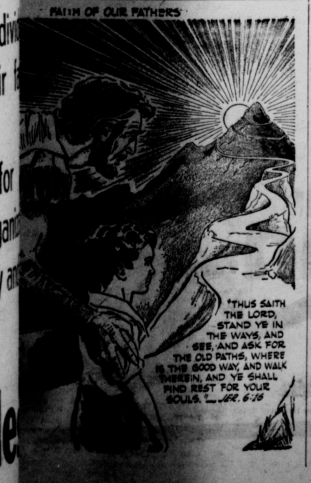

In 1929, Jasper Bogue, Panhandle Director of the Texas Christian Missionary Society, visited Gruver, Texas and organized The First Christian Church in Gruver, Hansford County, Texas.

The congregation worshipped with the Community Church of Gruver; a Minister of the First Christian Church conducting the services, one Sunday in each month.

November 8, 1936, Owen Hussey, a student at Texas Christian University, Fort Worth, Texas, was part-time minister until January 1937.

These were the Dust Bowl days and services were discontinued.

A movement to revive the First Christian Church in Gruver, was undertaken in 1949, when a few citizens of Gruver and vicinity felt the need of a place to worship according to the dictates of their own hearts.

The group purchased the building vacated by the Methodist of Spearman, in March 21, 1950.

This church building has quite a history; it was built in the town of Hansford in 1917, and was moved to Spearman when the Santa Fe R. R. built through Hansford County, and the town of Hasford was moved to Spearman in 1920.

It was moved to Gruver March, 21, 1951, and located on BLOCK 37 Lots 11-12 & 13 which were donated by the Cluck Brothers to the members of the First Christian Church.

A meeting was held April 19, 1951, with Rev. Clifford Parker, of Spearman, presiding, when the First Christian Church of Gruver, was re-organized.

Rev. Frank C. Reece a student at Brite College of the Bible, Fort Worth, Texas, was employed and began his work as pastor, September, 1951.

A spirit of co-operation prevails and the minister and congregation are happily working together for Christ, the Church and the Community. Much has been accomplished.

An annex, consisting of pastor's study, three class rooms, a bath room, kitchen and fellowship hall, has been built.

Three more lots No. 14-15 & 16 have been purchased by the congregation.

These lots adjoin the property on the south.

September 1952, Frank Reese enrolled as a graduate student, working toward earning his degree at Brite College of the Bible, Fort Worth, Texas.

During the week he was a student at Brite Bible College, Fort, Worth Texas, and traveled hundreds of miles each week-end by train and bus to preach in his Church at Gruver, Texas.

The Eagle or the Oyster?



Now comes the season of the year when the Red, White and Blue is glorified in oratory throughout the land. Plutitudes flow, Washington, Lincoln, Franklin, Patrick Henry, and George are quoted. For speakers bold enough to break with this tradition, we suggest the examination of a speech written by Marie Chorge, editor of "VOICE Magazine, for the July issue. Theme—The Eagle or the Oyster?"

For a people... who elect opportunism rather than opportunity, who dream of security rather than success; who believe political charity is a virtue; who mock the frugal and plunder the thrifty; who adopt the rule that if I don't succeed you are to blame, that what you have is as much mine as yours; who contend that property is a shameful sign of success; who believe that failure is the nobler cause; well-being is wicked; prudence, out-of-date; sacrifice silly; for such a people a fitting emblem is the Oyster.

For a people... who endure defeat, disease and disaster for a hundred years in order to get a foothold on the Eastern Seaboard, the while with one eye on the interior, a no-man's land, a cockpit for settling international rivalries and private grudges, disputed by wild animals and wilder redmen; who sacrificed thus for a belief in the worth and dignity of the individual; who believed that economic freedom was as important as political freedom; who substituted "In God We Trust" for the Old World motto "In Government We Trust"; for a nation built by men who dedicated their lives to achieve the realization of these beliefs, I give you, fellow citizens—the Eagle!

Guess this column could be stopped if the country editor did not have to apologize to the folk that are due apologies. Under that heading, with perhaps a special apology comes Mrs. Frances Sim. The excellent Dairy Kream managed by Mrs. Sim, was exactly 1 year old on June 18th. Mrs. Sim planned a special advertisement for the issue of June 17th and told this writer to come around and get the copy—and since Mrs. Sim has not lived here for 20 years she did not realize that the local country editor could not be expected to remember as long as 2 days, much less a week. She will probably learn that most folk in this county have long ago quit trusting the country editor with subscription money or valuable information. Sunburn Can Be Fatal

The death of a twenty-four year-old man from sunburn is reported from another state and the tragedy should serve to warn all persons, and especially fair-skinned people, that it can be dangerous to expose one's self unduly to the rays of the sun. It is not always the brightness of the sun that causes fatal burns. On slightly overcast days, the solar rays can filter through and be as powerful as the bright sunlight.

We do not know too much about the rays of the sun other than that they are extremely powerful. Some patients are exposed to the rays of the sun of treatment, especially tuberculosis victims, but it is safe to assume that if beneficial results can be secured, there is the possibility of harmful effects.

We do not go into the question of pigmentation, which explains why some people are easily sunburned and others are not. It is well for everybody to be temperate in exposure until well-tanned.

Intelligence Vital To Life

Lets not make the mistake of underestimating intelligence. Too many people take every opportunity to say smart things about the man of book-intelligence, suggesting that they believe that this is a big joke.

No problem of the world will be solved by emotion. No great benefit comes to the world except through change. Thousands of experiments would have been valueless without a trained mind to read their messages and apply them truthfully.

It is alright for a man to take pride in his experience, learned through the years. He has something that is distinctly an asset to him. However, let him not underestimate the value of so-called book intelligence, if he has little of it.

Experience and intelligence together will solve many problems that neither, alone can handle. The man without either is badly handicapped. He who pokes fun at intelligence is as foolish as the book-worm, who imagines he can understand all of life by reading between the covers of the printed word.

Rededication On The Fourth

The Declaration of Independence was passed by the Continental Congress on July 4th, 1776, but the historic document was not actually signed until later.

Now, after many years, the people of the United States appreciate the significance of the action taken many years ago, when the delegates of the colonies went on record in favor of the proposition that all men "are endowed with certain inalienable rights" and that "among these are life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness."

The rights of the individual, so long accepted by the world, are now under challenge from those who do not agree with our famous declaration that governments derive "their just powers from the consent of the governed." The world of 1954 is far removed from that of 1776 but, in one respect there is little difference. Again the liberty of men requires courageous action on the part of liber-loving people. Our rights as free men are now being questioned by planes, guns and motorized equipment, but there is still lacking an adequate assurance that the issue will not soon be joined.

It is urged that all readers take time to read the Declaration of Independence, July 4th, the anniversary of its passage, is a good day to dedicate to this ceremony. Afterwards, inspired to support the ideas of freedom, may we not as Americans, pledge to each other our lives, our fortunes, and our sacred honor."
