Leslie Reynolds' research theme on Ralph Waldo Emerson contained some very interesting and little known facts about the essay writer and was very complete with footnotes and bibliography.  
"Sea Poems" collected by Betty Tilly contained 12 illustrated poems by Manifold and others and had a very effective cover of a schooner at sunset.  
"Sevenson" in a black-lined stenciling on a white cover was the title of the next anthology by Marvel Gibber.  
Most of the illustrations in this collection were of the black and white lithograph type.  
The life and works of Charles Dickens by Wally Cayton was another research theme with good illustrations and a cut-out letter cover of red and white.  
Many of the anthologies were bound in wood with leather and wooden lettering, evidencing much midnight oil burning, to say the least.

"William Cullen Bryant" by Mary Margaret Wilbanks was one of these, and was bound also with leather thongs. Another was "Miscellaneous Poems" by Doyla Jackson, wooden with silver hinges and stenciled lettering.  
Everyone who saw Eddis Blackburn's very original "Hill Parade" collection was not only surprised but impressed. Two pieces of wood rounded out and colored like phonograph records were hinged together to contain such hits as "Slow Boat to China," illustrated by a couple in a row boat; "The Pussy Cat Song," illustrated with two cats on a fence; and "Down Among the Shattering Palms," illustrated with some monkeys in palm trees.  
"Winter Poems" by Don Floyd was illustrated in black and white etchings of snow scenes and contained, "Ode to Winter," by Thomas Campbell; "Old Winters on the Farm," by James Whitcomb Riley; "The Snowmaker," by William Cullen Bryant; "Blow, Blow, Thou Winter Wind" and "Winter" by Will Shakespeare.

"The Human Seasons," by John Keats.  
The cover for this book being one of white leather with a front-piece of a village in snow, it was particularly enjoyed.  
There were many other A plus graded anthologies which received high praise from fair visitors and it has been said that this exhibit was rated higher than any of the others according to actual effort and time put in, though it was not judged since it was classified only as an educational display.
