The location of the fast food service facility will also provide additional employment along with the employees expected to be hired to meet the needs of the new Nurs-a-nickle Motel, currently under construction.

No Gas Rate Decision Yet

A spokesman in the Gas and Utilities Division of The Texas Railroad Commission's office in Austin told the Reporter late Monday that a "decision is expected very shortly" on the request by High Plains Natural Gas Company for a rate increase. Spearman City Council members and residents have been anxiously awaiting a ruling by the hearing Examiner in Austin with reference to the possible hike in rates.

The Gas Utility has in essence asked for a rate increase that could go as high as 26% for local customers on the average. That ruling had been expected by January 18th but so far no action has been reported by the Railroad Commission office in Austin.

A spokesman in Austin said 'we haven't forgotten about you in Spearman!'





The treated domestic sewage effluent is discharged into Horse Creek; thence to Palo Duro Creek; thence across the Oklahoma State Line in Segment No. 0101 of the Canadian River Basin.

The permit, if renewed by the ommission, will specify conditions and limitations generally the same as those currently enforced by the existing permit.

No public hearing shall be held on this application for renewal unless a person who has received notice of the proposed renewal has requested a public hearing in writing. A person requesting a public hearing should set out the factual basis of his belief that such renewal should not be granted by the Commission.

If no sufficient request for hearing is received within 30 days of the date of this notice. the permit will be submitted to the Commission for approval of the renewal.

Film Review **Further Adventures** Of The Wilderness Family

New York - Back in 1975 Arthur Dubs made an innocent little film which he dubbed "Adventures Of The Wilderness Family." At the end of 1977 he reported rentals to date in the U.S. and Canada amounting to \$13,363,269. If its sequel, "Further Adventures Of The Wilderness Family - Part 2," which hits the nation's screens during Christmas week, does half that much it will still be an highly successful effort. And this despite the claim that it cost threeand-a-half times as much as the original. From what is on the screen, there's no reason why the sequel shouldn't have the same appeal as the first film.

While the cast, especially Robert Logan as the father and Heather Rattray as his daughter (they've also survived the Aleutians in Warners' "The Sea Gypsies"), are generally impressive and natural, it's evident from the opening shot tha they're going to play support to the scenery

Filmed at Irwin Lake Lodge, Crested Butte, Col., John Hora's color camera provides sweeping scenes of some of the Rocky Mountains' most stunning land-

The film takes viewers through most of the seasons and there isn't one fake snowflake to be found. The human actors are also hard put to it to out-perform the animals used - one assumes that even the seemingly wild ones, such as wolves, are carefully trained as the entire cast has to work in very close proximity

Arthur Dubs' simple script fortunately keeps his cast out-doors for most of the film as their interior scenes tend to get a



Some dogs are humble and ingratiating in their efforts to make you love them. Others, with supreme confidence in their beauty and breeding, allow you to admire them

Both have great appeal as picture subjects, but the latter type is probably easier to photograph because they tend to pose naturally Getting good pictures of such dogs is largely a matter of seeing-and seizing-the opportunities as they arise.

With other dogs, it will probably be necessary to plan ahead to produce the effect you want.

A Kodak Tele-Ektra camera, that allows you to switch from normal to telephoto lens at the flick of switch, is an excellent choice for pet pictures, planned or unplanned. On some occasions, moving in close might spoil the pose you are trying to capture. On others, there just isn't time to move. With the telephoto lens you can get the picture you want.

Remembering a few other points will help, too. Shoot from the dog's level, even if this means getting down on the ground





 Discoloration of vegetation is another clue.

· Detection of a peculiar or unfamiliar odor may indicate a line leak.


