Hansford Gas Completions Big Producer

It appears that this newspaper will have to await the official results of latest production records in gas and distillate, until they have been published in our large regional newspaper. Recently we published a story to the effect that the Ned Turner well, originally abandoned by a large Ma-

mor Oil organization and later drilled to the Morrow sand, was a good producer, and even hinted that the well might be rated at thirty million cubic feet.

We are printing below the story clipped from the Amarillo newspaper informing the world that the well is rated at eighty million feet, and 6 barrels of distillate per million feet of gas. Course all of us who are planning to hit Ned Turner for a loan, can learn that the well will not be turned loose at the maximum production. If Ned was drawing down his royalty on the basis of 80 million feet of gas sold and 640 barrels of distillate, he might be in a position to loan some of the less fortunate a bit of cash. So far as we know there are not any of the land owners gathering in any cash. The wells are tested and then closed in until a market for the gas is found.

Incidentally we might mention that the rumor current at this time rates the John Lyeon well as a fifty million cubic foot producer. Here is the story from the Sunday paper:

You never can tell about Hansford County. Sharples Oil Co. and the Baker Taylor Drilling Co. re-opened the Humble O&R Co. No. 3 Gruver Unit that was abandoned at 5182. It was drilling into the Morrow pay and from 7094-7119 it produced 80 million feet of gas on open flow. Location is section 122 block 45, H&T survey 4 miles SE of Gruver. The well also produced 6 barrels to the million of distillate.

GOODWELL, SEPT.—(Special) Twenty-six oil tinted photographs
by Paul Cherry, well known Ty-
rone amateur photographer, are
currently on display in the gal-
lery of the No Man's Land Histori-
cal Museum and will continue
throughout September.

The photographs range in sub-
ject matter from portraits to flow-
ers and landscapes and portrays
the southwest at its best.

Mr. Cherry is well known throu-
ghout the High Plains, his pho-
tographic art works hang in many
homes, business houses, and gal-

lery. Mr. Sammons said definitely
the "big brother" would not re-
place the standard-size bottle, de-

drink never intended it to be
more than a soda fountain bever-
age. In 1896, John S. Pemberton,
a druggist, prepared a soft drink
syrup in his back yard in Atlanta,
using a three-legged iron pot
heated by a wood fire.

He took a jug of the syrup to
Jacob's Pharmacy at the historic
Five Points, where soda water
was added and the new drink
put on sale.

The first year only 25 gallons
were sold, bringing in \$50. of
this, Pemberton spent \$47 on ad-
vertising. Most of it consisted of
oilcloth signs pinned to drugstore
awnings.

When Pemberton died two years
later, rights to Coca-Cola were
bought by a 37-year-old whole-
sale drug salesman, Asa Candler.
"Back in Candler's day The Coca-
Cola Company changed offices sev-
eral times," Mr. Sammons said.
"One time when it moved, a one-
horse wagon carried all the firm's
merchandise to the firm's
merchandise store."

Candler was a keen merchan-
dizer. He originated the Coca-Cola
poster and calendar, using Lillian
Russell's picture on one of them.
He was the first to use the slogan,
"Delicious and Refreshing," which
appeared in 1889. And to get the
public acquainted with the new
drink, he gave away millions of
tickets for free Cokes.

"They tell me in Atlanta," Mr.
Sammons said, "that even today
someone come across one of these
tickets in an attic. If they send it
in, they get a free case of Coca-
cola."

It was 13 years later that
Pemberton invented Coca-Cola
drink was bottled. A

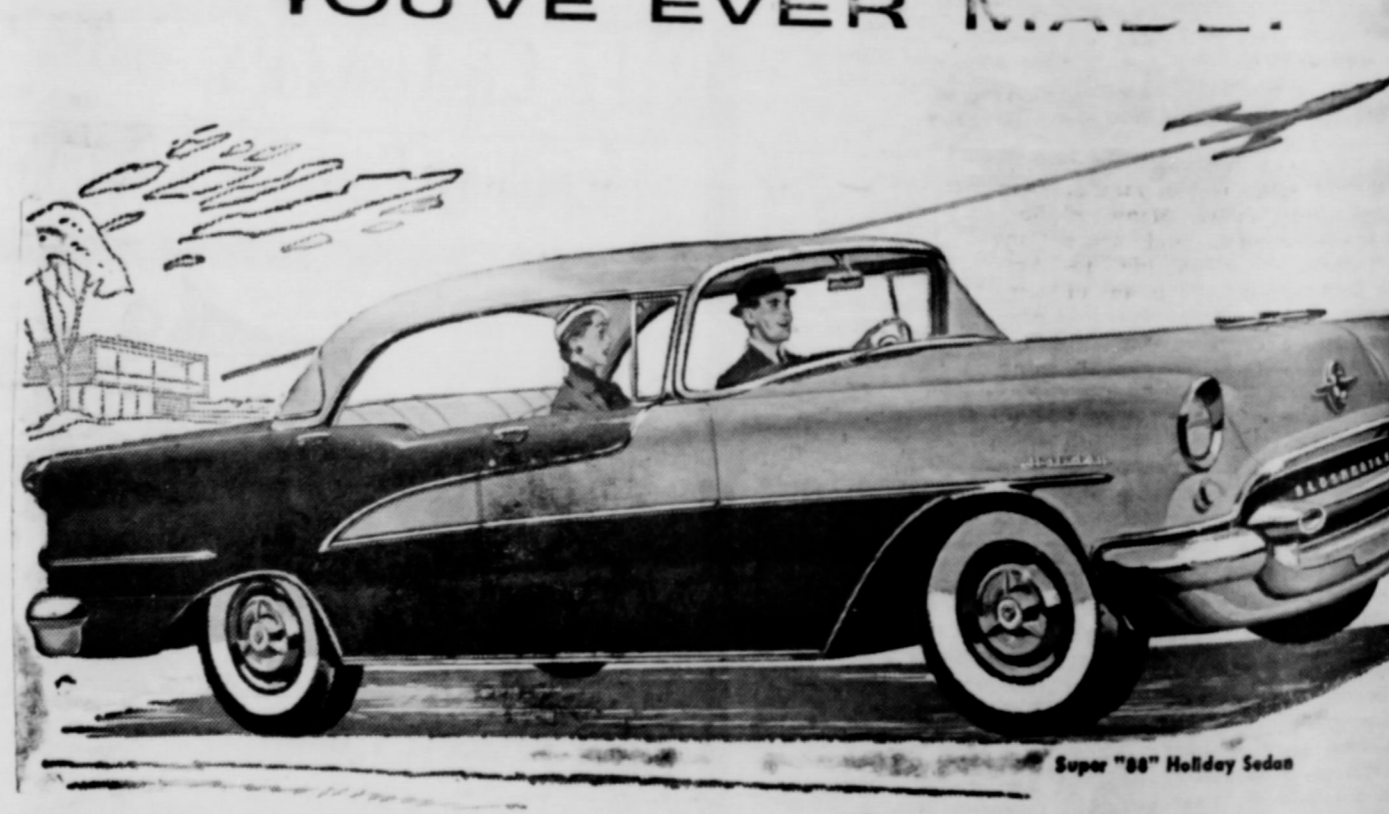

26 Photographs On Display
GOODWELL, SEPT.—(Special) Twenty-six old tinted photographs by Paul Cherry, well known Tyrone amateur photographer, are currently on display in the gallery of the No Man's Land Historical Museum and will continue throughout September.

The photographs range in subject matter from portraits to flowers and landscapes and portraits southwest at its best.

Mr. Cherry is well known throughout the High Plains, his photographic art works hang in many homes, business houses, and gal-

lery. Mr. Sammons said definitely the "big brother" would not replace the standard-size bottle, designed in 1915 at the recommendation of a bottling official who urged: "We need a Coca-Cola bottle which a person will recognize even if he feels it in the dark." When Pemberton died two years later, rights to Coca-Cola were bought by a 37-year-old wholesale drug salesman, Asa Candler. "Back in Candler's day The Coca-Cola Company changed offices several times," Mr. Sammons said. "One time when it moved, a one-horse wagon carried all the firm's merchandise 50 cents a trip."

Candler was a keen merchandiser. He originated the Coca-Cola poster and calendar, using Lillian Russell's picture on one of them. He was the first to use the slogan, "Delicious and Refreshing," which appeared in 1889. And to get the public acquainted with the new drink, he gave away millions of tickets for free Cokes.

"They tell me in Atlanta," Mr. Sammons said, "that even today someone come across one of these tickets in an attic. If they send it in, they get a free case of Coca-Cola."

It was 13 years after the drink was invented that Coca-Cola was bottled in a glass bottle. Asa Candler, the man who had come upon the idea, he bottled soft drink in the Spanish-American war. He gave the rights to practice most amazing contract pay cent. And the attention to Candler did enough of the product to even a single share.

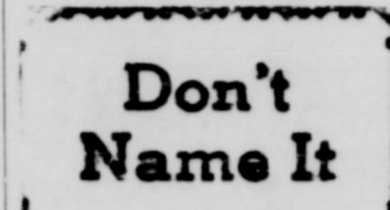

He has so organized his office staff as to enable him to give Texans the best possible opportunity to utilize his services and seek his advice.

"The doctors limit the number of visitors I can see," the Senator said. "But I would like to have all the letters my friends want to write. All will be answered."

Senator Johnson's staff will be divided to handle efficiently this the Federal Building, are Jack correspondence and the problems involved.

Heading his Austin office, in Senator's major assistants, and Hight of San Angelo, one of the Glenn Stegall, long-time member of the staff from Graham. With them will be Grace Tully, for many years personal secretary to President Franklin D. Roosevelt, and George Reedy, who will keep the Senator advised on legislative issues.

In the Washington office during this period will be Walter Jenkins, Senator Johnson's top assistant since 1938; Arthur Perry, formerly an aide to Senators Sheppard and Connally; and Booth Mooney, formerly of Dallas.

"With this setup," Johnson said, "I believe I can handle every request of a Texan during the recess quickly and effectively. I hope no Texan will hold back any request or suggestion he wants to make simply because I must take a little easy until I am fully recovered."

It is a real pleasure to record that Senate Majority Leader Lyndon Johnson is enjoying an encouraging recovery from the heart attack that incapacitated him early in July. With a few more months of rest he is expected to be well enough to resume his duties in the next session of Congress. Senator Johnson is leaving today for his home in Texas, where he will celebrate his 47th birthday on Saturday. Americans, regardless of party, who appreciate the high sense of responsibility with which he has exercised his Senate leadership in the national interest will wish him a very happy birthday and a happy return to the Capital.

Two Year Extension Given USDA'S Live Stock Loan Program

College Station, August—President Eisenhower signed into law on July 15 a bill which provides for a two year extension of the U. S. Department of Agriculture's special livestock loan program.

Under the extension initial loan will be made through July 14, 1957 but additional advances may be made for another two year period for making necessary credit adjustments and to repay the loans previously received. The special livestock loans are made to establish producers and feeders of cattle, sheep and goats—except commercial feedlot operators—who are temporarily unable to get from regular sources the credit needed to carry on their normal operations and a

help from the loan. Loans may be used to meet the usual expenses of livestock operations such as the purchase or production of feed, and replacing or repairing of farm machinery. Loans also may be made for the restocking of herds to normal if the applicant can carry his present herd, plus the additional livestock to be purchased, without buying a substantial part of his feed. Loans are not made to pay existing debts except current incidental bills.

The Loans are scheduled for repayment as soon as possible within a maximum period of three years. Other creditors are not subordinate to their liens but are expected to execute a standby agreement and agree that a reasonable part of the applicant's normal income from livestock can be used to retire the loan.

Applications for the special loans may be made at the county offices of the Farmers Home Administration.

Two Flock System Could Level Egg Production

College Station, September—A tough problem for the poultryman continues to be too many eggs in one season with a resulting drop in prices and too few in the seasons when egg prices are higher. Ben Wormeli, extension poultry specialist, says the answer is simple—a two flock system of egg production.

The two flock system, he explains, just means starting a laying flock early in the spring and another in the fall to pick up when the spring started hens begin to drop off in production.

The specialist lists at least five advantages for the two flock system. The problem of too many small eggs could be sharply reduced by having them come at different times of the year thus relieving the market glut. Too, chick brooding facilities could be used more nearly on a year-round basis with a corresponding reduction in the cost of producing the hen. Eggs could be produced at a year thus keeping production more nearly uniform rate throughout the year.

Quality drops in egg laid during the last few months of the hen's laying year and the two flock system would help solve this problem. Wormeli says in one area where poultrymen strive to produce only top quality eggs, a requirement of the organization is that replacement chicks be put down three times each year. He also says that a chief reason for the success of the cage method of handling laying hens is that production is kept on an even keel year round.

And another major advantage, he adds, the egg producer by following the two flock program can have a dependable year-round income from his poultry enterprise.

Wormeli points out that presently about 50 percent of the chicks hatched in Texas for flock replacements are placed during the first quarter of the year; about 37 percent the second; 6 percent the third and 7 the fourth quarter. This he adds, is strong evidence that a new flock could be producing when egg prices are normally at their peak—in the fall and winter months.

Scientists Seek Answ. To Why Flies Attract Flies When Feeding

College Station, September—Scientists are hot on the trail of a mysterious substance which may make fly control much easier.

The clue, according to Extension Entomologist F. M. Fuller, was supplied by Army scientists several years ago when they discovered that as flies feed, the material upon which they are feeding becomes more attractive to other flies. Apparently feeding flies deposit some unknown substance which is attractive to other flies.

Efforts at isolation of the material of its chemical makeup studied. If it could be produced artificially, Fuller believes it would greatly increase the effectiveness of present fly-killing insecticides by making them more attractive to flies.

Fuller says the entomologists turned detectives, don't know

Hints On Mechanical Harvesting Of Cotton Offered

College Station, Sept.—The grade of mechanically harvested cotton can be improved or lowered by the practices used during the harvesting process says Fred Elliott, cotton specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

If strippers are used, Elliott

advises producers to get the latest information from the local county agent on defoliation. He also suggests that weeds and especially Johnson grass be cleared from the fields before stripping is commenced. Spot oiling is suggested for this job.

When harvesting is begun, don't strip when the cotton is wet. Most gins he adds, are equipped to do a good job if the cotton is brought to them in proper condition. One of the more important of these conditions is dryness.

He suggests the use of blowers on the strippers and wire or slatted sides for the trailers. Make the trailers large enough so that tramping will not be necessary, he advises. Growers have told him it cost from \$5 to \$15 a bale to tramp cotton on a trailer. This will soon pay for extra trailers. When spindle type pickers are used, he again advises seeing the

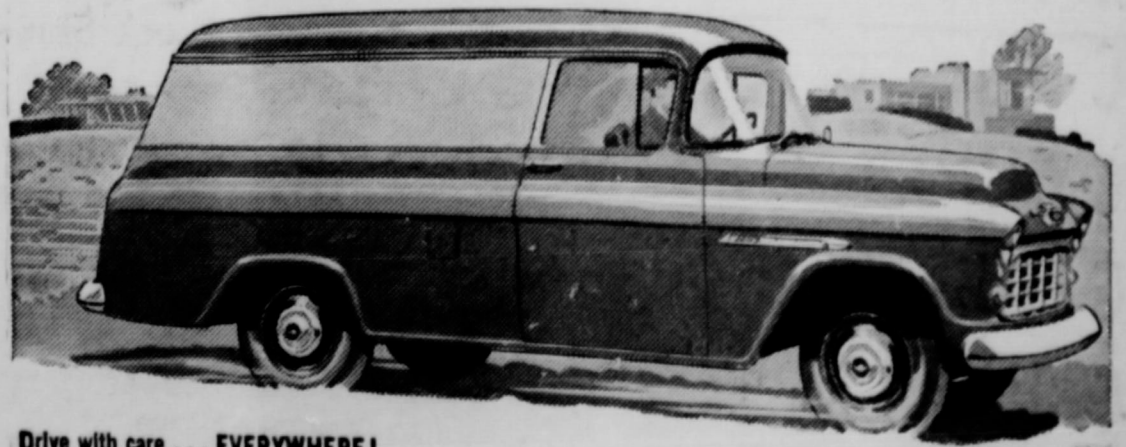
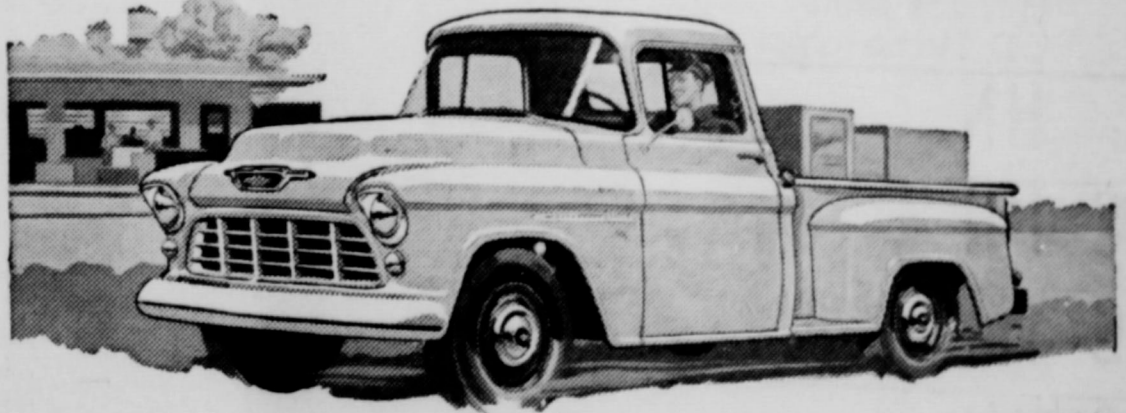

The majority of Reserve personnel recalled will be used in maneuver units to replace active Army personnel designated as umpires for Exercise SAGE BRUSH.

An estimated 184 officers in the grades of lieutenant through colonel and an estimated 195 enlisted men with ratings of E-3 through E-7 will be called from the Fourth Army area, General Williams said.

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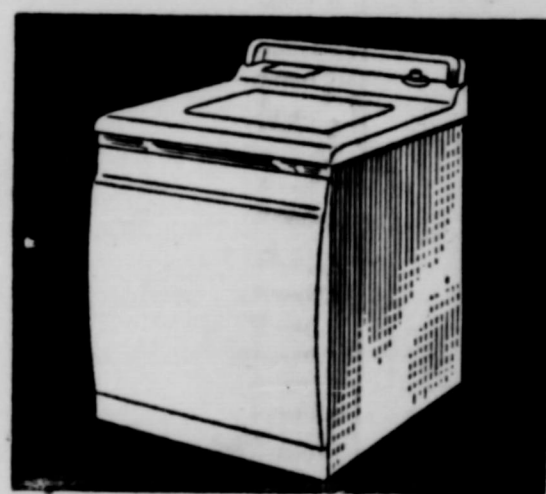
