Gruber Man Escapes Cascade Of 30,000 Bushels Of Wheat

GRUBER, Sept. 9.—Richard Neely, foreman of the Gruber Elevator, Inc., escaped death by inches this morning when a rupture in a recent completed bin dumped 30,000 bushels of wheat on the Rock Island railroad tracks and in an adjacent field... Neely was walking near the bin of eight built here this year by the Mayer Osborn Construction Co. of Denver, when he noticed grain spilling from a crack... He got a ladder and climbed to the break to ascertain whether it could be sealed. Seconds after he returned to the ground, a huge piece of the elevator wall broke out, leaving a hole big enough to admit a large truck... The grain spilled over the railroad tracks and into a field planted to sorghum by Cooper Brothers. It covered the ground to a depth of more than 15 feet in some places... Suction created by the fast emptying elevator pulled the roof into the bin... Total damage was estimated between \$15,000 and \$25,000 by Dan Schrader, office manager.

Washington News Letter From Congressman Walter Rogers

To The People Of The 18th District: THE DEATH OF EDC WAS NO SURPRISE

When France recently refused to ratify the treaty creating an official Washington was not surprised nor shocked. As a matter of fact, since the EDC proposal was executed at Paris on the 27th day of May, 1952, at no time has it been considered as having more than fifty-fifty chance. That some difficulty was expected was evidenced by the following paragraph contained in article 132 of the treaty.

"In the event that all the instruments of ratification have not been deposited within a period of six months following the signature of the present treaty, the governments of the states which have made such deposits shall consult among themselves on the measures to be taken.

The parties to the treaty were West Germany, Belgium, France, Italy, Luxembourg and the Netherlands. France and Italy were both expected to balk at ratification. However, it could be reasoned that if France could be sold, other words, France held the key to the situation and everyone knew it. Everyone also knew that unless some substantial changes could be made in the general government setup in France, there was no chance of getting the treaty ratified, and even if it was ratified, it would be wholly ineffective because there would be no government set up to carry it into force. As one leading columnist to ably put it, ratification depends entirely upon the affirmative votes of the members of several parties holding widely divergent political views. The all-out opposition to the plan found its nucleus in the 93 strictly controlled Communist members. Since the political pattern in France all seem to be more or less extremists, EDC never had a chance. In other words, France does not have a substantial political party with several wings inside the party. Each party appears to be what we would call a splinter party. It is an excellent example of what can happen to any government when you fail to maintain some degree of balance in a national political party. The creation of splinter type parties going off on every conceivable tangent creates a fertile field for Communism, because one of the basic axioms of both Communism and Fascism is "divided and conquer". The failure of EDC could have great value as a warning to free people everywhere that the success of a government must depend upon sound logical reasoning and a solid balance upon which can be founded a united front.

Yes, many of us were terribly disappointed that EDC did not become a reality, but I repeat, we were not surprised.

THE AMERICAN LEGION
The American Legion has just concluded its 1954 convention in the National Capital. Contrary to many stories that were going around the country to the effect that the American Legion Conventions were boisterous, noisy, unwieldy and unwanted, I want to say that I have never seen a finer group in convention anywhere. They had fun, yes, but it was good, clean fun and everyone seemed to be in splendid spirits and having a good time. Everyone in Washington joined in the spirit of the affair, and it turned out to be a good, old-time American convention that will be well and pleasantly remembered for a long time. Charley Gibson and George Broome of Amarillo were both in town, and I had the pleasure of lunching with them. These two men have done a tremendous amount of work during their service in this organization. Their contribution to the American Legion is certainly evidenced by the many, many friends that they have from all over the world.

The parade lasted all afternoon and all night and was enjoyed by one and all. It started about two o'clock in the afternoon and ended up about three a. m.

ONE-QUARTER MILLION DOLLARS A DAY
An attempt has been made to convince the American public that there is something criminal about a food surplus because there is a cost incident to the storage of such food. While reading all this propaganda about how much it costs to store food, I got to wondering how much it cost to store money. I watched the daily statements of the Treasury Department and notice that during the past year the daily cash balances have been somewhere between approximately 4 billion and 9 billion dollars. On August 30th of this year, the cash balance was five and one-half billion. Of this amount,

approximately four and one-half billion was deposited in banks which were paying no interest for the use of these funds. In other words, the funds were merely lying idle and being used by the banks in which they were deposited. Your Senator Reports

BL LYNDON B. JOHNSON DEBT LIMIT: The Senate reluctantly agreed to raise the ceiling on the national debt from \$275 billion dollars to \$300 billion dollars after Senator Harry F. Byrd of Virginia, fiscal expert and vigorous advocate of governmental economy, urged the increase.

Senator Byrd led the fight last year against the Administration's proposal to increase the debt limit by 15 billion dollars, and I supported his stand. In agreeing to a temporary increase—for only one year—the Virginia Senator made it clear that he did so because it was unavoidable to keep the Treasury from breaking through the \$275-billion-dollar ceiling between December and March.

ECONOMY NEEDED: Senator Byrd urged the Administration to return to its quest for a balance budget despite the troubled international situation. "This period of international crisis may continue for years," he said, "and we must live with it, and we must adapt our financial affairs to it."

The Senator also pointed out that his opposition to a larger and permanent increase in the debt limit was not motivated by any desire to embarrass the Administration. "To the contrary," he said, "the effort to hold the lid on the debt is to strengthen the Administration's hand of economy, leading to the balanced budget which the President secretly pledged."

Senator Byrd made good hard sense. He usually does. **BIGGER DEBT:** Facts released by the commissioners of the Public Debt show that the national debt is now 18 billion dollars more than it was when the present Administration took over.

In fact, figuring the public debt on the same basis that has been used in the past, it now stands at the highest point in our history. The present administration adopted a different method of figuring interest on savings bonds, entering on the books only the current value of the bonds. In the past the debt was figured on the basis of the bonds' maturity value. This is a legitimate book-keeping method, no doubt, but it may have caused people to believe mistakenly that the national debt has been reduced in the last two years, it hasn't.

Incidentally, the only year in which the United States had no public debt was 1836.

ATOMIC ENERGY BILL: A. Jones with other Senate Democrats I felt two vital principles were involved in our refusal to accept the conference committee report on the Atomic Energy Commission bill.

First the conference report would have seriously impaired the preference rights of REA cooperatives, municipalities and other public bodies to buy public power. Second it would have nullified the provision for compulsory sharing of patents, which we wanted in order to prevent a few large firms from getting a stranglehold on this important source of energy.

So I voted with 47 other Senators to reject the conference report and return it to the Committee. The Senate amendments finally were accepted by the conference committee and included in the bill as enacted.

SOCIAL SECURITY: One of the most important measures acted on in the Senate as this session of Congress nearly its end was a bill revising the Social Security system.

Social security coverage was extended to some six million additional persons. The President proposed to bring in ten and a half million more, but the Senate excluded some 3,600,000 farm workers and about 400,000 self-employed professional persons. The bill increases benefits at least \$5 a month for single retired persons and as much as \$21.25 for some families. Benefits as present range from \$25 to \$188.75.

Social Security taxes will be increased \$12 a year for employees and the same amount for employers. Taxes on self-employed persons coming under the law will increase \$18 a year. Provisions governing the earnings of retired persons were liberalized.

PERSONAL: Barring unforeseen developments, this session of Congress will have ended by the time you read this.

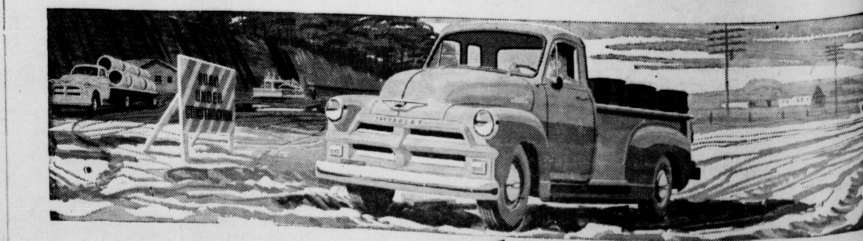

The letter printed below was received after the writer had already made an apology to the Attorneys of Hansford County, Main, Michigan, Alaska and all other parts of the world. We print the letter for the information of the public, because it explains in more detail the whereabouts of the letter. The letter is addressed to E. C. Greene, and this copy was mailed to this newspaper.

Mr. Greene informs this writer that he plans to use the printed forms only as a SAMPLE and when he gives them to a customer or friend, he will recommend that they be EXECUTED by an attorney. He has no intention of practicing law, he declares.

 Dear Mr. Greene:

It has been brought to my attention by members of The Northeast Panhandle Bar Association, composed of Lipscomb, Ochiltree and Hansford Counties, that you are preparing to distribute 300 records of wills to be executed. This information came to me from members of this Association not living in Hansford County.

I feel sure that you do not realize that this act on your part may constitute the practice of law. Unless you are a licensed lawyer, the law prohibits anyone from practicing law, and fixes a penalty for laymen found guilty of practicing law. Judging from an article which I understand appeared in the Spearman Reporter, you take the position that you are saving the public a heavy expense by distributing these printed wills. You will probably think that we lawyers oppose your proposed acts because we want to make a fee drawing wills. It might interest your good conscience to know that lawyers make their largest fees trying to probate a will not drawn by a lawyer, or in setting aside a will not properly drawn. In many of such cases, people are forced to assign large percentages of their inheritances for such purposes. We lawyers owe a duty to the

public. We are best discharging that duty when we correctly draw a legal instrument, charging them a small fee, that in most cases insures them against pitfalls of technicalities, and later disasters. If we were entirely selfish, we would encourage people to draw their own wills and legal instruments, for such practice by the public encourages and assures litigation. I thought it only fair to write to you giving you this information and request you to refrain from distributing these wills until such time as you can satisfy yourself that you are not doing something in violation of law, and probably detrimental to your clients.

They also feel that they sometimes lack ability in their ventures but that they can properly handle. Another general comment of many of the young executives was their belief that they were personally responsible for their business, and were personally responsible when things went badly.

The survey showed that many of the young executives were quick to praise others when things went well, but that when the business went downhill, they themselves took the blame and quickly went into action. These are the major results of the survey, which you might heed, if you have plans to become a successful business executive.

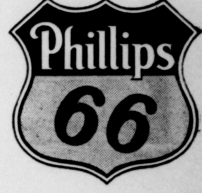

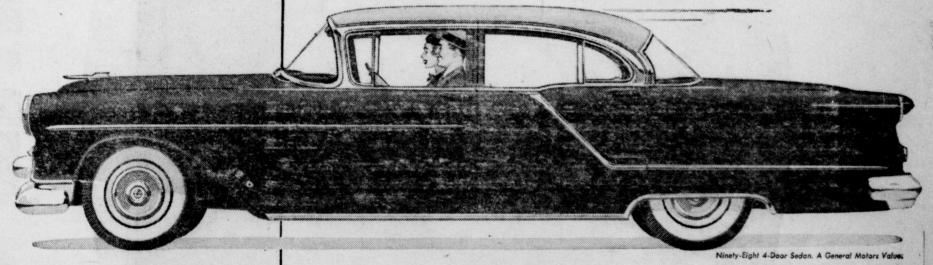

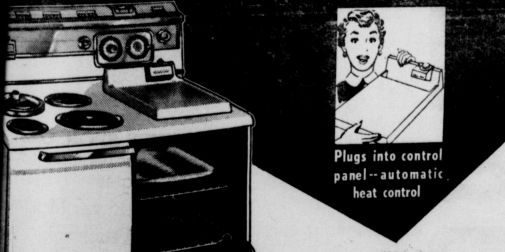

**Receipts Of The Week
June C. Gibbs
Nut Sponge Cake**

One-half lb. shelled nuts (peanuts, walnuts, black walnuts or pecans)
6 tablespoons all-purpose flour
1 teaspoon cream of tartar
10 eggs
one fourth cups sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla extract.

Preheat oven at 375 degrees F. Line bottom of a 10-inch tube pan with waxed paper. Grease the paper. Grind nuts in a food grinder, using medium blades. Sift flour and cream of tartar together and mix with the ground nuts. Separate the eggs. Beat the yolks, add the sugar gradually. This requires about 15 minutes with electric mixer. Add vanilla flavoring. The yolk mixture should be light in color, thick and very smooth. Beat egg white until they hold a precise peak. Sprinkle flour-nut mixture over beaten egg yolks, pile beaten egg whites over this and gently mix or fold all ingredients together, but only enough to disperse all patches of egg white. Pour batter into pan, leveling the top with a rubber spatula. Bake 50 minutes in 375 degree F. oven or until cake tester comes out dry when tested in center of cake. Invert cake on wire rack cool about 1 to 2 hours.

This unusual cake can be served in many ways. It is delicious served as is, or serve with a scoop of ice cream or whipped cream on top.

Nuts must be weighed. A cup measurement will not work.
