Those taking part in the program included:

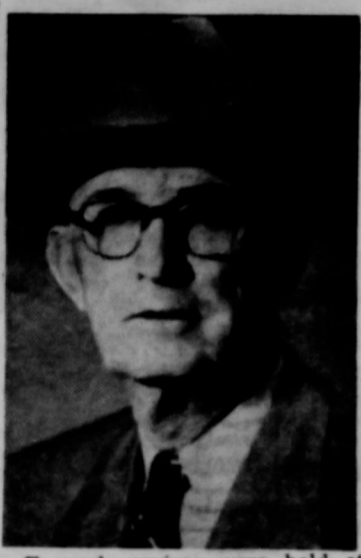
- 39 students were lectured in bookkeeping and accounting by Miss Terry.

Funeral services were held at the high school auditorium Tuesday-afternoon, at 2:30 P. M., for Walter Wilmeth of Spearman. "Walt" as he was known by his many, many friends, died at his home Sunday afternoon, at approximately 4:00 P. M. Walter had been in poor health for quite some time, but refused to give up, and was active in his cattle business, until his death Sunday afternoon. He died in his home at Spearman, while watching Television.

Ministers were Rev. H. A. Nichols, Rev. R. H. Campbell, and Rev. Wade Griffin.

A mixed choir of 36 voices sang "Sweet Hour of Prayer," following the reading of the scripture and opening prayer by Rev. Campbell of Gruver. A quartet from Gruver sang "When The Roll Is Called Up Yonder."

Rev. H. A. Nichols, former Methodist pastor at Spearman, and life long friend of the family gave the message of sympathy and tribute to the life and work of this outstanding pioneer citizen of the North Plains.

Rev. Waid Griffin read the obituary at the Memorial services. It would be impossible to write all of the fine things Walter Wilmeth has done in his life time, for his many friends, and for the town of Spearman. Walter was one of the few typical old time cattlemen that are left in this fine cattle country. He bought so many cattle this year, that rumors had it that Santa Fe was going to have to lay a new line to handle Walters Cattle.

His famous 7 brand, has been put on so many cattle, it would be impossible to know how many cattle he has handled in his life time, but most of all, he will be missed because of his powerful personality, integrity, and stand for fair play. It will be hard to keep the cattle business going in the Panhandle, without Walter. Besides his cattle, Walter raised horses. Some of the finest in the world. Also, he farms several sections of wheat ground, and also has interests in oil, and ranch land in this area. It will be impossible to replace him, but we extend our sympathy to Mrs. Wilmeth and their fine children and relatives.

OBITUARY

Walter William Wilmeth was the eldest child of six children born to Mr. Francis Crawford Wilmeth and Mrs. Ella Honora Mabry Wilmeth. He was born Feb. 28, 1889 in Ellis County, Texas, and passed this life May 11, 1958 in his home in Spearman having attained the age of sixty-nine years, two months, and eleven days.

Mr. Wilmeth was married to Ida McClellan on December 25, 1910 at Grand Plains, Texas, and to this union were born four children; two sons, Roy & Ernest of Spearman and two daughters, Mrs. Juanita Logan and Mrs. Agnes Bunger of Berger.

Mr. Wilmeth came to Hansford County as a boy with his parents in 1901 and has lived here since. He is remembered as being one of the early cattlemen of this area. He was a living example of integrity, one who had the regal bearing of an eagle, yet was understanding and considerate of everyone who came to him and would give a sympathetic audience to their problems whether they were of high or low estate. His word was his bond. Many young people were helped by him to gain training or an education and many there are who are proud to have had him as a friend in need, one who helped them in their moments of necessity and who assisted them in getting started in business. He was generous with his money in any case which sought to help the needy or which sought to promote good in the community. Mr. Wilmeth moved to Spearman in 1926 and has lived here since.

He is survived by his wife, Ida and his four children, Roy, Ernest, Juanita, and Agnes. There are seven grand-children and three great-grandchildren surviving also. There remains also his mother, Mrs. Ella Wilmeth of Colorado Springs, Colorado, a brother, Ken Wilmeth of Gruver, and four sisters.

Hamilton Files



A three-way contest for one of the positions on the Texas Supreme Court was revealed with the passing of the filing deadline last week.

First to file for Place 1, which will be vacated by St. John Garwood who is not a candidate for re-election, was the Chief Justice of the Eight Court of Civil Appeals.

He is Judge R. W. Hamilton a 58 year old former school teacher-turned-lawyer who once coached a state championship football team.

Upon release from military service in 1919 after World War I, Hamilton took up teaching and coaching and in the 6 years that where his team won state honors in 1919 - also at Sonora, San Marcos, and finally back at Tyler near his family farm at Troup where he was reared.

Judge Hamilton is basing his campaign entirely upon his 31 years experience as lawyer and judge.

His law practice began at Tyler in 1927. In 1929 he was County Attorney at Martin County. In 1933 he was District Attorney of the 70th Judicial District. He engaged in general practice at Midland from 1935 until 1950, when he was elected Judge of the 70th Judicial District which he had formerly served as District Attorney.

In 1953 he was appointed Chief Justice of the Eight Court of Civil Appeals and was elected in 1954 without opposition to a full term of that office which he is now serving.

Mrs. Hamilton is the former Lois Rogers of San Antonio. The Hamiltons have two daughters, Emily and Ann, both attending the University of Texas, and a son, Robert, Jr., attending A&M College.

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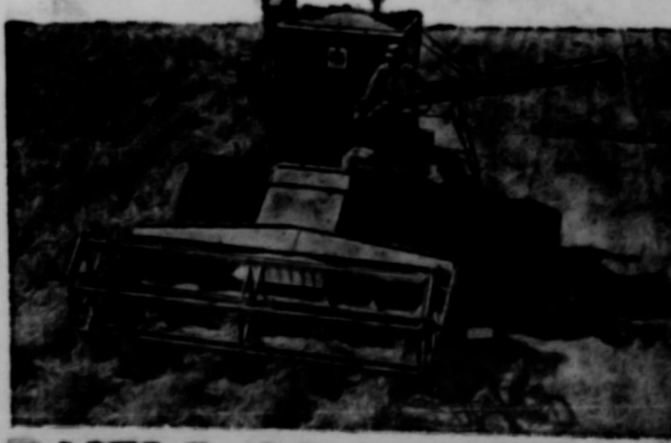

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Irrigation With Concrete Pipe

Conservation of irrigation water is very important to the irrigation farmer. Loss of water from unlined ditches because of seepage and evaporation can be enormous and probably varies from ten to fifty percent. A limited supply of water makes such losses doubly serious. Fewer acres can be irrigated, or crops must suffer from lack of

enough water. Concrete pipe is one method to cut seepage losses to a minimum. Irrigators are rapidly learning the advantages of concrete pipe. Some of the advantages are, provides close control of water distribution, saves time and labor, permits productive use of all the land, aids in insect and weed control, simplifies irrigation of

sloping land, and requires little maintenance. Of course, any concrete pipe needs to be properly located, so as to fit into a well designed system. Since these lines are permanent, it is well for the average farmer to seek advice on their design and location. Soil Conservation Service technicians are available and able to help with your concrete problems. Since several contractors are installing and furnishing concrete pipe in this area, no problem should be encountered in obtaining the pipe or the installation. All of the contractors guarantee their installations for at least one year. Generally, any fault in material or workmanship should become evident during the first year of operation.

Perhaps pipelines will never replace all open ditches but may eventually replace most permanent ditches. When concrete pipelines are supplemented with the use of metal or canvas pipe, no ditches are necessary at all. While concrete pipelines are expensive, their expected life span should be long. Considering the advantages and savings through their use, a real saving may be expected over a relatively short period of time.

 If Spearman is ever alerted for a 72 hour watch it will take 82 observers by staggering them two on a tower.
 Each month the post is alerted for a four hour watch.
 Johnnie Lee is county director of Civil Defense.
 Gruver already has its watch tower on the football field.
 Morse operates from the Oliver Leverton home.
 A watch tower will soon be erected in Spearman on the hospital lots. It will be equipped with a flash light alert which will be made from person to person over the town.

Clear flashing light is a weather bureau alert. A red flashing light means storm clouds warrant its time to take cover.
 Mrs. Oliver Leverton is chief supervisor at Morse and Sonny Riley served that capacity at Gruver.
 The towers will be manned only when the GOC is alerted by the Weather Bureau or the Tinker Airfield Base.

know all the details about raising fish he would need to devote his life time towards the study of fish pond management, plus many other angles that surely must coincide, but the cdtre fundamentals are very simple.
 Of course, what is said here applies to the Panhandle fish ponds specifically. How many acre-feet does the pond contain? What is the over-all fish population of the waters? How many pounds of bass, crappie, catfish is this lake expected to produce annually? What should this lake produce according to the authorities? The whole subject could get very complicated if followed up. There are a few fundamentals that, if applied to any pond, would produce fantastic results. In order to elaborate on this idea, first let me mention a personal experience that happened as a result of an experiment.

In about 1936 I was fertilizing a peanut field. The fertilizer distributor was set so that it would leave a stream of commercial fertilizer about the size of a lead pencil. At this rate there was about 100 pounds of fertilizer per acre being distributed. After going to you end and back for a few hours, distributing the fertilizer and planting peanuts I stopped the horses at the end of the row and opened the gauging lever so as to allow the distributor to operate at full capacity. At this rate there was a stream of fertilizer about the size of a large corn cob rolling into the furrow. After a round or so at this rate the distributor was again set at the 100 pound per acre notch.
 After a month or so anyone could stand at any place in the sand field and readily notice the huge growth of foliage from any angle. The fertilizer simply made

these few selected rows grow to a fantastic proportion.
 This is all water under the bridge but there is a lesson learned. A few weeks ago Woody Pond, Game Warden at Canyon, and I fished for a couple of hours in a small fertile tank north of Matador. On each cast from the rod there would be a six inch bass hit. If this bass wasn't securely hooked, there would be another hit the plug. If bass number 2 wasn't hooked there would usually be another hit before the plug could be reeled in. These bass were short in length but heavy in weight.
 Last week I tried the same plug in a lake in this vicinity and caught a few bass altogether in about the same length of time as compared to at least 100 on the trip near Matador. The bass caught last week represented at least two different age groups,

in my opinion. Some were six to six inch ones in weight with some of the others longer and representing old bass. None were keepers. Some were the others were small. Considering it would be months, it would be to say that it was Einstein to figure out that in this area bass wasn't growing fish. A yearling bass was five inches in length, small, keen mouth, it is possible the fish haven't fed.
