

Lynx Hammer Henrietta 95-66

Coach Moore was smiling after the game at Memphis Tuesday night. He was proud for his boys as they literally demolished a good Henrietta team 95-66, and it could have easily been over 100 points but he put in his wracking crew in the fourth quarter to try and hold the score down! Fans ached at the final outcome of the game as the torrid Lynx hit 35 field goals and 25 free throws to score the 85 points.

Newton hit 5 of 6 free throws and 2 of 3 field goals for 9 points; Jones hit 4 out of 5 shots from the floor and 7 of 8 free throws for 15 points; Reid, who along with Friemel, seemed to hold the team together the first half hitting 100% from the floor, 4 of 7 free throws for 13 points. Reid had the best night of his career and, as we said, he shot 5 times and hit 5 field goals for 100% which is perfection! Friemel also had a great first half when the team was having a time getting started. He hit 7 of 12 from the floor and made 1 of 5 free throws. Scott Martin almost had a 100% night! Scott hit 5 times from the floor and made 4 and he hit 3 out of 4 free throws for 11 points! Pool hit 3 of 6 from the floor for 6 points. Shields had another good night as he hit 2 of 6 from the floor and 3 of 6 from the free throw line for 7 points. Connelly hit 1 of 2 free throws.

The Lynx team shot an unbelievable 67.30% from the floor making 35 of 50 shots from the field! And they made 25 of 44 free throws for 55%!

The game was in doubt for the first three quarters, action! In fact the smooth running Bearcats held a 14-12 lead at the end of the first quarter and had actually jumped into a 6 point lead on the Lynx in the 2nd quarter as local fans began to feel uneasy! But the Lynx running game took hold just before the half and the Bearcats began to feel the results of the "Lynx Bench" as Moore literally ran the Bearcats off of the

court by half time! If we had two stars the first half, in Reid and Friemel, we had a whole host of stars the second half, as Barber, who lead all scorers with 19 points, found the range and bombed the hapless Bearcats with 7 straight field goals. Jones had a good second half also as he hit every field goal he shot after the first quarter.

The game was a spectator's delight! The running, gunning, sweat slobber and spit, offense of Coach Moore's was too much for the talented Henrietta team. And Henrietta got in foul trouble early in the game and didn't hit the bench that the Lynx had! It was just almost too good to believe as the Lynx fans fixed their eyes on Lubbock for the regional tournament! Fans began calling Lubbock at half time for reservations for the Friday-Saturday games!

The Lynx will play Denver City at 9 p.m. Friday in the regional tournament at Lubbock. Denver City has a 21-8 record and is one of the finest teams in the regional tournament. The other two teams in the AA bracket are Dimmitt and Socorro. They will play at 7:30 Friday night.

In other basketball action, the Spearman girls will play the winner of the Henrietta-Olney game which will be decided Thursday night when those two teams meet. Probably the way things look now the Lynxettes will play Henrietta either Monday or Tuesday night, probably at Memphis or Clarendon! But in the meantime with two teams in the state play-offs, the plot thickens and probably the Lynxettes will have a practice game against Follett this Thursday night in Spearman!

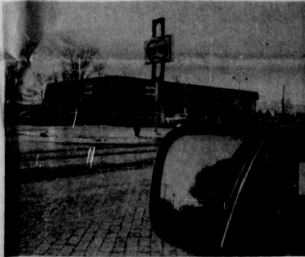

Casket bearers were James Parrish, Jim Evans, Mark Parrish, David Evans, and Scott Sherwood.

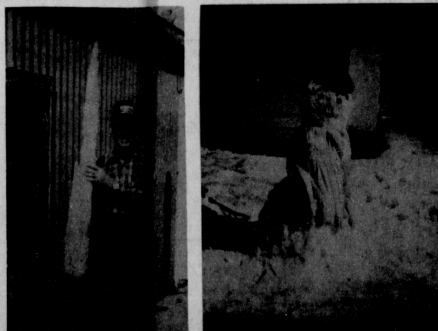

Price Readying Sales Force Proposal

Pampa -- Senator Bob Price, announced from his Pampa office today that he is now drafting a proposal earmarking an appropriate amount of state funds for Texas agricultural sales teams, which would travel to foreign countries to sell Texas agricultural products. Price plans to introduce this proposal when the Legislature meets in January 1979.

Senator Price said that the sales teams would be responsible for making contact in advance with interested buyers in foreign countries, so that future meetings could be arranged to sell the products. The sales teams would consist of people selected by the agriculture producers themselves.

"For too long, we have relied on government agricultural salesmen and overseas attaches

to be our salesmen," Price said. "It is time the agriculture producers of this state and the nation take on the responsibility of selling their products in the world market."

"I believe an aggressive world sales force can double our overseas sales in five years, with results that production would not have to be curtailed. Our great country was not built on running at half throttle."

Senator Price explained other duties of the sales teams. Prior to transactions of a sale, the sales team would be responsible for obtaining export clearance forms from the U. S. Department of Agriculture, and contacting the proper authorities for export licenses. In addition, Price said, the teams must check on the availability of foreign sales loans to the buying

nations, and they must secure land and sea transportation for products they sell.

Senator Price also announced today his staff selections for his district office in Pampa and his Capitol office in Austin.

Margaret Spearman will head the office in Pampa. Margaret is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Spearman, who ranch near Pampa. Margaret graduated with honors from Pampa High School in 1973, and holds a B.A. degree in History from Texas Tech.

Kathy Morris, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Ray Morris of Perryton, holds the position of first secretary in Austin. Kathy has had extensive experience as legal secretary and office manager. She was personnel officer for the American National Bank, and she also worked for the American Quarterhorse Association. Kathy was raised in Perryton in Ochiltree County. Her father farms near there, and her mother is a school teacher in the Perryton school system. Kathy graduated from Harding Academy in Searcy, Arkansas, where she majored in business. She attended Amarillo College, Harding College in Searcy, and Midwestern University in Wichita Falls.

Senator Price's legislative assistant is Thomas Davis, 47. Davis, a graduate of Texas Lutheran College, was Senator J. P. Word's administrative assistant, and was also the chief clerk of the Senate re-districting committee in the early 1970's. He is married and has two daughters.

Ret Andrew will be press and research assistant. Andrew, a journalism graduate from the University of Texas has been an aide to Senator Walter Mengdon.

Mrs. Marion Mercer Damen of Austin will be a secretary in the Austin office. Marion, a graduate of Southwestern Texas State University, has worked in state government over a period of years. She has worked in the Attorney General's office, and she has also been a legal secretary for several prestigious law firms.

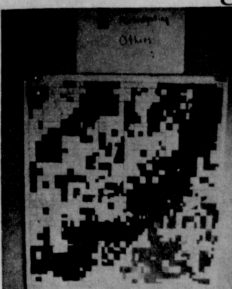

SOME FACTS & INFORMATION ON THE 50-50 PROPOSITION

It is going well in Hansford County. Just about 50% of the 183,000 acres goal for idle land has been pledged. This has been farmers that come in voluntarily to the Ag office. Teams of farmers have been set up, your neighbors and friends, to call on each individual farmer in the county. We will ask your support. There will be no pressure. We will explain it to you, answer your questions if we can, and solicit

your participation.

Why this move? Congress is so slow to pass any legislation. They say at their earliest, it would be October before a suitable bill can be passed. Another crop grown and almost harvested by then. 1977 wheat loans will have matured June 30 and milo and corn loans on Sept. 30. The government would have adequate stocks to control the market like they have in the past. So the time is perfect and in our favor to handle our own fate in agriculture for the following

reasons: The government has no stocks. 2. Farmers still have control of 72% all milo stocks; 65% of all corn; and 62% of all wheat. These are national figures and are documented authentic figures. 3. We control 100% of all agricultural products for 1978. 4. With 50% production in 1978 by destroying 50% of growing wheat, by plow or grazing, we stand to almost double the price of our 1977 wheat that is in the loan. By planting 50% of the milo and corn we will, in our opinion, get more than parity for these crops as well as what we have in the loan. We can control our own destiny!

Don't worry about losing normal crop acres in 1979. If this 50% idle program works, they will be plowing for us to plant in 1979. But are you willing to do your part? It will take a united effort. Do you plan to plant fence to fence and ride your neighbors back? You still have to face yourself and your neighbor. THINK IT OVER AND THINK POSITIVE.

Farmers' Tax Deadline Is March 15

COLLEGE STATION—While most taxpayers have until April 15 (actually April 17) to file their 1977 income tax returns, the filing date for farmers and ranchers is much sooner.

"Agricultural producers who did not file an estimate of their income by Jan. 16 and did not pay the estimated taxes must file their returns and pay due taxes by Mar. 15," said Dr. Richard Trimble, economist in management for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "However, if farmers filed an estimate, they have until the April 17 deadline to file final returns."

Trimble notes that several changes were made in the income tax law during 1977 which should be of interest to Texas farmers and ranchers.

A major change was the elimination of the standard deduction and the low income allowance. These two items have been replaced by a flat amount called "zero bracket amount." This amount depends on your filing status.

"The zero bracket amount is not a separate deduction, but the equivalent amount is built into the new simplified tax tables and tax rate schedules," explains the economist. "This

is true if you file the 1040 form and itemize deductions will need to make an adjustment if his itemized deductions exceed the amount allowed for his particular filing status."

Another change is that the deduction of \$750 for each exemption and the general tax credit have been built into the new tax tables, so there is no need for the taxpayer to determine these. The general tax credit has also been revised to consider exemptions for age and blindness, added Trimble.

Filing requirements have also been changed for the 1977 tax year. For example, an individual must file a return if his gross income is \$2,950 or more and a married couple under 65 years of age must file if their joint gross income is more than \$4,700. If both are 65 or older, they may make \$6,200 before being required to file a return.

There are many other minor changes, and Trimble suggests several publications that may be of help. One is publication No. 17, "Your Federal Income Tax," 1978 edition, from the Internal Revenue Service. Another is publication No. 225, "Farmer's Tax Guide," 1978 edition, is also available from the IRS or from any county Extension office.

Porter Visits Embassies In Washington

Chalmers Porter of Spearman, who has been in Washington, D.C. as a representative of the American Agriculturists, recently spent some time visiting several of the embassies in Washington, noting some interesting facts and figures from some of these foreign friends of ours.

In an interview with personnel at the French Embassy, Chalmers gleaned that France guarantees their farmers \$4.50 for their wheat but the price at the elevator is \$4.75 and \$4.80. Japan's price to the farmers at the elevator is \$4.70 and \$4.80 and in West Germany, prices at the elevators is quoted \$4.80 and \$4.90.

Gerald McAthern, also an American Agriculture representative, reported that Australia produces its maximum and because the crop production was smaller than usual, none is for sale on the export market from there. Canadian wheat is already committed to Red China.

McAthern also reports that chopped beef is \$5.88 per pound in the meat market in Japan and that steak sold for \$5.00 per pound through the government store there.

More reports will be made concerning agricultural products in the near future from these and other men who have been close to the source of facts and figures in Washington.

Average Tax Deduction Locally

Were the charitable donations made by Hansford County residents in the past year larger or smaller than those made by most other people in their income brackets?

Were their medical expenses, local taxes and interest charges higher or lower?

Taxpayers who are busy assembling their income and expense figures for 1977, in preparation for their annual encounter with Uncle Sam, will be interested to know how their deductible expenditures compare with the average.

Some guidance in this direction, for those who itemize their deductions, comes from the Commerce Clearing House, an authority on business and tax law, based upon data released by the Internal Revenue Service.

It has prepared a breakdown detailing just how much the average taxpayer in each income category has been listing for contributions, medical costs and the like.

In general throughout the country, it reports, families with earnings corresponding to the Hansford County average have been deducting a total of

\$4,750, which is equivalent to about 21 percent of their adjusted gross income.

For those with incomes that are larger than the local average, the amounts deducted are usually greater, but they represent a smaller percentage of their earnings. The converse is true for those with lower incomes.

The total deductions of Hansford County families with earnings of \$17,500, for example, will come to about \$3,960 if they conform to the average. Those with incomes of \$9,500 will be listing close to \$3,250 if they match the norm.

Of the \$4,750 in total deductions taken generally by families with incomes approximating the local average, \$530 is for contributions, \$1,990 for interest on loans and other obligations, \$1,790 for state and local taxes and \$440 for medical and dental expenses.

These are purely guideline figures, it is noted, and are not automatically accepted by the Internal Revenue Service. Proper records must be available to support them.

1978 ACP Handbook Available

Vanderburg noted that federal funds can share the cost of some practices under the ACP. There are seven practices in the Hansford County Program for 1978 and subsequent years. They are:

- Constructing terrace systems to provide control of erosion on cropland and prevent or reduce the pollution of water, land or air from agricultural non-point sources.
- Reorganizing irrigation systems to conserve irrigation water, improve water quality, prevent erosion or prevent or reduce the pollution of water, land or air from agricultural non-point sources.
- Complete details can be obtained from the Hansford County 1978 ACP Handbook which is available at the ASCS office in Spearman, Vanderburg report.

Winter Wheat Seedings Down 10%

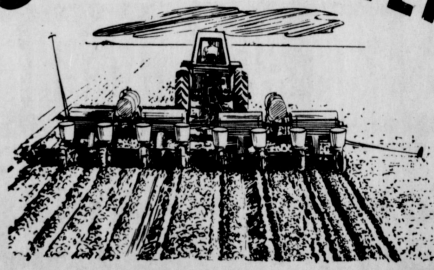
Winter wheat seedlings in Texas are estimated at 5.7 million acres, down 10 percent from last year. Based on December 1 conditions, production during 1978 is expected to total 68.4 million bushels, 42 percent below the 1977 crop. For the first time in three years this production total falls substantially below the 100 million bushels level.

Although plantings during the fall were slowed by a lack of soil moisture, statewide seedlings reaching completion on schedule by the third week in December this past year.

Third Place Winner

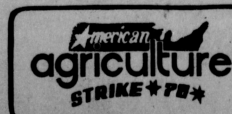

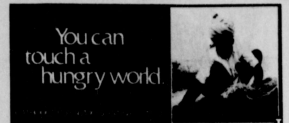
Morse Native To Oppose Hightower

How Fast Savings Double

COLLEGE STATION -- Use the "rule of 72" to determine the approximate length of time it will take to double savings dollars, says Dr. Carolyn McKinney, family resource management specialist.

Dr. McKinney is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

To use the "rule of 72," simply divide the interest rate into 72--the number obtained is the number of years required to double the investment, the specialist continues.

For example, if \$1,000.00 is placed in an account earning 6 percent annual interest, divide the interest rate (6) into 72 and find that it will take 12 years to double the initial investment to \$2,000.00, Dr. McKinney explains.

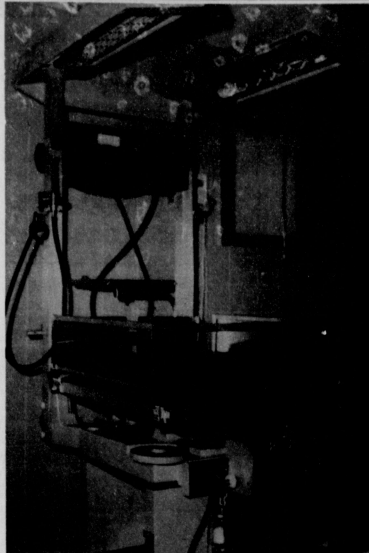

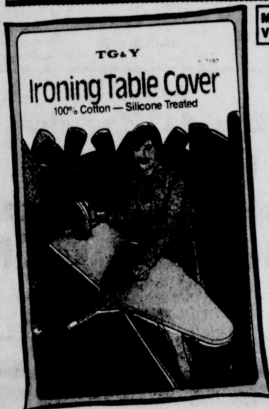
