80,000 Will Attend Chevrolet Banquets

Will Start Work On Perryton Dam

AMARILLO, Oct. 13—Official announcement today of the final approval of two water conservation projects, one in Ochiltree county and one in Swisher county, brought the total number to six of such recreational projects in the Texas Panhandle. Buffalo dam near Umbarger, the Boggy creek dam at Canadian, the McClellan creek dam south of Pampa and the Rita Blanca dam at Dalhart are already in various stages of construction.

Concurrent with this official approval by A. G. Black, chief of the Bureau of Agricultural Economics in Washington, D. C., is an announcement by James C. Foster, regional director of the bureau in Amarillo, of the plans for construction of the Tule creek project at Tulla in Swisher county and the Wolf creek project located near Perryton in Ochiltree county.

Agricultural Association Meets Delegates To State Convention

Tomnie Venneman and Lawrence Dwyer were elected delegates for the Hansford county Agricultural Association to attend the State Convention of the organization which will be held at Waco, Nov. 1-2. The delegates were elected at the regular meeting held at the club house Tuesday night Oct. 11.

At the meeting reports were heard from representatives of the home demonstration clubs of Hansford county. The reports indicated much progress has been made by the home demonstration agent, Miss Pearl Locke in organizing and mapping out the work for the clubs in the county. Miss Locke has also organized 4 4-H clubs for girls.

Will Miller made a talk on prospects for a major lake to be constructed in Hansford county as a part of the 1939 Panhandle Water Conservation program.

President John Venneman read considerable correspondence on the wheat loan and freight rate situation that confronts wheat producers of this area, and discussion of the problem left the delegates to the State Convention instructed to work for larger wheat loans and lower freight rates.

State Director of the association, Bill Deck of Ochiltree county was a visitor at the meeting and talked about the future program, reviewing his recent visit to Hutchinson, Kansas and Fort Worth, Texas on the occasion of Secretary of Ag. Wallace's visit to these two cities.

The association instructed delegates to the state convention to favor an increase in the truck weight limit from 7,000 pounds to 12,000 pounds.

Entire Panhandle Enjoys Moisture Over Week End

Rainfall amounting to 1.15 inches in Spearman over the week end, and topping this figure to as high as near 2 inches in the extreme west end of the county, brings assurance of winter pasture to practically every section of the Panhandle.

Rainfall at Spearman aside from showers Saturday and Sunday fell in a continuous slow rain during the night Sunday.

For the first time in over 7 years service with Spearman people, this writer has the authority of Frank Buzzard, Lee McClellan and Delon Kirk to go as far as I like in reporting this rainfall.

Mr. Buzzard stated emphatically that I could not exaggerate the benefits of the moisture. It came ideally, did more good than a 2 or 3 inch downpour, and insures plenty of pasture both wheat and range. Coming at this time of the year the rainfall will be followed by cool days and nights without the possibility of so much wind and hot sun to absorb the moisture.

Most of the county has an excellent sub-soil moisture and the week-end rainfall will cause the moisture to meet. A short spell of growing weather will make the entire landscape a green carpet of wheat.

Possibility Of Three Cornered Race For District Judge

These prices are for the German worker whose basic wage is between \$17.50 and \$26.50 for a 44 hour week.

I wonder if this applies to the settlement in Europe?

It seems as though Jack Doyle, the Irish tenor boxer, collided with a humorous situation when, while boxing, he made a terrific swing at his opponent with his right, missed, stumbled against the ropes, slipped, struck his head on the floor and knocked himself out.

The death of Honorable Judge Pickens created a vacancy which has been filled by the appointment of Curtis Douglass of Panhandle who will serve until the November election. It appears there will be a number of candidates asking the people for this office of trust. Mr. Aynesworth has already announced he will be a candidate Jack Allen of Perryton and W. L. McConnell of Panhandle have been mentioned over the district as candidates. These men all are men of high ability and it will be an opportunity for the people to honor one of their leading citizens in the legal profession. According to information Curtis Douglass will not be a candidate for the office in the November election.

It was brought out last night at the County Agricultural meeting that the wheat farmers of Texas are being discriminated against through an unjust freight rate to export points. It was also pointed out that a farmer living at Omaha, Neb., could ship wheat to Galveston for export for 23c per 100 lb. and that a farmer living at Wichita Falls is compelled to pay 35 c per 100 lb. in order to move his wheat from Wichita Falls to the same terminal elevator in Galveston. Makes one think of the old remark, 'who built the ark'. We farmers know who built the railroads although we are not in the same position when they were finished that brother Noah was. He used the ark he built, while we farmers allow the eastern capitalists to use the road we built.

Senator Pattman of Nevada has been quoted as having a remedy for the government and the overburdened cotton farmers depressed conditions. He suggests that we swap 13,000,000 bales of cotton to China and India and take in return silver bullion at the rate of ten pounds of cotton for 1 ounce of silver. We could then bury the silver in the treasury of the United States and they in turn could issue currency at the statutory value of \$1.29 per ounce, and pay the cotton producer in this currency at the rate of 12.9c per pound for his cotton.

You know it is interesting to see some of the programs our eminent senators are putting forward at this time.

The scriptural statement that the Lord will take care of his own is being enacted by the Lords of dollars. It has just been announced that Senator William G. McAdoo of California who failed to receive renomination in the late primaries is to become chairman of the Dollar Steamship Inc. and the announcement follows that the maritime commission announces the approval of a \$4,500,000 loan to this same company and a five year operation subsidy of \$3,000,000 a year.

Looks as if we all ought to be in the steamship business. It has just been pointed out that a framed up controversy over the trade treaty with Great Britain is to be used as entertainment for public attention during the congressional campaign this year.

It looks now like the whole Czech difficulty was a frameup to divert the minds of the French and British public from some of the tactics that were favored by their leaders to stop the growth of Communism in Central Europe and it is also suggested that President Roosevelt was tricked into sending his peace telegrams just at the right time to make the whole deal look genuine. If this is true as pointed out the U. S. is the number one dupe.

Spices For Variety Sometimes when we celebrate October 12, we forget that it is not alone the lure of a new continent but partly the urge of the medieval appetite that set Columbus voyaging. During 1937, the nation spent more than 12 million dollars more than 110 million pounds of spices and condiments, according to the U. S. Department of Commerce. At one time adulterations were prevalent, but since the enforcement of the Pure Food and Drug Act of 1907 adulterations of spices have been illegal. Moderation and variety are mottoes for using spices, in seasoning. To get the most flavor from every flock of spices, add spices at the last possible moment. In making a spice cake, add the spice to the flour and sift three times for best results. When reasoning with a combination of sugar and spices, as for cinnamon rolls or apple pie, blend sugar and spices thoroughly before using. Many cooks have won praise, by adding unexpected bits of spice to foods commonly accepted at their face value. Many of these 'touches' are so common that they are now a part of the standard recipes. But there are many more that are unusual that have overpriced happy discoveries. Remember just 'touches'. A little spice is good, but the more easily spoils the dish. Try adding a grating of nutmeg or two, to creamed chicken soup or creamed spinach; a dash of mace to string beans, a little curry powder to lima beans. Curry powder gives an interest. Hull, flavor for a mixed green salad and white sauce seasoned with curried is delicious on poached or sliced eggs. Then there are the spiced drinks for variety which should be served hot now that the days are cooler. Paprika chicken, is a variation of the usual stewed or fricassee fowl: After the bird has been seasoned with salt and pepper, it is rolled in a mixture of flour and paprika. Prepare enough of the paprika-flour to thicken the gravy later. After rolling in paprika—flour, brown in hot butter or some other well flavored fat. Cover with hot water and continue cooking in a tightly covered pan until the last bit of meat is tender. Thicken the gravy with the remainder of the flour. The quantity of paprika added is all a matter of taste. Paprika veal, prepared by the same method, is also excellent. —Virgie P. Wheeler
