## Clean Up Campaign Planned In City

### Kick-Off Breakfast Held At Steak House Tuesday Morning

Members of the Chamber of Commerce and City officials met for a six o'clock breakfast at the Spearman Steak House Tuesday morning to formulate plans for a City-wide Clean-up, Fix-up and Paint-up campaign.

Discussion at the meeting indicated that all property owners would be notified of the campaign, and would be asked for suggestion as to how a successful campaign could be staged. Out-of-town owners are especially urged to make suggestions, with the idea that vacant lots MUST be kept moved and free of weeds and trash.

Mayor Bruce Sheets will publish a proclamation in the next issue of the Reporter designating the dates for the city-wide program. Anyone that has a suggestion is urged to talk with Mayor Sheets or with City Manager Leo Dacus, or Bill Ballenger, manager of the Spearman Chamber of Commerce.

### Blood Typing Free Service

All residents of Hansford County will be benefited by the services of Hansford County Hospital who is offering the free service of blood typing, beginning May 6, according to Mr. Bob Vaughn, Hospital Manager.

Pre-registration is necessary to have your blood typed and will be handled by the Civil Defense Committee of the Home Demonstration Council, Mrs. Frank Davis, Chairman.

Anyone wishing to have their blood typed may register by contacting Mrs. Frank Davis or members of her committee: Mrs. Sam Watsak, Spearman; Mrs. Pete Cator, Morse; Mrs. J. L. Bryan, Spearman; Mrs. Bernard Barnes, Spearman or by phoning or contacting Barbara Fain, Home Demonstration Agent. Registration sheets will be located at Cut Rate and Ideal Grocery Stores.

After registration, you will be notified of the date of your appointment by card as only a limited number can be typed on dates designated by the hospital, hours 8-11.

All who wish to have their blood typed must register with one of the above people. All ages will be typed. This information will prove invaluable to the individual in case of their need of blood transfusion. All residents of the county who do not know their blood type are urged to take advantage of this free service.

### Spearman Youth Receives Award

The impressive Spring Concert of the West Texas State College Band, which was held in Canyon on Tuesday night, was highlighted by presentation of the first annual Band Service Award to bandsmen.

The first recipient was Joe Mack Hill of Spearman High, who plays the cornet, proved his merit by conducting the band in his own arrangement of Claude Debussy's "Sarabande."

### Post Office Is Dedicated Friday

Friday morning April 25, an unusually large crowd gathered in and around the new Spearman Post Office at 304 Hancock street for the dedication ceremony.

Donald Smith, Postmaster, welcomed the guests and introduced pastros of the following churches who made up the dedication committee: Apostolic Faith Church, First Methodist Church, Church of the Sacred Heart, and the Union Church.

Rev. Donald Cox, pastor of the Christian Church, and Rev. O. L. Brpant, pastor of the Baptist Church, were unable to be present for their part of the service.

He introduced the following guest postmasters: Wayne Bunten, of Borger; Floyd Miller of Panhandle; Jean Barnhart, of Cactus; Gordon Denman of Dumas; Imogene Benton of Sunray; Blanche Tabor of Gruver; L. H. Searcy of Stinnett and Eula Berry of Waka.

Spearman Mayor, Bruce Sheets, Sheriff J. E. Cooke, County Attorney Jimmie Linn, School Superintendent, H. R. Hartman, were all introduced. Then Postmaster Smith turned the program over to Joe Dan Bryan, the Master of Ceremonies.

Rev. J. Waid Griffin gave the invocation. Mrs. Hazel Wright Morton, daughter of Mrs. Mel Wright, the first Postmaster at Old Hansford, registered the guest.

Jerry Sparks, Gerald Hanners, Jerry Parrish and Steve Cates, the Four Jokers, entertained with songs and music.

The Spearman High School Band performed under the direction of Sam Watson, band instructor. They played the National Anthem as the V. F. W. color guard carried out their program ceremonies. The members of the color guard were: Clyde Longley, Clarence Mitchell, A. L. Wilson, Tony P. Vernon and Kenneth Evans. They raised the flag that had flown over the Capitol at Washington D. C.

W. C. Humphries, building Contractor, and Kenneth J. Kohler, owner of the building were introduced and later they conducted a tour inspection of the new Post office and equipment.

J. Mel Benech, Field Service officer, 2nd Postal Division of Texas, delivered the dedication address.

The high points of it pointed out the strength of Democracy shown in our American uncensored mail. Also the importance of mail in business, friendship and in keeping us all close together. Mr. Benech said our postal department went onto the red at the rate of \$16 per second. The postal department is the largest government agency and employs 520,000.

In his praise of the new office, he said there was none to equal it in latest, modern furnishings and equipment within a 250 mile radius of Spearman.

Rev. W. J. Matthesen pronounced the benediction.

Coffee and doughnuts were served at the open house by the following hostesses. Mesdames: Maude Mathews, J. H. Martin, Vester Hill, Tom Sutton, John Wilde, Roy Jones and A. M. Pittman. They served from a table laid with linen cloth and centered with an arrangement of spring flowers. Flowers were placed throughout the lobby. Approximately 750 attended.

Business went on as usual and smoothly except for the stream of patrons who consistently had trouble with their new mail box combinations.

### High School Band Wins Highest Award

The Spearman high school band became the first Class B band from region XI to win a Sweepstakes award in district competition since the Interscholastic League has used the present classification. To receive this honor a band must make a I division in Concert sight reading and marching.

There were three high school bands to receive this honor this year they were: Spearman, Borger and Phillips.

There will be a drawing to see which of these three bands will represent region XI at the State Fair in Dallas next year.

### Washington News Letter From Your Congressman Walter Rogers

TO THE PEOPLE OF THE 18th DISTRICT

**Community Facilities Bill**  
The Community Facilities Bill, under the authorship of Senator Fulbright of Arkansas, passed the Senate last week by a good margin of votes. The vote was 60 to 28. The bill would provide four major accomplishments:

First, it would increase the 100 million dollar Housing and Home Finance Agency's public facility loan program to \$1 billion. This would provide loans for financing local water and sewer systems, hospitals, and school buildings.

Second, it would establish a new interest rate formula which, under present conditions, would produce a rate of interest of 3 1/2 percent rather than the current 4 and one-eighth and 4 and five-eighths percent.

Third, it would raise the present 40-year maximum payout period on these federal loans to 50 years.

Fourth, it would increase the present federal loan fund, which is available interest free for long range public works planning, by 50 million dollars. The present fund is 48 million dollars, and it is increased to 98 million dollars.

The bill was highly contested, and the division was very sharp in many of the votes on proposed amendments to the bill that could cripple it. However, when these amendments had been voted down, many of those who had been supporting the amendments came over and voted for the bill on final passage. Many of the cities—especially smaller ones—have been experiencing much difficulty in financing water and sewer systems, hospitals, and schools. Many have voted the bonds but were unable to sell them because of the high interest rate that was being demanded and the burden that would be placed on the tax structure of the community. This bill should relieve that situation without costing the taxpayers. It will provide a measurable help toward a constructive approach of absorbing unemployment in many areas of the country.

**Ike's Arms Plan**  
The President's proposed reorganization of the Pentagon is an issue that becomes more heated each day. His original announcement that he planned to submit such a proposal to Congress was met with varied reactions. When he finished the final draft on the proposal and submitted it to the Congress, it was obviously anticipated that the message submitting the plan would receive top billing on the front pages of the newspapers throughout the country. However, the President—and especially his advisors—had failed to reckon with the Chairman of the Armed Services Committee of the House of Representatives, the Honorable Carl Vinson of Georgia. Chairman Vinson is now serving his 46th year in the Congress and has been handling military matters from a civilian

standpoint as long or longer than any other living man. His vast experiences and knowledge in this field affords him a weapon that provides him with great influence in the Congress. When the President's message reached the Congress, Chairman Vinson was waiting with a speech on the subject. The results was that the President's program and Chairman Vinson's reply there to share the headlines. On the following day the President appeared before a luncheon meeting of the American Society of Newspaper Editors and the International Press Institute in the Statler Hotel and proceeded to soundly denounce his critics on the subject. He termed many of the charges leveled by Chairman Vinson at the program as "nonsense" and "farfetched." He labeled the apprehension of his critics as "misconceptions" and, at the most, "misrepresentations." All of this causing much discussion on Capitol Hill. Some are asking why it is that this proposed reorganization of the Department of Defense is so essential and so absolutely necessary that it must be accepted and swallowed lock, stock and barrel and without question. They are asking why it is that such a plan was not proposed long ago, if its importance even approaches the proportions represented. They want to know why the President, who represents himself as a man with greater knowledge on the subject than any other active person, and a man who has been associated with the military all his life, waited so long to come up with the program. Many feel that if it took the President so very long to get the matter worked out with his vast experience and knowledge, the Representatives of the people should have an opportunity to study the plan and weigh its merits and demerits very carefully before taking action.

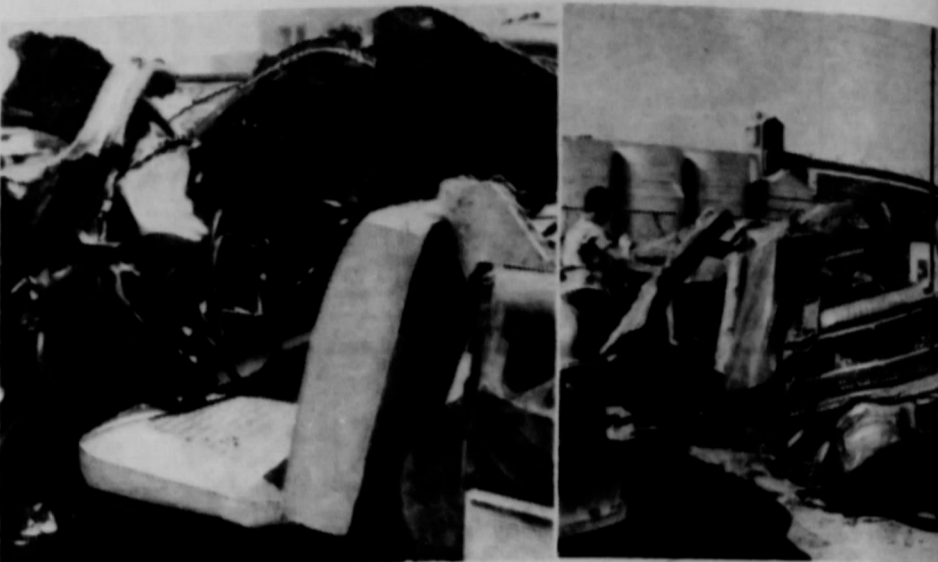

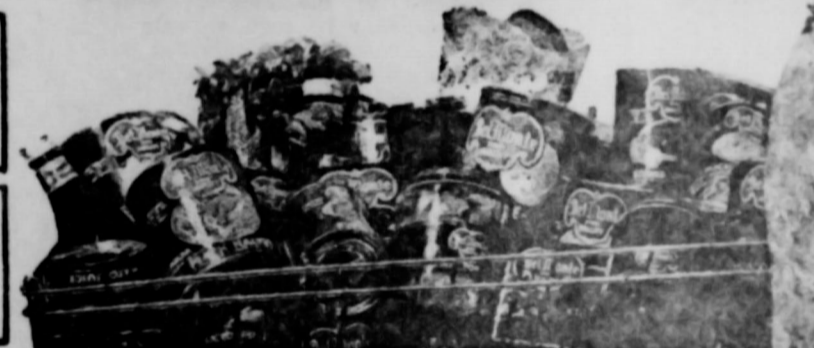

(h) An "Authorized Well" shall be: (1) The location of a ground well on an application filed until such application is denied, or (2) The location of a ground well on a valid permit, authorized well site is not a well to drill. # Regulations For Irrigation in North Plains

## LEGAL NOTICE

Notice is hereby given that the following rules are to be effective within the limits of Ground Water Conservation District No. 2, North of the Canadian River as of the 17th day of May, 1958, and thereafter in accordance with resolutions adopted by the Board of Directors of said District, to-wit:

Rules of Ground Water Conservation District No. 2, North of the Canadian River The Rules of Ground Water Conservation District No. 2, North of the Canadian River are hereby amended, effective May 5, 1958, as follows:

In accordance with Section 59 of Article 16 of the Texas Constitution, and with the Statutes of the State of Texas pertaining thereto, the following rules are hereby adopted as the rules of the District by its Board of Directors. All rules or parts of rules in conflict with these rules are hereby repealed.

The rules, regulations and modes of procedure herein contained are adopted for the purpose of simplifying procedure, avoiding delays, saving expense, and facilitating the administration of the ground water laws of the State and the rules of this District. To the end that these objectives be attained, these rules shall be construed as follows:

(a) No person shall hereafter begin to drill or drill a well, or increase the size of a well or pump therein, which well could reasonably be expected to produce or a pump designed to produce in excess of 100,000 gallons of water per day, without having first applied to the Board, and received a permit to do so, unless the drilling and operation of the well is exempt by the law or by these rules. Provided that, as set out in Rule 5d hereof, and under certain conditions, an applicant may commence the drilling of a well when his application therefor has been recommended by the proper County Committee.

(b) No permit shall be required for the drilling of temporary wells exempt by subsections 3 and 4a of Section D, Article 7880-3c (being generally wells used for the production of oil, gas, or other minerals and water wells used in connection therewith).

(c) Each County in the District shall have a County Committee composed of five committeemen. Each portion of the County is to be represented by a County Committeeman, if practicable.

(d) Each County shall elect two County Committeemen in January, 1960, for a term of two years or the same day the District Directors are elected. On the same day in January, 1961 each County shall elect three County Committeemen for a term of two years. Thereafter, each County shall elect County Committeemen when a term of such Committeeman expires and such election shall be held on the same day of each year fixed for the election of District Directors.

(e) Any qualified property tax paying resident voter within any commissioner's precinct, may have his name placed on the ballot by being nominated by the County Committee or by petition signed by not less than five qualified voters of the commissioner's precinct, which petition shall be filed with the District Board at least 20 days prior to the date of such election.

(f) The County Committees are authorized to accept applications for permits to drill wells and to perform such additional duties as are set out in these rules. The committee may designate a secretary or other person to receive and file such applications, accept deposits, to give information, issue forms, keep records, receive well logs, reports, and other information and to perform other administrative duties. The Secretary or other authorized person who received an application for a permit shall note on the face of the application the date and time of day on which such application is received and shall give an application a serial number showing its relative priority as to time.

(g) It shall be the duty of the County of the County Committee to applications later filed.

(h) The Board of Directors shall grant or refuse of applications Committees may hold hearings or meetings for this purpose. The signature of three County Committeemen on an application shall constitute a recommendation that the permit be granted. The refusal of three or more committeemen to sign the application shall constitute a recommendation of rejection of the application.

(i) If the County Committee shall recommend the granting of the application, and if there be no contest thereon or conflicting application, such recommendation shall be noted on the application by the County Committee. The applicant may thereupon proceed at his own risk to drill such well. The application shall not, however, be officially granted until the same shall have been passed upon and granted by the Board.

(j) If, before the Committee's recommendation of approval of an application shall have been noted on an application, a contest shall arise over the application, or if another owner shall within such time file an application for a well permit within less than the minimum spacing distance for such wells, the County Committee may conduct a hearing, upon due notice to both parties, to hear and determine which of the applications should, in its judgement, be granted. In the event of a contest or such a conflicting application, no well shall be commenced until the matter is passed upon by the Board. A contest shall be deemed filed when written notification is filed with the proper County Committee. The County Committee or such person designated by it to receive such applications or notices of contest shall receive the same and note

thereon, the date and time at which they were received.

The County Committee shall, in any event, forward both applications to the Board. Thereafter, both applicants, or the applicant and the contestant or contestants, after due notice, shall be entitled to a hearing before the Board. At such hearing, all parties may introduce pertinent evidence as to why the particular application or applications should be granted or denied, including evidence as to the effect on the water reservoir, the conservation and preservation of water, the prevention of waste, the protection of property rights, and other pertinent matters which evidence shall be taken into consideration by the Board. The Board shall also take into consideration which of the applicants duly filed his application first upon lines, or other legal description; and the county in which the land is located.

(k) A statement as to the proposed use of the well to be drilled whether municipal, industrial, or irrigation.

(l) The name and address of the driller or contractor and the date drilling operations are to be begun.

(m) A statement as to the exact location of the well to be drilled, including the section, block, survey or league and exact number of acres to be drilled, and the location of the well, as shown on plat shall state that all facts therein are true and correct.

(n) Such exception may be granted ten (10) days after written notice has been given to the applicant and all adjoining owners and all well owners within a quarter mile of the proposed location and after a public hearing at which the parties thereto may appear and be heard, and after the Board has decided that an exception should be granted. Provided, however, that if all such owners execute a waiver in writing stating that they do not object to the granting of such exception, the Board may thereupon proceed to decide upon the granting or refusing of such application without notice or hearing except to the applicant. The applicant may also waive notice or hearing or both.

(o) After an application for a well permit has been granted, the well, if drilled, must be drilled within ten yards of the location specified in the permit and not elsewhere. If the well should be commenced or drilled at different location, the drilling or operation of such well may be enjoined by the Board of pursuant of Article 7880-3c, Section B (9).

(p) No person shall rework, re-drill, or re-equip a well in a manner that would increase the rate of production of water from such well beyond any previous normal rate of production of such well without first having made an application to the Board, and having been granted a permit by the Board, to do so. Otherwise, the application will not be considered.

(5) Information as to the exact location of the well to be drilled, including the section, block, survey or league and exact number of acres to be drilled, and the location of the well, as shown on plat shall state that all facts therein are true and correct.

(6) Such exception may be granted ten (10) days after written notice has been given to the applicant and all adjoining owners and all well owners within a quarter mile of the proposed location and after a public hearing at which the parties thereto may appear and be heard, and after the Board has decided that an exception should be granted. Provided, however, that if all such owners execute a waiver in writing stating that they do not object to the granting of such exception, the Board may thereupon proceed to decide upon the granting or refusing of such application without notice or hearing except to the applicant. The applicant may also waive notice or hearing or both.

(7) After an application for a well permit has been granted, the well, if drilled, must be drilled within ten yards of the location specified in the permit and not elsewhere. If the well should be commenced or drilled at different location, the drilling or operation of such well may be enjoined by the Board of pursuant of Article 7880-3c, Section B (9).

(8) No person shall rework, re-drill, or re-equip a well in a manner that would increase the rate of production of water from such well beyond any previous normal rate of production of such well without first having made an application to the Board, and having been granted a permit by the Board, to do so.
