



ter weather often rob the farmer of valuable topsoil through erosion-not to mention the hidden damage from leaching. But farmers can prevent this winter time destruction of their land by planting cover crops.

But it must be remembered that cover crops do more than just protect the land, says R. J. Hodges, extension agronomist. These crops improve the soil itself, leading to increased yields.

Many growers have discovered that winter legumes increase their cotton and corn yields, more than paying for the time and money spent in putting in the legumes, points out the agronomist. These cover plants do not interfere with crops, coming at a time when farm work slows down. Legislation provides that the Bill Clemons, Girls Coach marketing quota must be equal to Leon Chapman, "B" Team Coach the average quantity of peanuts harvested for nuts during the 5 years immediately preceding the year in which the quota is proclaimed, adjusted for current trends and prospective demand conditions: but the quota must be not less than a quantity sufficient to provide a national acreage allotment of at least 1,610,000 acres. In deatermining the marketing quota for the 1958 crop, a "normal" yield of 1,026 pounds per acre was used. This yield, multiplied by 1,010 000 ac

in the national marketing Quota or 840,000 tons. If the minimulii national allotment provision of the law were not in effect, the national marketing quota would be oro,000 tons which with allowance for under narvesume would result in a national acreage anotment of 1,940,000 acres.



Experiment Station Developed Small Grain Varieties Add To Texas Farm Income

College Station, November-Plant breeders of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station have for many years been developing and releasing improved varieties of small grains for use in Texas. These varieties have enabled Texas producers to in-crease both their grain and forage production from small grain

The value of these new varieties to the agricultural economy of Texas is shown by a recent survey made by Extension Agronomist R. J. Hodges and Dr. I. M. Atkins, agronomist in charge of small grain for the Experiment Station. County agents reported to the agronomists that 70.5 percent of the Texas wheat acreage last year was planted to such improved varieties as Comanche, Wichita, Westar, Concho and Qupnah. Only 3.3 percent of the acreage was seeded to the blackhull group which is less desirable from a quality standpoint, but was once very popular in the

Hodges points out that a new variety is only of value when used by farmers. As an example of the value of a new variety, he says 559,000 acres last year was planted to Westar. For several years this variety, at Amarillo and Chillicothe, outyielded the ence popular Turkey variety by at least two bushels an acre. This variety alone was responsible for increasing the total wheat yield in Texas last year by more than a million bushels.

Three Experiment Station oat variety releases, New Nortex in 1936, Mustang in 1950 and Almo in 1954 accounted fo rmore than half of last year's oat acreage of almost 3 million acres. These varieties were developed especially for Texas conditions and have resulted in both increased grain and forage yleids. At Tyler each dollar spent to produce oat graz-ing returned a net of \$3.75 or \$44 an acre.

Cordova barley, released a few years ago, occupied 49 percent of the 370,234 acres seeded to barley in Texas last year. It has cutyielded Tennessee Winter by an average of 8.1 bushels an acre. Goliad, a variety developed for south Texas conditions, is disease resistant and a heavy forage producer. When not injured by late winter freezes, it also produces good grain yields. Hod-ges says the plant breeders are working continuously to develop even better varieties in order to meet the needs of an ever-chang-



Social Security News

The Amarillo Social Security Office, together with 557 other District Offices of the Social Security Administration, is cooperating with farm and business industries in the nationwide observance of Farm-City Week, John R. Sanderson, District Manager, announced today

Since the objection of National FarmCity- Week (November 22-28), is to stress the interrelation of rural and urban peoples. Sanderson said that the Social Security Administration will emphasize the "oneness" of its old-age, survivors and disability program.

"Some people do not fully understand that the social security program is the same for the farmer and for the city persons," Sanderson said. "Many farmers still think that old-age survivors, and disability insurance for them and their families is a distinct and separate program from the social security program for city folks. Some believe erroneously, that when they reach retirement age they just have to apply at their social security district office for "farmers' benefits and then go right on with their farming activities," he declared.

As a possible reason for this misunderstanding, may be that the social security law does contain a few special provisions for farmers in recognition of the fact that farmers in many ways from the operation of other business enterprises. These provisions relate to the way self-employed farmers are permitted to figure their net earnings for social security purposes if their gross farm income is not more than \$1,800 and their net is less than \$1,200; also, the manner in which farm rental income received from a tenant or share-farmer can count for social security credit if the farm landlord "materially participates" in the operation on the land he rents

farm operators, however, have nothing to do with the type of social security benefits payable or work eligibility for benefits. Farmers and their families qualify for these Federal insurance payments based on a farmer's work under social security just like millions of city workers who are employed or self-employed in offices. factories, mercantile enterprises or covered professions in urban
