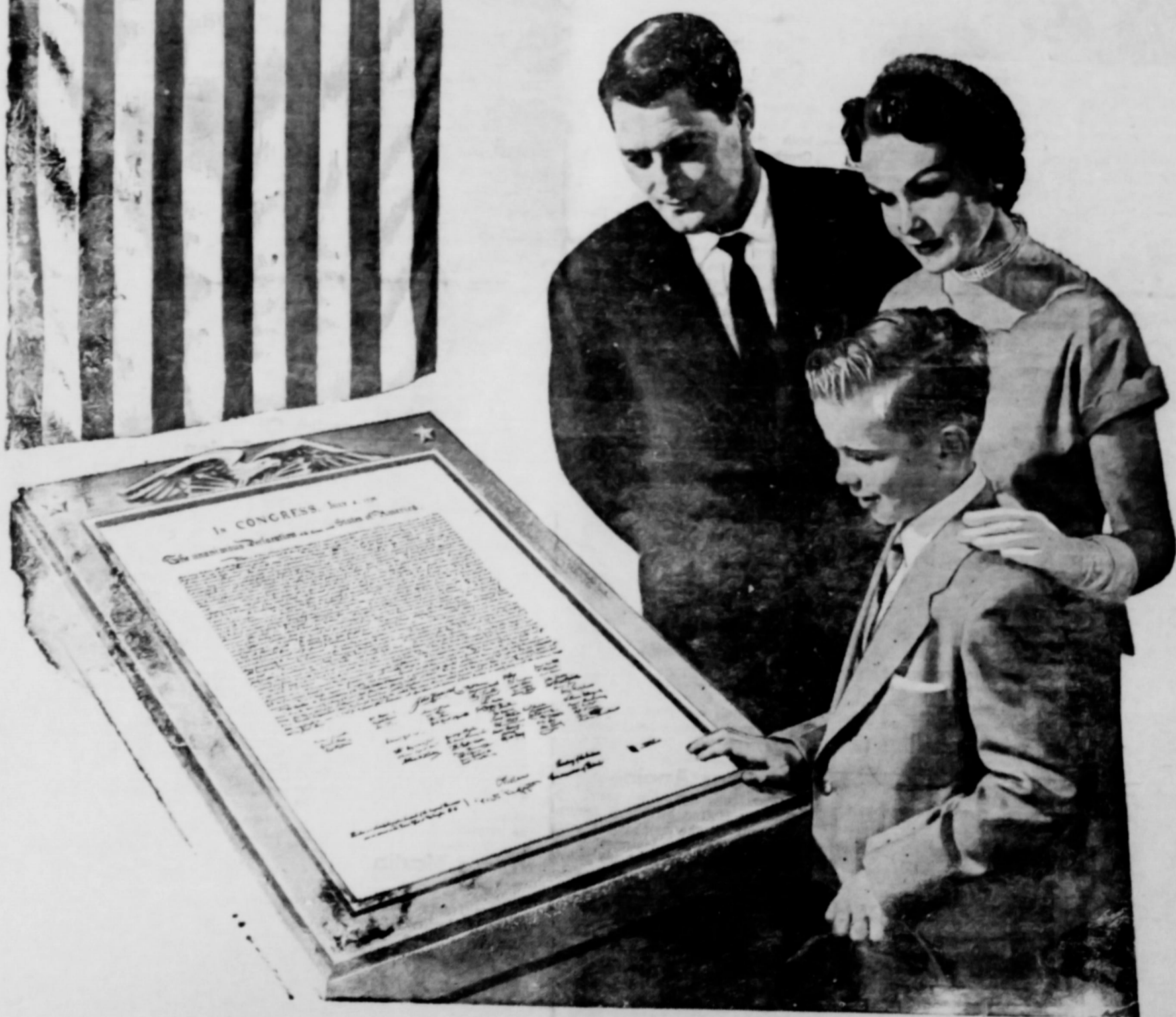

structure is permeated with the same loyalty under the Eisenhower Administration as prevailed during the Administration of Mr. Truman.

Regardless of the view one takes of the situation, whether it be good, or bad or indifferent, there is one inescapable fact about such an episode. It has news value. Until this news value has run its course or lost its effectiveness, the matter will not be dropped. Whether or not Mr. Adams leaves the employment of the government will depend upon how long this sordid episode contains appreciable news value. It will continue to contain appreciable news value so long as there are until items that can be brought up one at a time. The question is, how long can Mr. Eisenhower and Mr. Adams stand the heat.

Other cases of misconduct, or

as some would say, "imprudent" conduct, during this Administration were short-lived because their news value played out quickly. They were somewhat like a shooting star on the political horizon. The brilliance of their original flash was promptly dimmed by the quick severance of any ties or connection with the White House. However, the present situation presents a horse or, perhaps, a vicuna, of another color. This is not a case where some distant relative whose mail into disgrace could be charged off to some inadvisable political marriage along the way. Politically speaking, this involves the blood kin in the immediate family, which probably explains Papa's reactions.

Although to many may appear as a comedy of errors, the interwoven threads of tragedy must not be overlooked. The fact is that this country was built upon several basic principles. One of these was "equality under the law". In other words, a man was to be judged from a standpoint of complete fairness, regardless of his station in life, his material wealth, or his creed.

Yet, transaction such as those in which Sherman Adams, the Assistant to the President of the United States, and probably the most powerful man in the world next to the President, was involved, would indicate that there is an avenue through which favored treatment may be had: and area in which a man could operate without being subject to the same rules, regulations and laws as the other people of this country; a status that would enable one man to receive preferential treatment in obtaining profitable contracts paid for by the tax money; a situation whereby the friendship with a man high in government would entitle one man to concessions that were not available to others. It is the doubts and the suspicions created by the Sherman Adams-Bernard Goldfine performance that might constitute the terms that could destroy the underpinnings of our entire government. How can any man who bids on a government contract, or has a case pending before the Federal Trade Commission, or an application before the Federal Communications Commission, or even a case pending

in a court, help but wonder whether or not he can expect a fair and impartial hearing or trial, or whether on the other hand his adversary or opponent has an inside wire to the White House that can obtain a personal interview with those who will sit in judgement on the matter in which he is interested.

It makes no difference which political party might be in power. The constitutional right and guarantees would have little significance under such a system.

News in Hansford

NEWS IN HANSFORD SOIL

Members of the Hansford Soil Conservation District may receive chemical analyses from the Soil Conservation Service in planning of applying Soil and Water Conservation practices.

This technical aid usually makes available information on soils, engineering, range management, irrigation, agronomy (crops and range methods) wildlife management. Any farmer or rancher who is interested may obtain information on the types of soil, their problems and their requirements for conservation. Or he may want help in designing and installing irrigation systems, drainage systems, waterways, dams, erosion control or net fire diversion. Members can obtain information on methods of brush control, grass planting or other methods of range improvements such as watershed grazing, water facilities for proper range use.

Conservation from farmers or ranchers the Soil Conservation Service personnel will assist in preparing maps and problems (they don't have money or make it rain). After the soil, range, engineering or irrigation problems have been identified the farmer or rancher decides on what action he wants to take or is able to take to improve and protect the land. These decisions are incorporated in a conservation plan to be used as a guide in carrying out needed conservation practices. Such a plan contains a map of the person's farm or ranch. In addition it contains information on the type of soil, on the soils or on the place. This plan is then given to the farmer or rancher to be studied and used as a guide for future conservation.

Texas Top In Farm Legislation

A major advance for the Texas Department of Agriculture was claimed by Commissioner John C. White this week with the announcement that Texas now stands first among 12 southern states in the amount and enforcement of farm legislation.

"Since 1951, we have jumped from seventh to first position in modern farm laws," said White. "These legal provisions have enabled us to increase our services in Texas by as much as 300%. As a result, Texas can no longer be regarded as an agricultural dumping ground for inferior products from other areas."

The 33-year-old commissioner, who is seeking re-election to the top farm job in Texas, added that "ten years ago we were a convenient 'garbage pail' for the nation. Today, we can put more trust in our own production and know that farm goods shipped into state must meet certain quality standards."

Commissioner White cited his re-organization of the Department as a major factor in modernizing and increasing farm services. It marked the first big overhaul in its previous 47-year history and helped put many programs on a self-supporting basis.

"The clean-up of the state grain scandals, better seed laws, more effective insect controls and establishment of market news service are just a part of the accomplishments under this system", he added.

White is actively campaigning to continue the programs he inaugurated after taking office in 1951. He defeated two opponents without the necessity of a run-off in 1952 and 1956 and was unopposed in 1954.

Born and raised on tenant farms in North Texas, White said that "the challenge today is for even greater progress in our most vital industry—agriculture. It calls for devoted and experienced leadership in the future."
