CIVIL RIGHTS

The President was praised by the NAACP for his Civil Rights program and the advances that had been made in the abolition of segregation. However, there was much criticism directed at the executive branch of the government of the President for not taking proper action in banning segregation in housing projects. Great pressure is being brought on the executive branch of the government for the issuance of Presidential directives against the use of federal funds or guarantees where segregation is or might be practiced. Such directives could and would have the effect of law. This situation is of utmost importance in the housing field and will, no doubt, pose one of the big problems in the coming session of Congress.

Need For Farm Records In '55 Cited

College Station, Dec.—The need for accurate records of farm production in 1955 was cited here this week by an extension farm management specialist.

C. H. Bates, said under present economic conditions farm records are becoming more important each year.

Bates said that the new record soil and water conservation provision both require such records. Farm records also are imperative in figuring income tax. He said that records show the weaknesses in any farming operation. They reflect the year's farming activity and should be the basis for expanding or curtailing certain farm practices and cropping systems.

Records are easily kept and will prove invaluable when it comes time to evaluate each operation.

The first year, says the specialist, is an ideal time to start records. Several handy record books are available. Bates suggests the Texas Farm Record book. It gives inventories for land, farm improvements, machinery and equipment, livestock, crops, feed on hand, farm sales and expenses, farm products used at home, and summary of the year's business.

County agricultural agents can furnish information on how to order this book. Or it may be bought directly from the Exchange Store, College Station, for only 30 cents.

EAST-WEST TRADE

The Eisenhower Cabinet is planning an early meeting, at the request of high Administration officials, to study anew the problem of East-West European trade. The Eisenhower Administration is increasingly worried about the volume of machine tools, electric power equipment and other capital goods which are moving from the United States to the Soviet Union and wants to develop plans to curb such sales.

G. I. STUDENTS

Korean war veterans studying under the G. I. bill received a record \$51,000 in November—about twice that of a year ago—and still increasing, according to a Veterans Administration announcement. The number of World War II veterans receiving G. I. training has dwindled to 189,000 this year, a drop of 178,000 from the total a year ago.

BIG FOUR CONFERENCE

Premier Mendes France recently proposed that a Big Four Conference be held in Paris about next May, after the ratification of the London and Paris agreements on arming West Germany. He ruled out any conference that would "not include our American and British friends."

NEW SECRETARY

President Eisenhower has announced that he would name George V. Allen, the Ambassador to India, as Assistant Secretary of State for Near - Eastern South Asian and African affairs. Mr. Allen will succeed Henry A. Byrood, who will become ambassador to Egypt, replacing Jefferson Caffery, who is retiring.

It is now time to conclude that the warning of the Joint Chiefs several years ago—that 1954 would be a year of maximum danger from the Communist—has been needed and a dangerous year completed without a new war.

Texas Honeybee Population Down

College Station, Dec.—The honeybee population in Texas is estimated at 238,000 colonies, some 16,000 less than in 1952.

C. J. Burgin, state entomologist, says the 8,000 colonies moved into the state was offset by 20,000 colonies moved out during the fiscal year ending August 31. Poor crop prospects during early spring and summer probably was the cause, Burgin says.

The bee population in 1952 was 304,000 colonies. Honey produced last year totaled nearly 10,044 pounds and was valued at \$1,500,000.

This is the second consecutive year of decline in American honey production. A destructive bacterial disease of honeybees larvae, nearly 50,000 colonies were inspected during the year, and 1.25 percent showed signs of the disease. Most infected colonies were found in the North Texas beekeeping area where production is highly concentrated.

Texas is noted as a leading honey producing state. The industry got an early start from the cotton blossom, an excellent honey source. The decline in cotton acreage in recent years has been partly offset by the nectar of Huban and other sweet clovers.

No Shortage Of Foods On January Plentiful List

College Station, Dec.—For the third consecutive month, meats dominate the plentiful food list. Included are heavy turkeys, beef, pork, halibut, haddock, shrimp and canned tuna.

January features for this area, however, according to the USDA, are eggs, fresh and processed oranges, grapefruit and tangerines. Dairy products and rice remain in good supply. So do walnuts, almonds and figs, raisins, lard, vegetable fats and oils. The plentiful food list is based upon a survey made each year by the Southwest Food Distribution division, Agricultural Marketing Service, Dallas. Foods shown to be in heavy enough supply are placed on the list. Raymond J. Toronto is in charge of the area food distribution division.

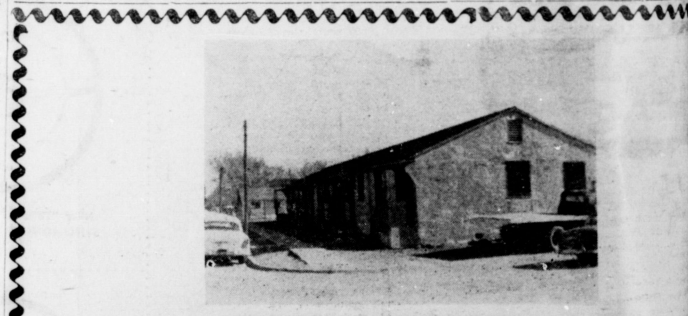

All he could do was to dig out.

He told me about his ambition to be a lawyer. He gave up the idea because he felt the call of God to go out and pioneer a new country, and face the hardships as they came. He never left any estate for the children to fight over, and to increase the Bank account by lawyers. He left an estate here of twenty-two Churches, that he had organized by pioneering the way on the plains of Texas. As I go from place to place and look at the many beautiful Churches, that was an outgrowth of his efforts, I can understand the full work he accomplished during his life.

Time. All of God's servants have a grievous experience in life, which hangs crepe on the doors of their hearts, they are not to blame for. He held revivals in old musty garages. His day and now are beautiful Churches, modern in every respect.

I could write twenty sheets on the good work our friend, Reverend Brogue has done, and the unflinching sacrifice he made. I should write these extra sheets, I would be no nearer the end of his busy life, than I was when I first began to write. Those who know the life of Brother Bogue, know that I am speaking the truth. Under a normal life, with the strain of it taken off of him, there might have been many years out in front of him. A good life is never too long and never too short. When I read the news that Brother Bogue had taken his flight, his soul had gone back to God who gave it. I said, "Thank God, he is out of his suffering and has gone to his reward." Long live the memory and the unselfish work our friend did while here in this world! Amen.

Chicago - What would you choose as the most important news event of 1954? The most important personality? The Supreme Court ruling that segregation in public schools is unconstitutional has been selected as the most important news story of 1954 by the editors of the American Peoples Encyclopedia.

At the same time the encyclopedia named Winston Churchill as the most important personality in the news of the year. The McCarthy-Army hearings and the censure of McCarthy was selected as the second most important story of 1954.

President Eisenhower was named second in the list of most important personalities. The American Peoples Encyclopedia editors announced their choice of the top dozen news personalities and the first 12 news stories of 1954.

Both lists will be recorded permanently in the American Peoples Encyclopedia Yearbook for 1955.

Franklin J. Meine, editor-in-chief of the encyclopedia, said that in making the selections, his editors considered both the important subjects in reference works for years to come.

In order of their selection, the top 12 news events were: 1. Supreme court ruled segregation in public schools unconstitutional.

2. McCarthy-Army hearings and censure of McCarthy. 3. Indo-China war ended; fall of Dienbiensieu. 4. Atomic energy and H-bomb developments.

5. Democrats victors in national elections. 6. European defense (EDC) conferences in Brussels, Paris and London.

7. Americans sentenced as spies by Communist China. 8. ALEX WINSTON CHURCHILL for his vigorous leadership of party and government; for his statesmanship at home and in behalf of the free world—all at the age of 86; a tremendous achievement in view of the widespread belief two years ago that his political career was nearing its end.

9. PRESIDENT EISENHOWER for his effective leadership of government in a troubled year; for retaining his personal popularity, and for his success in largely maintaining the support, and escaping the criticism, of the opposing party.

10. SEN. JOSEPH MCCARTHY for becoming an even more controversial figure than ever before— which was quite a feat.

11. PIERRE MENDES-FRANCE for keeping his country in the allied camp and himself in world-wide prominence.

12. KONARD ADENAUER for his excellent leadership of the West German republic which is becoming a force in its economic and military muscles.

13. JOHN FOSTER DULLES for his role in rebuilding European defense and maintaining world peace.

14. J. ROBERT OPPENHEIMER, the atomic scientist, for being the center of a controversy over security which will be debated for years to come.

15. ERNEST HEMINGWAY for winning the Nobel prize for literature and making the headlines with his real-life adventures in Africa.

16. CHOU EN-LAI for his behind the scene negotiations of the Indo-China peace on the part of the Communist world.

Polio Is A Bigger Job Now!

On January 3rd, the annual March of Dimes started its drive for polio-fighting funds. While the year just ending has witnessed a giant strides against this crippling disease, victory is not yet won. The trial vaccine developed by Dr. James E. Salk was given last spring to 440,000 children. Now an evaluation of its effectiveness in preventing polio paralysis is being made at the University of Michigan. But up to now we cannot know whether the vaccine protected against paralytic polio, and we will not know until spring. Meanwhile, the fight must go steadily on. Even if the vaccine is effective, polio still will strike in the years just ahead. It takes time for a preventive to become widely used. We must expect tens of thousands of men, women and children to be stricken and to need aid. That help must be available to them.
