School Bond Election Oct. 15th

The election for the purpose of authorizing sale of \$210,000. in school bonds for the purpose of building a 6 room primary building, a new school cafeteria to seat 150 people, and a Vocational Agriculture Building to house a shop and one classroom, will be held on Saturday, October 15th in the High School Building.

This election will be held under a new law recently passed by the Texas Legislature whereby a school district may levy an increase in tax above the \$1.50 now in effect, for the purpose of building. The proposed bond issue is for a period of ten years. At the end of the len year and the additional tax will be a smatically stopped. Under this new law the district will save \$22,353. In interest.

You may recall reading in the newspaper about the recent school bond election in Amarillo in which the voters passed upon several millions for new school buildings. Three ballots was used in that election . . . one white, one pink and one blue. We shall use the same plan here. A person who is a qualified voter and owns property listed upon the school's tax roll will vote all three ballots. A qualified voter not listed upon the school's tax roll will vote one ballot only. Election judges will be on hand to assist you in getting the

At present we have 442 students enrolled in the grade school and 144 enrolled in the high school. Next year we expect 460 in the grade school and 176 in the high school. The next year we expect 476 in the grade school and 208 in the high school. These figures are based upon projection of our present enrollment plus anticipated enrollment in the first grade for the next two years. Our enrollment has increased approximately 120 in the last year and a half. This increase in enrollment has caused us to give up the Visual Aid room in the grade school and in the high school; to move the Vocational Agriculture classes into the Bookkeeping room; to move two sections of the fourth grade into high school classrooms, and to become crowded in both the grade school and the high school.

It now appears certain that we shall need to have three sections of the second grade next year. The only room that can possibly be used is that which now contains the grade school library. The high school will be confronted with 32 additional students which will certainly necessitate more sections in the high school classes without any room available.

The proposed building program, if realized, would allow us move the first and second grade sections to the new primary building and would give room to move the two fourth grade sections from the high school back to the grade school. The Vocational Ag. building would allow us to move the Ag. classes out of the high school building. These two moves would give us three additional classrooms in the high school. We would also give us three additional rooms in the grade school.

The new Vocational building would allow us to move the present shop into new quarters. We could then move the janitors supplies from the west end of the Band building into the room vacated by the shop, and this would give more room to the band.

The proposed building program, if carried out, will certainly make both our grade school and our high school more efficient.

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



Farms Hum With Activity & Accident Rate May Climb

College Station, October-Farms across Texas are humming with activity. Harvest season in fullswing means longer hours of hard work with more highway travel for farm residents.

It is also the season, says W. L. Ulich, extension agricultural engineer, when farm accident statistics usually take a sharp turn upward. More and complicated machinery is used during the harvest season than for any other period of the year and the long hours on the job means more fatigue, both heavy contributors to farm accidents. Hauling tha farm produce to market means more highway travel and increased chances for traffic accidents, cautions the specialist.

Ulich believes that farm families can reduce accidents greatly if they'll answer a simple question. "Can I porsibly get hurt doing the job this way?" If the answer is yes, better change the method of doing the job or be more careful and always alert, says the engineer.

Automobile-tractor wrecks usu ally loaded with cotton, grain and other farm products. "Be sure," warns Ulich, "that your tractor is properly lighted if it is to be on the highway after dark". Also be sure you can see

ahead as well as to the side and rear of the vehicle you are operating. Make sure others can see your tractor. Use flags during the

Ulich says rear end collisions account for about 36 percent of the tractor accidents and 14 tractor-driver fatalities occur for each auto fatality from highway tractor-auto accidents. And concludes Ulich, "Statis-

tics won't harvest crops especially when used to record a fatality from a needless farm accident.
