HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 97 proposing an amendment to Sub-section (a) of Section 42 of the Constitution of the State of Texas...

Section 1. That Sub-section (a) of Section 42, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read hereafter as follows: "Section 42. (a) The Legislature shall have the authority to levy taxes to provide a State Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the officers and employees of the State...

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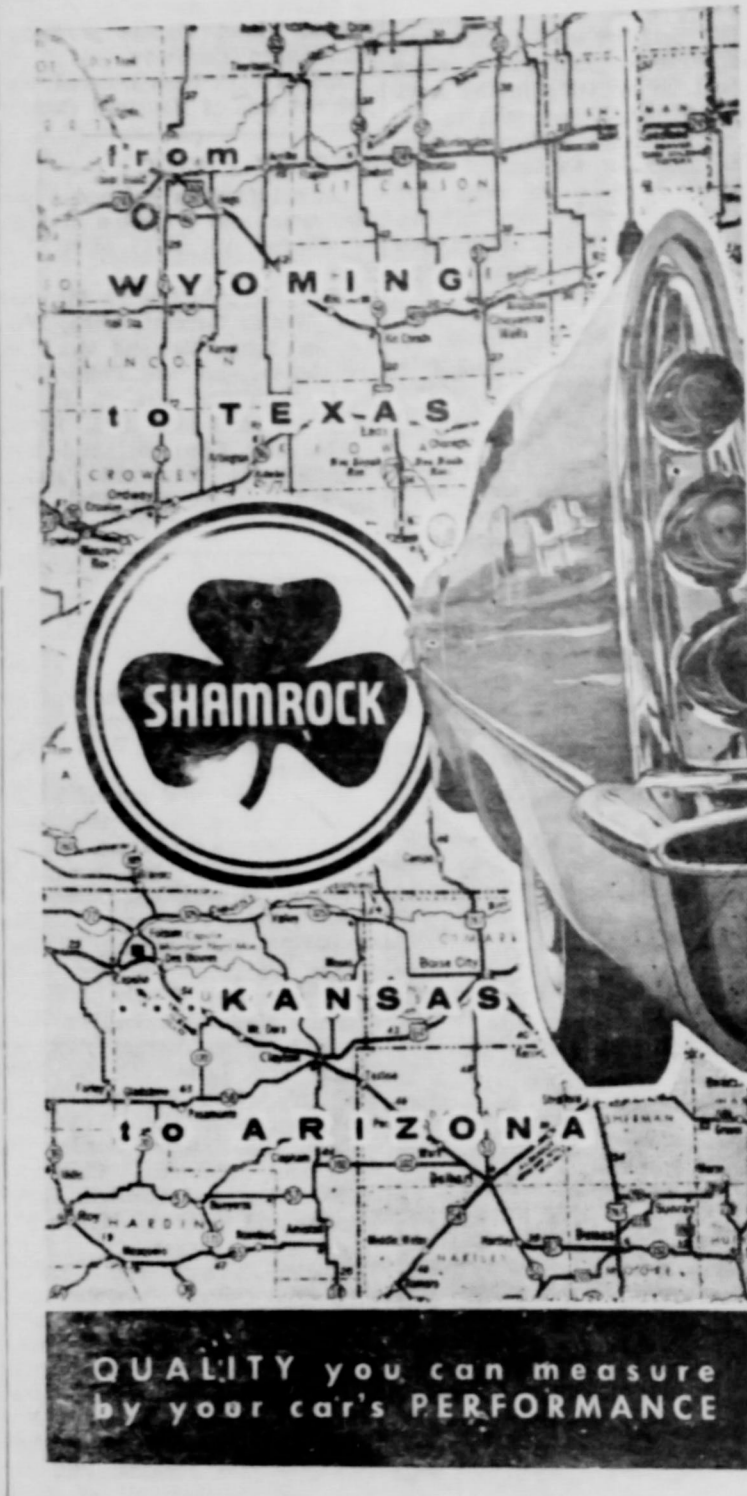

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1957.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 100 proposing an amendment to Article III, Section 51a of the Constitution of the State of Texas...

Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows: "Section 51a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions hereinafter contained, such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be by the Legislature deemed expedient for assistance to and for the payment of assistance to:

(1) Needy aged persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years, providing that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state-supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the one (1) year immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application, provided that the maximum payment per month from state funds shall not be more than Twenty-five Dollars (\$25) per person, and provided further that no payment in excess of Twenty-one Dollars (\$21) shall be paid out of state funds to an individual until an estate such additional amounts are matched by the Federal Government...

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1957.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 101 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas to create the Texas Water Development Board to provide for the issuance of bonds to certain political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas...

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 49-c as follows: "Section 49-c. There is hereby created as an agency of the State of Texas the Texas Water Development Board to exercise such powers as necessary under the provisions of this article with such other duties and restrictions as may be prescribed by law. The qualifications, composition and number of members of said Board shall be determined by law. They shall be appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate in the manner and for such terms as may be prescribed by law. "The Texas Water Development Board shall have the authority to provide for issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000). The Legislature of Texas, upon two-thirds (2/3) vote of the elected Members of each House, may authorize the Board to issue additional bonds in an amount not exceeding One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000). The bonds authorized herein or permitted to be authorized by the Legislature shall be called "Texas Water Development Bonds" and shall be secured in such form, denominations and upon such terms as may be prescribed by law, provided however that the bonds shall not bear more than four per cent (4%) interest per annum; they may be issued in such installments as the Board finds feasible and practical in accomplishing the purpose set forth herein. "All moneys received from the sale of State bonds shall be deposited in a fund hereby created in the State Treasury to be known as the Texas Water Development Fund to be administered (without further appropriation) by the Texas Water Development Board in such manner as prescribed by law. "Such fund shall be used only for the purpose of sinking or making funds available upon such terms and conditions as the Legislature may prescribe, and provided further, that the total amount of money to be expended out of state funds for such assistance to the needy aged, needy blind and needy children shall never exceed the sum of Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) per year. "The Legislature shall enact appropriate laws to make the recipients of aid hereunder available for assistance. "Supplementing legislative appropriations for assistance herein authorized by this section, the following sums are allocated out of the Omnibus Tax Commission Fund and are appropriated to the State Department of Public Welfare for the period beginning December 1, 1957 and ending August 31, 1959: Four Million, Nine Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$4,900,000) for Old Age Assistance (One Hundred Seventy-Five Thousand Dollars (\$175,000) for Aid to the Blind, and Five Hundred Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$525,000) for Aid to Dependent Children. Such allocations are appropriations to be made available on the basis of equal monthly installments and other wise shall be subject to the provisions of currently existing laws making allocations and appropriations for these purposes. "Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of Texas at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the day of November 5, 1957, at which election there shall be printed on such ballot the following issues: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment increasing the limit on the maximum monthly payment to needy aged persons from state funds from Twenty Dollars (\$20) per month to Twenty-five Dollars (\$25) per month subject to certain conditions for payment in excess of Twenty-one Dollars (\$21) per month and on the total yearly expenditure out of state funds for assistance to needy aged, needy blind and needy children from Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) per year to Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) per year, and allocating and appropriating additional sums supplementing current legislative appropriations for payment of assistance grants." "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment increasing the limit on the maximum monthly payment to needy aged persons from state funds from Twenty Dollars (\$20) per month to Twenty-five Dollars (\$25) per month subject to certain conditions for payment in excess of Twenty-one Dollars (\$21) per month and on the total yearly expenditure out of state funds for assistance to needy aged, needy blind and needy children from Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) per year to Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) per year, and allocating and appropriating additional sums supplementing current legislative appropriations for payment of assistance grants." "Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election, and this Amendment shall be published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

More Information About The Mystery Farm Owned By Mr. And Mrs. Ownbey

After we had printed the Mystery story last week, relatives to the Robert and Jenna C. Ownbey farm, we received the detailed information thru the mail from Robert. There are a few facts that we did not include in the page story of the Mystery farm and we are rewriting the story here for more details.

The farm has been in the possession of the Ownbey family for two generations. It was first settled in 1900 by Jim and Mrs. Jim Ownbey. It was one of the first farms settled in this area and in Hutchinson county. Mrs. Robert Ownbey was the former Jenna V. Stephenson, and she and Robert were married November 10th, 1941. The names of the children are: Nancy Jenna, age 12; Jimmie Stephens, age 10; Robert Faye, age 9.

Mr. and Mrs. Ownbey are members of the Methodist church. Robert is a member of the Masonic order in Hutchinson county, a member of the Khiva Temple at Amarillo and a member of the Hansford County Shrine club. Both Robert and Jenna V. are members of the Eastern Star organization. Both are members of the Borger Knife and Fork Club and also the Farm Bureau organization. Mrs. Ownbey is a member of the Executive Board of the Hutchinson County Girl Scouts, and a leader on the local unit of Girl Scouts. She is a member of the Methodist Board of Missions. Robert is a Potentiate Aide for the Khiva Temple and a Campbell Header in the Shrine organization. Both are former newspaper reporters and Mrs. Ownbey is Past Vice President of the Texas Women's Press Association.

Robert operates 14 sections of land, one half dry land and half hay and grass, and normally handles a herd of steers from 400 to 500 head. His favorite crops are: wheat, maize and small grains.

His method of tillage is rotation, Summer fallow and the usual livestock program.

Farm Income Still Lags

College Station, August—Agricultural prices and income have not enjoyed the rises that some segments of our economy have in recent years because of surpluses or lack of larger markets. Prices received by farmers have increased only 1.3 percent over those of May 1956. But prices paid by farmers have increased 3.5 percent and parity ration in May stood at 82 compared to 84 in May 1956, says John McHaney, extension economist. Consumer disposable income in the first quarter of 1957 was more than 5 percent above a year ago; due mainly to increases in wages and salaries. Too, the cost of living stood a few percentage points higher than a year ago, says McHaney.

General business activity looks good for the rest of 1957. Business outlays for new plants and equipment during the first 9 months of 1957 will be about 9 percent larger than those for the same period in 1956. Apparently, businessmen are generally optimistic about their future sales prospects.

But the economist says that we should not overlook the fact that consumer credit outstanding in May was 7.3 percent greater than in May 1956; in some industries, inventories remain large relative to sales; output of durable goods and autos dropped 4 and 14 percent respectively from December 1956 to May 1957; and steel mill activity has declined from around 100 percent of rated capacity in the fourth quarter of 1956 to a low of 84 in mid-May. There was a pick up to 88 percent of capacity in mid-June but the usual decline is expected in July and August, points out McHaney.

Agricultural exports through April of the 1956-57 fiscal year were estimated at \$4 billion—an increase of 43 percent over a year ago. Cotton exports were about 7.5 million bales, compared to 2.2 million in 1955-56. Combined exports of grain and feed showed an increase of nearly 50 percent for the fiscal year 1956-57 despite a decline in sorghum grain and barley. Wheat exports through April were 82 percent over last year and rice exports during July 1956-April 1957 totaled 22.6 million bags compared with 9.2 million during the 10 months ending April 1956. Exports of fats and oils have been running a fifth higher than last year. Most export grains are due primarily to government export programs, added Mc Haney.

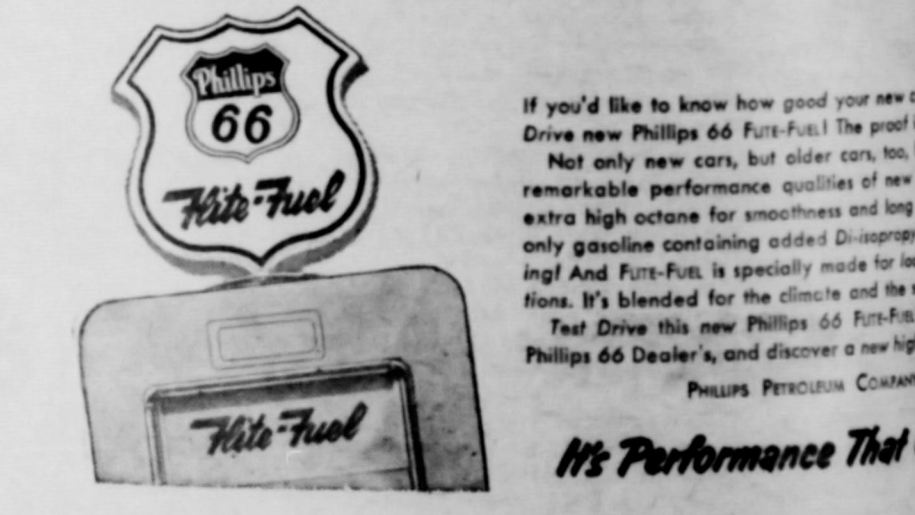

Turkey flocks infested with external parasites will require extra feed for finishing and are sure to be discounted at market time, warns Extension Poultry Husbandman Ben Wormeli. He urges turkey producers to make regular checks of their flocks and to keep them free of parasites.
Fish can't live without oxygen. At this season of year, says Ed Cooper, extension wildlife specialist, oxygen depletion in farm ponds often cause fish to die. Cooper suggests that fish pond owners secure from their local county agent a copy of B-213, Farm Fish Ponds, for information on summer pool management.
Two recent publications released by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service should be of much interest to rice and turkey producers. They are L-340, Rice Diseases and L-341, Ornithosis in Turkeys. They may be obtained from local county agents or the Agricultural Information Office, College Station, Texas.

Texas beef producers are reminded that the annual Beef Cattle Short Course will be held at Texas A & M College, August 12-14. Major emphasis during the meeting will be placed on reproductive performance, fertility of beef bulls and estimating carcass characteristics of live cattle. Other items of great value to the state's beef cattle industry will also be discussed. Interested cattlemen are invited.

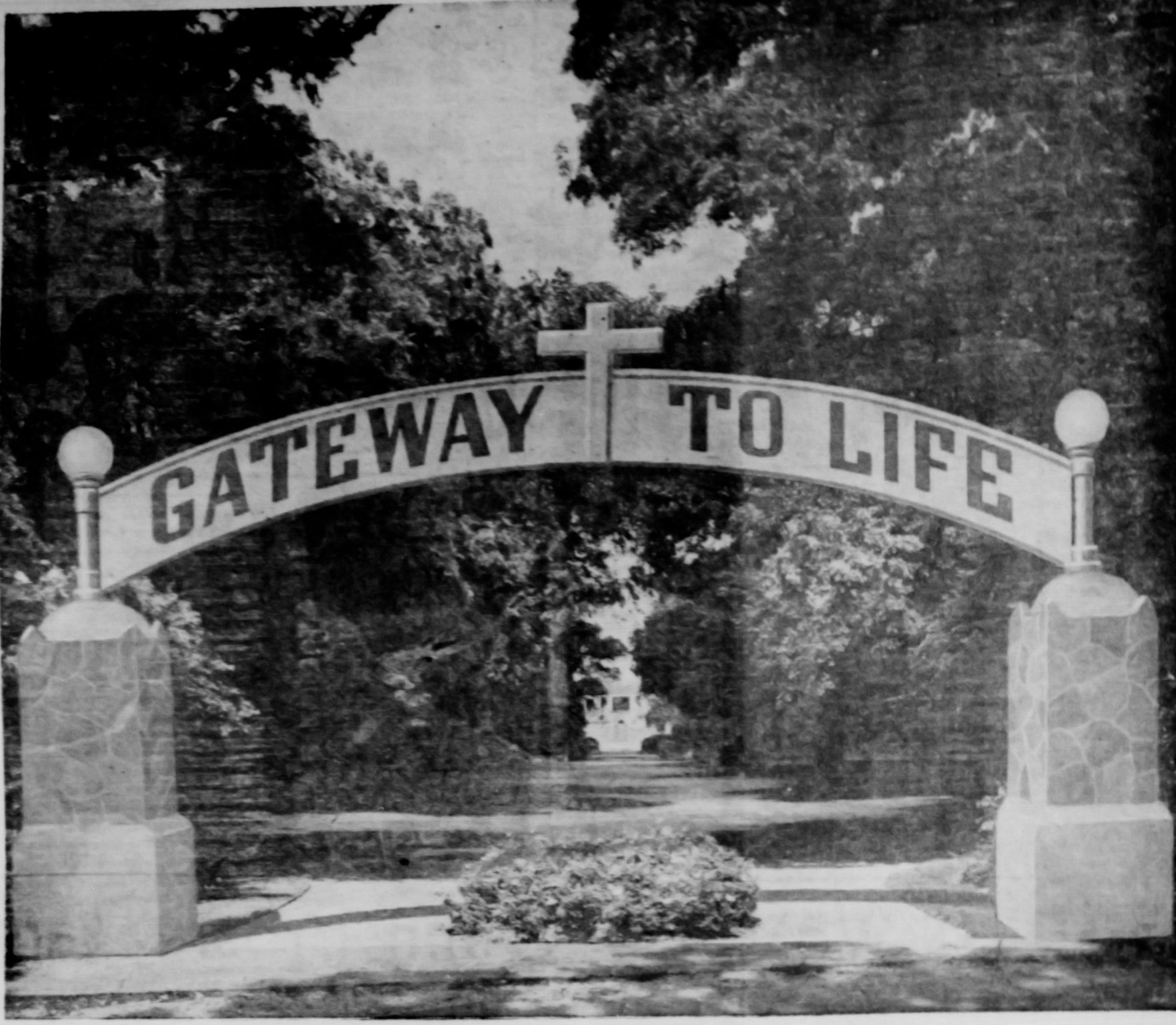

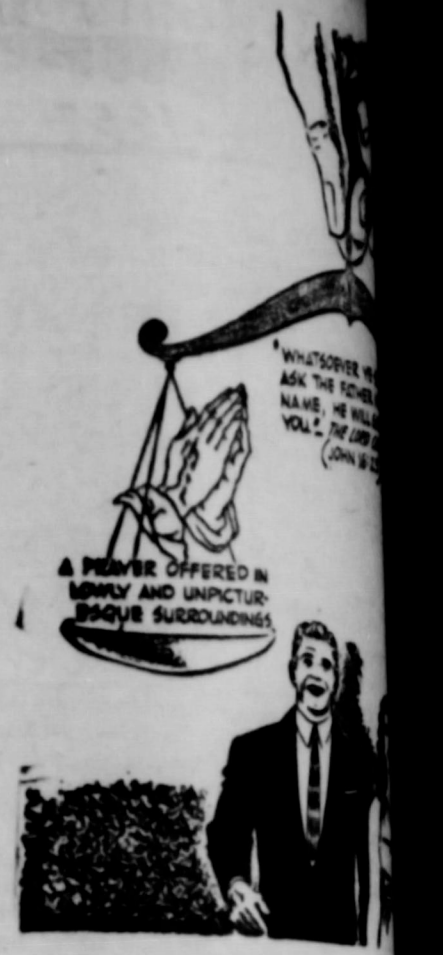
