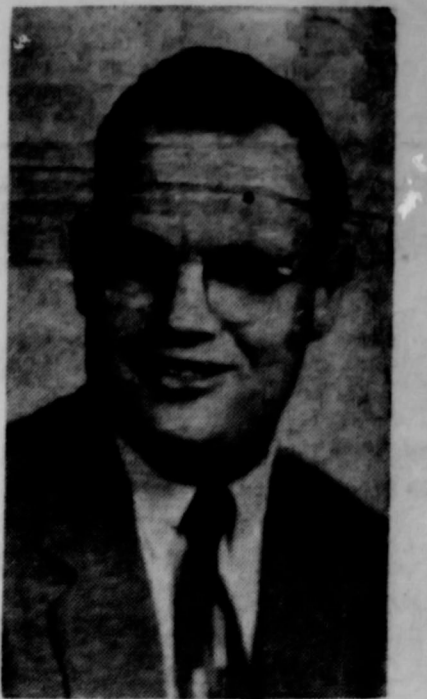

Report Beetles In 1958 Wheat

Flea beetles have been reported in several wheat fields North of Gruver, but there is nothing to be alarmed about unless the infestation is unusually high. In one field considerable damage has resulted because of building up of Flea Beetles.

The flea beetle is a shiny black beetle not much larger than a flea and jumps like one when disturbed. They are usually present on wheat fields all the time but not in great numbers. Buildups occur when conditions are favorable and are likely to build up in low places when water has stood and in patches of weeds. This tiny insect damages the wheat blade.

When the beetles develop in sufficient numbers to warrant chemical control, 2 or 3 oz. of Aldrin or one pound of DDT or 1.5 lbs of Toxaphane per acre will give good control. This insect may be controlled by spot treatment when first found.

They are not likely to cause much trouble but the farmers should be alerted and check his wheat. For additional information contact your county agent.

AMARILLO, Texas — A field day to show research on Panhandle agriculture will be held at the Southwestern Great Plains Field Station, formerly the Amarillo Experiment Station, Thursday October 10, beginning at 9:00 a. m. It is located at Bushland, about 12 miles west of Amarillo.

Much of the day will be devoted to tours through test plots of grain sorghum varieties and hybrid irrigation of grain sorghum fertilization, chemical weed control in connection with summer fallow, and soil and water conservation practices.

Staff members at the station will lead discussions on the various phases of research. County agricultural agents will conduct the tours.

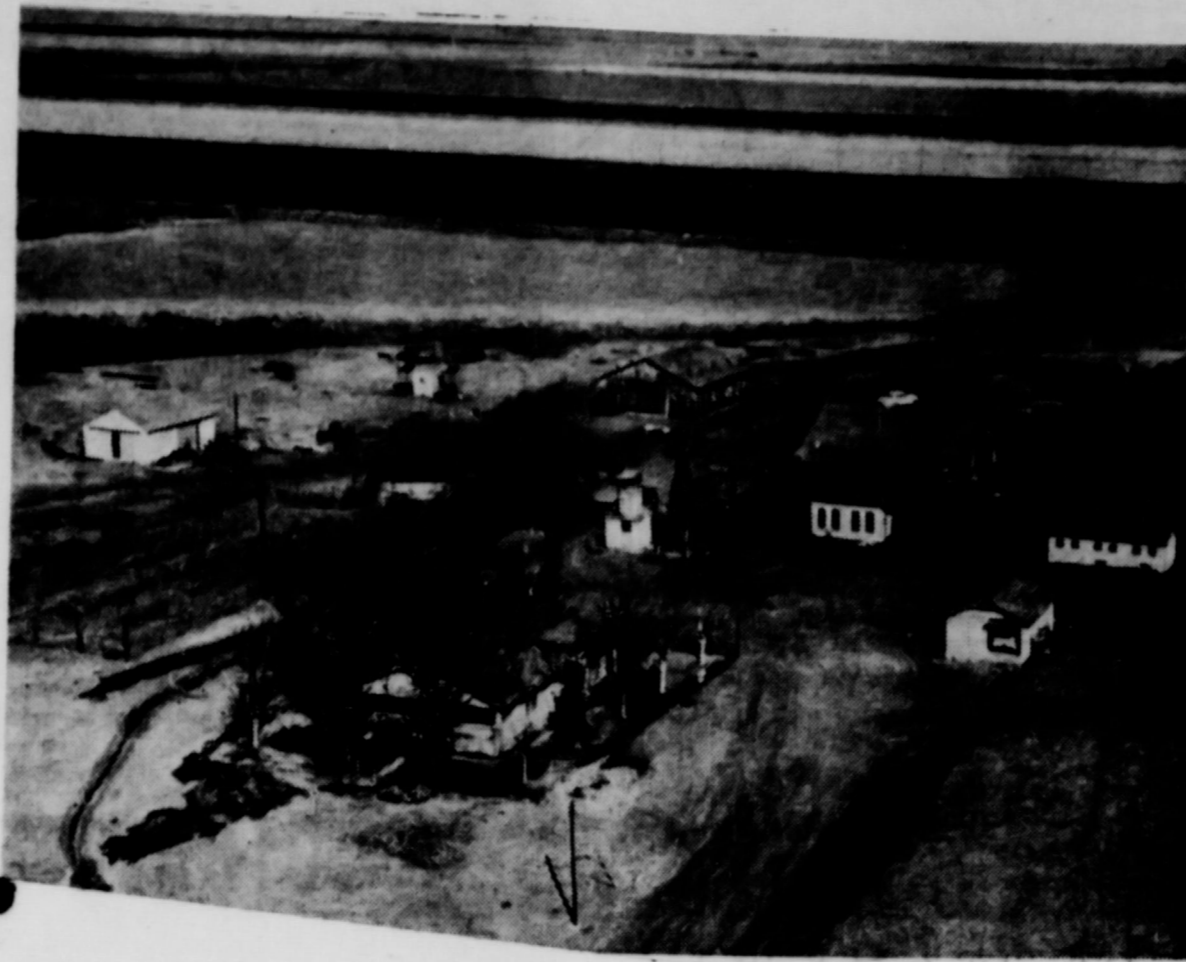

Taken from Schoolastic Teacher When Anne Sullivan entered the Keller house in 1887, she had formed to open the world of understanding to a deaf and dumb child. 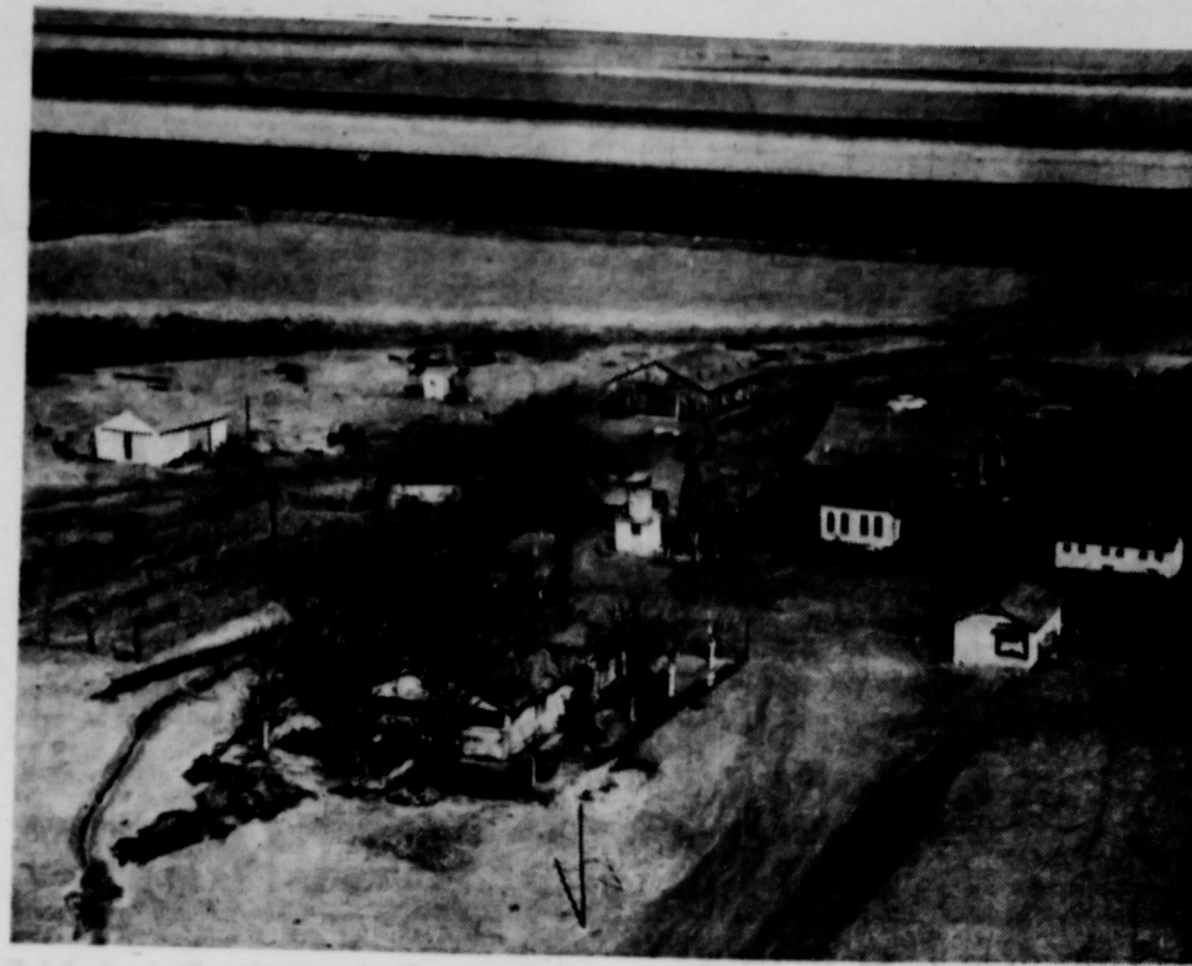

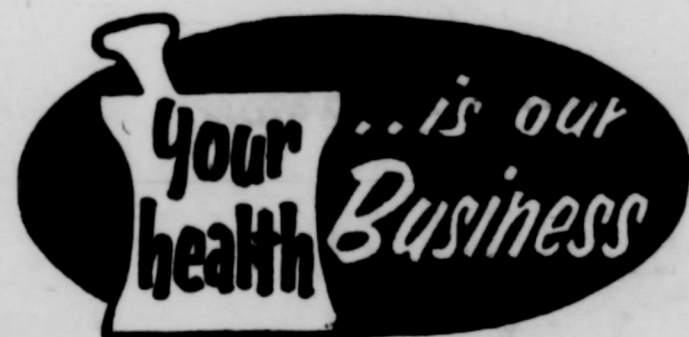

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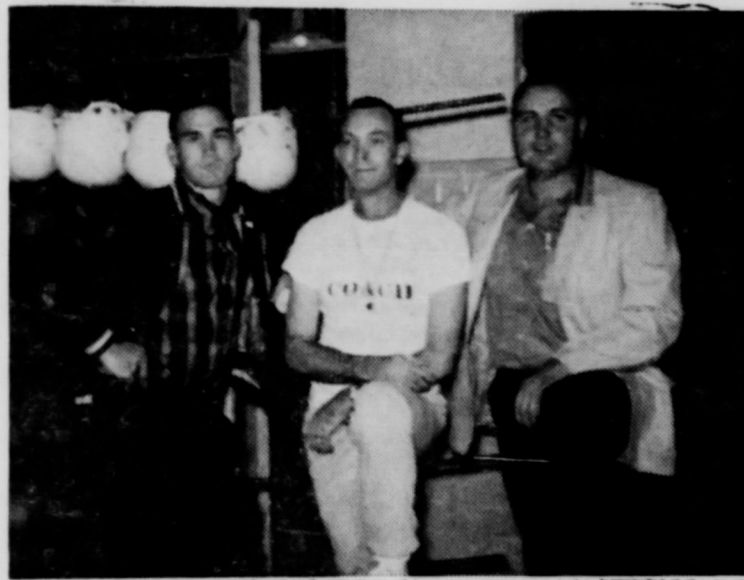
