D. O. Reynolds passed away Sunday afternoon after a lingering illness of a heart disease, at the Hansford County Hospital. Mrs. Reynolds, a farmer, lived about two miles west of town. For years he operated a large dairy which he had to give up because of the difficulty of finding enough help during the war years. He was 69 years of age at the time of his death and had been a resident of the area for 29 years. The funeral service was conducted Wednesday, August 24th, in the First Christian Church at 2:30 p. m. Rev. C. N. Van Dyke, pastor, conducted the funeral service. Among the survivors are the wife, Mattie, four sons, Orlando Borger; Leslie of Canyon; and Cecil and Gene Ray of Spearman; three daughters, Mrs. Mathline Turner of Waka; Mrs. Evelyn Wallace of Perryton and Dallasense of Spearman. There are ten grandchildren; three sisters, Mrs. Alpha Richardson of Fresno, California; Mrs. Laura Rodebaugh of Detroit, Michigan and Mrs. Maude Winters of Dodge City, Kansas; and four brothers, Otis of Perryton; Jay of Fresno, California, Lewis of Escondido, California and Marion of Austin, Texas. The funeral was under the direction of Boxwells at Spearman and the burial was in the Hansford Cemetery.



## Mrs. Pearl Reed Goes To California

Mrs. Pearl Reed who has been our librarian for the past 14 1/2 years will leave August 28 for California where she will take residence with her son, Chaplain Aln Reed, and his two children. Mrs. Reed became librarian in 1941 when the sum total library books, good, bad and indifferent was 300. The little library, in the City Hall seemed big enough then. Besides the 300 books there was one tier of shelves, a desk, a chair and Mrs. Reed. No one told her what to do first or how to do it. But she immediately went to work on the obvious mending books. The book allowance was only \$10.00 a month and no one but Mrs. Reed could have bought 4 or 5 good books with so little. Mrs. Reed loving children first and last, included at least two books for them with every order. Being a thrifty person, she soon learned how to buy bargains and take advantage of tricks in book buying. When everything else began to prosper the library did, too. New shelves had to be added and part of the City Hall lobby was walled up to make another library room. The book allowance kept increasing until now it is \$40 a month. A memorial shelf was started and Mrs. Reed reports more than 300 good books on it. She has seen the library reach over 5000 volumes. She says she has really had to buy more children's books than any other because they, absolutely, read them to pieces. Mrs. Reed has worked five hours a day and six days a week since she took over her library duties, with never more than two or three days off at a time and one of them was always Sunday. Once she took a two weeks short course at Canyon to learn the Dewey Decimal filing system. She says it didn't mean much to her personally because she had bought most of the books and put them on the shelves and she knew where all of them were. But she says it's a fine system, helping the librarian in many ways. It standardizes library files. A book correctly filed in Spearman would be found with the same key anywhere else. On learning Mrs. Reed was leaving a high school girl said, "Oh, no; let's throw the files away and keep you."

## Gruver School Faculty Short At Press Time

Following the custom of carrying a complete story relative to the personnel of the staff of schools in this county, we learned at the last minute that Superintendent Dooly and Principal Edkins are both out of town as we go to press, apparently seeking to fill last minute vacancies in the staff personnel for the Gruver schools. We will carry the detailed information in next weeks Reporter. Opening date for Gruver schools has been set for September 1st. All students in grades from the first grade through the 10th grade are notified to report at the regular school hours September 1st. All students in the elementary grades and Freshmen and Sophomores in High school will be enrolled Thursday Sept. 1st. On September 2nd students in elementary grades will pick up their schedules for regular work, and Juniors and Seniors in High school will be enrolled. Members of the first grade will be dismissed immediately after they are enrolled, but they must bring smallpox inoculation certificate and birth certificates. Monday, Sept. 5th, will be Labor Day, and this holiday will be observed at the Gruver schools. The regular school schedule will be resumed on September 6th. The school Cafeteria will be open on both opening days of school.

**Research Shows Broadcasting Fertilizer On Pastures**

College Station, July — Maintaining an improved perennial pasture capable of producing large quantities of quality forage is of real importance to livestock producers in the humid sections of Texas.

Research workers at the Angleton Experiment Station have found that tillage of any sort favored the growth of ragweeds and had no beneficial results on maintaining the pasture. The application of phosphate increased the percentage of white clover in the pasture mixture and nitrogen in addition increased the percentage of dalliagrass and decreased the clover. Potash had no effect on the plant composition of the

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seed, plenty of fertilizer and are leaving a thicker stand." These practices combined with current rainfall are encouraging many farmers to expect 50 to 60 bushels an acre or better. Ed Damuth of Pinehurst is aiming at 100 bushels an acre on a 10-acre plot heavily fertilized at planting time and watered by sprinklers when needed.

"Farmers growing corn have high hopes of making a bumper crop. Everybody agrees it is the best in recent years," is the word from Jasper County. About 90 per cent of the more than 10,000 acreage in the county is hybrid. "With a little more rain to finish it many farmers expect to harvest 75 bushels or more an acre."

"Over the county farmers say they have the best corn crop in their existence," is the optimistic report from Trinity County. Although late plantings are showing need of rain some corn already is made. "While some farmers expect to make around 100 bushels an acre the majority look to a yield of 50 or more."

Corn crop prospects in Polk County at the end of June were described as "the best for the past three years." Corn on soil "reasonably well fertilized" had three to seven shoots per stalk. Demonstrating the value of fertilizing, Edny Duke has corn on land following vetch which had 300 pounds of 10-20-10 an acre under it. Side dressing with 50 pounds an acre of anhydrous ammonia when knee high, he describes his crop as "the best corn I have had at this stage of development." Last year Duke grew 75 bushels an acre but this year he adopted the practice of a neighbor who used more fertilizer and produced 97 1/4 bushels.

Nacogdoches County seems assured of a "good corn crop this year." "In most cases moisture has come at the right time to make corn. It appears now that 50 bushels an acre will not be uncommon and there are good prospects for some 100 bushel corn," the county agent reports.

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Where tillage was not involved there was no difference in yields due to fertilizer placement. Disking or rotary tilling or placing the fertilizer below the surface gave lower yields and disturbed the root systems which were found to be very extensive in the top two or three inches of soil. The use of phosphate and nitrogen gave the best yields in the three-year tests.

Radioactive phosphorus was used to measure the uptake of phosphorus by both dalliagrass and white clover. Here again broadcast phosphate was utilized more efficiently than was phosphate placed in bands two inches below the surface and seven inches apart.

These and many other findings are carried in Bulletin 805, Effect of Fertilizer Placement on Perennial Pastures, recently released by The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. Copies are available from the Agricultural Information Office, College Station, Texas.

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**Farm And Home Management Increase In Import.**

College Station, August—Good farm and home management are known for their ability to "stay ahead of the pack." In predicting the future, John G. McHaney, extension economist, says that changes place real profit premiums on outstanding family management.

World and national forces are today shaping the prices of tomorrow, next year and the next decade, and government programs are being planned to meet or lower prices, explains the specialist. "Knowledge and understanding of how these forces work and their ultimate effect upon agricultural production and prices are basic for making management plans."

Right now with the price-cost squeeze continuing to tighten on the farmer, management and more efficient production offer some relief. Prices paid for farm products continue to decline—about 5 percent lower than a year ago—prices of production items needed by the farmer have declined only one percent. The income for consumers are now about four percent above those of last summer and food store sales are six percent higher.

During the past year competition in the consumer market has become extremely keen, says the economist. Credit has been used by many retailers to promote sales with the result that credit outstanding has increased more rapidly than income and is near peak levels.

Under present conditions it will pay to shop around for consumer goods, says McHaney. Money saved in this manner amounts to an increase in the family income and is good management. But, he warns, it is also good management not to over extend credit nor to purchase items not particularly needed just because they can be obtained at bargain prices. All must be paid for sooner or later.

**Trace Mineral Defic.**

College Station, July—Attention of farmers has been drawn in recent months to the possible deficiency of "trace minerals" in crop growing soils of Texas.

M. K. Thornton, Extension agricultural chemist, says that apparent deficiency symptoms appearing on growing plants suggests rather than most of them are suffering from poor drainage, nematodes or other soil-borne troubles such as compacted layers, absence of organic matter and lack of major nutrients—nitrogen, phosphorus and potash.

"In practically every case of this type," Thornton explains, "deficiency symptoms disappear after the physical trouble had been corrected and plants fed adequate supplies of nutrients."

This is not to say, the chemist adds, that there are no trace element deficiencies in Texas soils, but rather to emphasize that before dosing the soil with various chemicals operators should understand clearly the purpose of the treatment. Some trace minerals are toxic and too hazardous to play around with.

There is more evidence of iron deficiency in Texas than of other trace minerals. Iron is necessary to give plants a dark green color. Iron shortage is responsible for the chlorosis seen in plants in many areas, but the use of large amounts of organic matter in the soil usually will enable plants to pick up the iron needed.

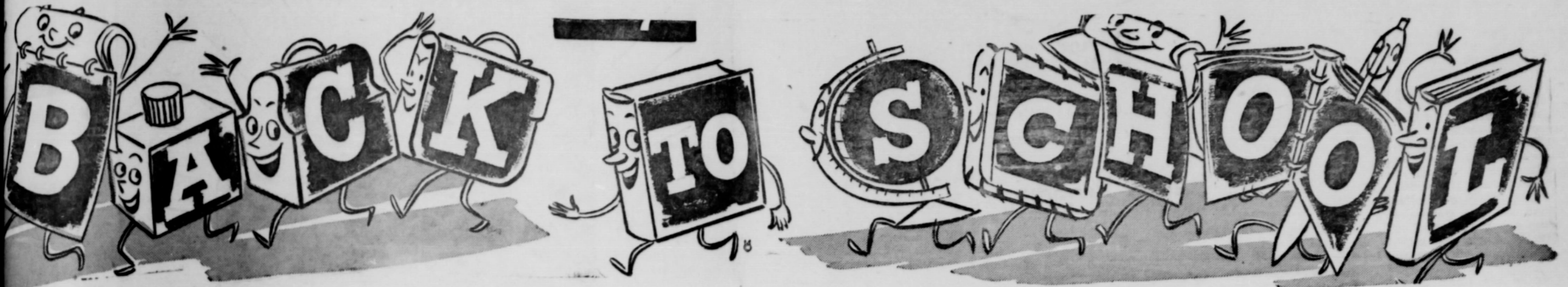

## Farm Gas Plan Massmeeting Set On Friday

Time and place for the High Plains Gas-for-Irrigation association's massmeeting were changed Thursday afternoon at a meeting of the promotion committee with President H. C. Hitch, Jr.

The meeting was rescheduled for next Friday and the place was designated the auditorium of the Panhandle A. and M. College, Goodwell. Originally the meeting had been set for Wednesday.

A high attendance from Oklahoma Panhandle Empire, Texas, Kansas, New Mexico and Colorado is expected.

### Out line Court Fight

The principal business of the massmeeting, Hitch stated, will be to map out court procedure to prove the constitutionality of the recently enacted gas-for-irrigation measure with insures irrigation farmers natural gas for fuel.

Other states are vitally interested in this procedure since similar legislation has been proposed in Texas and Kansas and likely will be in Colorado and New Mexico. Should Oklahoma's law stand the test of court action, it would be most helpful in securing the legislation in other states, Hitch pointed out.

Robert Cole of the Chamber of Commerce was to attend a gas-for-irrigation committee meeting at Dumas, Texas, Friday afternoon.

After a telephone conversation with civic officials there Thursday Cole reported to the High Plains association promotion committee that the folk in Texas are sure hepped up over this situation and are ready to fight to the end to get court approval of the Oklahoma bill." He said a large delegation from Texas would attend the Goodwell massmeeting.

### Prepare Letter

Cole was preparing a letter to go out to all land holders with irrigation well or water permits in the Oklahoma Panhandle Empire, Texas Panhandle and Sew-Morton and Stevens counties, Kansas.

There are 291 such permits covering more than 75,000 acres in Texas county alone, while Cimarron county shows another 150 and Beaver county about 75.

Texas Panhandle counties adjoining Oklahoma and north of a line one hundred miles southward have about the same ratio per square mile as does Texas county.

## Mrs. Pearl Reed Goes To California

Mrs. Pearl Reed who has been our librarian for the past 14 1/2 years will leave August 28 for California where she will take residence with her son, Chaplain Al Reed, and his two children.

Mrs. Reed became librarian in 1941 when the sum total library books, good, bad and indifferent was 300. The little library, in the City Hall seemed big enough then. Besides the 300 books there was one tier of shelves, a desk, a chair and Mrs. Reed.

No one told her what to do first or how to do it. But she immediately went to work on the obvious mending books.

The book allowance was only \$10.00 a month and no one but Mrs. Reed could have bought 4 or 5 good books with so little.

Mrs. Reed loving children first and last, included at least two books for them with every order. Being a thrifty person, she soon learned how to buy bargains and take advantage of tricks in book buying.

When everything else began to prosper the library did, too. New shelves had to be added and part of the City Hall lobby was walled up to make another library room.

The book allowance kept increasing until now it is \$40 a month.

A memorial shelf was started and Mrs. Reed reports more than 300 good books on it.

She has seen the library reach over 5000 volumes. She says she has really had to buy more children's books than any other because they, absolutely, read them to pieces.

Mrs. Reed has worked five hours a day and six days a week since she took over her library duties, with never more than two or three days off at a time and one of them was always Sunday. Once she took a two weeks sabbatical course at Canyon to learn the Dewey Decimal filing system. She says it didn't mean much to her personally because she had bought most of the books and put them on the shelves and she knew where all of them were. She also knew who had checked out what.

But she says it's a fine system, helping the librarian in many ways. It standardizes library files. A book correctly filed in Spearman would be found with the same key anywhere else.

On learning Mrs. Reed was leaving a high school girl said, "Oh, no; let's throw the files away and keep you". All who know Mrs. Reed will attest to her ability as excellent librarian. But a seven year old lad thought she went much further with her work. She was typing up file cards when he came in. He looked at her and said, "I bet it took you a long time to write all them books".

The Reed family came to Spearman in 1923 when water was hauled from nearby farms and no one knew when the town would get electricity.

Mr. Reed operated the town's largest cafe. Just the same he had to haul water for it. He put in gas lights.

Mrs. Reed, always an avid reader, often read a book a day and then read another one that night just to have something to do.

The Reed children, six boys and two girls grew up in Spearman attended the schools then went on to other institutions of higher learning.

Edwin, Harold and Larry took their basic in printing at the Spearman Reporter. Edwin was a big boy, 12 or so when started in as printer's devil. But he

Something is going to have to give because the library is about to run over. Another new 2 foot tier of shelves are going in raising the already ladder in high shelves higher. But there is no other way for expansion except up and they won't be too long reaching the ceiling at the rate books are increasing.

The Lions Club gave all of their fine money to the library and it amounts up in a years time.

More people are giving memorial books all the time. Often several go together get special and expensive books. Many individual give books from time to time.

That is the way Mrs. Reed likes to see it. She says not too many realize how many check out books.

She really has a good children's business; it is heavy in summer but heavier during the school term. Everyday 60-75 children check out books. Saturday bring more calls from them.

Mrs. Reed is sure there will be a great many things about California that she will like. She knows she will enjoy being with her son and his family. She also knows when they will not especially need her any longer she will have her home and she hopes a new library to return to.

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## Farm Gas Plan Massmeeting Set On Friday

Time and place for the High Plains Gas-for-irrigation association's massmeeting were changed Thursday afternoon at a meeting of the promotion committee with President H. C. Hitch, Jr.

The meeting was rescheduled for next Friday and the place was designated the auditorium of the Panhandle A. and M. College, Goodwell. Originally the meeting had been set for Wednesday.

A high attendance from Oklahoma Panhandle Empire, Texas, Kansas, New Mexico and Colorado is expected.

### Out line Court Fight

The principal business of the massmeeting, Hitch stated, will be to map out court procedure to prove the constitutionality of the recently enacted gas-for-irrigation measure with insures irrigation farmers natural gas for fuel.

Other states are vitally interested in this procedure since similar legislation has been proposed in Texas and Kansas and likely will be in Colorado and New Mexico. Should Oklahoma's law stand the test of court action, it would be most helpful in securing the legislation in other states, Hitch pointed out.

Robert Cole of the Chamber of Commerce was to attend a gas-for-irrigation committee meeting at Dumas, Texas, Friday afternoon.

After a telephone conversation with civic officials there Thursday Cole reported to the High Plains association promotion committee that the folk in Texas are sure hepped up over this situation and are ready to fight to the end to get court approval of the Oklahoma bill. He said a large delegation from Texas would attend the Goodwell massmeeting.

### Prepare Letter

Cole was preparing a letter to go out to all land holders with irrigation well or water permits in the Oklahoma Panhandle Empire, Texas Panhandle and Seaworth and Stevens counties, Kansas.

There are 291 such permits covering more than 75,000 acres in Texas county alone, while Cimarron county shows another 150 and Beaver county about 75.

Among other things, the British reply noted: "Knowing the true purpose of the Communist offer and peace motives which underly it, the government rejects it absolutely, and has no intention of negotiating with the Communist terrorists."

**Factors Successful in Defoliation.**

The evergreen machines in the defoliant process or failure, Fred C. Elliott, defoliation specialist, says that the rate and application of defoliant is of prime importance. The defoliant should be applied to the leaves and not the stems and preferably in the late afternoon or early evening when the temperature is in the 60s and 70s. Where tillage was not involved there was no difference in yields due to fertilizer placement. Disking or rotary tilling or placing the fertilizer below the surface gave lower yields and disturbed the root systems which were found to be very extensive in the top two or three inches of soil. The use of phosphate and nitrogen gave the best yields in the three-year tests.

Radioactive phosphorus was used to measure the uptake of phosphorus by both Dallisgrass and white clover. Here again broadcast phosphate was utilized more efficiently than was phosphate placed in bands two inches below the surface and seven inches apart.

These and many other findings are carried in Bulletin 805, Effect of Fertilizer Placement on Perennial Pastures, recently released by The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. Copies are available from the Agricultural Information Office, College Station, Texas.

**Research Shows Broadcasting Fertilizer on Pastures**

College Station, July — Maintaining an improved perennial pasture capable of producing large quantities of quality forage is of real importance to livestock producers in the humid sections of Texas.

Research workers at the Angleton Experiment Station have found that tillage of any sort favored the growth of ragweeds and had no beneficial results on maintaining the pasture. The application of phosphate increased the percentage of white clover in the pasture mixture and nitrogen in addition increased the percentage of Dallisgrass and decreased the clover. Potash had no effect on the plant composition of the

**Farm And Home Management Increase In Import.**

College Station, August—Good farm and home management are known for their ability to "stay ahead of the pack." In predicting the future, John G. McHaney, extension economist, says that changes place real profit premiums on outstanding family management.

World and national forces are today shaping the prices of tomorrow, next year and the next decade, and government programs are being placed in effect by the Federal Housing Administration for homes purchased with FHA insured mortgages.

Since April 23, 1953 the VA has had no mandatory down payment requirement, and the mortgage repayment period run as high as 30 years.

Today's action Sisson said was taken after a thorough study of National economic conditions, especially those prevailing in the residential construction and mortgage financing fields. The new requirements are expected to help protect prospective GI loan applicants against increased prices of homes, overextension of credit and financial risks further. They should tend to stabilize the mortgage market by eliminating the 30 year no down payment loan which currently is being trading at widening discount margins.

The new requirements are not retroactive. They are not applicable to purchases of homes for which VA has issued certificates of reasonable value prior to July 30, or in cases where requests for appraisals actually have been received in VA offices prior to July 30.

Also, the requirements will not apply to GI loans made solely for replacement or reconstruction of residential property that has been destroyed or substantially damaged by flood, fire, or other similar catastrophes nor to repair alternation or improvement loans.

**New Information On GI Home Loans**

Veterans purchasing homes with the aid of GI loans will be required to make a down payment of at least two percent, and the maximum time for repayment of loans will be set at 25 years, Robert W. Sisson, Manager, of the VA Regional office, Lubbock, Texas announced.

Similarly moderate credit requirements are being placed in effect by the Federal Housing Administration for homes purchased with FHA insured mortgages.

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**Trace Mineral Deficiency**

College Station, July—Attention of farmers has been drawn in recent months to the possible deficiency of "trace minerals" in crop growing soils of Texas.

M. K. Thornton, Extension agricultural chemist, says that apparent deficiency symptoms appearing on growing plants suggests rather that most of them are suffering from poor drainage, nematodes or other soil-borne troubles such as compacted layers, absence of organic matter and lack of major nutrients-nitrogen, phosphorus and potash.

"In practically every case of this type," Thornton explains, "deficiency symptoms disappeared after the physical trouble had been corrected and plants fed adequate supplies of nutrients.

include molybdenum, boron, zinc, iron, manganese, sulphur, calcium and magnesium.

This is not to say, the chemist adds, that there are no trace element deficiencies in Texas soils, but rather to emphasize that before dosing the soil with various chemicals operators should understand clearly the purpose of the treatment. Some trace minerals are toxic and too hazardous to play around with.

There is more evidence of iron deficiency in Texas than of other trace minerals. Iron is necessary to give plants a dark green color. Iron shortage seen in plants in many areas, but the use of large amounts of organic matter in the soil usually will enable plants to pick up the iron needed.

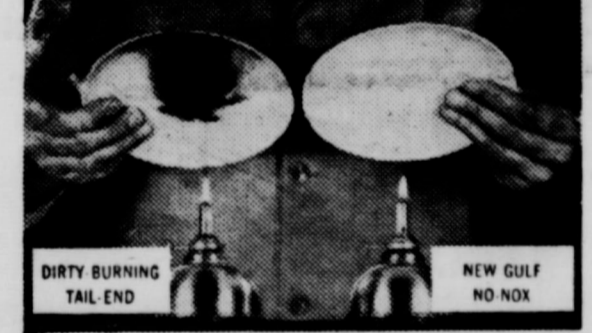

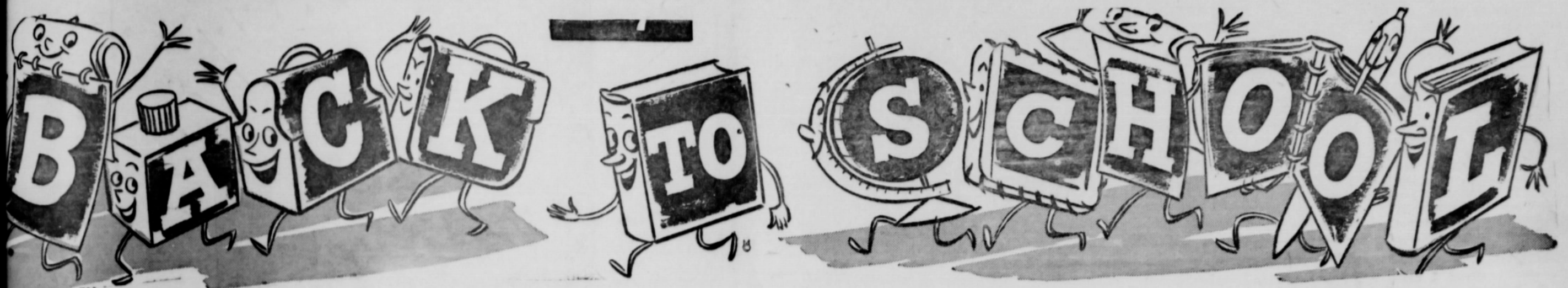

## Farm Gas Plan Massmeeting Set On Friday

Time and place for the High Plains Gas-for-Irrigation association's massmeeting were changed Thursday afternoon at a meeting of the promotion committee with President H. C. Hitch, Jr.

The meeting was rescheduled for Friday and the place was designated the auditorium of the Panhandle A. and M. College, Goodwell. Originally the meeting had been set for Wednesday.

A high attendance from Oklahoma Panhandle Empire, Texas, Kansas, New Mexico and Colorado is expected.

### Out line Court Fight

The principal business of the massmeeting, Hitch stated, will be to map out court procedure to prove the constitutionality of the recently enacted gas-for-irrigation measure with insures irrigation farmers natural gas for fuel.

Other states are vitally interested in this procedure since similar legislation has been proposed in Texas and Kansas and likely will be in Colorado and New Mexico. Should Oklahoma's law stand the test of court action, it would be most helpful in securing the legislation in other states, Hitch pointed out.

Robert Cole of the Chamber of Commerce was to attend a gas-for-irrigation committee meeting at Dumas, Texas, Friday afternoon.

After a telephone conversation with civic officials there Thursday Cole reported to the High Plains association promotion committee that the folk in Texas are sure hepped up over this situation and are ready to fight to the end to get court approval of the Oklahoma bill." He said a large delegation from Texas would attend the Goodwell massmeeting.

### Prepare Letter

Cole was preparing a letter to go out to all land holders with irrigation well or water permits in the Oklahoma Panhandle Empire, Texas Panhandle and Sevier, Morton and Stevens counties, Kansas.

There are 291 such permits covering more than 75,000 acres in Texas county alone, while Cimarron county shows another 150 and Beaver county about 75.

Texas Panhandle counties adjoining Oklahoma and north of a line one hundred miles southward have about the same ratio per square mile as does Texas county.

The promotion committee decided on a three-prong campaign in behalf of the massmeeting through the press, over the radio and through Chamber of Commerce in irrigation territory. The committee membership is David Long, Representative Fank Ogden, George Wagner, Robert Allen, Orville Nash, T. M. Raburn, Jr. and Raymond H. Fields, chairman.

Ogden and Senator Leon B. Fields of Texhoma will be asked to appear on the massmeeting program and tell off the long battle, and involvement, which they confronted in their legislative campaign for the gas-for-irrigation measure.

"This information will be of great value to the folks of other states who are planning similar legislation" said Hitch.
