THE PUBLIC DEBT

In a previous newsletter, I called to your attention the cash balance that has been carried by the Treasury Department in private banks in this country. This cash balance plus other cash on hand, but not in private banks, has been approximating in recent months around five and one-half billion dollars. This simply means that, although the national debt has been somewhat reduced, there are still some 274 and one-half billion dollars in recent months, actually the net amount we would be in debt, if we used this cash to pay off part of the public debt, would be some 269 billion dollars. The Congress recently authorized an additional 6 billion dollars rise in the debt ceiling which increases the debt ceiling from the present ceiling of 275 billion dollars to 281 billion dollars. I regret to tell you that the public debt has been rising month by month. On June 30, 1952, which was the end of the fiscal year for 1952, the national debt was 259 billion dollars. At that time, we had cash on hand in an amount approximating 9 billion dollars. On December 31, 1953, the national debt was 267 billion dollars, and we had on hand at that time approximately 6 and one-half billion dollars in cash, which made the net debt somewhere around 261 and one-half billion dollars. The most recent figures available show that the debt will continue to increase and that securities will be issued to absorb the additional 6 billion dollars authorized by Congress. Should this be done, it will mean that in the very near future, the national debt will reach an all time high. In other words, a record is in the making. Heretofore, the highest public debt ever reached was on
