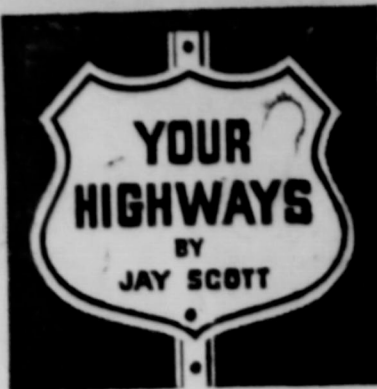

In 1957, more people than ever before in U. S. history will take to the highways for vacations.

THE STATE OF TEXAS COUNTY OF HANSFORD TO THE RESIDENT QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF SPEARMAN INDEPENDENT ROAD DISTRICT NO. 1 OF HANSFORD COUNTY, TEXAS, WHO OWN TAXABLE PROPERTY IN SAID DISTRICT, AND WHO HAVE DULY RENDERED THE SAME FOR TAXATION, AND TO ALL OTHER PERSONS CONCERNED:

TAKE NOTICE that a petition, signed by Kiff White and 55 other persons, being resident property taxpayers of SPEARMAN INDEPENDENT ROAD DISTRICT NO. 1 OF HANSFORD COUNTY, TEXAS, who own taxable property in said District, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, has heretofore been submitted to the Commissioners' Court of said County, wherein such petitioners pray the Court for an order for an election on the following proposition:

and truly educated who leaves Christ out of his heart, for Christ is the only standard which educated men can be measured by. Amen. Some Professor had written ten commandments on when a man was educated: The first one was when you go down the street, will a strange dog follow you? The last one was: put in nine-tenths of your time attending to your own business and on letting the other fellow's business alone. I have forgotten the other eight but they was as simple as the first and last one. The student who has the right conception of what schooling is and what it prepares him to do his very best in life. No man is educated unless he is trained to think for himself. He must be able to make decisions on what is right or wrong.

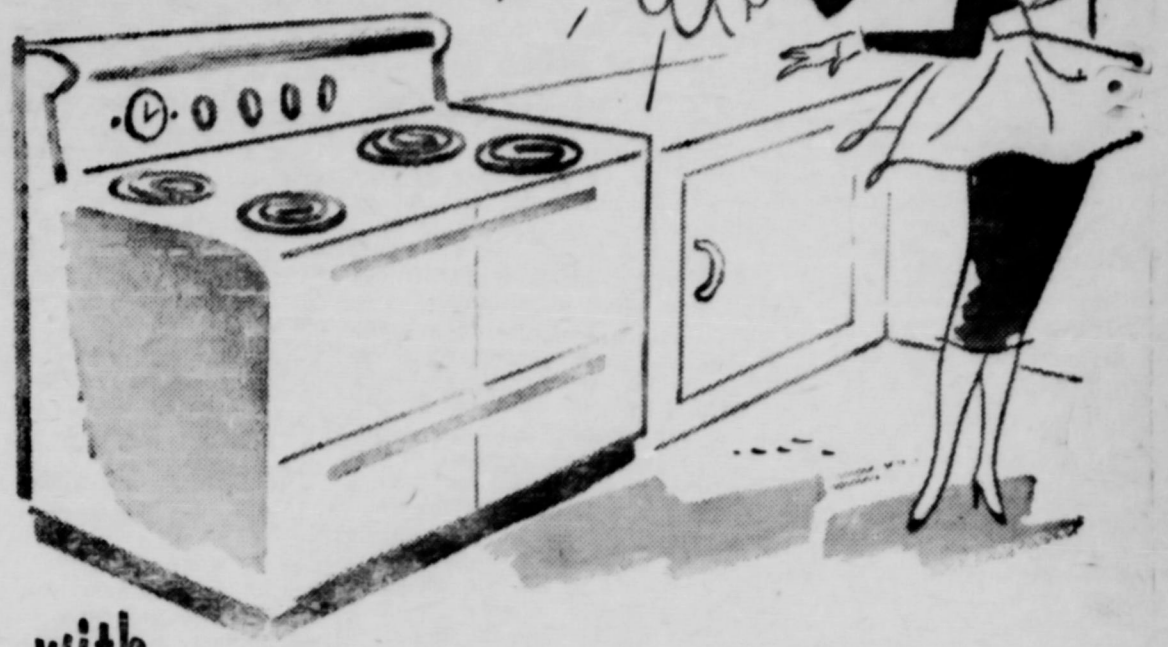



Judge Yarborough

U. S. SENATOR ON APRIL 2

Ralph W. Yarborough was born June 8, 1903, at Chandler, (Henderson County), seventh of a farm family of 11 children of Mr. and Mrs. C. R. Yarborough, and grandson of two Confederate soldiers. The Yarborough family has lived in Texas more than 100 years.

Now an Austin attorney, Yarborough has been a farm hand in East Texas and wheat harvest hand in Oklahoma, an oil field laborer in Borger, country school teacher 3 years in Henderson County, assistant Attorney General, Soldier, and Civic servant.

He went to grade school at Chandler, high school at Tyler, spent one youthful year in military school, another working and studying in Europe, and a session at Sam Houston State Teachers College.

He graduated from the University of Texas Law School with highest honors in 1927 and joined an El Paso Law Firm. In 1928, he married his boyhood sweetheart, the former Miss Opal Warren (also of Henderson County) at Corsicana. They have one son, Richard, who is now in military service.

An assistant attorney general for 3 years 9 months, Yarborough handled several cases of high importance to Texas. One in particular, an opinion for the land commissioner, was the bedrock on which Texas later built its tidelands recovery case.

He wrote the first law to protect Texas' underground water resources and argued before the Railroad Commission for the abolition of "strappage" a device whereby pipeline companies arbitrarily deducted one percent of the volume of oil produced and sold in Texas before paying for it. Upon his case, the commission abolished the practice. This has resulted in a continuing saving to Texas royalty owners. Oil producers, and the Permanent School Fund of millions of dollars.

Yarborough was born into a Baptist family, has been a member of that faith since he was 12 and now belongs to Austin's First Baptist Church. He once taught Sunday School there and has been a church trustee. Mrs. Yarborough is a member of the Christian Church.

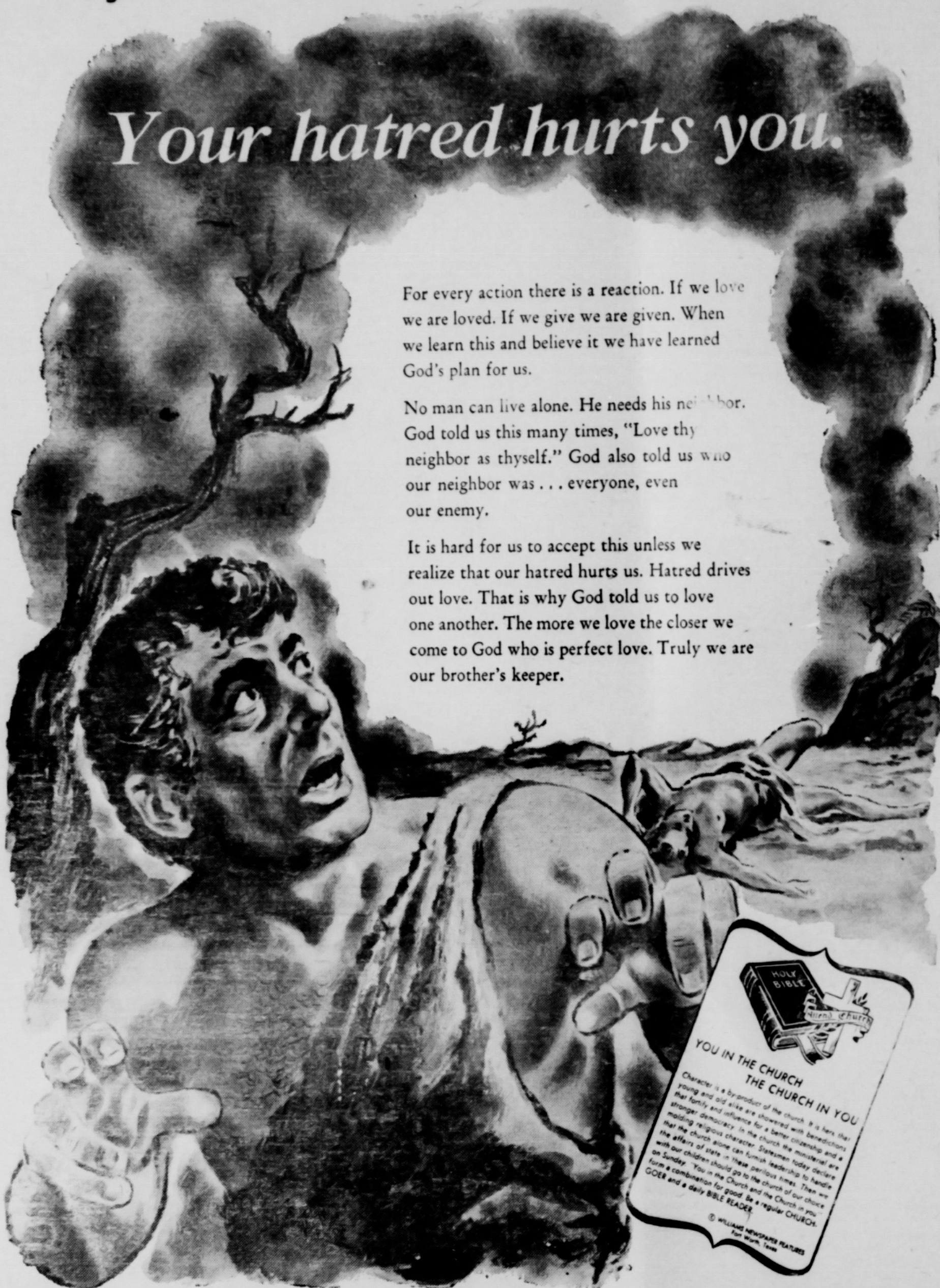

Social Security

According to John R. Sanderson, Social Security Administration District Manager, Amarillo, Texas, and James Z. Pierce, Administrative-In-Charge, Amarillo, District Internal Revenue Service, social security tax must be paid by the employer for any household worker who receives \$50 or more cash wages in any calendar quarter.

This tax, 2 1/2 per cent for employer and employee, since January 1957, applies to domestic workers ranging in jobs from upstairs maids to chauffeurs. From 1950-1957 it was two per cent.

The Internal Revenue Service Officer explained wages included payments in cash or by check of money order. Not included for household workers is the value of food, lodging or clothing. Cash payment for bus or carfare is included, but not the cost of bus or car tokens.

The tax is paid to the Internal Revenue Service District Director on a simple Form 942, available at Internal Revenue Service, Form 942, showing name, social security number, wages paid and tax withheld from each household employee, should be completed and returned to Internal Revenue Service within one month after the end of the calendar quarter — that is, by April 30 for the January-March quarter.

Here are two typical questions and their answers most often heard at the Amarillo Social Security District Office.

An employer says: "I have just received a copy of the Household Employer's Social Security Tax Guide. On the inside of the back cover are copies of receipts I'm instructed to give my household employee. There's a blank in which I'm asked to fill in the amount of the social security tax I withhold from my employee's cash wages. Now, I pay the entire amount of the social security tax — my share and my employee's share. What do I write in this space?"

Reply: "Write 'None' While household employees, like employees in other kinds of work, are required by law to have their share of the social security taxes deducted from their wages, the law doesn't specify that you must withhold it. If you wish to assume the entire amount of the tax, that's your privilege."

A mother asks, "What about a baby sitter's wages? I pay mine \$15 a month. Do I have to report her wages for social security?"

Reply: "No, the wages you pay her aren't covered by social security unless they amount to \$50 a calendar quarter."

Airman Harold V. Collier, USN, serving aboard the Pacific Fleet attack carrier USS HORNET, CV-12, didn't have a birthday this year. Collier's birthday falls on the evening of February 13 the HORNET steamed eastward across the Pacific to join the Seventh Fleet, crossed the International Date Line Crossing time ahead 24 hours, and thus Collier and his shipmates woke up the following morning to discover that the date was February 15, and that they would have no Valentines Day this year.

Collier, the son of Mrs. Harold J. Collier, of Spearman, entered the Naval Service in January of 1956 and reported aboard the HORNET on April 22, 1956. Before entering the Navy Collier attended Spearman High School.

One advantage to Collier's going two years without a birthday is that he won't have to worry about becoming old too quickly. If the International Date Line were closer to the U. S. perhaps more people would take advantage of the opportunity to skip a few birthdays. Although the International Date Line hasn't unlocked the secret of youth, it has helped to prove the saying that "A man is only as old as he thinks he is."

ACP Practices Can Be Carried Out On Soil Bank Land

College Station, March—Land which has been placed in the Soil Bank, either the Acreage Reserve or Conservation Reserve, is still eligible for Federal cost-sharing in carrying out practices under the Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP). Tom Prater, extension farm management specialist, reminded Texas farmers this week.

But, he said, applications for cost-sharing for conservation practices must be filed with the county ASC committee before any practices is undertaken. Too, the county committee is the best source of information on practices which have been approved for ACP cost-sharing in the county for this year. Approved practices vary by counties, therefore, checking with the county committee is very important.

Applications are now being received for the 1957 ACP at most county offices. All applications for approved practices that are received in time for inclusion under this year's program will receive equal consideration, said Prater.

If ACP practices are carried out on land placed in the Soil Bank, the Soil Bank provisions of no grazing and no harvesting must, of course, be met. Some practices which are not eligible for assistance under the Conservation Reserve are eligible under ACP, and may be carried out on Conservation Reserve land if approved by the county ASC committee. Assistance, however, cannot be given under both programs for the same practice on the same acres.

The safe bet, said Prater, is to contact the local ASC committee and find out what is available for helping conserve and build up your farm land.
