Cities Receive Sales Tax Checks

The City of Spearman received \$15,514.89 from the one cent sales tax for the June tax allocation. The payment for the same period last year was \$14,668.60.

Payments to date in 1979 have been 154,729.36. This compares to \$59,341.28 for the same period last year, showing a decrease of 7 per cent.

The City of Gruver received \$3,228.57 for the same period. This compares to \$3,856.01 for the same period last year. 1979 payments to date total \$10,364.71 as compared to 1978 payments of the same period of \$10,030.97, us 3 percent.

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said that Texas cities shared \$218 million in rebates from the one-percent optional city sales tax during the first six months of this year. This figure compared to \$196.4 million for the same six months of 1978.

If you are unable to visit personally, you may call 806-669-3381 or conduct any social security business.

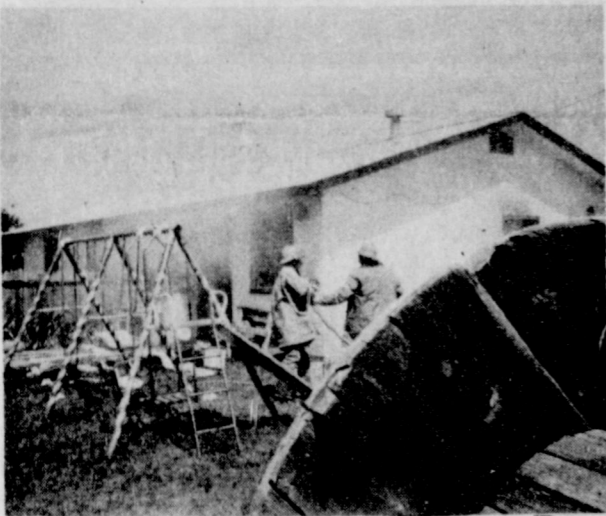

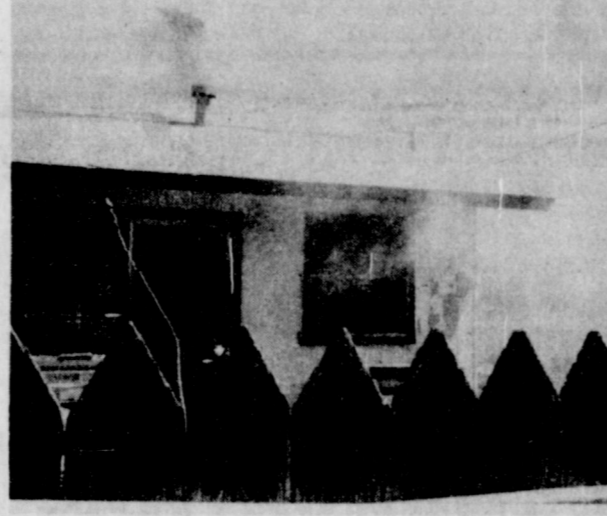

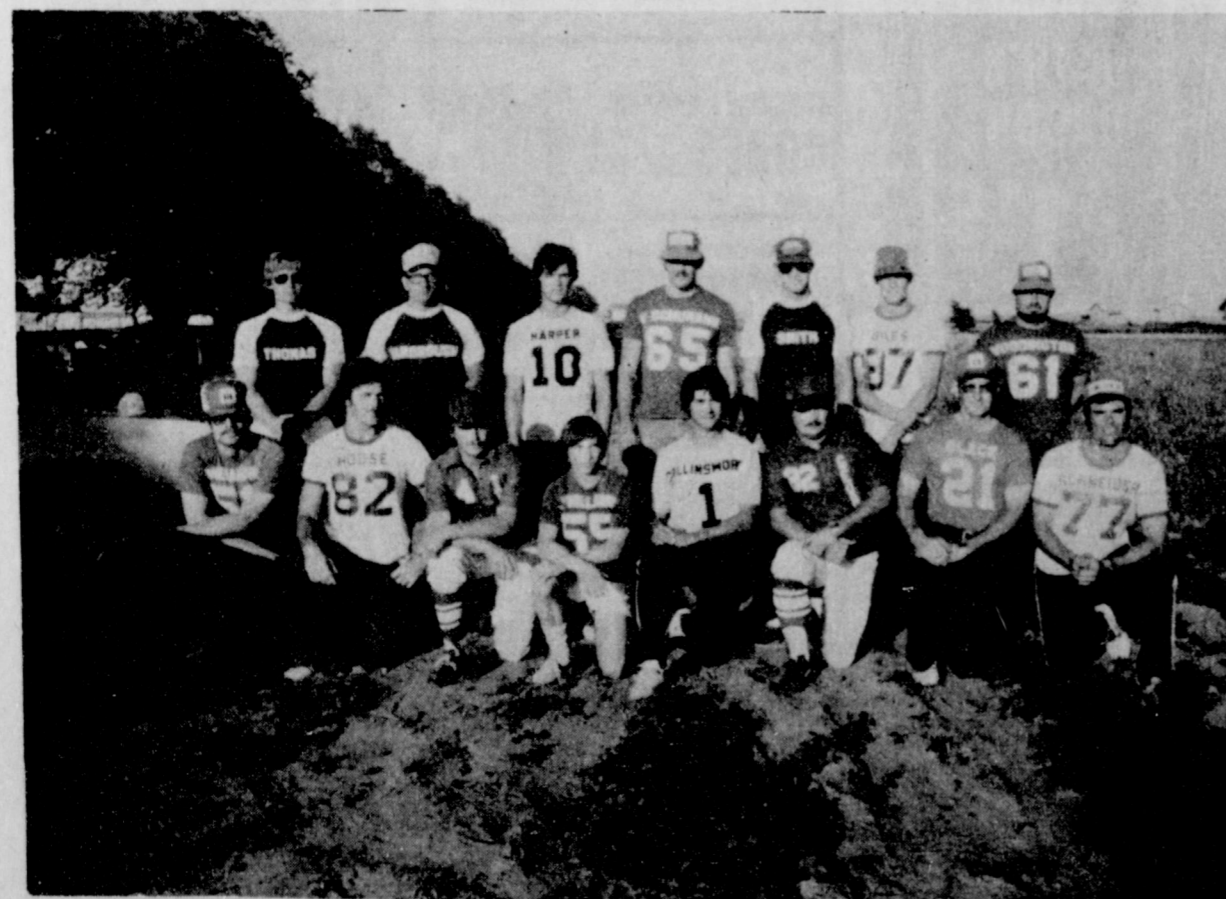

example and ride the rails for one full year.

The assignment is complicated by a gang of fumble-fingered dog-nappers, holding one of the world's rarest animals - a Shar Pei from China - for ransom.

"What's most outstanding about London," Tim goes on, "is the way he takes his trainer's commands. I've worked with a great many 'professional' animals, most of whom respond to hand signals or gestures. Not London. All of his cues are word cues, and he has a vocabulary of more than 5,000 words.

"The first day we worked together, his trainer began by 'telling' London what he wanted him to do. My reaction was, 'This has to be a put on.' But it wasn't. When the scene started, the trainer stood out of camera range, repeating his instructions which the dog executed flawlessly.

As the weeks went by, Conway's admiration for London increased.

"As strange as it sounds, we became 'friends,' with a professional respect for each other, almost like human actors," Tim recalls. "One day, we were rehearsing a tricky escape scene, which wasn't going well. Finally, in desperation, I suggested, 'Let's ask the dog what to do. He hasn't blown a scene on us yet.'"

After filming was over, Conway expressed his admiration for London in characteristic style.

"I think even W.C. Fields would have loved this dog," he remarked.

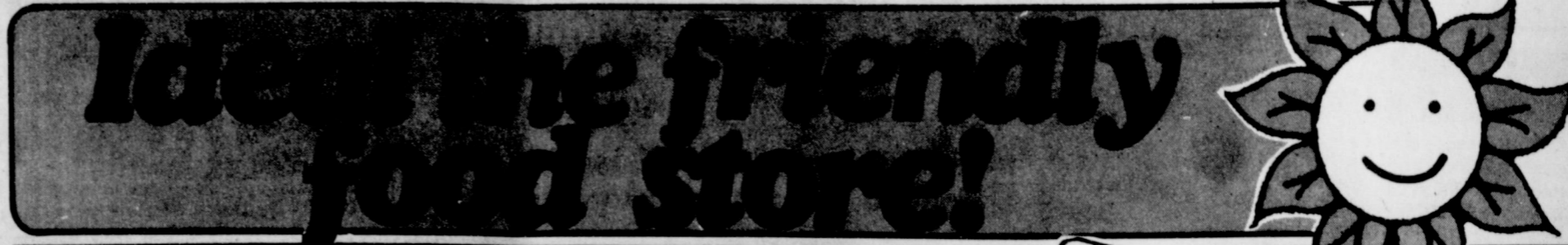

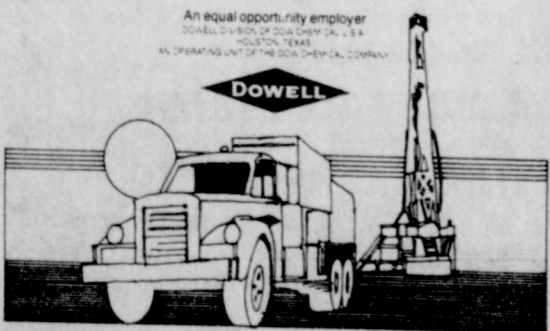

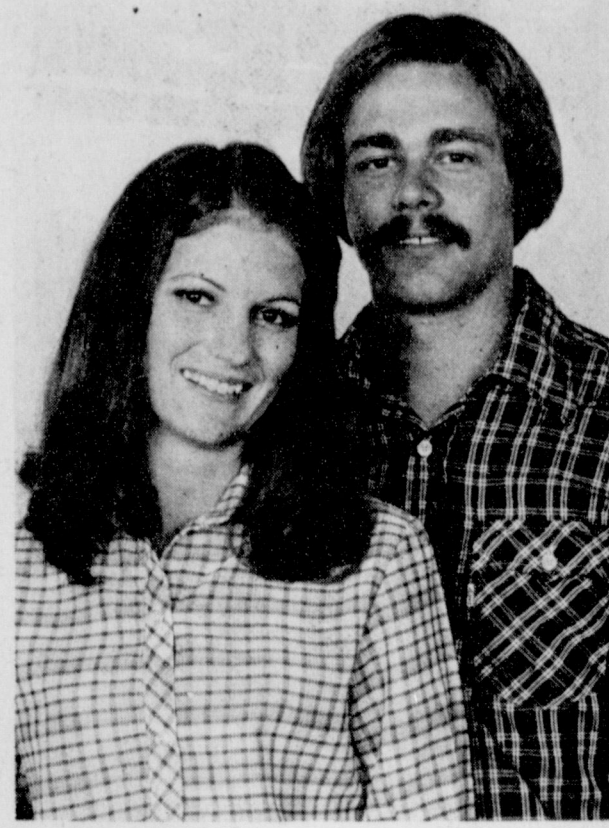

--buying a house already financed, and pay the equity (what the owner "has in it" and wants as profit--perhaps large because of the inflated market) to assume the existing loan.

--or have a lender agree to loan you money and hold a second or third lien on the home to help you assume the existing loan.

--or buy a home with a loan secured under Federal Housing Administration (FHA) or Veterans Administration (VA) guidelines.

BECOME A MISER?--MAYBE
Saving to make the larger down payment now required--as a result of tight conventional mortgage money--may not work.

Although savings on money can mean a 10 percent return--on large certificates of deposit (CD's), other housing and house-purchasing costs are increasing at a higher percentage rate.

CONSOLATION?
As a consolation, those who would be--but aren't yet--first-time home buyers can look at a few costs of owning a home, and perhaps feel a bit better.

For example, consider the costs of insurance and furnishings--such as draperies, appliances, building maintenance, landscaping and landscape-maintenance equipment--such as lawnmowers.

Then compare those costs with any income-tax or other savings you might achieve through owning a home.

ALONE YOU'RE NOT
Potential first-time home buyers are between the ages of 24 and 34.

Single first-timers are the fastest growing segment of the home-buying market, according to the National Association of Home Builders and the United States League of Savings Associations.

In other words, as interest rates rise and building, land and other home-buying costs increase, the first-time, conventional-mortgage home buyers may be eliminated from the market.

Alternatives to new conventional loans include:

Clean Up Mosquito Breeding Places Around Home

Recent rains have brought a mosquito problem to many Texas communities. Standing water from these showers makes an excellent breeding place for mosquitoes, says Layton Barton, County Agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Mosquitoes can lay eggs wherever standing water is available for a week or longer. Old tires, tin cans, birdbaths, roadside ditches, rain gutters, temporary water container and swampy places all can hold enough water to provide breeding sites for mosquitoes.

If mosquitoes are a problem, the first thing to do is eliminate their breeding sites, advises Barton.

Empty out old tires and place them where they cannot collect additional water. Flatten and discard tin cans. Change the water in birdbaths every week. Clean out rain gutters, remove temporary water containers and see that rain barrels and water storage tubs are tightly covered. Drain standing water from ditches and swampy areas.

If there is standing water that serves as a breeding site but cannot be drained or eliminated, treatment with a larvicide will be necessary, points out Barton.

One of the most effective larvicides is No. 2 diesel oil with a biodegradable spreader, applied at a rate of 20 gallons for each surface acre of water, or about 6 ounces per 100 square feet of surface.

Abate, malathion or Dursban applied to standing water at rates indicated on their labels also are effective larvicides. But labels should be read carefully to determine the hazards these insecticides pose to persons applying them and to fish and animals that may use the water, cautions Barton.

Control of adult mosquitoes offers the most immediate relief. Inside the home, aerosol bombs containing pyrethrin offer quick knockdown of adult

mosquitoes. Since the killing effect of pyrethrin is short-

lived, frequent application will be necessary to control adult mosquitoes inside the house. The "pest strip" offers effective control for long periods. One pest strip for each average size room is necessary to control mosquitoes.

Persons who are active where mosquitoes are a problem should use repellents, suggests Barton. These repellents will protect you from biting mosquitoes from one to three hours, depending upon the type of activity.

Adult mosquitoes around the home can best be controlled by space or residual treatments of insecticides such as malathion, Dibrom, methoxychlor, or Dursban. Space treatments, generally fogs, have little residual activity and require repeating at frequent intervals. Space treatment should be done during the cool hours of the night or early morning and when wind velocity is less than five miles an hour.

Residual treatment applied as mists or sprays to resting sites of adult mosquitoes give longer-lasting control than space treatments, notes Barton. These should be applied to vegetation, eaves of roofs, under porches, and similar shade areas where adult mosquitoes rest by day.

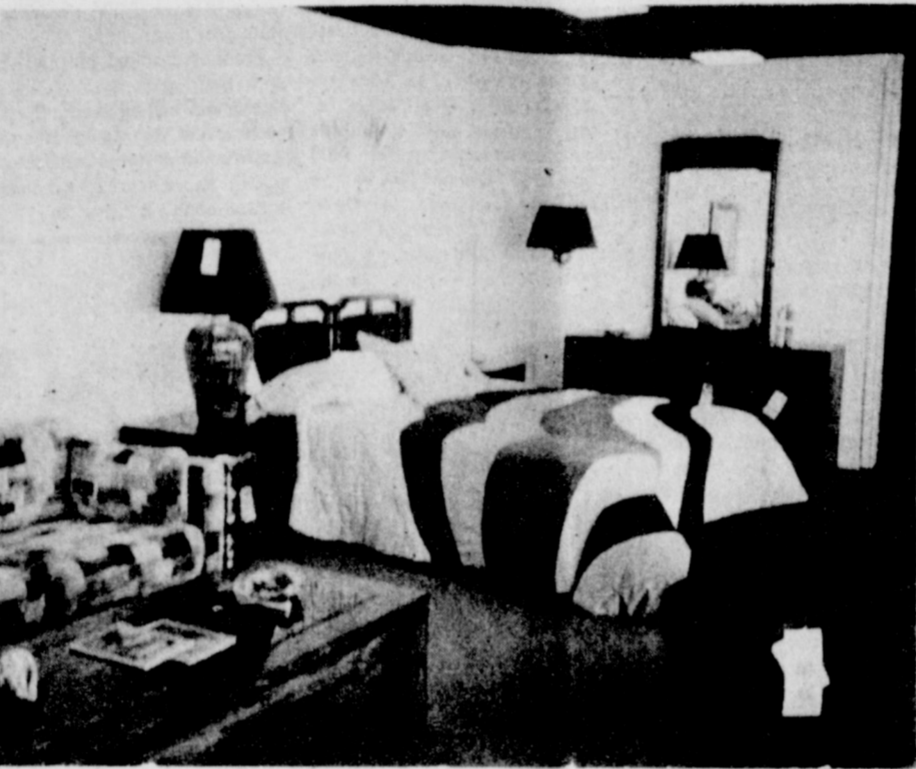
Hot, dry summer weather should dry out these temporary pools of water and give people some eventual relief from these biting mosquitoes, adds Barton.

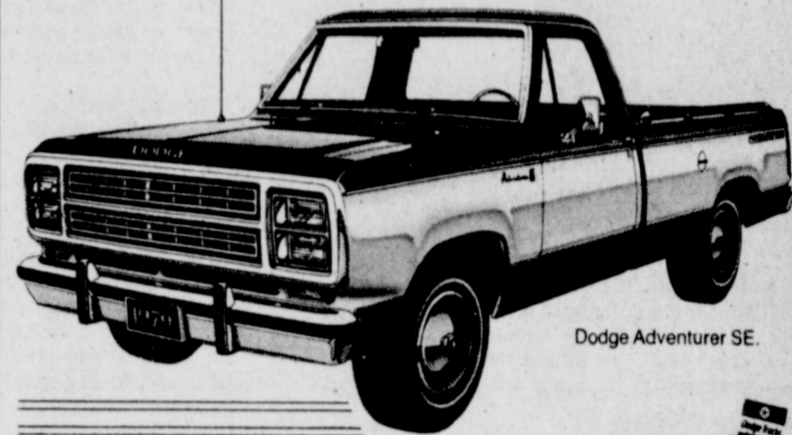

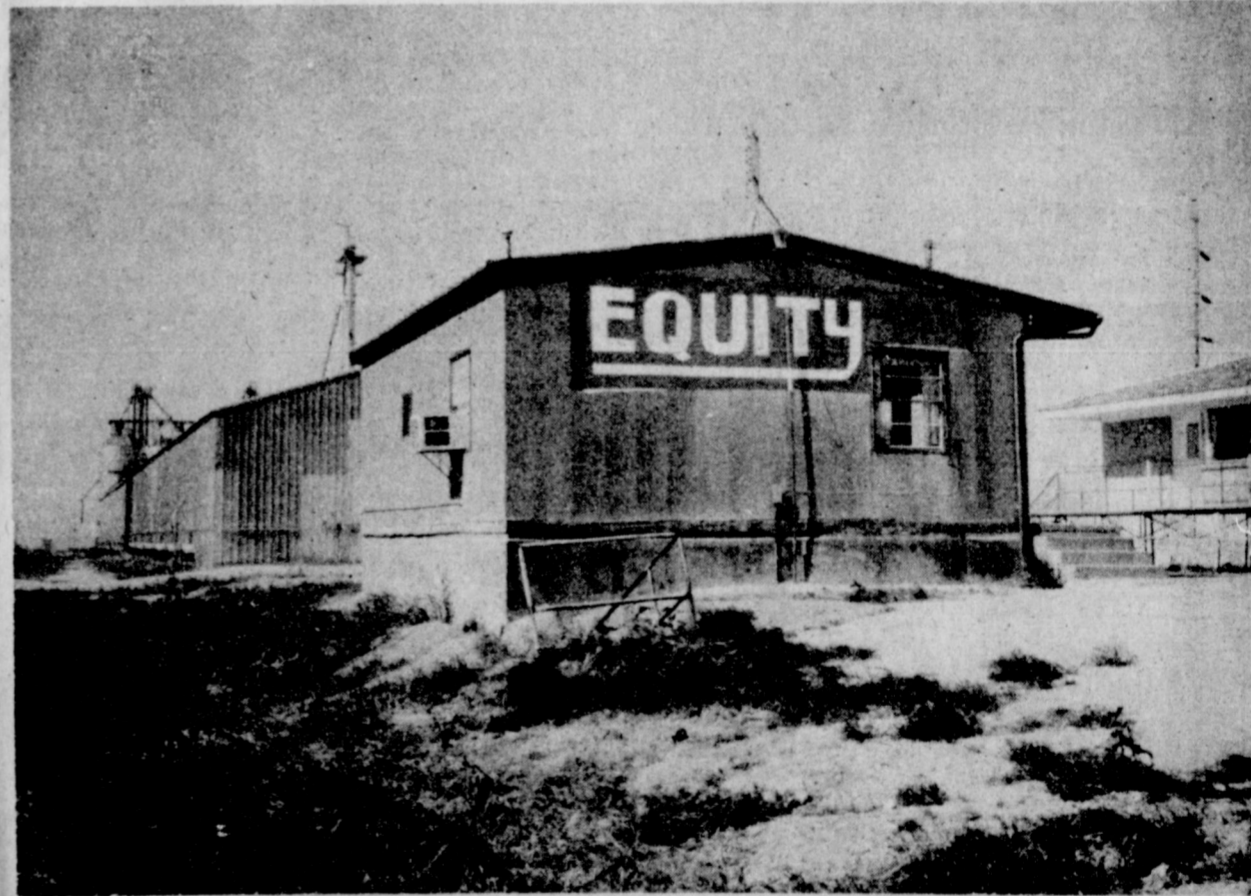

North Plains expansion under way

Faced with a critical shortage of space, North Plains Electric Cooperative has recently begun an estimated \$500,000 expansion project that will double the size of their building.

Construction began about three weeks ago with the digging out of a new basement. Bids on the project, which is expected to be completed by May or June of next year, were let in late March and the contract was awarded to Golf Construction Company of Amarillo. The same firm did the expansion on the Perryton Equity building.

Architects are Rittenberry and Kenyon from Amarillo. The expansion will be located adjoining the existing structure on the north side. The exterior will be the same brick that the present building has. That facility was built in 1961 and has about 4,350 sq. ft. of office space.

The addition will house the manager's office as well as offices for the member service officer and the engineering and drafting department. A special feature will be a new member community room with an enclosed patio running off of it. The com-

munity room is 26 ft. by 36 ft. while the patio is 16 by 22.

There also will be a lineman's room where the workers can shower and clean up and lockers are to be provided for personal gear.

In total, the expansion will have about 4,951 sq. ft. of space. The basement will add another 2,641 sq. ft. and will be used for storage of records.

Also in the plans are the remodeling of part of the existing building. The board room, which up until now has served multiple purposes, will be redone and the

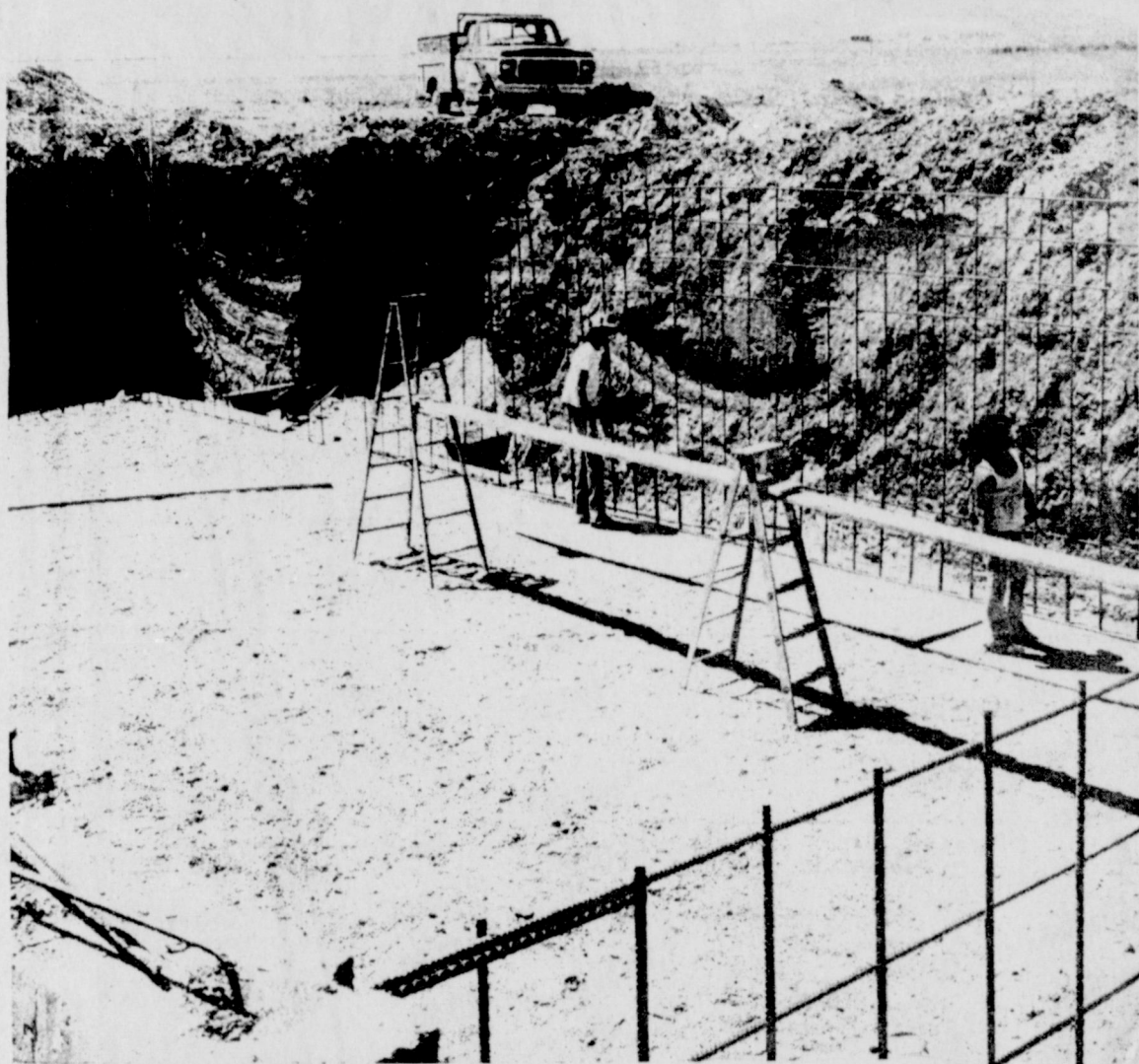
kitchen facilities taken out. The room will be a bit smaller when the job is complete and there will be a hallway at one end which will provide entrance and exit into and from the new building.

Elimination of the kitchen facilities in the board room was decided upon as the new community room will house all the kitchen appliances. The patio, which will be cut-off from the wind, also will have an outside grill which should make for great bar-b-ques.

The existing yard will have some development work done to allow for better drainage and there will be surfacing work done. A new hard-surfaced parking area will be added to the north side of the expansion. Employees' cars and equipment will take over the new hot while the lot on the south will be used for customer parking.

North Plains also announced that an additional 2.2 acres of land which joins the cooperative's property has recently been purchased. This will eventually be used for storing poles, transformers and other outside hardware.

North Plains Electric Cooperative serves about 4,000 customers in a seven-county area. The REA approved of the expansion plans and contract in May.

The planned North Plains Electric Cooperative's expansion project is well underway as workers lay forms for the walls of the basement. The project

will double the size of the facility and will cost more than \$500,000. Completion date is expected in May or June of 1980.

How To Save Energy

If Congress had the courage to enact the necessary legislation, a significant percentage of the energy consumed in the United States could be almost immediately conserved.

As a result, when the next oil cutoff comes, we are likely to witness an undisciplined panic--by an undisciplined citizenry, most of whom are today too young to remember either World War II or the depression, the last two major crises to threaten America.

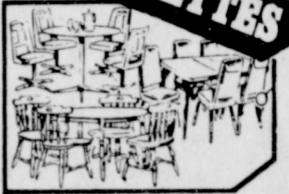
