Spearman Woman Is Charged With Attempted Bank Robbery at Pampa

ried over the radio Saturday and in daily newspapers of this area Sunday, Mrs. Edna Gail Jentzen of Spearman, is charged with an attempt to rob a large Pampa, Texas bank Saturday of last

The story printed below was carried in the Borger Daily Herald Sunday morning.

A nervous lady from Spearman, who tried to rob a bank in Pampa Saturday morning, returned to the alleged scene of her crime a few minutes after bungling the job and was pointed out to police by a cool cash-

She gave her legal name as Mrs. Edna Gail Jentzen, although she said she was known as the wife of Jack Emory in Spearman. According to investigating officers. Mrs. Jentzen said she had been living with Emory for about a year, although the couple was not married. The 34 year old woman has

two sons age 15 and 10 years. She gave her home address as 212 Main street in Spearman. Mrs. Jentzen's husband was killed in 1954 at Port Lavaca in an industrial accident. Her escapade started Saturday

morning in Spearman as she left on a shoping tour of the North Plains. Her first stop was in Borger, where she bought some clothes with a check at the J.

where she entered the First National Bank shortly before noon. She handed teller Mrs. Hugh Shotwel a deposit slip for \$25. but failed to sign it.

When Mrs. Shotwell asked her to sign the slip, the heavy-built woman told her to read a note on the back of the paper. The teller' said the note read as fol-

"Give me five minutes. Give me all the fives tens and twenties and larger bills. Do not look up. Do not call.

Mrs. Shotwell looked up despite the warning. "Did you ring the alarm?" asked the daring lady.

"Yes, and they'll be here in just a minute," replied Mrs. Shotwell, standing her ground. The woman then grabbed the note and waked out of the bank. Two bank employes, Don Alston and Adell Myers, followed her for about two blocks but lost

sight of the woman as she hurried on. Mrs. Jentzen said later she walked into a clothing store, browsed a while, and then returned to the area of the bank at the corner of Cuyler and

Foster Streets. Meanwhile the bank was flooded with police officers. Two were questioning Mrs. Shotwell for a description of the woman when the teller stopped suddenly to

look out the window. "There she is," said Mrs. Shotwell, pointing out Mrs. Jantzen as she passed by. Mrs. Jantzen was nabbed on the spot. No gun nor other evidence was found on her person, although Mrs. Jantzen allegedly admitted the rob-

bery attempt. As FBI agent from Amarillo was called immedfiately to handle the case. By late Saturday night, Mrs. Jantzen was still in custoday of the Pampa Police Department without charge while the FBI continued its investigation. She was not asked to make

a formal statement at this time. Bond was made for Mrs. Jantzen Monday afternoon and she has moved to the home of her sister in Amarillo. We learn from relatives that a Federal heoring will be had in her case, and this writer sincerey hopes that Mrs. Jentzen's unfortunate mistake will not penalize her future life and that of the two fine



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

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

The purpose of the laws creating the defense department was to unify all the services so there could be a full coordination of effort. The evidence at hand would make it appear that such has not been realized. Under the circumstances, it would seem to me that the early days of the coming session of Congress should produce a full, complete and thorough investigation, to the end that the results sought in the unification act might be a reality rather than a figure of speech. Jealousy of jurisdiction or pride of authorship in an individual or a small group of individuals, can be a very dangerous thing when the security
