First State Bank Damaged By Fire Thursday Night, Dec. 26

The First State Bank here in Spearman was damaged in a fire, Thursday night, which was quickly under control by Spearman's fire department. The cause was a fire in the kitchen. Apparently a curtain was pulled down and the fire burned to the top of the ceiling. The bank firemen broke out the window in the front of the bank and soon had the fire under control. The chemical which was used to fight the fire, was not severe, but the fire started between 10 and 11 p.m. and was out by 12:30. The fire was first seen by the boys who operate the fire station. They were alerted by information first received from a telephone call. Had the fire gone on much longer, the bank possibly most of the buildings on the bank could have been burned in the high wind. The bank crew was back on the job by Monday of this week. The new paint, and some ceiling will be needed in the bank. The machinery probably was damaged, and some of it may be beyond repair. The only noticeable damage was a desk, and electrical equipment which was on Clays.

Lewter was carried to the Hansford Hospital, where he remained Tuesday of this week.

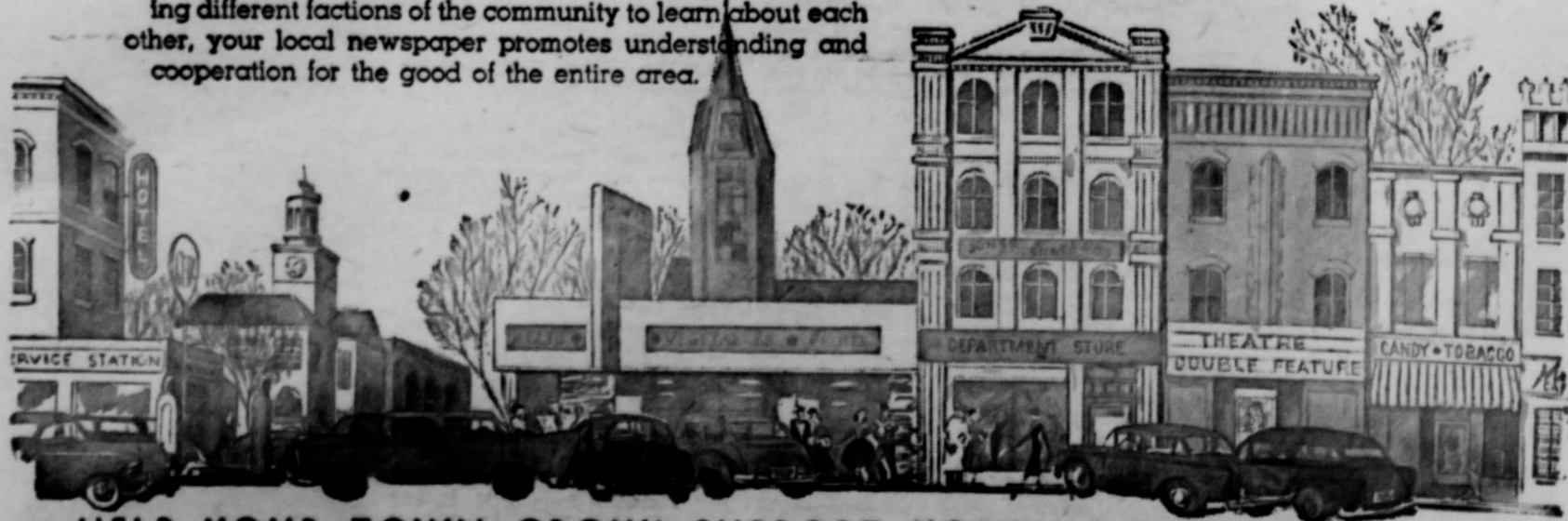

PUMPKIN PIE

You can work a few external tricks with various festive garnishes for your Pumpkin Pie. Simplest is to spoon a dollop of whipped cream on each serving. Carry this one step further by grating on a sprinkle of nutmeg. As an alternative use whipped cream from a pressure dispenser can to make circles over the whole pie. Or, make a border of chopped nuts. Any of these ideas will add interest to a simple bakery pie as well.

An unseasoned device may be used to increase your pastry's nutritional quality: bake it with enriched flour. Enrichment gives three essential B-vitamins and food iron.

PUMPKIN PIE

1 cup sifted enriched flour 2 to 4 tablespoons cold water
1/2 teaspoon salt Pumpkin Filling
1/2 cup shortening

Sift together flour and salt. Cut or rub in shortening. Sprinkle with water, mixing lightly until dough begins to stick together. Turn out on floured pastry cloth. Press dough together. Roll out to circle about 1/4 inch thick and fit into 9-inch pie pan. Trim and flute edge. Fill with Pumpkin Filling. Bake in hot oven (450° F.) for 10 minutes. Reduce heat to a slow oven (300° F.) and continue baking 45 minutes or until silver knife, inserted in center, comes out clean. Serve with whipped cream or chopped nuts.

Pumpkin Filling

1 1/2 cups cooked pumpkin 1/4 teaspoon ground cloves
1 cup brown sugar 1/4 teaspoon mace
1 teaspoon cinnamon 2 eggs
1/2 teaspoon salt 1 1/4 cups milk
1/2 teaspoon ginger

Mix pumpkin, sugar, cinnamon, salt, ginger, cloves and mace. Beat eggs and add milk. Add to pumpkin mixture and mix until smooth. Pour into unbaked pastry shell. Makes 1 9-inch pie.

1. Dredge meat with small portion of flour. Brown in heated shortening.

It is a festive dessert, indeed, topped with snowy coconut and decorated with golden pineapple rings and cherries. The cake uses an angel food mix—or make your own, if you prefer.

PARTY ANGEL DESSERT

Minty Green Filling: Soften 2 teaspoons plain gelatin in 2 tablespoons cold pineapple syrup and dissolve over hot water. Stir into 1 cup drained, crushed pineapple. Add 1 tablespoon green Creme de Menthe or a few drops of mint extract. Tint with extra green coloring, if needed.

Cherry Pink Filling: Soften 2 teaspoons plain gelatin in 2 tablespoons cold pineapple syrup and dissolve over hot water. Stir into 1 cup drained, crushed pineapple. Add 1/4 cup chopped maraschino cherries and 1 tablespoon Brandy or flavoring. Tint with extra red food coloring, if needed.

To put together: Cut one 10-inch angel food cake into 3 even layers. Place bottom layer on cake plate. Whip 2 cups whipping cream. Fold 1 cup of the whipped cream into each of the fillings. Fold 1/2 cup of moist shredded coconut into each filling. Spread green filling on bottom layer, top with second. Spread pink filling on second layer, cover with top layer. Spread remaining whipped cream over top and sprinkle with 1/2 cup coconut. Decorate as desired with pineapple rings and cherries. Serves 10 to 12.

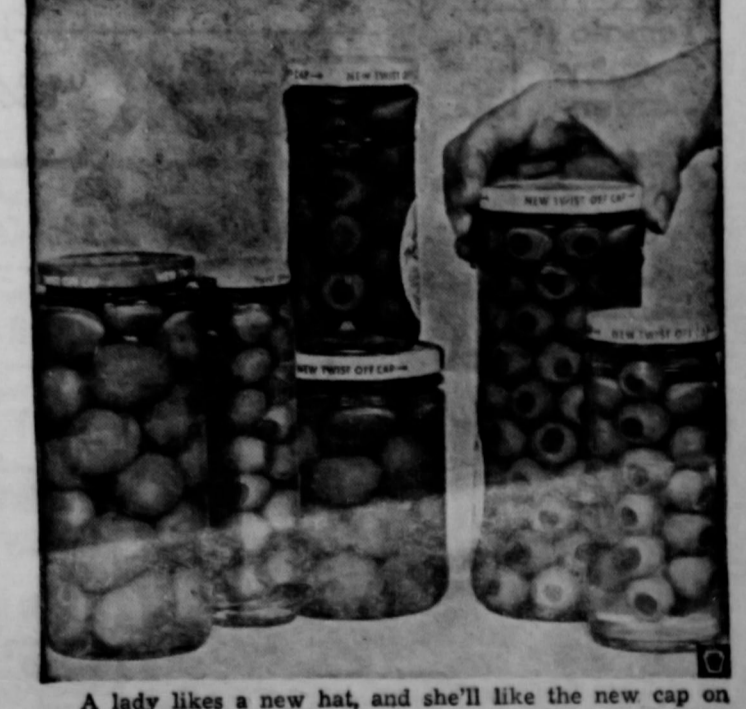

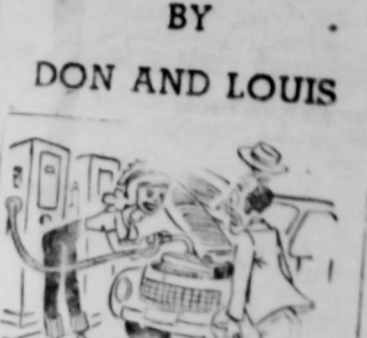

LOW COST COTTON BUG PLAN PROVED IN 1750 ACRE TEST



Outstanding results in controlling cotton insects were obtained this year by nine Louisiana farmers taking part in an insect control demonstration.

All these farmers used toxaphene and toxaphene-DDT mixtures for control of the boll weevil and other insects and kept infestations at low levels throughout the season at low cost.

The demonstrations conducted on 1,750 acres in the principal cotton growing areas of the state, were the largest such tests ever staged in the tri-state Delta cotton area.

The demonstrations were conducted by Hercules Powder Company, makers of toxaphene, after reports of failure to control the boll weevil with commonly used insecticides were made by farmers and research men in 1956 and 1957.

This year, right in the middle of the areas where failure to control had been reported, farmers in these demonstrations were able to keep infestations at extremely low levels.

Conditions were ideal for boll weevil development with extremely wet weather occurring throughout the season in eight of the nine locations.

The fields in the tests were in locations where the boll weevil problem has always been severe. The program of control used in the demonstrations included a schedule of early season poisoning in which toxaphene was used to knock out overwintering weevils, flea-hoppers, plant bugs and other pests which attack cotton early in the season. This stopped stunting of the little plants, helped the crop get off to a good start.

Costs were low averaging under \$30 per acre for the insecticide material. Many farmers in the same area reported spending more than \$30 per acre for other insecticides. Farmers taking part in the demonstrations were C. M. Hutchinson, of Calde Parish, Jimmy Taylor and Ware Arledge of Natchitoches Parish, Otis Newman of Rapides Parish, G. A. Goux of Avoyelles Parish, Hollybrook Plantation in East Carroll Parish, George Yergey of Madison Parish, Russell Ratcliff of Tensas Parish and W. A. Callaway and Son of Ouachita Parish.

RESTORE BIRTHPLACE OF GIRL SCOUT FOUNDER



Restoration of the birthplace of one of America's famous women—Juliette Gordon Low, founder of Girl Scouts in America—has recently been completed in Savannah, Ga., through the efforts of the more than two and one-half million girls and adults of the Girl Scouts of the U. S. A.

It's the handsome, ante-bellum Wayne-Gordon mansion, considered one of the best surviving examples of the many handsome residences erected in Savannah in the 1820s and 1830s.

Action by the National Board of the Girl Scouts in 1953 saved the historic structure from being torn down to make way for commercial development. Funds for its purchase and restoration were raised by the Girl Scouts and today it stands as a memorable example of Old South architecture.

The structure, which occupies a quarter of a block, has been partially furnished with some of the original furniture. The remaining pieces will be carefully selected to reflect the era and section of the country.

In the bedroom which was occupied by Mrs. Low's parents, is the bed in which Juliette Low was born. Girl Scouting officials chose an authentic Birge Colonial collection wallpaper pattern with which to decorate the room in which the Girl Scouts' founder was born.

At the suggestion of the Girl Scouts, the design, for many years a popular one known as "Mayfair Chintz," has been re-named the "Juliette Gordon Low" by The Birge Company of Buffalo, N. Y., oldest wallpaper manufacturer in the U. S. The firm has long been known for its quality wallpaper products. Other Birge wallpapers were also used in the restoration of the mansion.

The mansion will be used as a center for Girl Scouting activities in Savannah. Its carriage house has been converted into a troop house for Girl Scouts. The long neglected garden has been restored and is now alive with yucca, fig and pomegranate trees, colorful flowers and shrubs. The service yard has been converted into a play area for Girl Scouts visiting the home.

The ground floor of the mansion houses Girl Scout exhibits, a modern kitchen, dining space and an assembly hall.

The house, when first completed, consisted of an English basement, a principal or parlor floor and one floor of bedrooms. Another floor was added in the mid-1850s. It is a spacious house with large rooms, crystal chandeliers, marble fireplaces and curved staircases.

Distinguished American figures visited it, among them Presidents William McKinley, and William Howard Taft, Admirals W. S. Schley and George Dewey.

THE FEAST OF '57



Thanksgiving and the specialty of the day . . . King Turkey, of course! And, here's a stuffing to give it even greater glamour . . . Mushroom Rice Stuffing made with packaged pre-cooked rice. For a colorful garnish, fill orange cups with spiced fresh cranberries.

MUSHROOM RICE STUFFING
1 large box (about 4 cups) packaged pre-cooked rice
1 tablespoon salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
2 cups water, boiling
1/2 cup butter
1/2 cup chopped onions
2 cups chopped celery and celery leaves
1/2 pound (about 1 1/2 cups) sliced, fresh mushrooms

Add packaged pre-cooked rice, salt, and pepper to water, boiling in a large saucepan. Mix just to moisten all rice. Cover, remove from heat, and let stand as directed in Step 2 on the back of the packaged pre-cooked rice box.

Meanwhile, melt butter in skillet. Add onions, celery and leaves, and mushrooms. Saute until lightly browned. Add to prepared rice. Put stuffing into turkey. Do not pack tightly. Roast at once. Makes 12 cups stuffing, or enough for a 12- to 16-pound turkey.

Catch Me If You Can . . . I'M THE GINGERBREAD MAN!



Dancing eyes and squeals of delight welcome a Christmas tree decorated with sugar cookies and gingerbread men. "May we really eat them?" the children will chorus while their father without asking permission, is likely to "borrow" one from a spot where it won't be noticed too soon.

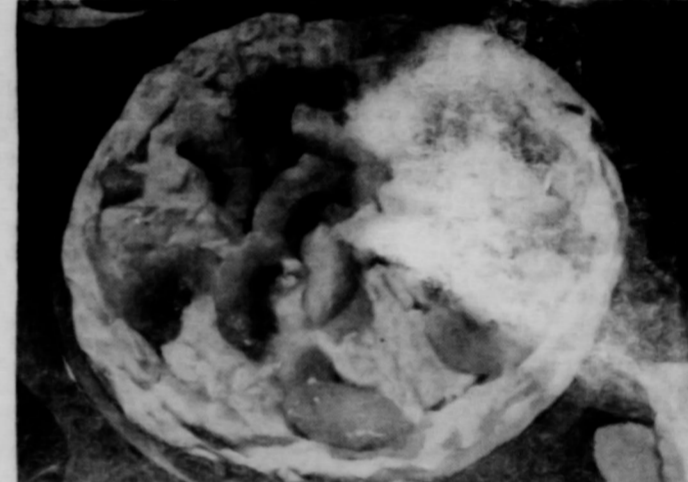
Gingerbread men are as much a part of Christmas tradition as the tree and the gifts under it—and what a cheerful spicy aroma fills the house while they're baking. Roll the gingerbread dough directly on your baking sheet, advises Crisco Kitchens who developed the simple but delicious recipe below. Then cut out your figures using a floured cookie cutter, or a sharp knife and your own paper pattern. Remove excess dough and ferrul it to make more cookies. Before baking mark the eyes and buttons with seedless raisins and punch a hole at the top of the cookie with the plain end of a kitchen match. Or make the features with frosting after the figures come from the oven and pull a loop through the top with needle and thread. The sketch above how to cut your own pattern from folded heavy paper or cardboard.

GINGERBREAD MEN

- 1/2 cup Crisco
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 1/2 cup molasses
- 1 egg
- 1/2 cup sifted enriched flour
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon allspice
- 1/2 teaspoon ginger
- 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1/2 teaspoon clove
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla

Blend Crisco, brown sugar and molasses. Combine dry ingredients and add alternately with milk to the first mixture. Mix until well blended. Chill. Roll out 1/8 inch thick. Cut with floured cookie cutter, or make your own pattern and cut around it. Bake on baking sheets rubbed with Crisco at 350°F. for 10-12 minutes. Remove from baking sheets immediately and decorate when cool.

A Pie That's Pure Heaven



Peach angel pie is a heavenly dessert. It features a crisp, like meringue shell, piled high with billows of ice cream and crowned with luscious golden peaches. To enjoy this dessert all year round, use sweet and juicy quick-frozen peaches.

PEACH ANGEL PIE

- 3 egg whites
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup vinegar
- 3/4 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 quart vanilla ice cream
- 1 package (12 ounces) Birds Eye Sliced Peaches, thawed

Beat egg whites and salt until foamy throughout. Add sugar, 2 tablespoons at a time, beating after each addition until sugar is blended. Then continue beating until mixture will stand in stiff peaks. Add vinegar and vanilla and beat well. Entire beating process takes about 10 minutes. Spoon into lightly buttered 9-inch pie pan, building up sides 1/2 inch above edge of pan. Bake in slow oven (300°F.) 30 to 35 minutes. Cool.

Just before serving, fill meringue shell with scoops of ice cream. Top with sliced peaches and juice.

Baltimore, Md.
Fort McHenry is the birthplace of our national anthem. As British guns shelled the fort that night in 1814, Francis Scott Key watched and waited anxiously on a ship in Baltimore Harbor, with dawn's early light he saw the flag was still there. Inspired, Key wrote the words of "The Star-Spangled Banner." Today Fort McHenry is a national shrine.

The tower, with its 71-bell carillon, overlooks tall pines and palms and a profusion of tropical plants and flowers. Many say this majestic but rural sanctuary moves the visitor to silent communion with nature—and himself.
