GROSS PRODUCTS UP Price inflation amountin to two thirds of the twenty three billion rise in the value of the na tional out put last year. The production of all goods and services, called tthe "gross national product," reached an annual rate of \$427,100,000,000 in the first quarter of this year. This was an increase of 6 per cent in value over a year ago while roughly a third of the rise representing further advance WYATT ATKINS in physical volume.

TAX CHECK. Improvement in the procedures for checking tax returns, including use of complicated new machinery, and an increase in personnel assigned to examinations of returns makes for a slightly greater chance this year that your income tax return will get a detailed examination by the Internal Revenue Service. The odds are still something like 25 to 1, however , that any particular return will be audited, except for the routine check on arithmetic that almost all returns receive.


