New law to become effective September 1 . . .

## "Fasten seat belt" law to be enforced

In a few weeks, Hansford county motorists -- and drivers all over Texas, for that matter -- must buckle up, the seat belts, that is.

Texas legislators last spring decided that if Texas drivers wouldn't try to save their own lives, a law would be enacted to help them.

Thus, fastened seat belts become the law of the state, beginning Sept. 1.

Those motorists and passengers who forget will receive warnings for 90 days, until Dec. 1, when officers may begin issuing tickets.

The fines are not great -- \$25 to \$50 each, plus court costs of \$13 -- but the money is enough to get the attention of careless drivers.

The law specifies that front seat passengers, as well as the driver, are required to have buckled seat belts in automobiles and light trucks (pickups included) unless the vehicle was not equipped originally with seat belts.

In other words, if the seat belts have been removed deliberately, the fine may be imposed.

An exception to the law may be a person who for medical reasons could not withstand the pressure of a seat belt.

Otherwise the law is applicable in all instances.

Personal convenience has no place, nor does a plea that clothing becomes wrinkled when seat belts are in place.

A safety engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service describes those kinds of excuses as "strange thinking," mostly based on some myths about seat belts.

Dr. Gary Nelson has accumulated some of those myths and cites research results that refute the ideas.

Here is what Nelson says:

- Myth: Seat belts are unnecessary for short trips.  
Fact: More than 70 percent of injury-causing traffic accidents occur within 25 miles of home, according to the National Safety Council. More than 80 percent of all collisions happen at speeds of under 40 mph.

People who were not wearing seat belts have been killed in accidents that occurred at speeds as low as 12 mph -- about the speed you would be driving in a parking lot.

- Myth: Seat belts trap people inside cars, and I'd rather be thrown clear.  
Fact: Study after study in the United States and abroad show a substantial decrease in the number of serious injuries in actual auto accidents among those who are belted versus those who aren't.

In the rare instances where injuries due to belts have been reported, either the belt was inappropriate worn or the crash was so severe that the occupants would have been killed or seriously injured if they had been unbelted.

- Myth: I don't need belts since I'm a careful driver.

Research and facts dispel myths about seat belt use -- Texas drivers will have to overcome some of their "strange thinking," says expert, when a recent law becomes effective Sept. 1. Motorists have 90 days in which to get used to the law, without paying a fine for non-wearing.

Fact: "Thrown clear" is a misnomer. Being thrown from a vehicle usually means flying through the windshield or catapulting out a door. The force of a collision can fling you as much as 150 feet onto a roadside object, into the path of oncoming traffic or scraping along the pavement.

For these reasons, if you are thrown from a vehicle in an accident, your chances of being killed are 25 percent greater. What's more, instead of being trapped, belted occupants are likely to be conscious and unhurt, and therefore better able to escape in the rare situation where fire or submersions are added dangers.

- Myth: Seat belts cause injuries.

Fact: Study after study in the United States and abroad show a substantial decrease in the number of serious injuries in actual auto accidents among those who are belted versus those who aren't.

In the rare instances where injuries due to belts have been reported, either the belt was inappropriate worn or the crash was so severe that the occupants would have been killed or seriously injured if they had been unbelted.

- Myth: I don't need belts since I'm a careful driver.

Fact: No matter how good a driver you are, you can't control the other car. There's no way to protect yourself against someone else's bad driving, poor judgements or mechanical failures. Even good drivers can be killed or injured in a crash.

- Myth: I don't need seat belts; I can brace myself.

Fact: The force of an impact at just 10 mph is equivalent to catching a 200-pound bag of cement thrown from a first-story window, according to the National Safety Council.

At 35 mph, the force of an impact is even more brutal. There's no way your arms and legs can brace you against that kind of force -- even if you could react in time.



"But officer they don't put seat belts on Mercedes-Benz!" that is what Mary Dixon told the officer who stopped her for not wearing a

seat belt, and remember the fines range up to \$63 for not wearing a seat belt.

## Gruver man dead

Rex Shapley age 38, of Gruver, Texas, died instantly from a shotgun wound at 10:30 a.m. Tuesday. Shapley apparently reached into his pickup to get his shotgun to kill a coyote. The shotgun accidentally discharged hitting him in the chest and killing him instantly.

Law officers in Gruver and Spearman have not details other than he was accidentally killed.

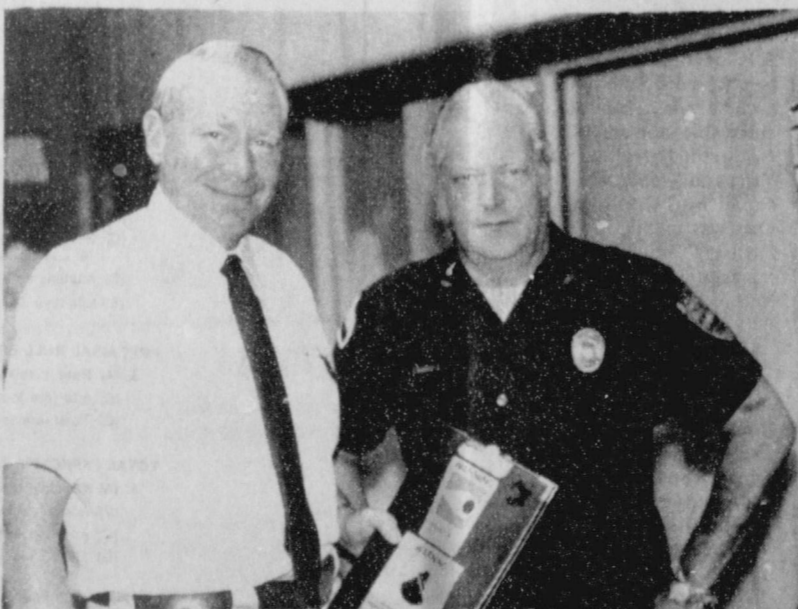

## Farmers with grain in Oles elevators to receive payment

(AMARILLO)--"Farmers with grain stored in any of the 10 closed Oles Grain Company elevators across the Texas Panhandle and Plains will be paid for their grain long before the ongoing federal bankruptcy proceeding against elevator owner David Oles is even close to being settled," Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower affirmed during a recent visit to the Panhandle.

"TDA General Counsel Sam Hiseore and TDA Grain Warehouse Administrator Darrell Keelchum have successfully convinced the court-appointed trustee and Oles' major creditors that the farmers' grain in these elevators is not part of the estate squabble. Not only will the farmers get their full payment long before the creditors divide up the Oles estate, they won't even have to pay any trustee or court costs. The only expense to these farmers should be the normal elevator storage fees."

Hightower also announced the procedure TDA will use to expedite cash payments to the estimated several hundred farmers who have grain stored in any of the 10 Oles elevators. The estimated cash value of that grain is \$3 million.

"Farmers can bring their grain warehouse receipts or scale tickets to TDA officials at county courthouses across the Panhandle and Plains," Hightower said. "When farmers

transfer those documents of title to TDA, we will give each of them a signed affidavit, ensuring that the grain is still owned by that farmer. As an added precaution, those records will be locked in a safety deposit box of an Amarillo bank."

"These warehouse receipts and scale tickets must be collected and inspected by the parties to the bankruptcy proceeding prior to August 10, when court-appointed trustee Robert Tolar will begin accepting bids to sell the grain from each of the warehouses. Just as soon as all of the one million bushels of grain is removed from the elevators, Mr. Tolar will write each farmer a check for the grain he or she had on deposit. If, in shipping the grain out of the elevators, any shortages are discovered, that loss will be covered by the \$500,000 grain warehouse bond TDA requires on all elevators in Texas. Any loss of quality to the grain will also be covered by the bond."

The Oles elevators are located in Amarillo, Bunker Hill, Exum, Kress, Nazareth, Perryton, Spearman, Tulla, Vega and Vigo Park. The facilities were closed by TDA in early June because Oles was unable to renew the required licensing bond and because TDA inspectors found the elevators at Perryton and Spearman to each be between 8-10 percent short of the grain reportedly in storage. Major creditors also initiated federal bankruptcy proceedings against Oles at the same time.

"We want every farmer who has grain stored in any of the Oles Grain Company elevators to be paid for their grain just as quickly as possible so they don't get tangled in what promises to be a long legal matter. That grain is just like money in the bank for those farmers. Ever since those elevators had to be closed, our foremost concern has been for those farmers. It will continue to be our foremost concern until all of those farmers receive what is rightfully theirs."

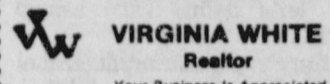

### Educate your child on sex abuse

Four out of five women are sexually abused by the time they reach 18; three out of five men are sexually abused by the time they reach 18. That means that if you go to a party with 25 people, twenty women and fifteen men in that room have been sexually abused by a relative, neighbor, acquaintance or stranger.

I find those statistics shocking and tragic. Before we examine the effects of sexual abuse on the victim, let's define what sexual abuse is.

Contrary to popular myth, sexual abuse is not ONLY forced intercourse. In fact, sexually abusive behavior often starts with undressing, either the child or the abuser or both, giving the abuser a voyeuristic experience. From there, it leads to touching or fondling, masturbating, oral sex, then intercourse. If not stopped at the undressing stage, over a period of years the abuse will lead eventually to intercourse with the victim. With those steps in mind, let me define sexual abuse as any sexual behavior with a child where the intent is to control (usually the victim) or sexually arouse somebody (usually the abuser).

What effect can being sexually abused have on the victim? One of the effects is that victims often believe they are "damaged good", not worthy of respect or love. They may experience guilt over their involvement in the abuse; fear and depression, a low self-esteem, unexpressed anger and hostility toward adults in general, the abuser specifically, and often themselves. Victims of sexual abuse have difficulty forming intimate relationships and may be unable to trust other people. They are unclear about what behavior is normal or OK and what is not. Finally, and what to me is most appalling, many victims, as adults,

become abusers themselves. These are just a few of the effects of abuse.

What can be done? Texas State law requires that if sexual abuse is suspected, it MUST be reported to the authorities; the police, the Sheriff, or the Department of Human Resources. Failure to report abuse can lead to a fine and/or prison sentence. Of equal concern is the fact that, if not stopped by legal intervention, an abuser will, in his or her lifetime, abuse an average of 68 children.

Can you protect your child? Yes, through education, listening and action. One of the reasons sexual abuse continued is because we are afraid to talk about it. It's a secret crime. Sit down with the child and tell her or him that they don't have to be afraid to tell you if someone does something to them that makes them uncomfortable.

Tell the child he or she has a right to control his or her body. That means don't force little Johnny to kiss sloppy Uncle Perry if he doesn't want to. It's his body, give him control.

Tell the child it's OK to say NO. When I was growing up, saying no to an adult would bring an immediate bolt of lightning from God. I believed that. Today's children need to know how to say no to an adult.

Give your child permission to tell you if something you or someone else is doing is making them feel uncomfortable, "funny" or "bad". Don't be afraid to talk about feelings, fears, wants and needs to your child.

The best way to stop sexual abuse is to educate our children, listen when they talk, act as if we believe what they say and act to protect them. Maybe with our children we can beat the statistics of sexual abuse.

### Karen's Kozy Korner

Ceiling fans have won their place in the hearts and homes of energy-conscious Texans. If you have a ceiling fan in the family room or bedroom, and are thinking of buying another, you may be in for a surprise.

Manufacturers continue to make changes in ceiling fans to make them even more practical and appealing.

One of the biggest design changes is the close-to-the-ceiling fan. These fans are more practical in smaller homes. The increased clearance also looks better and allows for more flexibility in the design of accessory lighting kits.

About five percent of all ceiling fan sales in 1984 were in models with eight inches of clearance or less.

One company has introduced a heat fan which pushes out warm air heated up to 3500 BTU with the fan in reverse position. It operates for less than 10 cents an hour, and the company claims it can trim heating bills 35 percent in a 2000 square-foot home.

Other companies are making remote-control fans in response to consumer demand for this con-

venience.

The price of ceiling fans has also come down. In 1981, roughly 20 percent of all ceiling fans retailed from \$49 to \$99. In 1984, about 80 percent of all fans fell into that price range.

New designs on the drawing boards treat fans as "ceiling furniture." Until now, emphasis has been on big 52-inch main-room fans. But companies are now turning their attention to second fans in smaller sizes for kitchens, bedrooms and other areas.

Industry-watchers predict that manufacturers will soon be turning out fans with upholstered sidebands to coordinate with other elements of a room. Stenciled blades, custom-look grills and designer colors will likely be used in promoting ceiling fans as real pieces of furniture that make fashion statements.

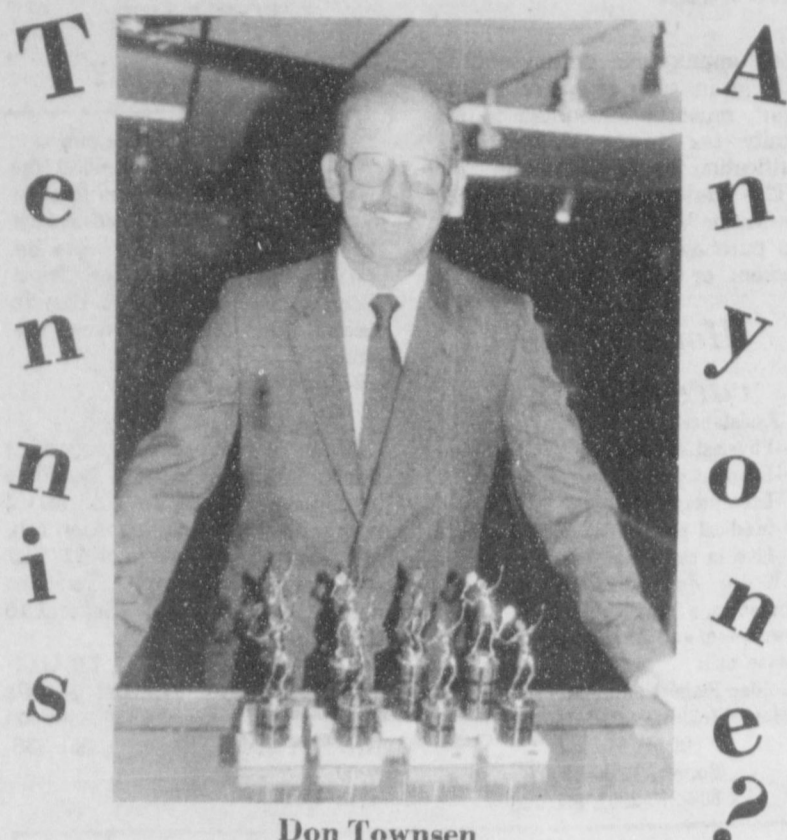

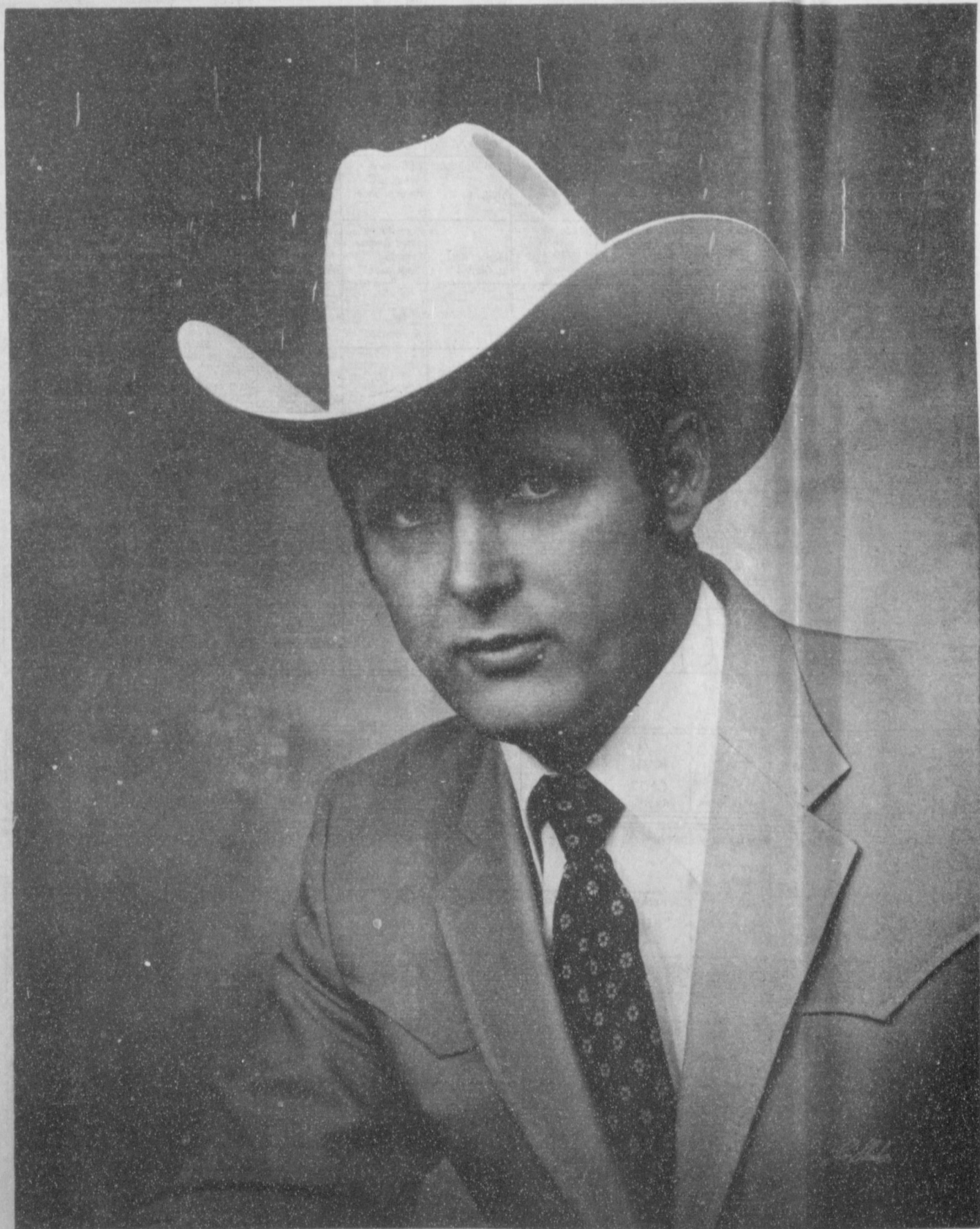

# Rotarians to help prevent crimes

John Bradshaw spoke to the Spearman Rotary Club at their Monday noon meeting at the Cattleman's Supper Club with Chief of Police D.J. Alberts as "backup". John, who graduated from Palo Duro High School in Amarillo obtains a bachelor of science degree from Sam Houston State University, then a master's degree from West Texas State University before receiving his law degree from LaSalle University.

He then was a member of the United States Secret Service from 1965 thru 1980 and then was a security consultant to private industry before joining the Panhandle Regional Law Enforcement Academy out of Amarillo College.

As Crime Prevention Coordinator John's "territory" covers an area of 25,000 square miles with a population of 350,000 people.

He spoke to the Rotary about their new marina watch program for such places as Lake Meredith. They also have a farm and ranch watch program; and, of course the neighbor watch program which Spearman needs.

He used the town of Bovina to illustrate his point. Bovina was a town of 7500 and was having 5 to 7 burglaries a week. The paper work alone was blocking the police departments ability to operate. So they installed the neighborhood watch program on January 24 and there has not been a single robbery since.

Meeting number three, the follow up meeting will be October 8 to find out what we have done and what else needs to be done.

Chief of police Alberts spoke to the group on the rash of burglaries that are occurring and said he had rather have 200 calls if you see anything suspicious than one robbery.

Please keep your doors locked with dead bolts and report anything suspicious.
