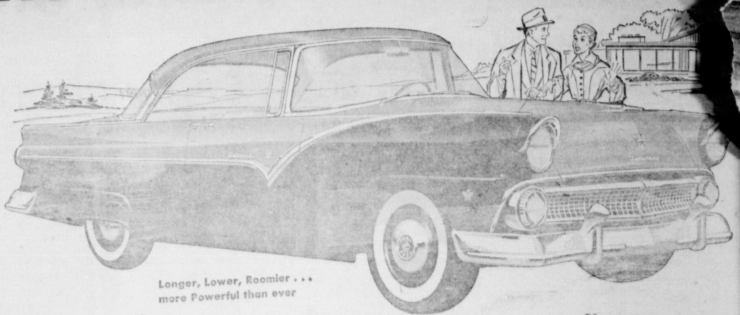

Will Call Hospital Election

Hansford county's Commissioners' Court will call an election about 30 to 40 days for the purpose of determining the wish of the citizens of this county relative to leasing the hospital at Spearman to "a doctor."

One hundred and forty qualified tax paying citizens of the county signed a petition asking County Commissioners' Court to lease the hospital to a doctor. Requirements by law would call for 119 signers in order to make it mandatory for the court to call such a special election.

We are informed by County Judge Johnny Lee that in addition to determining the will of the people relative to leasing the county hospital the court will have voters specify that if the election carries, will each voter express his opinion on whether the hospital is leased to a doctor or a doctor approved by the American Medical Association, or just leased to a doctor.

This last expression of the will of the people is required because the hospital is leased to a doctor other than one approved by the American Medical Association, would limit the practice of all doctors that are members of the association. In other words if the hospital is leased to a chiropractor, we are informed that no medical doctor will be able to practice in the hospital, and the service that could be derived at the Hansford Hospital would be limited to such services as featured and carried out by the Chiropractor profession.

It appears that the Commissioners' Court is anxious to do the will of the people, and there fore will get an above the board expression of the voters in the coming election.

Date for the election has not been set, but the court officials have ordered election supplies through the Spearman Reporter and where these supplies arrive, there will be time for setting the date for the election, and determining the framing of the vote questions.

For the gala occasions, Mrs. Dressen boiled a ham, baked cakes and made pies and fed the crowd from midnight until sun-up.

The happiest time for the Dressens was the big Community Christmas tree at the Court House. Mr. and Mrs. Nebb were always on the decorating committee. They didn't have to spend much on decorations as most of it was strings of pop-corn and cranberries. The big trees looked very gay and pretty with all the presents hanging on, unwrapped.

Mrs. Dressen got a lot of pleasure from field glasses. She spent many a lonely hour watching the activities of birds, coyotes, antelopes and the prairie. Actually she was always hoping she would pick up a person headed their way.

They were so eager to have company they begged every one who stopped for water or to ask directions to stay over night, any kind of company it broke the monotony of daily routine, even if some turned out to be thieves or cattle rustlers.

The "brave men" from Dodge City, Kansas always made Dressens their head quarters. They made good wages gathering bones for a fertilizer plant. For two years they made regular trips

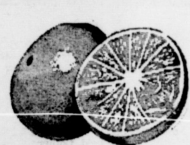

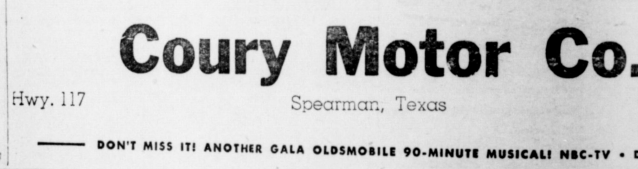
