### 4-H Champ in Soil Conservation

Understanding and cooperating in a farm program of 4-H Soil and Water conservation brought distinction to Wilfred Kewitz, 13, of Guadalupe county, winner of the 1957 state award.

Living on a 640-acre ranch, he found that collecting and conserving rainwater was the biggest factor in raising grass for good grazing.

Wilfred helped clear brush off 95 acres which will be reseeded. The home place of 175 acres is farmed on contour and crops are rotated. Legumes are planted to break up the hardpan and let in air, thus increasing the yield of feed and grain crops.

Wilfred figures his 11 years in 4-H work have brought him more than \$20,000 cash return. He will represent his state at the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago. His trip is provided by the Firestone Tire & Rubber Co. The program is conducted by the Cooperative Extension Service.

Soil Tests Get Lawns And Gardens Off To A Good Start

College Station, December—A soil test is the first step in getting your garden or lawn off to a good start next spring.

Fertility of the right kind and amount is necessary to keep lawns growing good and to keep gardens producing plenty of good vegetables. This can be determined in a laboratory test.

Taking a soil sample for testing to determine its fertility needs is easy, said William F. Bennett, supervisor of the soil testing laboratory at Texas A. and M. College. If it is from a lawn dig about the first three inches of soil from about 10 different places, mix them together and then take about a pint to be used for testing.

If it is from a garden use the same procedure, but dig about the first six inches of soil, Bennett said. One sample normally is enough for most lawns or gardens, but if the type soil differs from one part of the lawn to another a sample from each of the various types should be taken.

A soil test cannot be used to determine whether a plant has died from root rot or some other disease, he said. Neither can the test be used to determine presence of soil insects or other effects not due to a lack of soil fertility.

After a soil sample is collected an information sheet should be obtained at the county agents' office and completed to accompany the soil sample to the Soil Testing Laboratory at Texas A. and M. College. The length of time required to test the soil sample is usually one to two weeks.

TEXAS A&M COLLEGE SYSTEM EXTENSION SERVICE MORE AND MORE WATER NEEDED WITH GROWING POPULATION

College Station, December — Expanding industry and rising standards of living require more and more water per person to satisfy the American way of life. One fourth of the population today is troubled with water shortage, poor water or both, reports the Soil Conservation Service of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

The potential supply of water remains constant while needs for human use pyramid with growing population, according to the SOS. From 1900 to 1950, while U. S. population doubled, total water use, together than for power, increased fourfold. By 1955 it was up another 21 percent from 1950.

Water needs are expected to double again by 1975. Average daily use for all purposes increased from 600 gallons per capita in 1900 to 1,700 gallon in 1950 and 1,300 in 1955. By 1975 the country will be using 1,800 gallons of water a day for every man, woman, and child.

Industry and irrigation are by far the largest users. Water problem largely watershed protection problems, says SCS, pointing out that water control and conservation cannot be separated from soil conservation.

LIME PAYS OFF FOR LAMAR COUNTY FARMER

About one-eighth the amount of lime is being used in Texas as the agricultural authorities say is needed.

Lime serves a fourfold purpose in the soil it gives the correct soil acidity, furnishes available calcium for plants and animals, increases the efficiency of manures and fertilizers and improves the growth of beneficial soil organisms.

Community Pasture Program Entries Due Before December 31st. College Station, December—Organized community or neighborhood groups in Extension Districts 4, 5, 8, 9, 10, and 11 are missing a bet if they fail to enter their group in the current community pasture improvement program, advises Reagan Brown, extension rural sociologist.

All entries must be submitted to his office by December 31. He points out that weather conditions are the eligible districts since last April 1, the starting date for keeping the community record of achievement, have been the most favorable for several years.

Objectives of the program, sponsored by the Texas Plant Food Educational Society in cooperation with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, are to increase the quantity and quality of forage for livestock through proper establishment and management, including recommended fertilization; promoting wise use of permanent pastures, range and forested lands; promote better utilization of cropland through improved cropping systems which include sod crops and to stimulate individual, family and community interest and effort in a cooperative program.

Cash awards to the top six communities in each of the eligible districts are provided by the program sponsor. Judging will be on the basis of progress made during the current year. Brown says that county agents in all of the eligible counties have complete details of the program and urge community leaders to get it entered if one has not already been submitted.

Christmas Gifts For Children

When you start shopping for toys, don't forget the age of the child you're shopping for, reminds Mrs. Eloise Johnson, extension family life specialist. It's easy to buy that electric train you never had or the bride doll that you yearned for years ago for a child that's not old enough to enjoy such a gift.

Every child should have toys which satisfy his interest in physical play, such as push and pull or wheel toys. He needs toys for constructive-creative play provided by drawing, painting or building equipment. Dolls, trains and household equipment will stimulate his imagination and help him imitate and dramatize activities he sees around him. All children over two years old also need some toys or games which encourage sharing of play activities and social play.

Wee tots will take to something that's bright colored and makes a noise. Avoid toys with sharp edges, poisonous paints, or small objects that can be swallowed.

A two year old will like the push and pull toys that make noise, too. Big blocks, balls and objects he can lift and carry, or wagons, cars and trucks just like the real ones, will help him use the muscles he is developing.

Children a little older are even more active. They like tractors, dump trucks, fire trucks, play houses, doll buggies, telephones and plastic dishes. Choose sturdy toys that will stand real wear.

Boys and girls six to eight years old enjoy trapeze bars, skates, jumping ropes, and work benches. This is the hobby age and equipment for the preferred hobby is always a good choice. Constructive and handcraft materials are always welcome, too.

Leave Crop Stubble For Wildlife

College Station, December—Game birds such as quail, doves, ducks, geese and wild turkey often have a difficult time during the winter season finding food. Ed Cooper, extension wildlife conservation specialist, suggests leaving crop stubble as long as possible after harvest as a food source for our feathered friends.

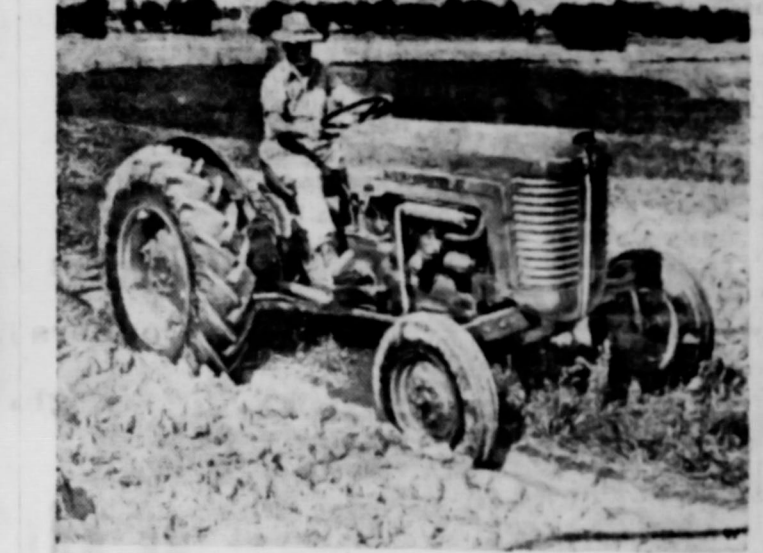
Cooper points out that crop residues plus the seed of native weeds that are available in harvested fields make one of the best food sources for game birds. But he adds, some birds, particularly quail will not utilize food in a field unless there is some cover to prote ct the f from natural enemies. Plant stubble left in the field will give this needed protection, he says. Rice, corn, grain sorghum and some other crop fields are especially good feeding areas following harvest if left undisturbed for as long as possible. Native weeds shared with a neighbor.

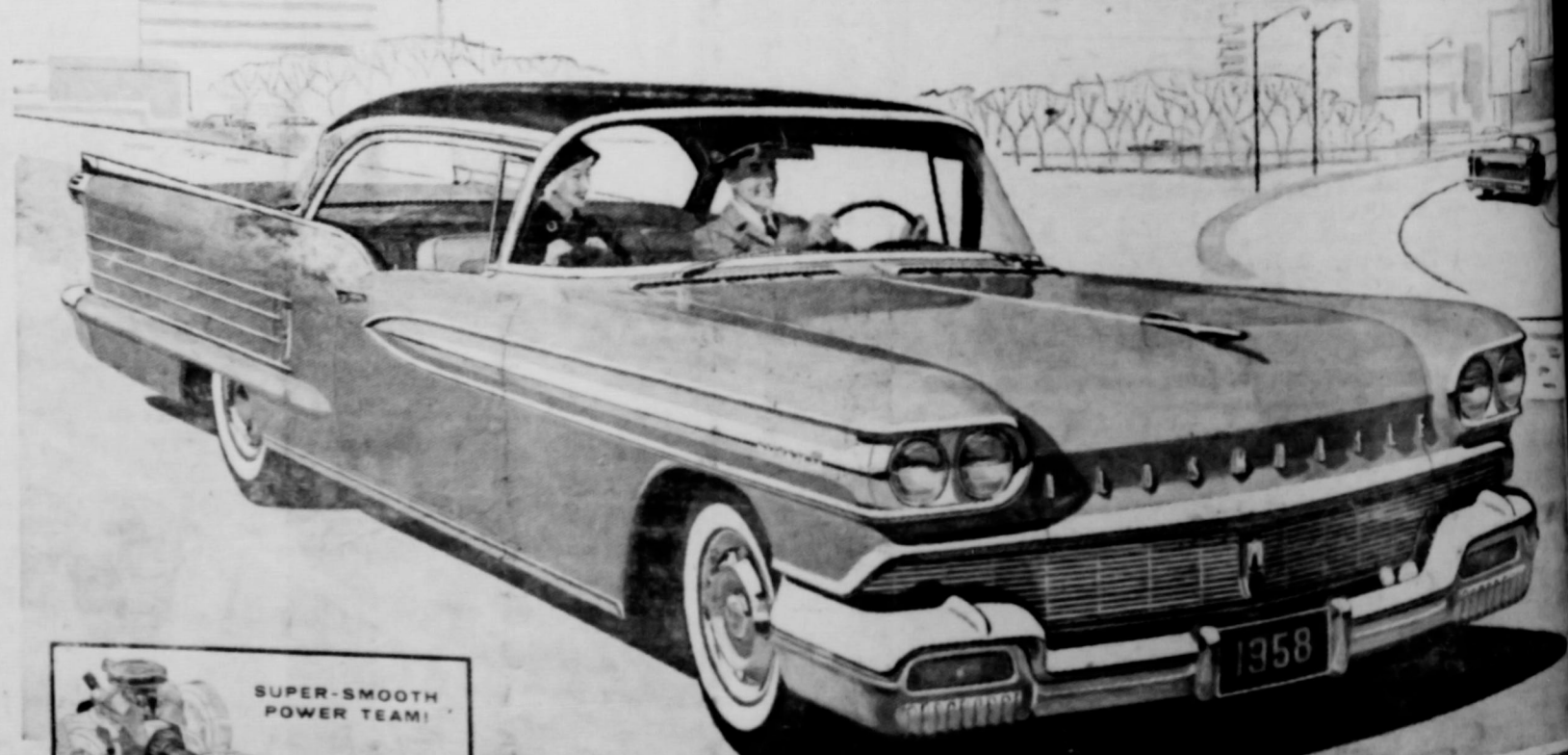

It is six years since there was good bird shooting in most parts of the Panhandle. 1950 was an excellent year and 51 wasn't far behind but since then the hunting, on the average, has been poor. From most observation the quail shooting in Hutchinson and Roberts counties is just about as poor as it was in 1952 one of the poorest years for bird hunting. Even the bird hunting is at its poorest this year 1957 is quite different from 1952 in many respects.

In 52 there was practically no food or cover for birds, whereas this year the food is really bountiful. There are more birds in the country now than then but due to the large growth of grass and weeds the birds are very difficult to locate and more difficult to hunt. Two of the large ranches in the Panhandle have privately closed the quail hunting on the respective ranches, and rightly so in my opinion, but nevertheless there are more than a dozen coveys of bobbs on each ranch. The birds on these two ranches as well as others will make the carrying plenty of fat. Weed seeds abound and there is an ample amount of green food also available. It is impossible to predict what amount of bird crop we shall have in 1958 but one thing is certain conditions are perfect and will be thru the winter for the upland game birds. In some seas the quail are more plentiful. G. H. Whitlock, of Shamrock, and two companions had little difficulty in getting their bag limit of 18 (the daily bag is twelve in the Panhandle) in two hours. The hunters flushed six coveys in that length of hunting time.

The ideal country, or native habitat, for the bob whites is Virginia. The deep south is also well adapted for quail. The Texas Panhandle is on the outer fringes of the bob white home range. Where a condition such as this exists it is typical that there are high fluctuation in game populations. When we have a good bird year, in my opinion, we have far better quail hunting than farther east. Practically the whole thing is tied up to the rainfall in this area. Haywood McDaniel and I flushed 150 bobwhite quail in exactly 1:20 minutes a few years back on the Studer ranch. We were dog training. That's birds when you can find them at the rate of more than one per minute for two hours or more. The next year I turned down \$35.00. When the bird population reaches the peak in this country the enthusiasm will also grow to the extent that a first class shooting dog will bring from one to five hundred dollars.

Now-a-days most of the dog owners, outside of a limited amount of shooting, will have to be content with some dog training and make a few field trials. Many of the dog handlers will compete at the Spring field trials near Canadian in March.

What is the most desirable Christmas gift to purchase for the outdoor sportsman? Of course it all depends on how much you wish to pay. From seventy five to one hundred and fifty dollars will buy a new shot gun. Rifles are a little less. For two dollars you can get a full year subscription to Texas Game and Fish, a monthly outdoor magazine, mailed to your friend. This magazine is sold at a strictly cost basis and is printed especially for the hunters and fishers bird and animal lovers. Mail two dollars to the Texas Game and Fish Commission, Austin, Texas and request several subscriptions for several friends.

It is just as easy to raise dogs with outstanding bloodlines, as it is to raise ordinary dogs. For the first time I am offering my opinion for stud service. This dog in my opinion has one of the best bloodlines in the Texas Panhandle if not in the USA. For example The Texas Ranger, a dog that won more championships than any other dog in the forties, is a grandfather of Tex Lester's Enjoy Wahoo, a National champ is the grandsire on the other side of the family tree. The other two sides comprises of such bloodlines as Air Pilot's Sam and Cushman Billy. The stud fee is twenty five dollars. Now is the time to raise puppies so that they will be old enough to hunt next fall.

### Social Security News For Farmers

Many farmers are probably asking themselves or others - "How long must I work to qualify for social security benefits? With social security figuring as it does in the future planning of many people, the question is a legitimate one. Actually, for those farmers who reach their 65th birthday before April 1, 1958, they are "insured" under social security if they have as much as two and one-quarter years of covered earnings in 1955, 1956, and 1957. Every farm operator whose net earnings amount to \$400 or more in a year, must report his earnings and pay the social security tax. For this he gets a full year's social security credit. If, on the other hand his net earnings from his farm self-employment are less than \$400 he neither pays the tax nor does he get credit. However, if the farm operator has earnings from any other business, these earnings may be added to his earnings from his farm operation.

For those farmers who will not reach their 65th birthday before the April first date mentioned above, or for those who have not had as many as two and one-quarter years of covered earnings in 1955, 1956 and 1957, additional periods of credit would be required. The amount of time required is roughly half the time after 1950 or all but one year of the time after 1954, and before attainment of age 65. For example a farmer attaining age 65 in the first half of 1959 would be required at least three and one quarter years of credit.

The social security program for farm operators is not voluntary. Every such farm operator with net earnings of \$400 or more must report to get credits. If he fails to file his returns and pay his tax the eventual social security benefits will be lower than they should be, or may even result in no benefits being paid.

Information concerning a farmer's tax liability should be obtained from the District Director of Internal Revenue. The Amarillo Office of the Social Security Administration will have information available concerning benefits under the program to self-employed farmers.

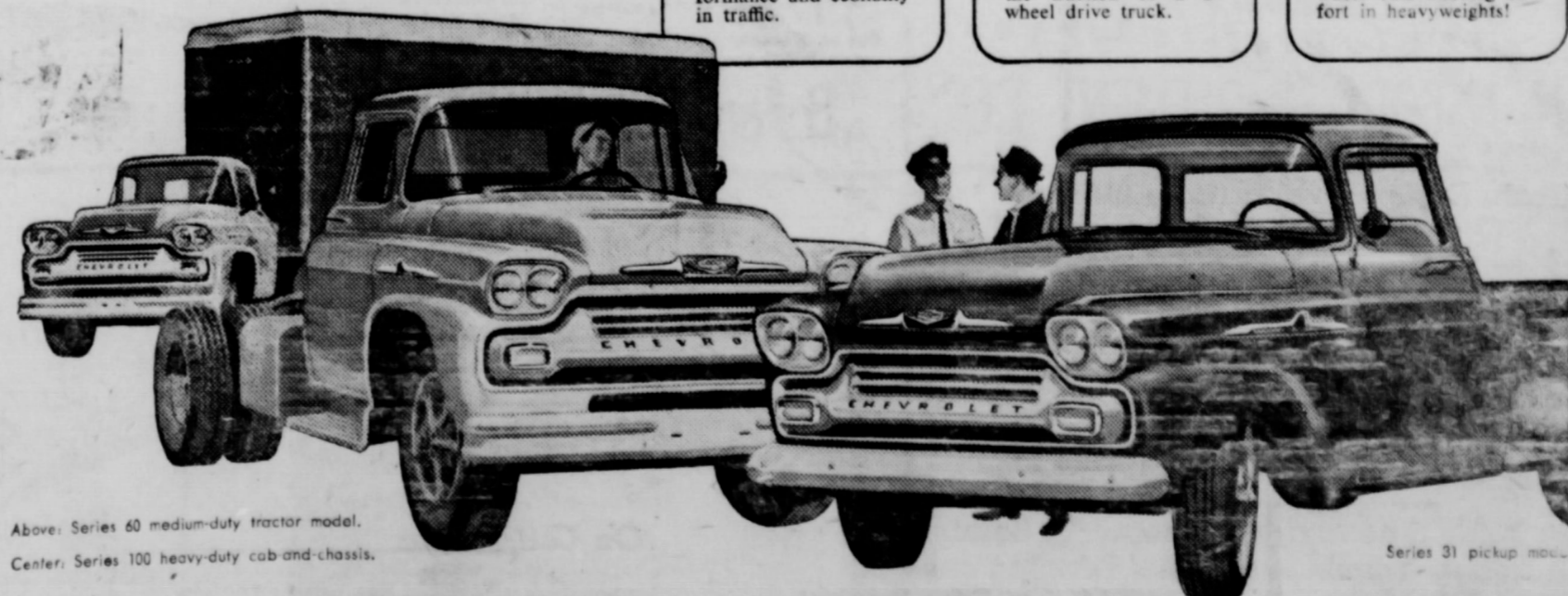

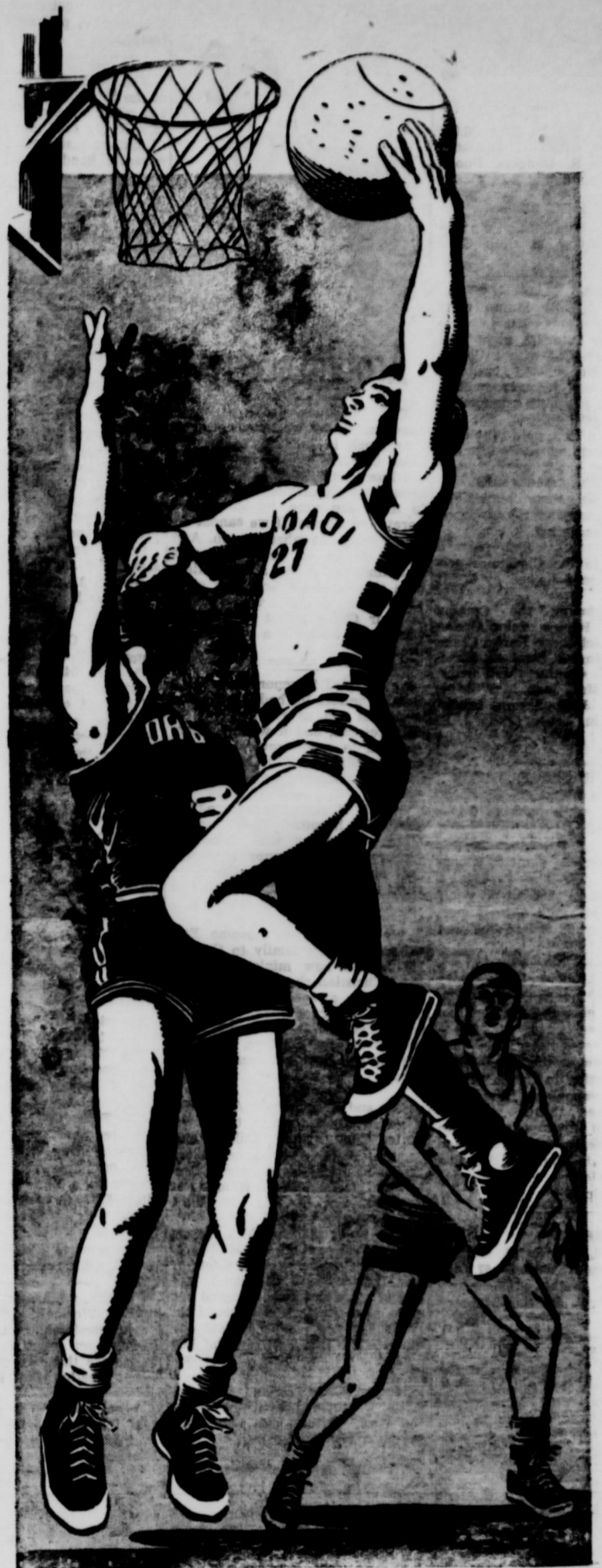
