



Unemployment Figures More Promising

The last Government statistics on em-ployment, covering the month of June, is-sued jointly by the Commerce and Labor Department, are mildly encouraging. Em-ployment rose by almost 1,000,000 from May to June, although most of this increase was a seasonal one, occuring on the farms. The official Government conclusion was that, taking into consideration season-al factors, the downtrend in non-farm em-ployment had almost completely halted

ployment had almost completely halted in June.

The unemployment total, which has in-creased rapidly during recent months, creased rapidly during recent months, showed an increase of only 42,000. This \$10000 an increase of only 42,000. This 42,000 was said to represent mostly a sea-sonal rise caused by the influx of June graduates into the labor market. The Gov-ernment estimates this seasonal rise at a bout a ten per cent increase, and there-fore, the number of other unemployed rose less than 15,000 between May and June. This compares with totals of several hund-red thousand in some of the Spring months.

This slowdown and the heavy increase This slowdown and the heavy increase in farm employment considerably bright-ens the employment picture. The Govern-ment reports shows that there are still 62,098,000 Americans employed—compar-ed with 61,119,000 in May—and that their salaries and wages are at record, or near-record, levels. This huge force, of course, persentia a tramendous market represents a tremendous market.

We must await figures for July, Aug-and, perhaps September, before we and will definite and positive information as to the end of the unemployment snowball. If figures for the next two or three months continue to reflect the apparent trend, the nation will certainly have seen the worst of the recession. On the other hand, If unemployment unexpectedly rise sharply, the guarded optimism which is justified at this stage will not be in order.

The Foreign Operations Administra-tion recently announced it had sold \$6,000,-000 worth of surplus butter to Great Britain. It was the biggest such sale ever made.

It was the biggest such sale ever made. The huge government surplus of but ter had been worrying government officials for some time and only this Spring Russian feelers reached Washington on the questi-on of a Soviet purchase of some ten or fif-teen million pounds of butter. Although Soviet feelers were given consideration, the United States decided not to sell its surplus butter to the Communists. The British, however have agreed to pay \$6,000,000 for 14,600,000 pounds of this country's surplus butter, and the bill will be paid in pounds sterling which in turn Disc RolLLING-Roll them of will be used to purchase military and re-lated goods in England needed by the U. S. military services. Such items are normal-ly purchased abroad by the services.

It should be pointed out here that great Britain is probably the best customer the United States has in the field of surplus disposals. Congress some years ago decid-ed to write into the Mutual Security Act pro-visions which would allow the Foreign Op-erations Administration to sell food surplu-ses to foreign nations. This was done in an effort to relieve surpluses piling up in the United States in a way which would not amount to dumping, and so that normal markets would be upset as little as possible.

In the last year, Britain has bought over \$72,000,000 worth of surplus farm products (of the total of \$245,000,000 sold)—mostly prunes, tobacco, lard, cottonseed oil, beef and canned fruit. It is expected that the end of meat rationing in England will soon

bring a vigorous demand for U. S. beef from Great Britain. The latest surplus foodstuff sale is en-couraging, in that it demonstrates surplus foodstuff can be disposed of in large guan-count titles. 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

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

Ministers, who served the church include Eulis H. Hill, George F. Bedford, Owen Hussey, C. F. Bastion, Bill Masters, Clifford Ellis J. Veale. Rev. O. N. Van Dyke is the Parker and E. J. Veale, Rev. O. N. Van Dyke is the minister serving the congregation at this time.

Between 1910 and 1915 several attempts to organize a congregation were made by a Brother Ballenfield from Old Ochiltree and again in 1920 by Brother Bogue, who later succeeded in 1926. Brother Bogue conducted the series of meetings in the Union church building. However, on the organization of the congregation arrangements were made to meet in the IOOF hall. After meeting in the hall for several months services were held in the Presbyterian church building, until the old bank building was purchased and moved to the site of the present building in 1928. The lots had been purchased in 1927.

The present wonderful church plant and its opening for services has been featured in recent issues of the Reporter.

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
