

RAPID CITY, S.D. - Eight Panhandle-area cowboys and cowgirls will be completing in the National High School Rodeo Finals which opens tonight here.

Seven of those contestants are members of the Tri-State High School Rodeo Association. That group includes Adam Brewster, Mark Pearson, Kristie Spies, Stacy Funk, Holly Shafer, Karen Cochran and Jane Templer. The eighth is

John Templer Jr.
Jane and John Templer Jr. are brother and sister, and the children of John Templer was the rookie cowgirl of the year for the TSHSRA and qualified for the nationals by winning the pole bending competition at the Texas State High School Rodeo. John Templer Jr., a junior in the high school division of New Mexico Military Institute in Roswell, qualified for nationals in cutting competition because of a top-four finish in the New Mexico state rodeo.

Brewster of Snyder and Miss Funk were the Texas' state rodeo all-around cowboy and cowgirl, respectively. Brewster will compete in saddle broncs (fourth in state) and bareback broncs (first in state). Miss Funk will compete in goat tying (first in state) and poles (second in state).

Pearson of Spearman finished second in the state bareback bronc competition to earn his berth in the nationals here this week. Miss Spies of Muleshoe won first in the cutting competition at state.

Miss Shafer of Abernathy and Miss Cochran of Asperment qualified in goat tying finishing fourth and second in state, respectively.

#### Scottish Division to be at Alamo

AUSTIN -- With banners waving and bagpipes piping, 86 members of the Scottish Division of the Royal Army of England will join thousands of Texans at the Alamo on March 6, 1986 to pay a stirring Sesquicentennial-anniversary tribute to heros who died there on that day in 1836.

The pipers, representing three regiments of the British Army, will be sponsored by the Scotland to the Alamo Committee, an officiallysanctioned Sesquicentennial organization. The Alamo ceremony will be the highlight of a two-week visit to Texas in which the infantrymen will recognize the honor the Scots who helped Texas win its independence, said Scotland to the Alamo Committee Chairman Joe

With such colorful names as The Royal Highland Fusiliers, The King's Own Scottish Borderers, First Battalion of the Black Watch and The Argyle and Sutherland Aggie War Hymn,' said Lane.

The pipers will arrive in Austin on February 28, 1986, ad participate in a number of special events in the Austin area including Austin's Texas Independence Day Parade on March 2. Between March 2 and the March 6 festivities in San Antonio, they will be available to towns in the Austin-San Antonio area to enhance other local Sequicentennial celebrations.

As large expenses are involved in bringing the bands to Texas, the Scotland to the Alamo Committee is conducting several fundraising activities. Land emphasized the grassroots approach the Committee is taking in its fundraising. "We want everyone who's ever been thrilled at the sound of a bagpipe to take part. Connie Steger, of First United Methodist Church, Spearman, recently returned from Madision, Wisconsin, where she attended a Bethel Series Teacher Clinic.

The Bethel Series is a tool or an instrument designed to aid church members in gaining a deeper understanding of the biblical message.

Its primary objective is to aid adults in securing a knowledgeable overview of the Scriptures which would serve as a base or a springboard for an indepth study of God's Word.

Neither a survey course nor an in-depth study, the Bethel Series simply attempts to acquaint the student with a basic understanding of both Old and New Testament narratives. It seeks to present these motifs in the clearest, most systematic manner possible so that the student begins to see the interrelationship of events and ideas within the Scriptures, and hence, gains an appreciation for the part as it relates to the whole and the whole as it relates to the part.

Along with its attempt to provide an overview of the biblical message, the Bethel Series also seeks to give the student an appreciation for interpretive principles which must be honored if the Bible is to convey a relevant message:

--- It gives substantial attention to defining the radical difference between Hebrew-thought form and Western thought form, lest the student impose Greek questions upon the Bible and expect answers from the Scriptures which it is neither designed for nor prepared to give.

--- It accents the necessity of seeing the various parts of the biblical message in their direct relationship to the historical context in which that message was given.

--- It seeks to let Scripture interpret Scripture in those segments where there seems, at first sight, to be conflict in concept; and it demands that the part never be interpreted in isolation but always in its relationship to the whole of God's revelation in

The Bethel Series deliberately attempts to avoid theological jargon that belongs in the minister's study or to learned seminars. This is a course designed for lay people, taught by lay people, and geared to speak to lay people. It does not presuppose a strong theological background or understanding on the part of the student.

In classroom presentation, the Bethel Series leans toward the lecture method but does not discourage discussion. The teachers are encouraged to make judgements about the understanding and comprehension levels of their students and to permit or encourage discussion when they feel that such discussion will be meaningful and relevant to the

majority of the members of the class. To aid in the retention of what the student has learned in the study of the Bible itself, the Bethel Series makes use of a series of 40 visual aids. The aids are not "art pieces." They were neither designed nor intended to be so. They are illustrations or posters which serve to summarize a body of knowledge and which carry specific meanings that have been imposed upon them. They have no meaning apart from the purpose which they fulfill in the classrooms where they are used. Merely tools to help the student remember and retain what has been learned, they become secondary to the primary objective, which is to acquaint church members with the message of the Scriptures; and they fall further and further into the background as the study progres-



#### **Bridge construction underway**

AMARILLO -- Construction work is underway on the southbound State Highway 136 Canadian River bridge three miles north of Borger.

The southbound bridge deck will be reconstructed and widened under a \$1,958,722 contract awarded in April by the State Highway and Public Transportation Commission to Heavy-Highway Constructors, Inc., of Amarillo and Washburn.

While the widening and reconstruction work is progressing, SH 136 traffic will be carried on the northbound bridge only one lane in each direction separated by a concrete median barrier.

Jay L. Hawley, Jr. of Borger, State Department of Highways and Public Transportation Resident Engineer, said the detour will be in effect until the work is completed about mid or late summer of 1986. Hawley said the deck, or riding surface, of the southbound bridge was built in 1950 and has deteriorated because of winter freeze-thaw cycles, the use of deicing chemicals during winter storms and because of heavy truck traffic from area oil and agricultural business.

The existing deck will be removed. A new and wider concrete bridge deck will be poured supported by an additional row of columns. The existing deck is narrower than the approach roadways and the new and wider riding surface will then better align with the highway apporach to the bridge.

Hawley is asking for the patience and cooperation of Borger area motorists while the reconstruction work is underway.



#### Toll free line for referendum

Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board has provided a toll-free phone line for the benefit of sorghum farmers who have questions about the forthcoming grain sorghum checkoff referendum. The number, 1-800-692-4169, will be in operation from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday, July 17 to August 15.

Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board (TGSPB) is conducting a statewide referendum on the proposition that grain sorghum may be assessed up to one cent per hundredweight to finance grain sorghum promotion and market development. The program is voluntary. Producers who do not wish to participate will request and promptly receive a refund.

A grain sorghum checkoff program already exists in twenty-nine counties of the Texas High Plains. Sorghum farmers in those counties established TGSPB in a 1969 referendum which approved an automatic assessment of a nickel per ton (one-fourth cent per hundredweight). Farmers in the 29county area already included in TGSPB, will vote on a frefrendum allowing the farmer-elected board to set the assessment at any amount up to, but not over, one cent per cwt. to make their assessment consistent with that being considered by the rest of the state.

The TGSPB checkoff funds are used to finance promotion of Texas grain sorghum throughout the world. In recent years, most of the effort has been concentrated in Mexico. That effort has paid off

with Mexico becoming the number one customer for U.S. sorghumbuying more than half as much in the last three years as Texas produced.


Other sorghum promotion projects have been started in Egypt, Algeria, and China. Plans are underway for livestock feeding demonstrations in several countries in South America and Asia. Implementation of thoe projects depends upon the support of Texas sorghum farmers.

At the same time Texas farmers vote on the checkoff referendum, they will elect directors to seven positions on the board which administers the TGSPB programs. The TGSPB directors—all sorghum farmers themselves—will have complete authority over the program, once it is established. They will set the rate of assessment (within the limit approved by the voters). They will determine collection procedures, decide projects and hire the staff to do the work.

Ballots will be mailed by July 22 to more than 60,000 Texas sorghum farmers on the ASCS rolls. About 13,000 of these producers are in the twenty-line counties which already have a grain sorghum checkoff. The remaining 47,000 are in the new territory which is petitioning expansion.

Any farmer who does not receive his ballot by August 1, may pick one up at the office of his county agent or get one from the TGSPB office by calling the toll-free number 1-800-692-4169.

### Engineers okay Palo Duro lake

A lake on the Palo Duro Creek to control floods and supply water to cities in Moore, Hansford and Hutchinson counties is one of the seven projects nationwide recommended for federal financing by the U.S. Army Corps of Engi-

But, the decision reached in Washington recently places cost of the project -- a lake northwest of Spearman - at \$139 million and limits federal participation at \$6.2

The decision on the North Plains lake at a site northwest of Spearman was reached in Washington recently by the federal Board of Engineers for Rivers and Harbors of the Corps of En-

A draft report by the Corps chief of engineers on the Texas Panhandle project will be sent to Texas Gov. Mark White and "concerned federal agencies for review and comment," according to a U.S. Army Corp of Engineers news release.

"After review at these levels, the report recommendation will be sent to the Secretary of the Army, the Office of Management and Budget, and the U.S. Congress," the release

It adds that the board has recommended the plan "in accordance with cost sharing and financing arrangements satisfactory to the President and the Congress.'

A multi-purpose project, the Corps of Engineers plan is primarily for flood control but would provide a water supply reservoir for North Plains cities and recreation areas or 220,000 visitors a and royalty owners of the potential session to relate what the potential -Benjamin Whichcote. areas are 220,000 visitors a

Participation by the federal agency is one of two plans to build the Palo Duro lake, northwest of Spearman.

The Palo Duro River Authority proposes to build a 60,900 acre foot lake at the same site at a cost of \$53 million. It would be financed by PDRA revenue bonds and state loans and grants.

Both projects include a water purification plant and pipeline system to deliver 7.8 million gallons of drinking water a day to the cities of Dumas, Sunray, Cactus, Stinnett, Gruver and Spear-

The Palo Duro project with its water conveyance system is the first of this type project ever approved by the Corps of Engineers.


