#### Report Beetles In 1958 Wheat

Flea beetles have been reported in several wheat fields North of Gruver, but there is nothing to be alarmed about unless the infestation is unusually high. In one field considerable damage has resulted because of building up of Flea

The flea beetle is a shiny black beetle not much larger than a flea and jumps like one when disturb-Mrs. Ruth Womble on Monday of this week at the First Christian wheat fields all the time but not in great numbers. Build\_ups occur when conditions are favorable and are likely to buildup on low places when water has stood and in patches of weeds. tiny insect damages the wheat

> When the beetles develop in sufficient numbers to warrant chemical control, 2 or 3 oz. of Aldrin or one pound of DDT or 1.5 lbs of Toxaphane per acre will give good control. This insect may be controlled by spot treatment when first found.

They are not likely to cause much trouble but the farmers should be alerted and check his wheat. For additional information contact your county agent.
