ion wells were quite common on the South Plains in the late 1930's and early 40's, due to shallow water and very good water. Kansas also had early development due to the shallow water.

The first wells of commercial value were also drilled in Hansford County in the 1930's, but only four of them. These included Doc Hales at Old Hansford, and this was a Southwestern Public Service exper-The county imental well. probably had 25 wells by the end of the 40's.

In the early 50's irrigation really "got in hi gear" and by the time the water district was formed in 1955 there were approximately 200 wells in the county

South Plains and Kansas drillers moved to this area after they drilled out their home areas. In 1955 the water district was formed. First permit was issued in April of 1955 to Jack Reed.

Holton stated that we are fortunate in this area to have some of the purest water in the nation, plus the best water district. Of course, the records on the first wells are not complete, just what someone could remember. Sand was a big factor, causing all kinds of trouble. Some of the first wells

These include: psychological testing, marital and family counseling, individual counseling. and group therapy. The second category of our services is of an educational nature. These include: newspaper articles, radio broadcasts and special programs for area groups. Topics reviewed not only. deal with mental illness, but with mental health. We work with people to help them, not only get more out of each day they live, but each hour. This is done by incresing awareness of ourselves, our world and then examining options that are open to us.





#### Social Security News

Howard Weatherly, Manager of the Pampa Social Security Office, said that many people are still confused regarding the

Some people are of the opin-ion that individual accounts are established for each taxpayer and he can only draw from this account in case of retirement, disability or death. If this were true, the average retired wither could draw out all he hadpaid in slightly over 2 years, and then

cords are maintained for the individual worker regarding the amount of wages on which he has paid the tax. This record of wages is used to determine the benefit he will receive in proportion to earnings on which he paid social security taxes. Since the average retired

worker will draw benefits much longer than two years, many people ask, "What keeps the program from running out of money?" The social security program operates on a "current basis. That is, monies currently collected from payroll taxes are used to pay benefits to those people who are now entitled. Therefore, the programs remain fiscally sound because of the social security taxes paid by the emplyed

populace. Congress has attempted to keep the tax rate at such a level that contributions each year will equal payments with a small reserve on which to rely to cover periods when payments exceed the amount of money coming in. Weatherly said the basic idea behind the social security program is like any other insurance in that it is a sharing of the risk. For instance, most people carry fire insurance on their home to protect them if they have a fire. Social security provides benefits to people when they retire, become disabled, Medicare at age 65, and benefits to their survivors if they die.






