

An important part of this job is done in advance by our own agriculture department, by collecting data on planted acreage, weather, crop damage and other factors that affect yield. These statistics provide useful information for


farmers, elevator operators and others interested in grain movements, and assist us in spotting graintight boxcars at strategic points at harvest time.
