Sheriff McFarlin Reports Arrests

Sheriff McFarlin informed the paper that two men have been arrested in Lawton, Oklahoma, concerning saddles belonging to Red Hamilton, a local

farmer, alleged to have been stolen in 1978.

The two men, being held in custody in Lawton, are Norman Poole and Calvin Battiste.

They are refusing to sign extradition papers to be returned to Hansford County.

The District Attorney's Office will start extradition proceedings. The Governor or Texas will send a governor's warrant to the Governor of Oklahoma who will extradite the men if he

sees fit.

Also arrested in connection with the saddle theft was Louis Leblanc in Center, Colo. He was returned to Hansford County and tried in 84th District Court and was given 4 years probated sentence, \$500 fine, and ordered to make full restitution.

Commissioners Discuss Various Issues

The Commissioners Court of Hansford County held their regular meeting June 11 in the Courthouse.

Minutes of the last meeting were read. The treasurer's report for the month was received and bills were approved.

A representative of the Texas Dept. of Human Resources met with the commissioners concerning a Child Welfare Board. The commissioners will study the recommendation to determine whether a Child Welfare Board is needed in Hansford County.

They passed an order authorizing Judge Roy L. McClellan to contract with the State Highway Department to inspect bridges. It is possible that the county can receive funds to improve the North Palo Duro bridge under this program.

They approved the deputization of Kay Johnson for the District and County Clerk's office.

They passed an order to publish a notice of Proposed Hearing of the Revenue

Sharing Fund, which is to be held June 25, 1979.

Commissioners discussed the H.B. 1060 Tax Relief Amendment and voted to waive implementation of agricultural use value for farmland at this time because the present tax valuation is lower than the ag use value would be. The ag use value will be mandatory for next year with landowners being able to choose whether or not they wish to have their land valued under present structure or the ag use value.

The county attorney position presently filled by J.E. Blackburn, who has been appointed District Judge by Gov. Clements, was discussed but no action was taken pending the official resignation of Blackburn. The county still has an attorney and action will be taken at a later date on this appointment.

The next regular meeting of the commissioners court will be June 25, 1979 at 10 a.m. in the courthouse.

Soviets Indicate Continuing Large Purchases of U.S. Grain

WASHINGTON, June 6--The U.S. Department of Agriculture today reported that, during regular consultations in Moscow May 31, officials of the Soviet Union indicated that relatively large purchases of U.S. grain would be continuing. These consultations continued a series held semi-annually pursuant to the U.S.-USSR Grain Agreement.

It was confirmed during the talks that purchases of U.S. wheat and corn for delivery in the year which it began last Oct. 1 had reached a total of approximately 10 million tons, and that

additional purchases for current year shipment will likely be made in coming months. This is the third year of the 5-year agreement.

The U.S. delegation was headed by Under Secretary of Agriculture Dale Hathaway, while the Soviet delegation was

headed by Boris Gordeev, Deputy Minister of Foreign Trade.

Despite a record Soviet grain crop in 1978, it had until recently been anticipated that USSR imports of U.S. grain in the current year would total approximately 10 to 11 million tons, thus significantly exceed-

ing the minimum 6 million tons specified in the Agreement. Now, however, as a result of recent Soviet purchasing and the May 31 discussions, the expectation is for a somewhat higher level of shipments, possibly 13 to 15 million tons. Shipments of U.S. wheat are not expected to greatly exceed 3 million tons. Thus, corn shipments should exceed 10 million tons.

Concerning prospects for the fourth year of the Agreement, it was noted that the general state of condition and progress for the coming season's Soviet grain crop appears less favorable than that of one year ago. It was also noted during the consultations that the current tentative forecasts of total U.S. grain exports for 1980 assume a continued relatively large volume of shipments to the USSR in the year ahead.

The next regular consultation under the Agreement was tentatively scheduled for early October in Washington.

Instruction for the clinic was provided by Billy and Joan Brown of Spearman. The Browns are well-known for raising, showing, and training horses. Both have conducted horsemanship clinics in the past. Billy is a former Texas A&M Livestock Judging Team Coach and Joan has been a Horse Program Aide for Texas A&M. Aiding the Browns was Johnnie Jarvis of Stinnett who gave instruction in barrel and pole pending.

Proceeds from the clinic are going toward the establishment of a Senior 4-H Club scholarship fund.

But that's only one of his many portrayals as screenom's most awesome bad guy. His other roles have included such box office hits as "Silver Streak" and "The Longest Yard," not to mention his prominent appearance in dozens of television shows.

In "They Went That-A-Way and That-A-Way," Kiel makes another "big" appearance as the King Con of a prison farm where Tim Conway and Chuck McCann have been sent on an undercover assignment. You might even say he contributes an "extra dimension" to the screwball antics and madcap comedy of the script written by star Tim Conway.

At the impressive height of 7'2" (by last reckoning), Kiel has always done things in a big way. Born in Detroit, Michigan, he came to California when he was still a child. After "growing up" in the Covina area, he tried his hand as an insurance salesman, a cemetery lot salesman, a bouncer, and then proved his ability to convince people by becoming the top Toyota car salesman in California.

For a change of pace, he decided to convince casting directors that he had what it takes to be an actor. At his first audition, everybody seemed to agree that he had "presence."

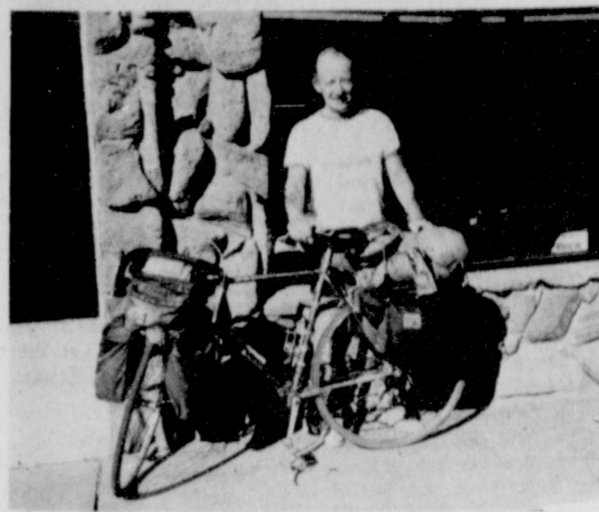

The orientation was from 9:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. and was geared towards informing youth about the labor market and assisting them in developing job-seeking and employment skills.

Mr. David Duncan, Texas Panhandle Community Action Corporation Vocational Counselor presented a session entitled "How to Get the Job Before You Shove It?" emphasizing the need for a positive self concept, resume development, job application procedure and job interview techniques.

A representative of Opportunity Plan, Inc. of Canyon addressed the group on the subject, "How Can I Not Afford to Do This?" This presentation informed the youth about grants, loans, scholarships and

work-study programs available to those who wish to continue their education or avail themselves of skill training after high school.

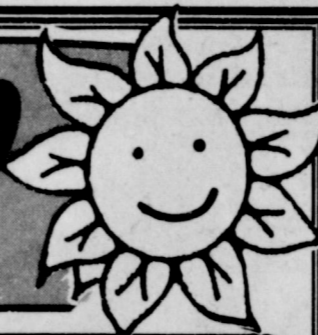

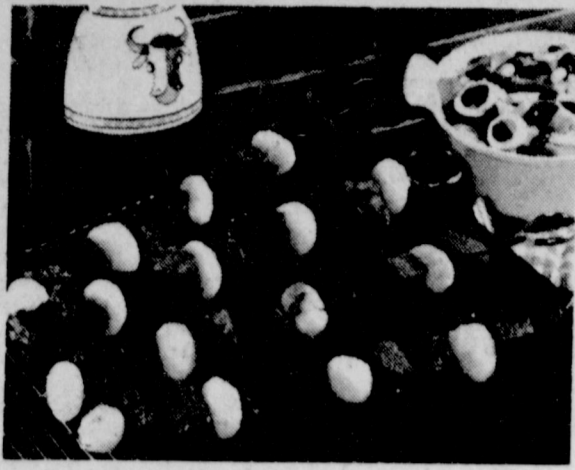

BEEF KABOBS SPICE OUTDOOR EATING

A cookout seems to make any meal taste even better, and the taste buds will really take notice when He-Man Beef Kabobs are the featured attraction. And since cookouts and dads go hand-in-hand, why not plan this year's Father's Day around a backyard barbecue? After all, kabobs are a pleasant and exciting variation from the usual barbecue fare, and they're so easy to prepare.

He-Man Beef Kabobs

- 2 pounds beef tip, cut in 1-inch cubes
- 1/2 cup salad oil
- 1/2 cup soy sauce
- 2 tablespoons vinegar
- 1 tablespoon minced onion
- 1/2 teaspoon ginger
- 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder
- 2 cans (16 ounces each) whole potatoes

Combine salad oil, soy sauce, vinegar, minced onion and garlic powder. Place beef cubes in bowl or plastic bag; pour marinade over meat, coating all sides thoroughly. Cover and refrigerate 8 hours or overnight. Remove beef cubes from marinade and thread on 4 skewers (12 to 14 inches in length) alternating 2 beef cubes and 1 potato. Brush with marinade. Place on grill over ash-colored coals so surface of meat is 3 to 4 inches from coals. Broil at moderate temperature 10 to 12 minutes; turn and brush with marinade. Broil 8 to 10 minutes or to desired degree of doneness. 4 to 6 servings.

DAD'S DAY STEAK

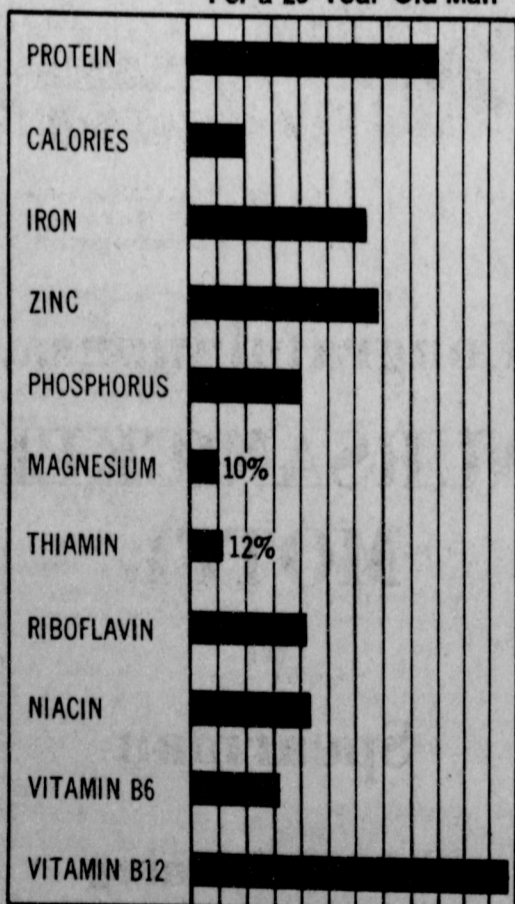
Father's Day is the one day each year we stop to honor the man who means so much to us. On this occasion, beef is just right. The good taste of beef, along with its versatility and good nutrition, make it an excellent entree. In fact, beef is the official Father's Day food, endorsed by the Father's Day Council. The following recipe is served to the national Fathers of the Year at the Father's Day banquet. Why not have your own Father's Day banquet at home and honor dad with Dad's Day Steak?

- 1 beef top round steak, cut 1 1/2 inches thick
- 1/2 cup sherry
- 1/2 cup soy sauce
- 1/4 cup salad oil
- 1/4 cup lemon juice
- 2 tablespoons brown sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon ginger
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 1/2 teaspoon hot sauce
- 4 teaspoon cornstarch
- 1/2 pound mushrooms, sliced
- 1/2 cup sliced green onions

Mix together sherry, soy sauce, oil, lemon juice, brown sugar, ginger, garlic and hot sauce in small saucepan. Cook slowly 10 minutes; cool. Place steak in plastic bag; add marinade and tie securely. Refrigerate 24 hours. Remove steak from marinade, reserving marinade, and place on grill over ash-covered coals or on rack in broiling pan so surface of meat is 4 to 5 inches from heat. Broil at moderate temperature to rare or medium (25 to 40 minutes, depending on doneness desired), brushing with marinade and turning occasionally. Carve in thin slices, diagonally across the grain. For sauce: stir remaining marinade into cornstarch in saucepan. Bring to boil; add mushrooms and green onions and cook slowly until thickened, 2 minutes. Serve sauce over sliced steak. 10 servings.

TEXAS DINNER CREPES

Gladys Geddes, Zavalla

- 2 lb. lean ground round
- 3 sliced onions
- 3 minced garlic cloves
- 1/2 lb. mushrooms, washed, dried and sliced
- 1/3 C. flour
- 1/2 C. burgundy or dry sherry
- 3 C. water
- 8 pieces hot red pepper
- 1/2 C. chopped green pepper
- 1/2 C. sweet red pepper
- 2 tsp. thyme
- 2 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. pepper, freshly ground
- 1/3 C. grated Parmesan, Romano or Swiss cheese
- 1/4 C. chopped parsley

As beef fries on low heat in a large pan, break it into small pieces. Do not brown. Add sliced onions and minced garlic and mushroom. Fry until onions are transparent, adding vegetable oil if necessary. Add flour and stir until blended thoroughly. Cook on low heat. Stir in wine and water, cooking slowly until thickened. Add more water if mixture becomes too thick. Add remaining ingredients and adjust for seasonings. Put 1/4 cup of beef mixture down the middle of each crepe and roll. Place on an attractive heat-proof serving dish. When all the crepes are filled, place the dish in the oven at warming temperature and keep hot until ready to serve. To serve, spoon extra beef mixture over the tops of crepes and garnish with parsley. Yield: 6 to 8 servings.

—Keep a spray bottle filled with water nearby to put out flare-ups if not using a grill with a cover.

City News

All members of the city commission were present at the regular meeting, held in Spearman Tuesday evening. The pledge and invocation was given and the minutes of the meeting of May reviewed, and Orvil Latham, from the local school tax offices, was on hand to discuss the new and changing tax laws with the alderman.

A board of equalization for the coming year was re-appointed, subject to their approval. The same group of men who served last year, were re-appointed.

A new member was appointed to the housing board, subject to his approval and acceptance.

The hospital had asked the city what steps to take in closing the South Evans Street, between 7th Ave and 8th Ave. City officials stated that the hospital owned all land surrounding the streets, and that it would be legal for them to close the street if they deemed it necessary in the future. This is apparently being considered because of the new nursing home facility to be voted on in the August bond election.

The city is still discussing their Gas problem with High Plains Natural Gas. They are on

top of the situation, and doing their best to solve the rising energy costs of to the public.

A new city secretary, Donna Thomas was appointed at the meeting Tuesday night.

A new contract for the removal of metal from the land fill will be drawn, with a Mr. Hope who met with the council Tuesday night.

In other discussions Tuesday night, Sgt. Kennard resigned from his position on the city force. A discussion on the lights at the tennis court was held, and it was learned that the South lights were not in operation but would be fixed in the near future. Also, the possibility of repairing the courts was discussed.

City manager Lewis Simpson stated that the street sweeper has been broken down, and that the sweeper is getting so old that the city must consider a new one. The past week, some business men on main street have contacted the paper wondering about sweeping the streets. It looks like; this problem will be resolved as soon as possible. Also, the alleys on main street were discussed. Commissioner Head has helped in grading the alleys and as soon as it is dry enough, he will probably take care of the alleys!

The story behind rising beef prices

Why are beef prices higher? For an answer, you have to take a look at the beef business and how it brings America's favorite meat from the range to your table.

In many ways, the beef industry is just like any other business. For example, the price you pay for beef is determined by the law of supply and demand. When supply is greater than demand, prices are low. When demand exceeds supply, the opposite is true.

But in other ways, the beef industry is quite different from other businesses. For one thing, beef production is biological. The mother cow, blissfully ignorant of such things as supply and demand, only produces one calf in nine months' time. That means there is nothing the beef industry can do to speed up production when supplies are low. With beef, Mother Nature sets the pace.

The Cattle Cycle

This pace has been broken up into what economists call the cattle cycle. Simply, the cattle cycle is a 10- to 12-year swing between high beef production and low beef production. This century, we have experienced seven cattle cycles and are starting the eighth.

The cattle cycle operates like this: High beef prices provide the incentive for cattlemen to produce more beef. So, they keep young female calves in their herds to be bred. This can't take place until the calves are at least a year old. Then it takes nine months before the young female's calf is born—and another 18 months before it is market-ready. Total time elapsed: 39 months.

It takes several years for the industry to accomplish this herd-building phase of the cattle cycle. As we've shown, the biology of the cow is an important factor. But another factor is the large number (about 1.8 million) of independent cattlemen in the country. With the average beef cow herd being under 200 head, there is no such thing as a unanimous decision-making process.

Despite the short routes and quick cures, there's no easy way to anything that's worth-while.

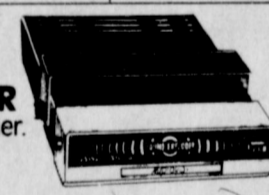

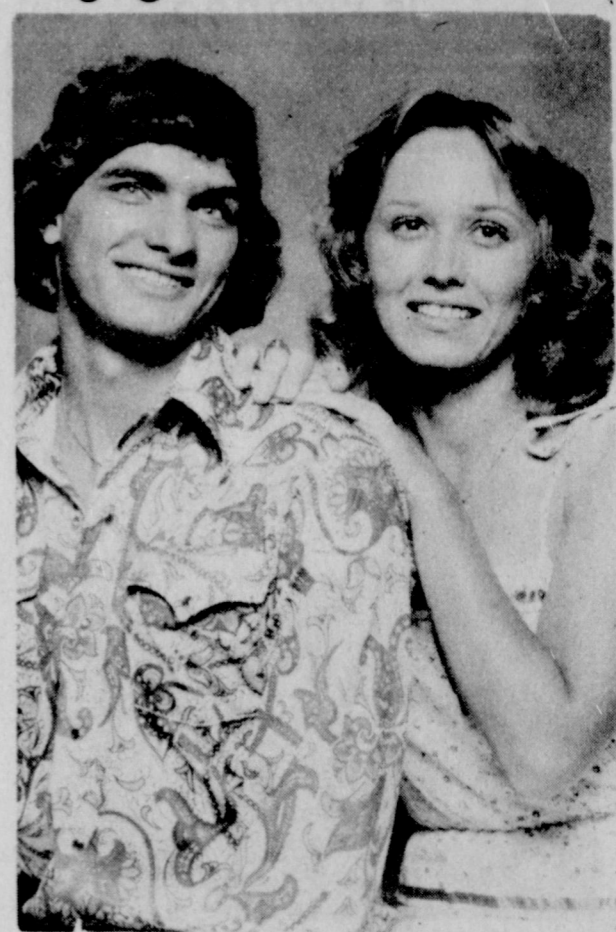

Peggy's Pointers

Less-than-new appliances may lack the glamor of a spanking new model--but sometimes the money saved can more than make up for a little less glamor.

In order to make the best used-appliance choice, follow these steps:

VISIT STORES

First, visit a few stores and look over new models. Learn what the current prices and up-to-date features are. Use this as a guide for judging the used equipment.

TRACK DOWN APPLIANCE

Next, start tracking down the particular appliance needed. A reputable new appliance dealer may take trade-ins and sell used equipment.

Some utility companies, both gas and electric, also act as dealers and sell appliances. A few companies even place equipment in local schools for educational use and, after just a couple of years, replace them and sell the "old" equipment.

Some dealers and utilities will deliver a used appliance, install it (sometimes an extra charge) and even stand behind it with a 30-, 60- or 90-day warranty.

BUYING DIRECT

Consumers who buy directly from the owners, through newspaper ads or community bulletins, are on their own.

But, often the price savings is worth the gamble. However, to make it less of a gamble, here are a few thoughts to keep in mind:

--Check the over-all appearance of the appliance--closely inspect the critical, hard-wear parts such as washer and dryer tops, interior linings of refrigerators, dishwasher insides and just about all of the kitchen range.

--Ask these questions: Did the owner by it new--or did it come with the house? What repairs have been made on it, and can you see the work sheets from the service shop? How much has the family used it?

The size of the family might offer a clue to amount of usage. For example, a 10-year-old washing machine doing the laundry for a family of eight probably isn't a good buy at any price.

--Also, ask why the appliance is being sold.

If it is still under warranty, find out whether the warranty will cover you as the new owner.

Ask the owner to demonstrate the appliance--not only will any strange noises reveal themselves, but also any unusual operating procedures developed by the previous owner can be explained.

--Finally, take down the model number or serial number and check with the local manufacturer's service department on the availability of parts and if the machine can be serviced locally.

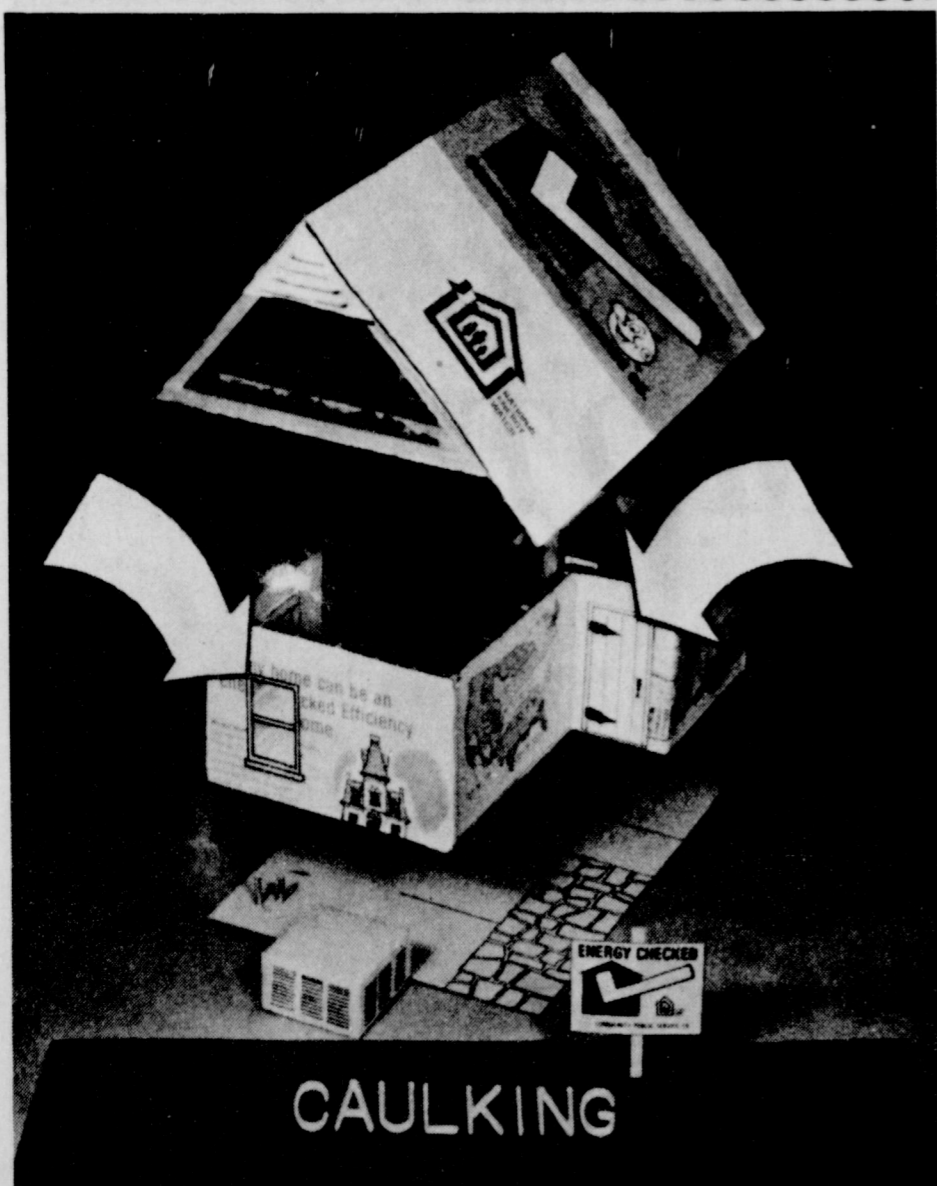
