Work begins on new airport

Work began in earnest this week on the new Spearman Air Port. Large dirt moving rigs are in operation, graders, water trucks, and electricians are burying the high lines which are located at the end of the runway. The Spearman group received their state approved \$75,000.00 for their airport this week in Austin, and little time was wasted in starting up the project.

Besides having a large, safe, runway, which will be capable of landing jets, the airport will have facilities for industrial development, and hangar space for all types of airplanes.

The Industrial Foundation will match these funds and NO CITY TAXES will be used in the construction of the airport facilities in Spearman!

Completion date will be two to three years.

The tax rate for the county for 1978 is \$1.81 and from that 33 cents goes to the hospital district, 30 cents to the special road fund, 6 cents to Palo Duro River Authority, 5 cents to the water district, 10 cents to the state with 97 cents left going to Hansford County. The county's tax assessment ratio is 20 per cent. Tax Collections for 1977 totaled 96.4%.

Canadian Plans Industrial Tour



A guided tour of one of the big drilling rigs in the Canadian area will be a special feature of a business and industrial tour planned by the Canadian Chamber of Commerce in connection with Canadian's annual Fall Foliage Tour next Sunday afternoon, October 29.

The industrial tour replaces the highly successful "tour of homes" which featured the Foliage Tour date last year; and like the tour of home, proceeds from the ticket sales (\$2 for adults, \$1 for children under 12) will all go to the community-owned Edward Abraham Memorial Home, a non-profit nursing home.

Headquarters for the Foliage Tour, which is free, and for the Industrial Tour, will be the lobby of the Moody Building at the corner of Second Street (Highways 60-83) and Main in downtown Canadian. Maps and brochures will be available there for both tours.

The business and industrial tour will also include guided tours of the Moody Building itself (the historic Hotel Moody which has been restored and remodeled into a luxurious office building housing the Malouf Abraham Company and Sansing and Nies law firm on its upper floors, plus shops and a coffee shop in its "mini-mall" on the ground floor); and of Canadian Millwork, the home-grown multi-million dollar industry which ships finished hardwood trim all over the United States.

The Millwork buildings, stretching out for blocks along the Santa Fe tracks at the lower end of Main Street, a block and a half from the Moody Building, contain a manufacturing plant which converts raw hardwood from Malaysia into finished trim moldings which are shipped to builders throughout the U.S. It employs more than 100 people, using sophisticated and automated woodworking equipment, and visitors will be offered a guided tour of the entire operation.

Concluding the industrial tour will be a short trip by bus (transportation will be furnished) to one of the big drilling rigs near the city, and visitors will be taken on a short tour of the rig itself. Before taking the buses, visitors will be invited to view a 20-minute color film, "Making Hole", provided by the Baker & Taylor Drilling Company, which shows the whole drilling process. The film will be shown continually during the afternoon in the Canadian Room at the First State Bank Building (across Main Street from the Moody Building) and buses will leave from that point at half-hour intervals during the afternoon (from 1 p.m. until about 5:30 p.m.) for the short trip to the working drilling rig. At the rig, visitors will get a close-up look at the drilling operation.

In addition to the industrial tour, visitors to Canadian on Sunday afternoon (from one until six o'clock) will be invited to drive Canadian's famous Fall

Foliage Trail to Lake Marvin, and to visit the Nature Trail laid out on the east side of the Lake by Naturalist A.S. Jackson. There will be no charge. Maps and brochures will be available in the lobby of the Moody Building and at the concessions building at the Lake Marvin.

Also during the afternoon, visitors will be invited to attend Canadian's annual Hobby Show and Sale which will be held in City Auditorium (one block down Main Street from the Moody Building), and this is also free for all.

Canadian's restaurants and cafes, including the handsome new Beef Country Restaurant on Highway 83 north of the city overlooking the municipal golf course, will be open to serve visitors at mid-day, and a "Kountry Kitchen" sponsored by members of the Women's Service League, will be in operation from 11 to 5 o'clock in the Moody Building Coffee Shop, offering home-baked goodies for sale and featuring barbecued beef brisket-on-a-bun and cold drinks.

The Moody Hall shops will also hold open house for visitors during the afternoon.

Fall foliage in the Canadian valley should be at its peak of color for this weekend; and if good weather holds, thousands of visitors from all over the Panhandle area are expected to take the tours this year.

The Tax Relief Amendment

It's not often that we have a chance to vote to lower our taxes, but Texans will have that opportunity on Nov. 7. In the section of the ballot on constitutional amendments, the first item will be "The Tax Relief Amendment" which was authorized by the special session of the Legislature last summer.

It is far-reaching and addresses tax relief in six major areas—all of them balanced and designed to help all segments of the economy as well as individual tax payers.

A statewide committee known as "Texans for Tax Relief" is being formed to promote passage of the amendment. Co-Chairmen are Mrs. Marcella Perry, widely known Houston business and civic leader, and Ray Hutchison of Dallas, former member of the Texas Legislature and former Chairman of the Texas Republican Party.

Dozens of other business,

professional, educational and civic leaders throughout the state are participating as committee members. "We believe this amendment is the most important item ever to come before the voters in the area of tax reform," Mrs. Perry and Hutchison said.

The six major areas of tax relief provided in the amendment are: -- Removal of intangibles from the mandatory tax base to allow the Legislature to clear up the constitutional problem which now exists. The Legislature is not required to tax intangibles.

-- Removal of the current \$250 limit on household goods and personal effects which are exempt all household goods and personal effects from taxation which are not held or used for the production of income and would permit the Legislature to exempt all or part of the personal property homestead of an individual family.

-- Granting a \$5,000 exemption from the market value of a residential homestead for school tax purposes. It also allows the Legislature to grant an additional exemption up to \$10,000 for citizens 65 or older and for disabled citizens. Property taxes for residential homesteads of 65 or older would be frozen and may not be increased during the period of time that residence remains a homestead of that individual.

-- Providing for the taxation of land devoted to farm and ranch use on the basis of productive capacity rather than simply market value.

-- Places a ceiling on spending by the State Legislature and stipulates that the state budget may not grow faster than the state's economy.

-- Provides for "Truth in Taxation" which means that property taxes may not be increased without full public hearings beforehand. The provision also says that if property is revalued, the owner must be given notice not only of the revaluation, but also of the amount of taxes which would result from the evaluation if neither the tax rate nor the ratio of assessment is offered. Many people think this is perhaps the key portion of the entire amendment.

Texans Want Stronger Laws

Only one-fourth to one-fifth of Texans responding to the most recent Texas Crime Poll are satisfied with present laws concerning prostitution and marijuana use.

The finding is the result of the second semi-annual poll to be conducted by a team of social scientists at the Criminal Justice Center at Sam Houston State University in Huntsville.

In the most recent survey, a random sample of 1,000 Texas residents were questioned on the two issues, and a total of 642 responded. One question was: "In regards to present laws in Texas for prostitution, do you think the laws should be: (a) more severe; (b) left as they are; (c) less severe; or, (d) there should be no laws against prostitution."

The largest proportion of respondents (44%) replied that the laws should be more severe. Approximately one-fifth (18%) said that there should be no laws against prostitution or that the laws should be less severe (9%). Only 26% said they should be left as they are.

Responses to the question were also analyzed according to the sex, race, and income level of respondents, said Dr. Raymond Teske, Jr., director of the Texas Crime Poll.

Females (49%) are significantly more likely than males (38%) to want more severe laws for prostitution. On the other hand, males (23%) are much more likely than females (14%) to respond that there should be no laws against prostitution.

Mexican Americans (63%) apparently want more severe laws for prostitution, said Teske, while Blacks (48%) and Whites (41%) are less likely to want more severe laws. Only 9% of the Mexican Americans felt that there should be no laws against prostitution, whereas 24% of the Blacks and 19% of the Whites selected this response.

The lower the income level, the more likely that the respondent would like to see more severe laws against prostitution. Higher income level respondents were more likely to prefer that laws be less severe or that there be no laws against prostitution.

A similar question concerning marijuana use got similar response with 45% indicating that laws should be more severe, 14% saying that they should be less severe, and almost one-fifth (19%) saying there should be no laws against the use of marijuana. Only 21% indicated that they were content with present laws.

Responses to the marijuana question were not significantly different between sexes or Blacks and Whites. Mexican Americans (56%) were more inclined to want more severe laws than Whites (44%) or Blacks (44%).

As was the case with the prostitution question, the lower the income the greater the probability that the respondent would want more severe laws and the higher the income the more likely they would want laws left as they were. No distinct pattern was observed among income levels on whether there should be no laws against use of marijuana.

October 18--Navy Aviation Structural Mechanic Airman Lewis K. Kibler, son of Carol A. Lamb of route One, Gruver, Tex., is participating in the major NATO exercise "Display Determination."

He is serving as a member of Tactical Electronic Warfare Squadron 130, based at Whidbey Island Naval Air Station, Oak Harbor, Wa. His squadron is operating as a unit of the U.S. Sixth Fleet.
