Attractive, Mrs. Ingeborg Sogn, a Gruber housewife of Norwegian descent, prepared two "old world" pastries recently as Cook of the Week on KGNC-TV's "Food Fiesta Show. A mother of three daughters, all of whom attended the show, Mrs. Sogn baked "Krumkake" and "Rosettes" for the television audience.

Mrs. Sogn's daughters are Marie, 20, Dorothy 18, and Katie, 12. All three got a big thrill out of helping mother in KGNC's all-electric kitchen.

Named by Mrs. Dan Shroder of Gruber, Mrs. Sogn received a Presto Pressure Cooker, courtesy of State Sign, honoring her as Cook of the Week.

Her recipes were:

Three beaten eggs. One-half cup sugar. One half cup butter or melted margarine. Three-fourths cup flour. 1 teaspoon lemon extract. One and one-fourth teaspoon salt. Add sugar to eggs and beat. Melt butter and add to mixture, then flour and flavoring.

Stir until batter is smooth. Place one teaspoon batter on preheated Krumkake iron. Close cover, press handles together.

slightly to spread batter. Bake on low heat about 20 seconds on each side, turning iron as it bakes, or until Krumkake is a delicate brown. Remove from iron with tip of spatula. Roll quickly around Krumkake stick before cookie hardens. Slip from stick.

For variation, sherry or almond and vanilla flavoring may be used. Do not use high heat.

Another delicious variation: Krumkake may be pinched closed at one end while still warm, then fill with fruit and whipped cream. Serve immediately. Store in "dry place, uncovered, until ready to serve. Makes three dozen.

ROSETTES
Two eggs slightly beaten. Two teaspoons sugar. one-fourth teaspoon salt. 1 cup milk. 1 cup flour, more if necessary. 1 tablespoon lemon extract. Add sugar milk. Sift flour before measuring. To slightly beaten eggs, then add

them together with salt. Stir into first mixture until batter is smooth and about the consistency of heavy cream. Add flavoring. Dip iron into hot fat in a deep kettle to heat it, then drain excess fat on brown paper. Fat should be hot enough to brown a piece of bread while counting 20. Dip heated iron in batter, do not more than three-fourths of its height. If only a thin layer of batter adheres to the iron, then dip it again until a smooth layer forms. It will be partly cooked from the heat of the iron.

Plunge batter-coated iron quickly into the hot fat and cook for two to three minutes (until active bubbling ceases). Remove from iron, and drain on a brown paper. If your Rosettes are not crisp, the batter is too thick, and should be diluted with milk.

While still warm, dip into powdered sugar. Makes 40 Rosettes.

News Letter From Dassman Walter Rogers

Whether it be Washington, New York or Denver, it could not be a democratic form of government but must be an iron hand government of either monopoly or statist, either of which would make economic slaves of the people. Yet various groups who are seeking legislative favors are lawfully asking for the passage of laws that actually circumvent the intents and purposes of the Constitution and would move this country and our people into that central federal control that you and I know must lead to socialism. Do not misunderstand me, I am not talking about any one particular group, because I can show you proposed legislation from many groups, rich, poor and intermediate, who are deeply sincere in what they are asking for, but who obviously fails to realize the price they are offering to pay. Let us all remember that with every right there is a responsibility. When you are told that you will gain certain things, never fail to ask about the price you are paying.

RUSSIAN RIFLES

My good friend, J. C. Phillips, of Borger, who is one of the best communist watchers in this country, sent me an advertisement for other day which offered Russian army rifles for sale. I immediately conferred with the Department of Justice and the Treasury Department concerning these firearms. I recently received a communication from the Alcohol and Tobacco Tax Division of the U. S. Treasury Department, which has jurisdiction of this particular situation, concerning the importation of Russian rifles. This communication disclosed that the Pasadena Firearms Company of 927 E. Colorado Street, Pasadena, California, imported 1,000 mosin rifles (Russian), caliber 7.62 mm. from Spain under U. S. Import Permit No. 41, dated June 18, 1954. These guns were a portion of the rifles captured from the

rebels in the Spanish Revolution and were offered to United States arms dealers for several years. The Department advised me that this company is owned by Mr. Alvin D. Gettler. The advertisement furnished by Mr. J. C. Phillips had been placed in the magazine by the Golden State Arms Corporation The Treasury Department advised me that this company had obtained the firearms which it had offered for sale in December of 1954 from the Pasadena Arms Company. The Golden State Arms Corporation was also owned by Mr. Alvin D. Gettler. The letter concluded that the Treasury Department had found no violation by the Golden State Arms Corporation. I have some other information on Russian Army rifles that I am very interested in and that I am going to run down. It seems that there are quite a few of these in this country.

THE SOUTH WILL RISE AGAIN

It seems as though the South has risen too many times in one particular place in this country. The story they are telling in a certain New York night club, the one has forbidden the orchestra to play either "The Eyes of Texas" or "Dixie", even though the Governors of all the Southern states might be present. The reason: The last four times the stirring strains of these southern favorites came from the orchestra pit, the owner had to refurbish his establishment completely.

Work Saving Shrubs

Many of our common shrubs can be listed as work saving shrubs if they are planted in the right place, and if soil preparation is made ahead of time, says Miss Sadie Hatfield, specialist in home economics at the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

In listing jobs required by shrubs Miss Hatfield believes that watering and fertilization head the list. Rated as second and third are the problems of disease and insect control and pruning. One reason why many people make, continues Miss Hatfield, is in the use of young trees as shrubs. This results in later pruning problems and lack of balance in the landscape plan. With the ranch type house that many people are building these days, she suggests that special attention be given to the use of true shrubs. That is, shrubs that will not grow over 8 to 10 feet tall if they are neglected for several years. There are many of these shrubs which will survive with very little water and which have few insect enemies and diseases. Examples of such shrubs which might be used near the house are nandina, abelia, rosemary, lavender, flowering juniper, dwarf pyracantha, winter almond and others. Attractive plants which require little water and are suitable for use in screen plantings and wind breaks include althea, Arizona cypress, cherry laurel, French mulberry, crape myrtle and desert willow.

KILL WEEDS AND FERTILIZE AT THE Same Time

Dr. H. E. Rea, Associate Professor in the Department of Agronomy, has done some wonderful work using ammonia nitrate spray as a contact weed killer. It "burns" the grass but immediately becomes a fertilizer and stimulates grass growth. The lawn grass will then choke out most of the weeds. Spray twice per year; early in the spring growing season and in late summer or early fall when weeds start growing. (1) Cut the grass short, (2) let it start regrowth, (3) mix one pound of ammonia nitrate (2 cups) per gallon of water, (4) mix in one thousand square feet of lawn. This will eradicate bur clover, henbit, hairy bedstraw, common

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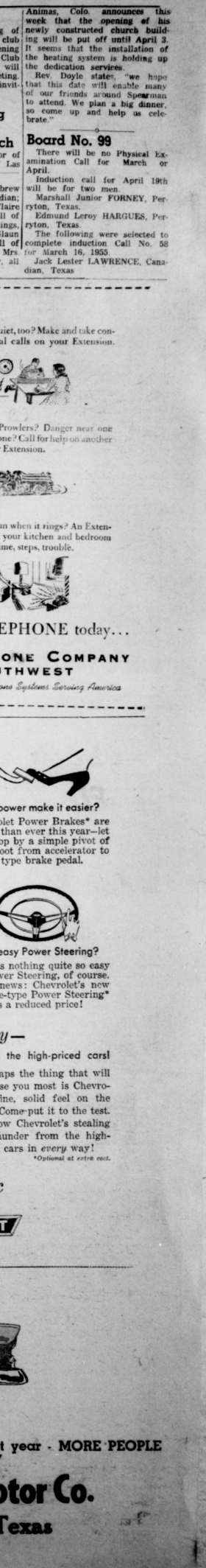

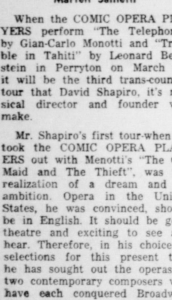

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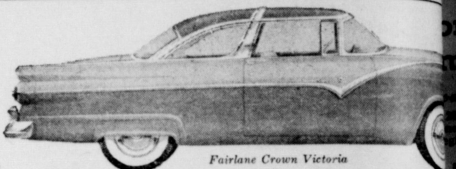

POLIO VACCINE FOR KIDS

Polio Vaccination Plan

Being prepared to face any eventuality is a wise course to follow. Many of us were brought up on adages that stressed the value of always being ready and what could happen if we were not. Sometimes we may question the value of making advance preparations for an event that may not occur. But when we are dealing with the lives and health of our children, nobody can challenge our duty to be fully prepared.

Right now tens of thousands of health officials, physicians, school authorities and lay volunteers all over the country are planning and preparing for a polio vaccine. We still do not know if the Salk polio vaccine, given to 440,000 children last spring, prevents paralytic polio under conditions of natural exposure. We will not know the answer until the scientific evaluation report is issued sometime in April.

The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis will provide through March of Dimes Funds sufficient amounts of the vaccine to the Texas (State) Health Department so that it may be given in our schools under the supervision of Doctor R. L. Kleeberger, Hansford County Health Officer, if the vaccine is licensed by the National Institutes of Health. When licensed, vaccine will also be made available by manufacturers to physicians for purchase. Children not in the designated grades of school and others wishing to receive the vaccine may obtain it through them.

We shall not know whether the vaccine will be licensed until some time in April, but we must prepare now for our community program so that all three inoculations of the vaccine may be given before schools close and before the polio season.

If this polio vaccine can be offered, do you want your child to have it?

Unfortunately, word of current planning may give the impression that these in charge actually know the vaccine is effective. This is not the case. No one knows the answer yet, not even workers at the Polio Evaluation Center in Ann Arbor, Mich. But "Always Prepared" is a good motto for crucial situations.

The advance planning being done now is an example of that motto wisely being put into practice.

We have great hopes that all children in the first and second grades of the primary schools in our community will have the opportunity this spring to receive the Salk polio vaccine. These children have been selected according to a nationwide plan developed by health and educational authorities and outlined in the

accompanying leaflet, "Attention, Parents."
