

Rich Texans Subject Of Magazine Story

"The Oil Folks at Home," a witty study of the Texas oil families appears in the February issue of Holiday magazine. The text, by Cleveland Amory, and the pictures, by Slim Aarons, present a colorful view of many of the state's leading citizens.

The author asserts that of the ten richest men in the country, at least five of them are Texans, and if persons with inherited wealth are excluded, the proportion is even higher.

The article includes many anecdotes and sketches of men like Haldson Lafayette Hunt and Clint Murchison of Dallas, Hugh Roy Cullen, of Houston, and Sid Richardson of Fort Worth. These men, according to Amory, are the big four in Texas Oiligarchy. Amory describes Glenn McCarthy as a man whose life would make an ideal movie script and claims that D. Harold Byrd, of Dallas, once issued a dinner invitation to all those within hearing distance at the Cotton Bowl Game. Though the emphasis in Tex-

The article concludes with a tribute to Everette Lee DeGolyer, of Dallas, the father of petroleum geology. "He is," the author writes. "a man of remarkable humility, open-mindedness, humor and naturalness."

Turkey Farmers In For Tough Times

College Station, Jan.-Turkey producers will probably have a tough time marketing birds at a profit in 1957, say extension poultry mktg. specialist F. Z. Beanblossom and extension economist John C. McHaney. Government purchases through the school lunch program eased last year's situation somewhat, yet little or no profit was realized from turkey enterprises.

Feed-dealers credit sources featuring risk-sharing plans of production financing are factors which may influence farmers to continue turkey production at a higher rate during 1957, although prices received for the record 1956 crop were the lowest in several years.

The specialists says some of the pressure from the expected large crop may be relieved by current trends which are lengthening turkey sales into a yearmarketing problem of surplus production, they warn. Both national and state testing

We'll take just one more example of intimidation, an effective weapon in the hands of any efficient political boss or any dictator. Here in San Diego those terms are interchangeable.

I have talked to these men, sat with them in the Windmill Cafe, favorite haunt of Parr supporters. They eat well, dress well, have their own cars and show no signs of poverty. Yet their official pay is less than \$12.50 per week. Parr reputally makes up the difference.

I watched these men in action in Judge Laughlin's court room that hot and sleepy afternoon.

At the conclusion of the hearing Judge Laughlin ruled that one Parr man, Leopoldo Sepulveda, had lost his seat to Manuel Trevino. The election of Alberto Garcia was confirmed, but the anti-Parr forces now had a three to two weights on the site council. two majority on the city council.

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


