A serious misunderstanding apparently has arisen between some producers and buyers of eggs on certain points of the new Texas Egg Law. Agriculture Commissioner John White said today. Reports have reached the Texas Department of Agriculture that certain retailers and buyers have refused to handle eggs from the small producers with limited flocks. These buyers have blamed the Texas Egg Law and used it as an excuse for not doing business with the farmer who wants to sell only two or three dozen eggs at a time.

"There is absolutely nothing in the law that interferes with or prohibits this long-standing business relationship between any producers and buyers", White emphasized.



Reduce Delinquency AT GATESVILLE (A distinguished Texas judge offers pointers on combating our rapidly increasing juvenile delinquency problem.)

By JUDGE SARAH T. HUGHES, For many years whippings and solitary confinement were routine punishment at the state reformatory at Gatesville. We heard that sadistic guards punished the boys unmercifully.

Several years ago a drill-master jumped on a boy who refused to drill any longer and choked him. The boy died.

The boys in this institution are subject to the same harsh and strenuous rules and regulations as you would expect to find in controlling the hardest criminal in the penitentiary, a legislative committee said about the Gatesville reformatory.

Despite the harsh treatment (which included 10-year-olds who were there because they were neglected but who were learning crime from the older, more serious offenders) there were gang fights, hunger strikes, and many escapes.

In 1952 a new policy was inaugurated. Today the whip is gone. Bars have been removed. Boys are punished by being deprived of privileges. There have been no gang fights or hunger strikes. Escapes have decreased.

Institutional Whippings Authorities believe that whippings in institutions often build up resentments that cause the boy to commit other offenses.

Those who have actually worked with teen-age offenders believe that institutions for delinquents should have treatment seeking the causes of delinquency, together with a program of education, rehabilitation and vocational training.

"Eggs do not have to be graded", White pointed out. "Grading is not mandatory under the law at any level of trade. Ungraded eggs may be sold in the channels of trade but they must be plainly marked 'ungraded' on the carton or container."

White added that it is more advantageous to all concerned if the producers and handlers do participate in the egg grading program. Otherwise, high quality will not place undue restrictions on the trade.

There is a big difference between occasional bad eggs involved in sales transactions and whole cases of spoiled eggs", said White. "Common sense will

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gram. Otherwise, high quality eggs will be sold on an ungraded basis, sacrificing the price advantage of the higher marked grades.

When the grading system is used, the cartons or containers must be labeled according to the actual size of the eggs. Standards are those set by the U. S. Department of Agriculture and approved by the Texas Egg Marketing Advisory Committee.

Two main points to remember, said White, are:

1. An egg producer, large or small, exempt from the law—and all of its provisions—if he sells only from the production of his own flock on an ungraded basis.

2. The new law is essentially an egg labeling act which requires that eggs sold within the state be properly marked as to size and grade if a grade is claimed, or marked "ungraded" if no grade is claimed. The eggs must meet the specifications indicated on the container if they are sold as graded eggs.

"Our problems would be simplified if most of the complainants would only read the law", said White. "Troubles arise when a person gets his information 'second hand' and decides that the law discriminates against him."

White strongly urged all persons with a question on the law to contact the Texas Department of Agriculture in Austin.

"We will answer all inquiries fully and promptly and send along data that explains a phases of the law in detail", he said.



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

was the dual problem of the architects from Birmingham, when they hoped to secure their concept of the design in national competition.

of jurors, named by the American Institute of Architects and resident in California, Oklahoma and Texas, chose the design of Begrow & Brown as the 268 submitted in the competition.

They have been given a contract and now are drawing work for construction start this year on the first \$1 1/2 million of an eventual \$5 million project, as a joint project of 17 western states.

How could two young Michigan architects effectively conceive an idea that would best represent the cowboy as the central figure of western history? Like national heroes from 16 states, Gov. Daniel J. Evetts Haley, and Byron and A. M. G. Swenson, of Texas, who represent Texas on the national board, were a little nervous also. For the best answer, it was the conception of Jack Begrow, with his explanation of the unusual design.

Very often, an outsider, given the right background and experience, has a sharper perspective on the persons who participated in the life of a given era," Begrow said.

The cowboy himself is a figure that, through the medium of plays, movies, songs and fiction, has accepted the fancy of millions and put a touch of glamour on the great epic western movement. Paintings of Charles M. Russell and Remington, among others, added to that air of romance.

Like many others, my partner and I have long been exposed to those interpretations. We have spent quite a bit of time in the west too. From our observations and a lot of research, we feel that we have grasped the spirit of the spiritual feeling and understanding of the west.

"It was easy to see that the cowboy, as a symbol of an era, was a dynamic individual with real freedom of movement and

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almost self sufficient. His individuality and semi-vagabond spirit put him in a category similar to the gypsy of Europe—or perhaps with a dash of the Robin Hood characterization of English folklore.

"Our great problem, then, was to find a type or architecture that was indigenous to the cowboy and to the western pioneer. They had no touch with historical architecture as such, like Colonial, Greek or Gothic. The most prevalent forms of architecture in the west were transplanted from Mexico.

"The cowboy lived close to earth. The pioneer lived near his wagon, his half-dugout or his soddy. Both of them had some of the feeling in early days that is evoked in the song "Don't Fence Me In." One thing always important to both was water. With it they could improvise shelter or do without.

"So taking those facts as basic elements, we envisioned a camp composed of tent-like structures surrounding garden tools. It crowns a high ridge on two major transcontinental highways and as you approach you will see a series of undulating roofs with two larger, tent-like structures rising from the center. The highest will be the Cowboy Hall of Fame and the lower the Museum. They are on a plateau of some 15 acres.

"From the parking lot you will see that buildings are grouped around a series of pools. The complete memorial is shaped like a bold brand forming an "H" in a square "O." The first unit is like an "H." The bar of the "H" is the Hall of Fame. Museum displays, a trustees' room, lounges and lecture rooms are on the long sides of the letter "H" design.

"The Hall of Fame will be monumental in design with ceiling 60 feet high, in contrast to 15 foot ceilings in the other areas. There you will see the staturary, sculptures or other uniform memorials to those persons voted into the Hall of Fame. Nearby is the Donor's room, where permanent, accessible files will honor those who have contributed to the building fund.

"Panels, diaramas and other modern devices throughout will tell the history of the west in a manner easily understood by children too. There will be a snack bar, ample storage space in the lower level, and a souvenir shop. Later a research library for scholars will be added.

"Although it honors the past, the buildings must be eye-catching and interesting in the future, since this is a project planned not only as a memorial, but for information and inspiration in traditional western Americanism to generations yet unborn. So the most modern materials will be used with the symbolic design that still will look fresh across the next frontier," Begrow said.

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

The most recent of this type of letter coming into my office was signed, "A. Tneutisnoc". The subject had to do with the need for tax reform. The letter started off by pointing out that the writer was one of the "little" men of this country. I continued to read the letter and found that he was deeply disturbed about a publication which pointed out several different types of alleged loopholes in the tax laws that were available to people in the high income brackets. The writer proceeded to condemn such practices on the part of those enjoying large incomes, while bemoaning the fact that there is no escape hatch for the so-called "little" fellow whose taxes are deducted

from his pay check. Certainly, the writer of that letter had an excellent point, and one in which I have been interested for a long time. The people of this country have always been most willing to pay whatever taxes were necessary for the proper defense of the country and the conduct of the Constitutional form of government under which we are supposed to operate. However, they all feel that the tax burden should be spread equally and that some select few should not have access to concessions that are not available to all. The tremendously heavy burden of taxation that has been the lot of the U. S. citizen for the past several years makes it all the more necessary that every possible effort be made to afford the so-called "little" people tax relief.

I was starting out to write my views on the subject to the party above-named when my secretary discovered that there was no address and that the signature on the letter was not the name of anyone, but was "a constituent" spelled backward.

Frankly, I would appreciate it if everyone who writes would sign their name. Whether we agree or disagree on a subject, we live in a country where every citizen has the right to express himself without fear or retaliation. I feel very deeply about the freedom of speech, and I do hope no one will hesitate to sign their right name to any mail addressed to my office. The President's Press Conference The newspapers here have praised the President's recent press conference. They take the position that the President came forth with some affirmative views for the first time in several of these conferences—the most notable being the President's position with relation to our future activities in moving into outer space. The columnist and commentators seem to think that the President's position on this subject, in conjunction with the excellent results that have been attained by the Army and Navy in putting satellites in orbit, will do so very much toward regaining the "face" we lost because Russia was the first to accomplish entry into outer space. The great fear that seemed to engulf many of our people immediately after the Russians sent up their two "spunkies" seems to have calmed, and it is generally conceded now that we were not nearly so far behind as

some propagandists would have had us believe. The President's statement as to our future plans has proved most reassuring.

OUTDOORS IN TEXAS

About ten days ago there were 12 Game Department fish hatchery trucks parked above Lake Marvin at the "State Lake" awaiting a load of brood bass which were to go to nine different fish hatcheries throughout the state. Mr. Harper, superintendent from the Medina hatchery south of San Antonio, 530 miles distant, was in the group. Jack Woodford, Game Warden from Miami, had been carefully draining the lake for some five days in preparation for the arrival of the trucks so as to time the operation in such a manner that the trucks could pick up the prized brood fish and head south without losing any time. More than 1000 brood bass were transported to practically all parts of the state as result of this operation.

It had been two years since the 40-surface-acre lake had been drained. After that it was stocked with fingerling bass from the hatchery at Dundee, Texas. The brood fish, as is evident, travelled from Dundee to Canadian, thence to all parts south. As a result, these brood bass will be the parents of millions of large mouth bass that will populate the state this summer and fall.

The state lake, located on Boggy Creek which heads on the I. V. Ranch and flows onto the Canadian River through Lake Marvin, is a clear blue stream containing fertile waters. The late Game and Fish Commissioner Gene Howe planned this lake as a growing pond for the Panhandle fish pond owners. In other words, Mr. Howe evidently thought that it might be wise to grow "stock" inches in length before transporting them to the ponds and lakes in area. Since that time much information has been learned about stocking lakes and as a result fish biologist have determined that it is more practical to ported to only hundreds of the stock smaller fish, especially since thousands of fry can be trans-

larger ones. The State Game and Fish Commission is operating on a "full speed ahead" basis in order to supply the growing needs of fish pond and lake owners all over the state.

Fish applicants should put forth serious thought before applying for fingerlings and fry (smaller since under ideal conditions bass fry will develop into one to two pounds in six months of time. Not only that, but a pair of three-pound brood bass will pro-

duce 25,000 off-spring per year. Fish pond managers recommend only 200 bass per acre. It looks crystal clear to me that when a pond has a few spawning size bass in all the owner needs to do is manage the pond rather than request more fish from the Game and Fish Commission.

Considering the above facts, Lake Fryer, 12 miles southeast of Perryton, should be excellent for fishing when the lake is opened, May 1 is the reported date for the official opening. For better information contact Mr. Mayfield of the Perryton Chamber of Commerce, County Judge



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TIME TO FIGHT CANCER

This is Cancer Control Month, the annual occasion for the American Cancer Society's Cancer Crusade. That great public service organization is the only national voluntary health agency fighting cancer in three fronts — through research designed to find new methods of cure for this disease and eventually to conquer it, professional and public education, and service to cancer patients.

Momentous strides are being made in the attack on man's cruellest enemy. In the last twenty years more progress has been made in understanding cancer than all the previous history of mankind. This is largely due to the fine assistance volunteers in the April Crusade, both men and women, have given to the ACS. There are nearly two million Cancer Crusaders.

More people die of cancer each year, but more are being saved from it. Until the spring of 1956, statisticians estimated that one in four Americans who had cancer was being cured. At the Third National Cancer Conference in Detroit in June, 1956, it was disclosed that one in three was being saved. From one-in-four to one-in-three means that some 38,000 lives are being saved annually which would have been lost to cancer a decade ago. In all, about 150,000 are saved in this country each year. That is heartening, but physicians agree that one in two—half of those who develop cancer, or 225,000—could be saved today by earlier diagnosis and prompt treatment.

The Society has led the way to the greatest research attack ever launched against a single disease, and has devoted nearly \$60,000,000 to research since World War II. Its spokesmen have been leaders in persuading Congress to appropriate large sums for this work. The American Cancer Society is not a permanent organization.

It is working hard to put itself out of business. It will last only until cancer is conquered. Public contributions to enable the Society to carry on its attack have mounted from less than a million dollars in 1944 to more than \$29,000,000 in 1957. To continue this accelerating attack, the Society relies on its independent fund-raising and The 1958 goal: \$30,000,000.

Certainly the ACS, in seeking that goal deserves all possible support from the public.




