Bills Could Rise 26 Per Cent

Gas Rate Increase Possible After Commission Hearing

A 51 per cent rate increase for natural gas requested by the local gas company has been delayed for at least 120 days, pending approval by the Texas Railroad Commission, said Spearman City Manager Lenis Simpson.

This would cost the consumer "about a 26 per cent increase if they (the gas company) get what they ask for," Simpson said.

The High Plains Natural Gas Company has been placed on the docket by the Texas Railroad Commission will approve all, part or none of the rate increase, Simpson said.

Simpson said it would be at least the middle of November before any rate hike could become effective even if approved by the commission because of the 120 day extension.

Simpson said he doesn't feel the Railroad Commission will allow the High Plains Natural Gas Company to raise the rates the full amount they are requesting and he "hopes there will be no rate increase at all."

High Plains has a contract with the City of Spearman where the city pays 54 cents for each thousand cubic feet (MCF) of natural gas used, with the city paying 100 per cent of any gas costing the gas company more than 54 cents up to 85 cents for each MCF, Simpson explained.

After the cost to the gas company reaches 85 cents, the city pays 90 per cent of the additional cost, he said.

The cost fluctuation is caused by contracts the gas company has with different companies from whom they buy their gas, Simpson said. The contracts with each company is for a different rate and it depends on where the gas used is bought how much it costs, he said.

High Plains is filing for \$1.27 per MCF plus 100 per cent for any additional costs to the gas company.

The Railroad Commission will allow a rate increase if the hearing scheduled for Sept. 5 shows that the High Plains Natural Gas Company is not making enough money for their investments, Simpson said.

He said the last rate hike requested by the gas company was denied by the commission Sept. 6, 1977. The company usually asks for a rate hike

annually, he said.

The Railroad Commission is the "Supreme Court of the utilities," Simpson said. The commission regulates the rates of the High Plains company because of the monopoly the company has on the gas utilities in the area.

Simpson said the city usually pays more than the 54 cent contract implies because the gas usually costs more than 54 cents. He said the city paid \$1.05 MCF last month and the

city charges "just enough to get by."

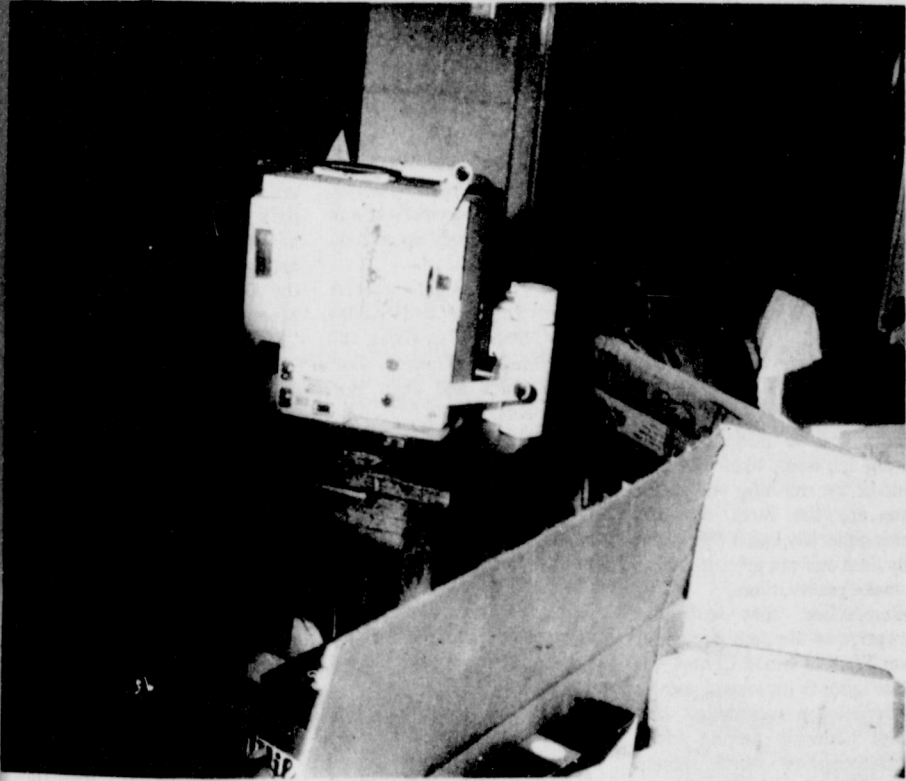
The City of Spearman and the City of Perryton will be the main cities fighting the rate increase Sept. 5 in Austin. Bob Wilson will represent both cities in the rate hike hassle, Simpson said.

He said although Spearman and Perryton will be the main cities fighting the rate increase, other towns will also be fighting the increase. The increase would affect a three-county area--Hansford, Ochiltree and

Lipscomb.

Simpson said that although Canadian consumers will be affected by the rate increase, the City will probably not be fighting the increase because the gas is sold directly from High Plains to the consumer, not through the city.

The gas company will not be able to raise any rates in the three-county area unless the Railroad Commission gives them permission to raise all the rates because the entire three-county area was filed for in the request, Simpson said.

The vehicle allegedly used in the burglary was reported by Bobby Archer as stolen July 16, Wisniewski said. The vehicle was a large station wagon.

the vehicle of Floyd Close in the Ideal grocery store parking lot was reported July 15. The shears have not been recovered.

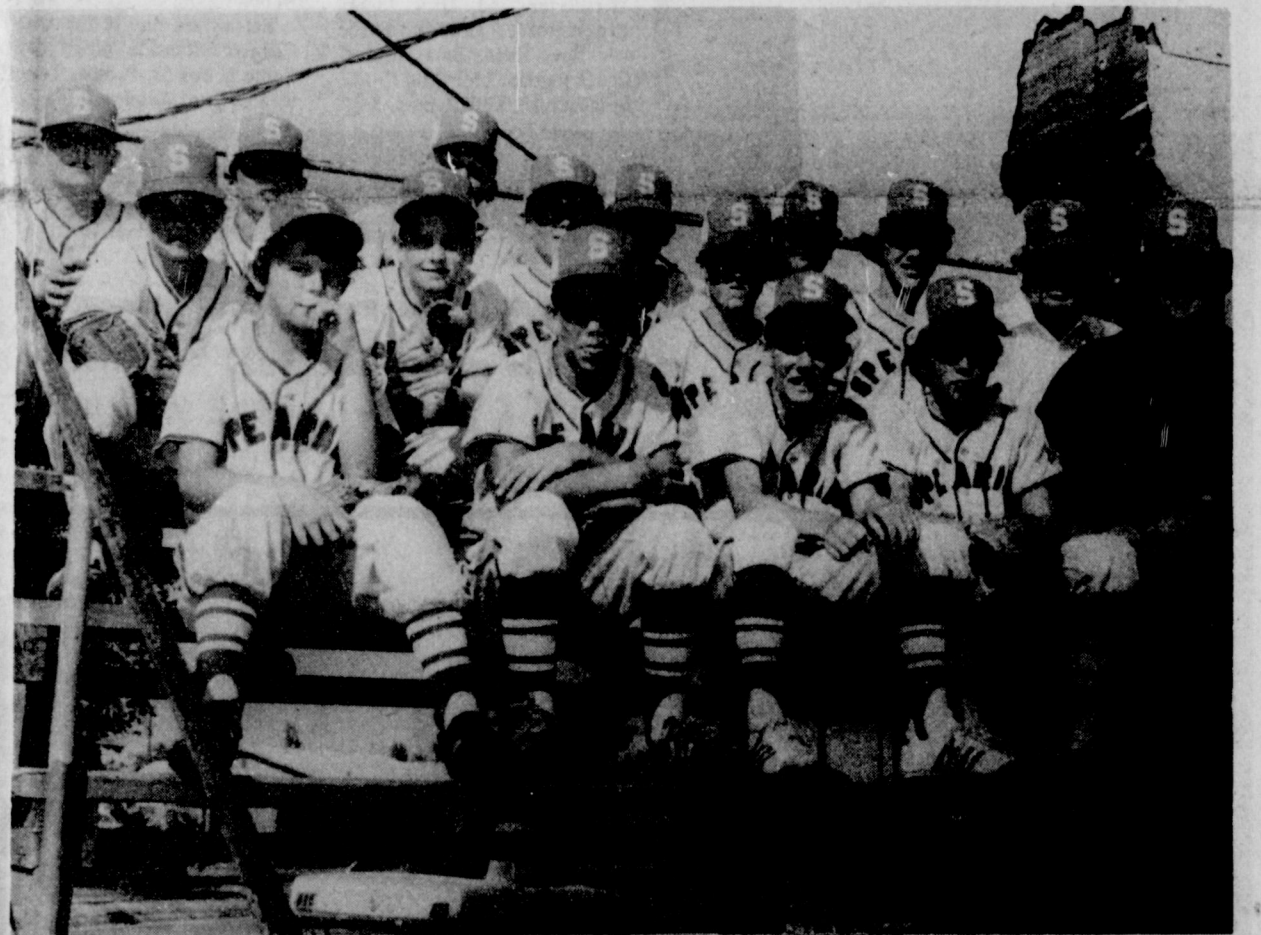

Red Cross Bloodmobile Here July 27

Circle July 27th for more than one reason but perhaps the most important is the scheduled Hansford County visit of the American Red Cross Bloodmobile which will be in Spearman at the Parish Hall of the Sacred Heart Catholic Church between the hours of 10:00 A.M. and 3:30 P.M.

This, along with the beginning of the Hansford County Round-Up Days, should indeed make this a "red letter day" for everyone in Hansford County.

The visit of the Red Cross Bloodmobile may perhaps be the most important of the year for there is discussion of returning to the once-a-year-plan of blood donating for Hansford County in order to encourage everyone to help meet the quota set.

"It's summer time 'tis true and many blood donors will be on vacation or devoting extra time to things agriculture," said Mrs. Preston Smith, Hansford County Blood Chairman, in announcing the upcoming Bloodmobile visit. "But the need for blood does not take vacations--and the need for blood to help or save the sick or injured of our communities and our state continues."

Mrs. Smith went on to say that past records indicate that there is a decline in the number of persons donating at the Bloodmobile visits during the summer. We can't allow that to happen here if we are to meet our goal of 120 units.

Who can donate blood? Any healthy individual between 17 and 65 who weighs at least 110 pounds. Minors in Texas (and Oklahoma) require signed permission of parent or guardian to donate blood at 17.

The entire process, including a delightful 15 minutes in the well-stocked (free) canteen area following a donation, usually takes less than an hour. A prospective donor moves along what is called the "Donor beltline" where pulse and body temperatures are checked and a short medical history is then taken as well as having blood pressure

and hemoglobin checked (all amounting to in the neighborhood of perhaps \$10.00 to \$15.00 if you pay a visit to your own physician so you really are making money while giving! After these simple tests are made and the prospective donor is okayed, the unit of blood is drawn by a nurse, a procedure which takes less than 10 minutes and during which you can relax and let the rest of the world go by!

Following your life-saving donation, you are served light refreshments in the canteen area and then may resume normal activities. The Red Cross Bloodmobile is coming to Hansford County once this time for this 1978 year. Residents may schedule appointments for the July 27th visit by contacting in Spearman Hazel Stumpf, 659-2109, or Susan Delk, 659-2917; and in Gruver, Mrs. W. L. Maupin, 733-2564, Mrs. Bob Crawford, 733-2740, or Mrs. Dave Arrington, 733-2983.

In the Gruver area members of the TOPS #643 are calling everyone to check for blood donors and to make reservations if one would like. The first hour in the morning and noon-time are the most crowded times generally and if this is the only time one can give, it is best to make reservations.

Remember, that with the exception of the paid personnel from Wichita Blood Center, all of the labor is for love of you by many of the volunteers who spend hours in setting these visits up; giving of time, money and effort in the way of foods and supplies; but mostly love of others. Do your share, if you can, give blood--next best is to give your time and efforts so that others may live.

"Join the 'rare birds,'" reiterated Mrs. Smith, "and note the Wichita Regional Red Cross Blood Program's recruitment theme. I challenge the residents of Hansford County to become summer blood donors--a really special and great flock of rare birds."

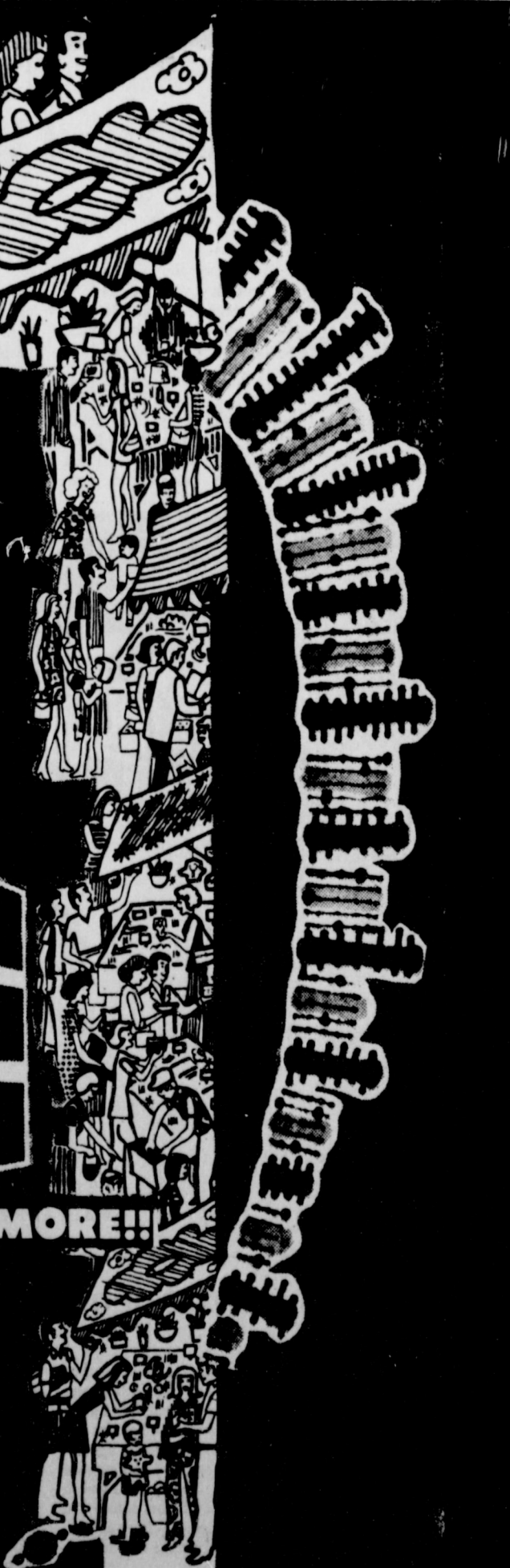

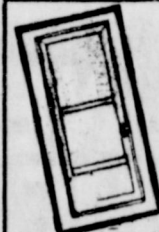

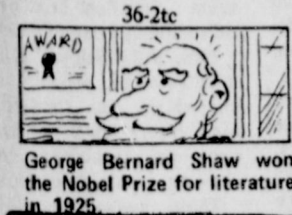

Proposal Would Reduce School Ad Valorem Taxes

Gov. Dolph Briscoe this week said he is very interested in a proposal which could effectively reduce property taxes levied by Texas school districts.

The proposal, as put forth by Reps. Jim Nugent of Kerrville and Lynn Nabers of Brownwood would dedicate one-fourth of the revenue from the state's general sales and use tax to reduce school ad valorem taxes throughout the state.

"The Legislature currently is meeting in a special session to consider legislation and proposed constitutional amendments which would return a portion of the current and projected state surplus to the people of Texas," Briscoe said. "I am extremely interested in any proposal which could result in a lowering of property taxes and particularly those levied by our Texas school districts."

Nugent and Nabers have expressed hope for a hearing early this week on their proposal.

Nugent and Nabers explained that to be eligible to receive additional state funds, under their proposal, a school district must reduce the ad valorem taxes it levies for maintenance and operation purposes by \$200 for each \$220 it will receive.

The maximum amount by which a school district would have to reduce its taxes would be 50 percent. The new state money, the two House members said, would be distributed to school districts on a per Average Daily Attendance (ADA) basis with the 1978 share being \$220 per ADA.

"The existence of the surplus in the state treasury and the projected surplus has to mean that the state is taking too much money from the pockets of Texas taxpayers. In our opinion it is time to return part of that money to the taxpayers and we think our approach is most equitable," Nugent and Nabers said.

Preliminary statistics show the proposal would have the following effect in Hansford County: Spearman Independent School District, a 17 per cent reduction in property tax and \$18,186 in new state funds.

New state funds means the amount of additional state money to be received by a school district in excess of the amount the district currently is raising through ad valorem taxes for maintenance and operation purposes.

For the Gruver Independent School District, it would mean a 10 per cent reduction in property tax and \$9,706 in new state funds.

How much food does a baby need? The amount of breast milk or formula and food a child requires depends

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Estate Planning Cruise Planned

AMARILLO-- People in the Golden Spread will have an opportunity this winter to combine education with pleasure, learning to set up a personal estate plan and at the same time cruising in the Caribbean on a trip sponsored by the Panhandle Economic Program.

FB Prexy Calls for Tax Relief

AUSTIN -- Texas Farm Bureau President Carrol Chaloupka said Tuesday, July 11, the Legislature should act now to give relief to all taxpayers of Texas.

"The tax revolt that manifested itself in California is running strong in Texas," Chaloupka said. "It is an idea whose time has come."

The state farm leader said inflated land values and lagging farm prices have been plaguing agriculture for many years.

"Farmers and ranchers have special problems with agricultural land taxes which are based on speculative sales value rather than what the land will produce," he explained.

"We're asking that the Legislature not resort to delaying tactics to kill this opportunity for lowering taxes," the Dalhart

cattle and grain producer said. "Legislators can assist farmers and ranchers in their struggle with drought, low prices and higher production costs by giving relief on taxes now!"

Chaloupka and the other two officers of the TFB, Vice President Reed Lang of Rio Hondo and Secretary-Treasurer S.M. True Jr. of Plainview, are meeting this week with leaders of the Texas Legislature.

The president of the 214,000-member state farm organization said county Farm Bureau legislative committees will begin converging on Austin next week. They will contact their legislators and explain Farm Bureau's position on the various tax-relief proposals in Gov. Dolph Briscoe's special-session call, Chaloupka said.

'CASEY'S SHADOW' WAS A FAMILY AFFAIR



CS-42 Walter Matthau is a veteran Cajun quarter-horse trainer, who dreams of winning the world's richest race, and Andrew A Rubin is the oldest of his three horse-loving sons in "Casey's Shadow." The Columbia Pictures release from Rastar, opens July 19 at the Lyric Theatre.

During a recent running of the All American Futurity at the Ruidoso Downs racetrack in New Mexico's pine forest, the onlookers included screenwriter Carol Sobieski. Her mission: to soak up the color and excitement of the world's richest horse race and write it as an adventure screenplay.

The result is "Casey's Shadow," which opens July 19 at the Lyric Theatre.

The Columbia Pictures release stars Walter Matthau as colorful Cajun horse trainer Lloyd Bourdelle, who tries to overcome a lifetime of hard luck by winning the Futurity and its million-dollar purse.

Bourdelle's dream — and the family that helps him chase it — may have a familiar ring to some of the annual regulars along the Ruidoso Downs backstretch. Recalling her two-week stint at the track, screenwriter Sobieski explains why:

"The families are almost like circus families — everybody, including the children, works in a different capacity. The members of the family are very proud of each other and very closely knit."

"What was fascinating was how many youngsters are used in professional capacities. At the age of 13, you can get a license as a groom. At 16, you can ride as an exercise boy or a jockey, depending on your ability."

Among the many people involved with quarter-horse racing with whom she met and talked was a particularly intriguing Cajun family from Louisiana.

"The father was a trainer with one horse and his entire family was with him — his eldest son was a jockey, and the youngest boy simply loved horses and did everything he could to help out."

As Carol began working on the script, she focused her attention on a Cajun family not unlike the one she'd met. "From the beginning," she recalled, "I felt a deep affection for that

Cajun family. And a commitment to tell a tale they themselves would enjoy." "Casey's Shadow," a Columbia Pictures release, is a Ray Stark-Martin Ritt Production from Rastar. 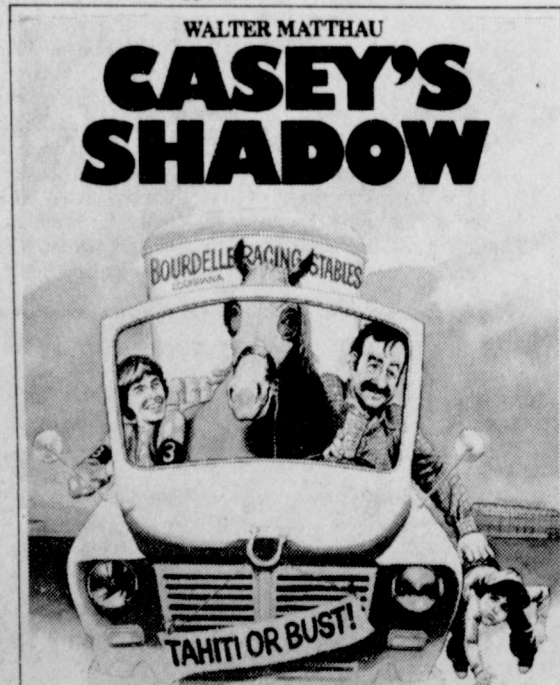
She gave birth to a new 3.3 oz. baby boy named Thane Robert Hergert. The boy was born Sunday and mother and baby are doing fine.

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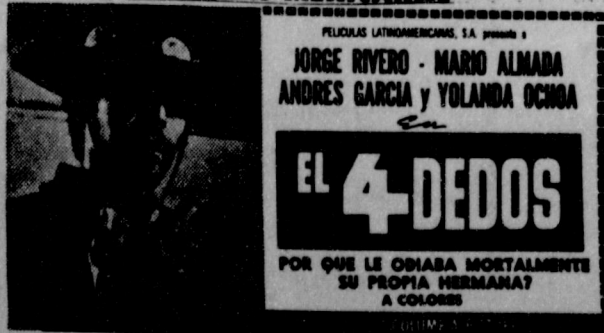

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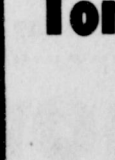
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
