Rapidly we are learning that the price of wheat is the vital element of successful wheat farming. The price of wheat will never advance to the cost of production with more than double the quantity produced, than is needed to meet the demands of the market.

Supply and demand will regulate the price of wheat. No government, even one as rich as our own can afford to pay the difference between the market price of wheat, and the price necessary to insure a profit to producers, when the market price is as low as it has been this year.

This writer seriously doubts if the loan on wheat made by the national government to help farmers will or has proven a benefit. If wheat had gone down to 30c per bushel and would jump to \$1.30 next year after the visable supply had been deminished, we believe it would be much better for wheat producers, will prove a blessing to Hansford county. If a wheat producer has 45 percent of his acreage idle, it will be cared for in a manner to increase wheat production year in and year out, or it will continue to produce income via stock farmiling or other eligible methods.

tanks, and small irrigation systems.

In developing these water resources the emphasis is on the "small". Most of the projects are expected to take \$2,000 or less. The loans may extend for the life of the structure but in no case more than 20 years. The sareas are selected in cooperation with county planning committees and State agricultural advisory councils.

Loans are made through the Farm Security Administration. Farmers and ranchers getting loans agree to follow sound management practices worked out in cooperation with State and Federal farm specialists. The soil conservation service will build or supervise the building of, water facilities agreed upon.

In many instances successful rehabilitation of needy farm families in the plains depends upon the development of water supplies on the farm. With water for a small number of livestock or possibly for irrigation of a small ruck patch, many families can become self-sustaining. In this, the first year, water resources are being developed where they will do the most good 'in relieving human distress and promoting better land use.

# Dale l'arnegie 5-Minute Biographies

P. T. BARNUM

There was one born every minute—including himself.

Who was the biggest faker in American history? The laurels undoubtedly belong to old P. T. Barnum, the Connecticut Yankee who made himself the most famous showman on earth.

Barnum was proud to call himself? The Prince of Humbugs." He even wrote a book entitled, Humbugs of the World, and was flattered when people denounced him as a fraud, a scoundrel, a mountebank, and a charlatan. He loved to fool the public. He once advertised a strange horse, whose head was where its tail ought to be, and whose tail was where its head ought to be. The public flocked to behold this astonishing freak of nature; and, after paying 25c admission, they saw a borse backed into the feed-trough.

Although Barnum's name is now a synonym for the circus, the fact is that he never organized what we now call a circus until he was sixty years of age; and he didn't form the Barnum & Bailey circus until he was seventy.
