisors in the PCS Division are being involved more and more in the volunteer program, and indoctrination and training programs, and indoctrination and training programs are being indo the set of the set of

their hair, or perhaps take them on excursions outside the home. A project underway in Austin emphasizes a variety of activities. In a combined volunteer program between that city's nursing homes, residents who are able are taken annually to the circus. Volunteer altos take them on pienics, stage domino tournaments and have even taken residents night cl u b bing. Volunteers pick up the

residents and return them to the home. "This program has been very successful and very rewarding." says Mrs. Hestir, "and it"s something volunteers statewide could do." Mrs. Hestir says she feels that volunteers get as much out of the program as the program is large, and she sees a growth in the future.

she sees a growth in the future. We had about 20,000 volunteers a month working in nursing homes when we moved to the Texas Department of Health from the Department of Health Resources last fall, she said.

fail, she said. December is always a big month for volunteer activity, and last December 50,000 volunteers gave some 150,000 hours. Mr s. He st ir emphasized that there's a big job to be done in this field, since there are more than 1,000 licensed nursing homes in Texas. Anyone has something to give to a nursing home resident, and in giving the volunteer also receives.
