





### As The County Agent Sees It

Your county farm agent has learned that it is not safe to be optimistic about the Spring wind and its possibilities in the Panhandle. It sure is good to pump stock water through. 'Nough said—

The local 4-H week activities would have been a howling success had it not been for the howling subject mentioned above. The radio program over KEVE and the tour of Amarillo Air Force Base will be carried out at a later date.

Heard lots of good comments on Milly Bennett's program at Farm Bureau Meeting the other night. You should have seen Kelly Garrett going through the motions to that crazy song about the Chestnut tree.

Something else brought up at that meeting that all of us should get behind—NATURAL GAS FOR IRRIGATION. All you clod jumpers that are trying to wet down this sand know what needs to be done.

Write to some of the boys at Austin. Tell the House Speaker Ruben Senterfitt, the Governor or Olat Colburnson, Railroad Commissioner, the advantage of natural gas for irrigation and ask why we are not allowed to use it. A letter on notebook paper written with a lead pencil is best.

For those who have lawn troubles in the summer—the four musts in the care of the lawn are feeding, watering, aerating, and mowing. If these are done properly, your grass will resist most insects and diseases.

Feed the lawn in the Spring and late summer—about 2 pounds of nitrogen per 100 square feet. Some soils will need Phosphorus. Water enough to get 6 inches of penetration each. Light sprinkling will cause shallow roots and may cause weeds to come in.

Aerate by the use of a four-pronged spading fork or similar tool. Loosening of the soil in this manner will increase space and allow deeper penetration of moisture. Mow not closer than 2 inches. I have some good bulletins on lawns and gardens that might be helpful.

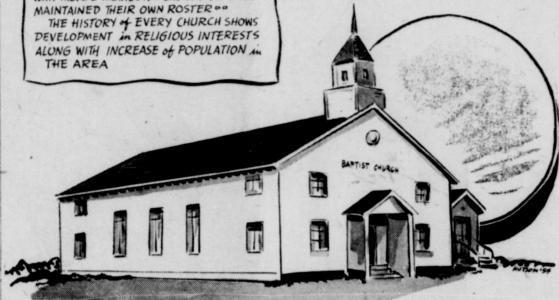

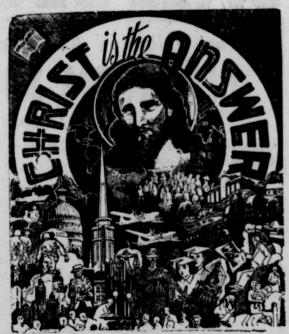
**Morse Baptist**

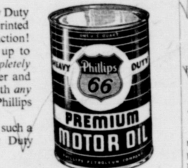

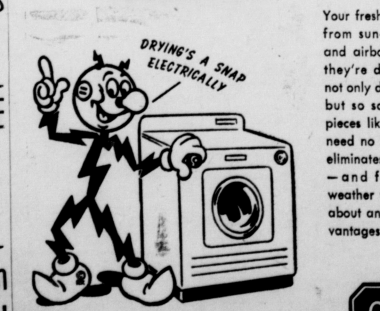

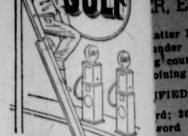
