It points up why we need to manage properly one of our most valuable natural resources-grass. Through range judging the importance of native grasses and plants can be better understood

Range judging can be practiced all over the state. It is a means by which the contestant becomes familiar with grasses, weeds, trees, soils and the reactions of land. Any person can participate. In West Texas the land user manages for highest grass production; while in East Texas, highest production and greatest income is derived from multiple use-grazing and timber. In different areas of the state the grazing periods have to be adjusted to the growth stage of native vegetation. Unless all these points for the local area are known, one cannot obtain good



PANHANDLE OUT DOOR LIFE

by s. v. whitehorn The fall 1957 Panhandle antelope hunt swung into action with a bang when the game fell on some ranchers while on others it swung into action with a dozen or more bangs and no game fell. Some game dropped and had to be followed up for a few yards to miles. An antelope can carry more lead than any animal its weight according to the reports from some of the hunters. In the past it was comparatively simple to bag a buck but this year, in many cases it took a bonified hunter to drop a fast traveling buck. A. R. Minton, Borger hunter, stated the other morning in the De-Sota hotel coffee shop that some had stated that shooting a buck antelope was about like shooting a cow-according to some people. "Well it's not like shooting a cow, I could have killed a hundred cows but I haven't killed a buck yet". Mr. Winton first day of the hunt assisting other hunters and that it took plenty of cooperation for the hunters to bag their game. When a hunter checks in at a ranch he has many questions to ask for the simple reason that he first needs to know where he is. Is this the Middlewater ranch? How far in this direction, he asked, can you go? Are there many bucks on the ranch? Where are the boundries of the ranch? How can you determine where your ranch stops and another starts? Most of these questions if not all are up to the Game and Fish Commission personnel. They are the middle men. They are there to assist any hunter in the hunt. In more than one case
