pie fishing will be good at Stamford lake, but it is well worth a 6 hour drive to get into the swing of catching em. There is a large Power plant on the north end of the lake and the plant pumps in a stream of hot water ever minute of the day and night. There are literally millions of shad minnows and shad fish around this warm water and naturally they attract croppie, channel cat and a few bass. We found the lake entirely to muddy for bass fishing... even though we tried several hours each day. Understand that Virgil Matthews and John Berry went after a load of post up near Possum Kingdom and naturally stopped to bass fish a couple of days. They report a fair to middle catch of bass and excellent catch of croppie with minnows.

Bruce Sheets was not satisfied with croppie fishing and loaded Freda and Susan in their car and drove to Red River, N. M. Friday. He reports catching (or rather Susan and Freda catching) four trout that measured ten to 11 inches each. Sheets said the hills are plenty pretty at this time of the year.

As I measure it on my oil map the new Tom Eter oil well a little more than a mile from home base can be called a double. 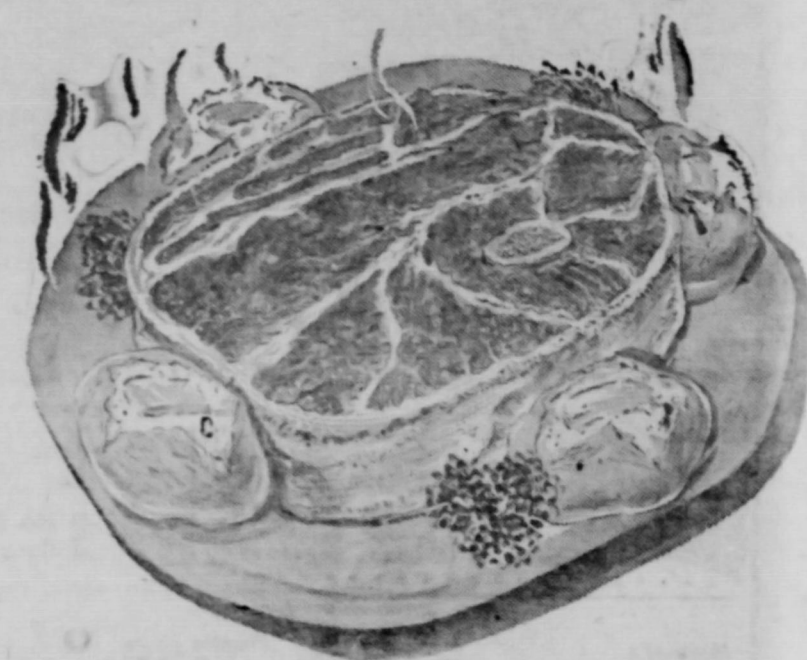

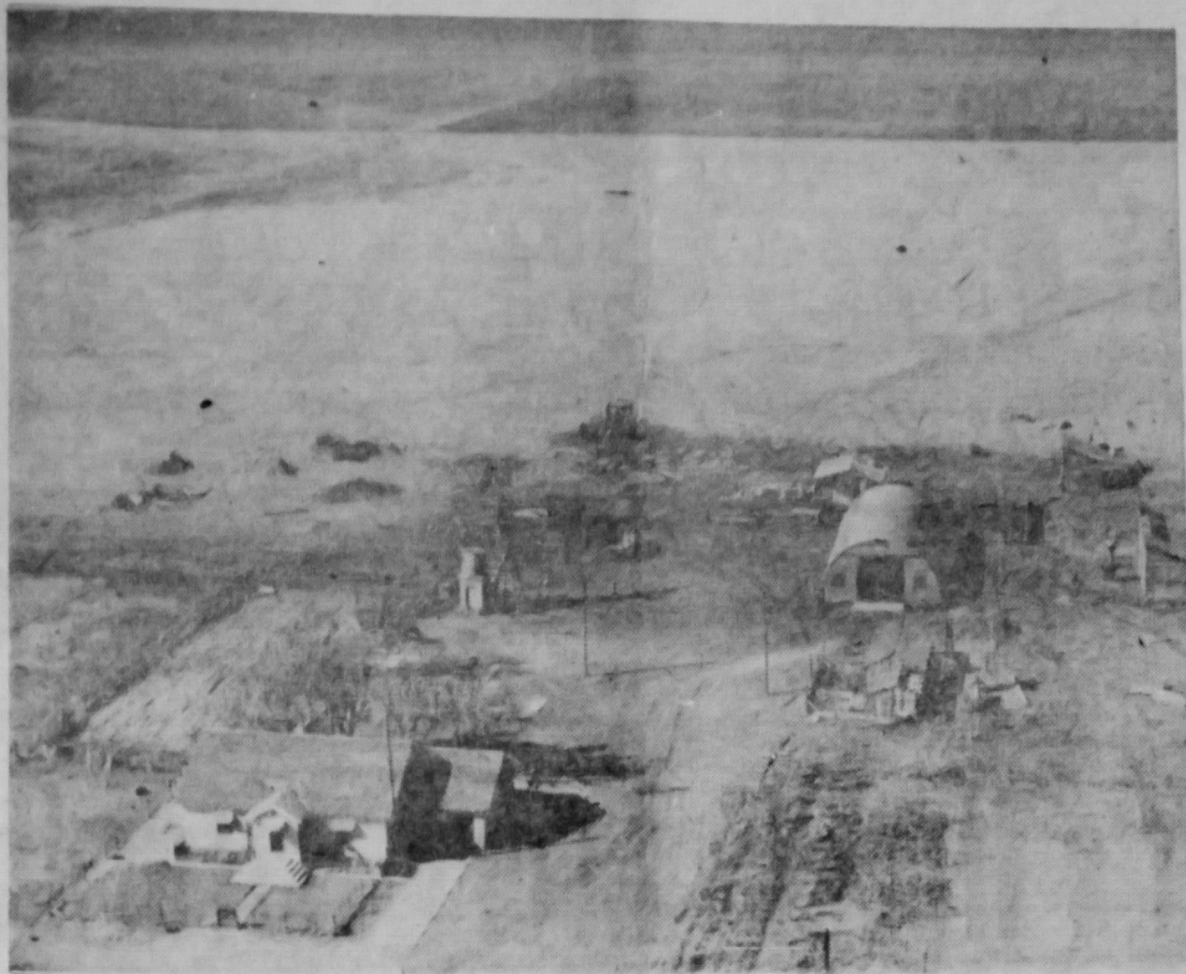

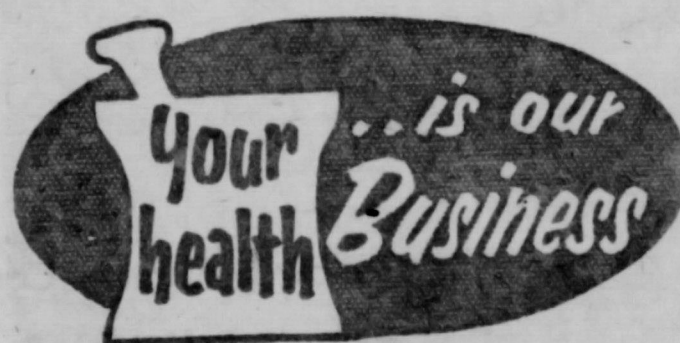

close friend, or the landowner himself and have ready access to his shooting grounds but most of the hunter must make arrangements to go upon the land. Texas has trespass laws which says that a person may not enter upon the enclosed lands of another (it doesn't need to be enclosed in the Panhandle) to either hunt or fish until he has first secured permission from the owner or the person in charge of the land. This is a good law, for without it the landowner's privileges and profits would certainly be nullified to a great extent, and his tendency might well be to discourage the existence of game on his land to rid himself of the nuisance created by trespassing. Following the passage of another law known as the shooting preserve act. This law permits the landowner to make a charge for hunting privileges on his property. He now becomes the host who may choose to welcome only the hunters who compensate him. During the last 20 years we have seen the increase of more than 4000 shooting preserves in Texas. This means that there are now approximately 5,500 ranches,

farms and marshland areas where hunting is done and where the privilege is paid for by the hunter. However, in some cases, not enough game is taken and a surplus remains. There are still a great many areas under private ownership where hunting is done by guests without charge, but approximately 300 per cent increase in the number of shooting preserves, in the last 20 years indicates that free hunting is rapidly diminishing.

The landowner remains the key person to be considered in developing improved hunting for more people in Texas. Profit motives, such as occur under the shooting preserve system, have been successful in encouraging him to protect and improve the wildlife supply on his property. No longer does he feel obligated to supply hunting to his friends, and neighbors and city visitors without compensation.

The enjoyment of the outdoors thru hunting is a prized American heritage. Nearly a million Texas citizens go hunting each year. To most of them it is a principle of outdoor recreation. To perpetuate this privilege is to keep a large segment of people stronger, healthier, and happier. It may well be a responsibility to those in charge to the lands to extend hunting privileges to as many as possible. Apparently there are enough hunters willing to pay for this privilege.

Another recent form of hunting is afforded by the shooting resorts. A shooting resort is a place where pen-raised birds are turned loose shortly before the old-time hunter who is accustomed to pursuing game in the wild this may seem like an unpalatable dish. To those who have tried it, it seems to take well enough. At least in this air-conditioned, push-button age, it is on a rapid increase. The hunter knows that when he goes out he will find targets to shoot; his walk will not be too long for tiring; and he usually has service so attentive as to satisfy his ever-comfort. This type of hunting is often referred to as "put and take" shooting; in other words put it out before daylight and take it before sundown. It may surprise those of you who are learning of this type of hunting for the first time to know that you may be the next to try it, for many very seasoned hunters have recently experienced a day at shooting resorts and returned to express their delight.

Public hunting grounds do exist in Texas, but they are quite limited indeed. The acquisition of lands for such purpose, and the operations of such lands, is a full discussion of its own. In the meantime, directing our attention to full development of hunting potentials on private lands will pay good dividends.

Last Call For Submitting Application For Refund on Federal Gas Tax

College Station. — September Farmers and ranchmen are reminded by C. H. Bates extension farm management specialist, that September 30 is the deadline for submitting applications for a refund of the Federal tax on gasoline used for farming purposes since July 1, 1956.

Farm operators who have not filed a claim may obtain Form 2240 reporting form from local county agricultural agents or Internal Revenue Service offices.

Bates points out that claims will be checked for accuracy and claims, therefore, should be certain that figures are correct. Sufficient records should also be kept to verify the claim, he adds. Claims should be submitted to the same district Internal Revenue office to which income tax returns are sent.

The legislation which makes possible the refund was passed by Congress in the spring of 1956.

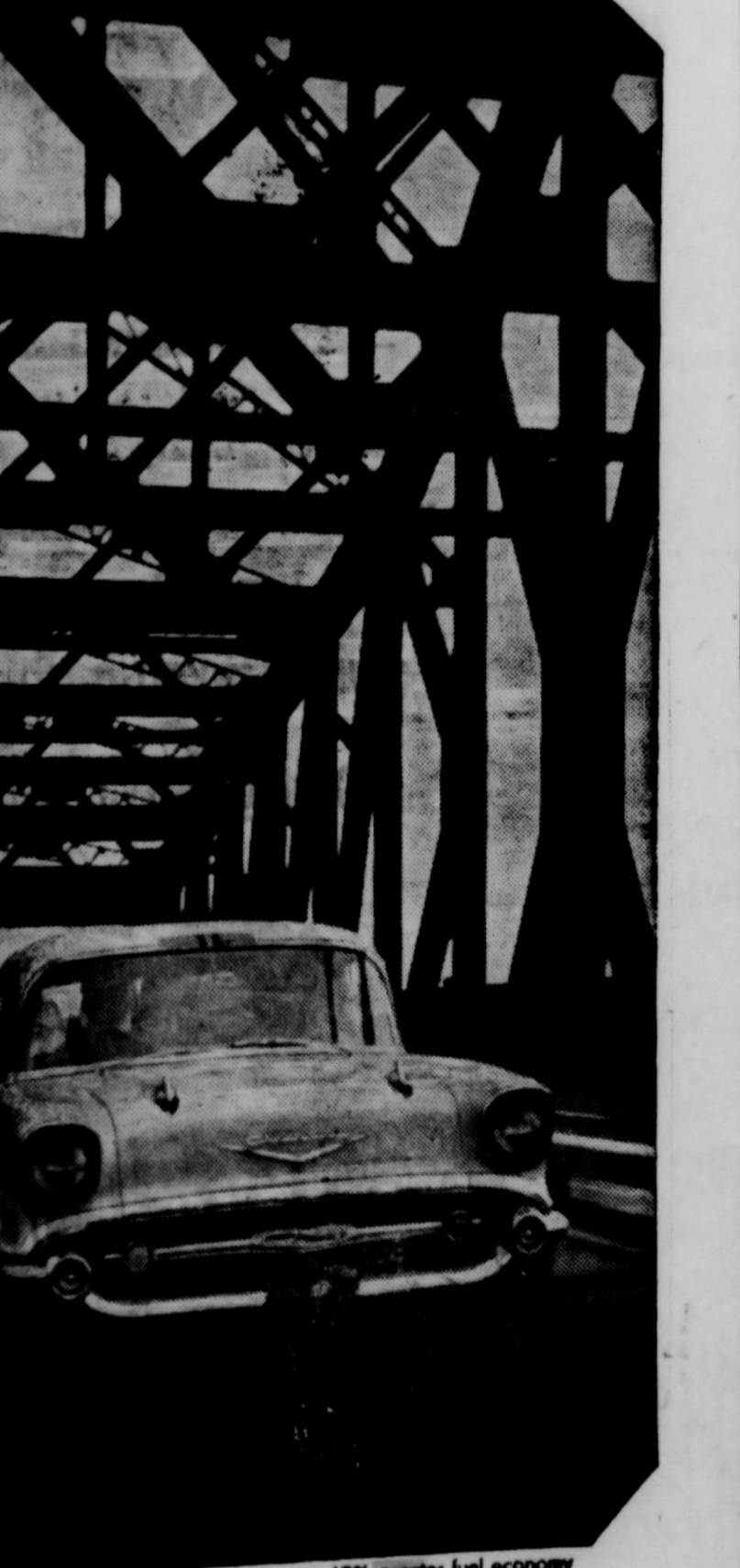

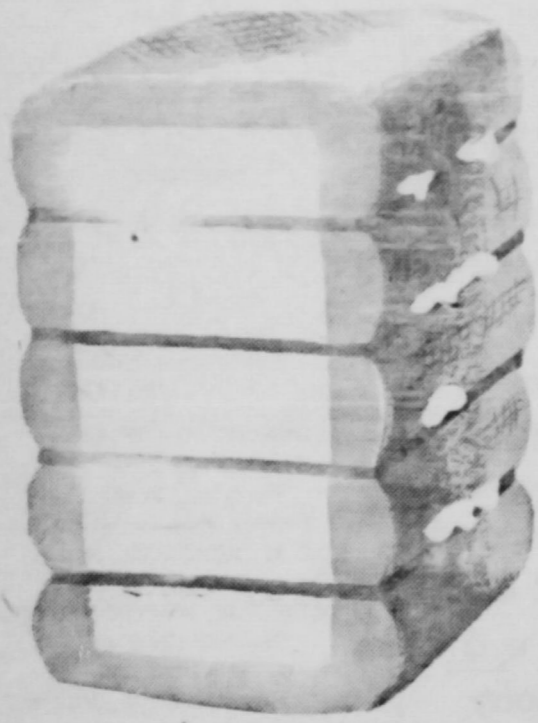

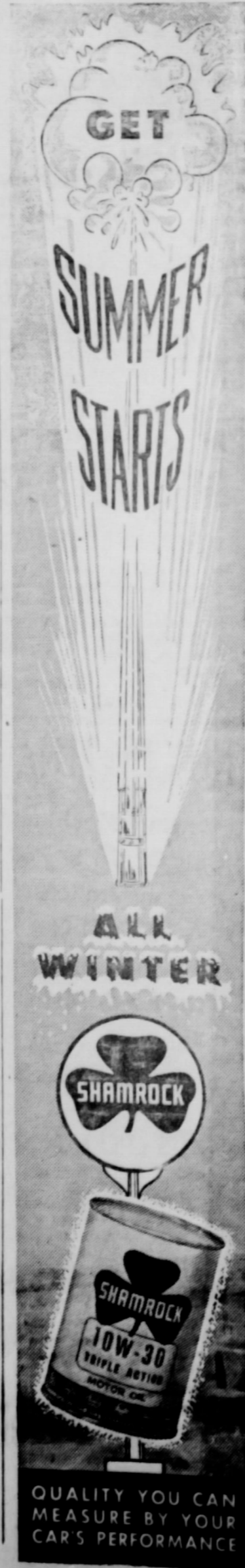
