## City Out Of Debt For First Time

For the first time in the history of our city government the city is out of debt, having paid off the sewer bonds this month.

This is a situation enjoyed by very few incorporated towns or cities in the United States. Considering the fact that the city was in the hands of the receivers back in 1936 and owed a total of \$178,000.00 at that time, we feel that this is a remarkable record and should bring praise to the past and present city administration and city employees, especially our City Manager, Leo Dacus. He has been with the city through the trying times, and through his good management we have been able to liquidate all the indebtedness.

This newspaper feels that this is a wonderful situation for the expansion that faces this city during the next ten years. There is a crying demand for building more homes and more homes in Spearman. We realize that the city will soon face the responsibility of providing revenue for expansion of utilities to new additions to Spearman.

## Hazlett Announces For District Judge



Guy Hazlett has authorized the Spearman Reporter to announce his candidacy for District Judge, 84th Judicial District, subject to the action of the voters in the July Democratic Primary.

In making his announcement for the unexpired term of the late Honorable Judge Jack Allen, Hazlett said, "It is with sincerity and humbleness that I solicit the support of you, the people of this District, in my candidacy for District Judge."

"I want to thank the citizens for the overwhelming endorsement they gave me for the appointment by the Governor. I respect the law, that the people shall have a voice at the polls. You should have that right to decide for yourselves, who shall hold office."

"I proudly present to you a thirty-five year background of integrity and a record of honest, efficient service in public office. I feel that the voter may well gauge a man's future action and conduct by his past. My past record shows that I always held steadfast, and fought for the preservation of those that are the backbone of America—the working man, the small businessman, and the farmer."

"My previous experience in the Legislature, and as a special judge, has been an asset in my professional and everyday life. I know it will be an asset in deciding the law. The greatest compliment I have ever had, it that of a former senator from the Panhandle. He said that I served in the Legislature and came home owning myself. This legislative independence has left me bound to no person, group, or corporation."

"I make you this solemn promise. When a case comes before me, I will do that for a judge to do. I shall keep in mind that a candidate for District Judge is in no position to make political commitments other than presiding without bias, or prejudice and never losing sight of common sense."

Hazlett was born in Glazier, Texas in Hemphill County, in 1923 the son of Howard and Lydia

Hazlett of Glazier. His father has for some 36 years been station agent for the Santa Fe at Glazier. His mother was the former Lydia Kolander, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Fritz Kolander, pioneer settlers at Goodwin near Shattuck, Oklahoma. He attended Public School in Glazier and graduated from Canadian High School in 1940. He has a Bachelor of Science Degree from WTSC, in Canyon, and an LLB Degree from the Baylor University School of Law. Hazlett began his professional career with nine years credit for college work, two degrees, and work on his Masters Degree.

In World War II, he was shot down and held as a prisoner of war, during his service in the U. S. Air Force as a pilot in the European Theater Hazlett and his wife, the former Margie Kella of Canadian, and their two children, Guy II, 10, and Michael, 6, reside at 1105 Cooley Drive, in Borger.

Hazlett is a member of the First Baptist Church of Phillips; a member and past president of the Kiwanis Club; past vice-president of the Jaycees; vice-president of the 19th District PTA and City Council; a member and past-president of the Gateway PTA; on the board of directors of Hutchinson County Girl Scouts; Y. M. C. A. and American Legion; member of the Chamber of Commerce; active in Boy Scout work; past president and member of the Borger Bar Association; member of the Texas Bar Association; and served as State Representative of the 86th Legislative District for two terms, from 1953 to 1957.

Mrs. Hazlett, a mother and housewife, gives freely of her time in school activities, and a Cub Scout Den Mother, as well as in many other civic activities.

Hazlett, in announcing his candidacy for District Judge, says, "I will appear before you as a Democratic Candidate at the polls. You will be my judge! I want and ask to be yours! I need and earnestly solicit the support of every citizen of this District."

## Judge Boyer Visiting Friends In This Area

Judge Max Boyer, of Perryton, was in Spearman on Monday, meeting friends and supporters in connection with his campaign for the unexpired term as District Judge of the 84th Judicial District.

"I am very pleased and gratified with the enthusiastic support I am receiving throughout the district. I find that the voters understand that it is only fair that I be permitted to serve the remaining two years of Judge Allen's unexpired term and then to determine whether or not I should be elected for a full four years term," Judge Boyer stated. "I am not making any promises," the jurist continued, "and am standing on my record during the six Judge. The dockets in the three counties are being cleared constantly and I shall continue to run the affairs of the Court in as efficient a manner as possible. I shall decide cases in accordance with the law, regardless of who the parties or their attorneys may be. That is the only promise that one seeking a judicial post can honorably make."

Judge Boyer urged that all voters in Hansford County, who plan on being gone on July 26th cast an absentee ballot at the County Clerk's office at once.

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## Record Gas Producer Brought In On Virgil Wilbanks Land

A record gas producer of 190,000 million cubic feet classified as among the larger producers of the world was finalized by Phillips Petroleum Company on the Virgil Wilbanks Section 2, block 1, H. and GN burvey the past week. According to information from Wilbanks the test showed 12 barrels of distillate per million cubic feet, which would make this well a 2280 barrel distillate producer per day in addition to the 190 million cubic feet of gas. Of course the production will be limited, as we understand it to 25 per cent of the test peak.

Even then the producer would record 370 barrels of distillate each day it is allowed to produce.

Not tested yet is two wells in this area which are classified as dual producers. The Wm. Hutton No. 1 Humble well has possible production from the 9 foot of Marrow and 13 foot of Cleveland sands.

A second producer not tested is the Kiff White well 5 miles Southwest of Spearman. There is a 23 foot sand in the Marrow horizon and an undesignated sand in the Cleveland horizon.

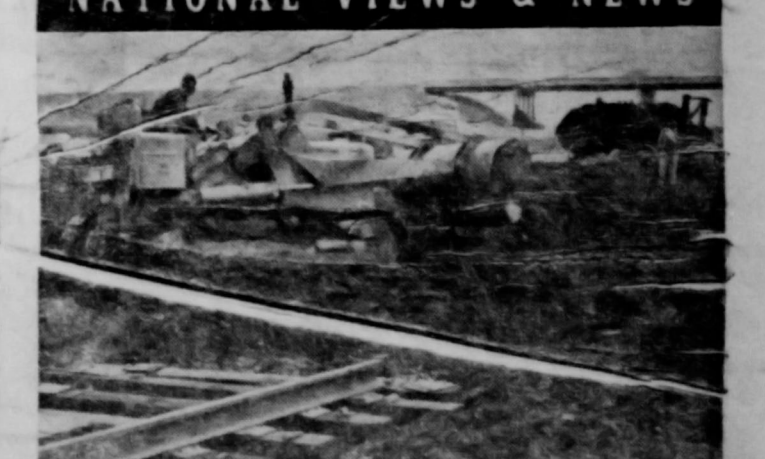
## Friends Of Buck Buchanan Boost His Campaign

today, who are committing suicide, and not all of them are doing it by using a gun. I am forced to believe something has slipped. No sane and sensible man will commit suicide by drinking himself to death. He may be to blame for starting to drink when he is overpowered by it, and he dies from the effect of it; he has gone to the place where reason is gone, and he has no control over self and his will-power has left him and he wants to get out of his misery. There are so many things we don't understand and such a little that we do, we should not give any explanation on what we will never know in this life. Don't know is a mark of intellect with the brainiest people we have. In fact, they are the ones who are smart enough and big enough to admit they don't know. He stepped without an answer, then she went to the barn just a short distance from the house, and he had hanged himself to a rafter. He did not eat that chicken dinner he had announced. Neither did the rest of the family. This unknown tragedy did not only knock the man out of the dinner that he had announced to the passerby, we are going to have chicken, but it took the appetite from others and the food was on the table, but no one had any appetite to eat it. The food was prepared and on the table but no one wanted to eat.

A good man was ready to sit down to the table when an outlaw called him out to kill him, and he beat him to the draw. Breakfast was on the table, but no one wanted to eat. The justification of taking the other fellow's life will take away the pain of remorse and regret as it had to be done. These circumstances that will take the appetite of people, who have a heart but they can be touched by material surrounding beyond their own control. No one will doubt this taking away hunger and driving people to their knees in prayers and tears. I have my serious doubts of sincerity about people fasting for one meal, as a form or a custom, and eating enough for two meals at the next one. Jesus condemned the Pharisees for fasting twice a week and paying tithes, then having no conscience in robbing or oppressing their neighbor, or the stranger in their gate. Fasting has a heartache behind it to see sinners saved and to save the situation by being in the spirit of prayer, which will take away hunger. Jesus explained this situation when the disciples said, "Lord Why could we not cure

this man?" His answer was this is only done through prayer and fasting. A material fast, when it is done with meditation and prayer, means a Spiritual feast at the bountiful table of God's love, and the feast will offset the fast. The heartbreaking experience of a preacher who pours his heart out to God in fasting and praying, with a Spiritual feed to feed hungry souls, and to see them reject His invitation to come to the table of the Lord and drink milk and eat honey without money or without price. The table is set with a Spiritual banquet for blind people who have never been awakened to the sense of their

Spiritual needs then refuse to eat at God's bountiful table loaded down with luscious food that will fatten the soul, and they they will stay in the hogpen and eat the husk of the hogs. These experiences will cause preachers and Christian people to fast and pray and agonize with God that something will be done to turn sinners from their sins unto God and look and live. **PANHANDLE OUTDOOR LIFE**

**Bob-White Quail - 1958**  
Since 1951 there hasn't been a bumper crop of this upland game bird specie present in the top part of the Texas Panhandle. For six years the bird crop has been in very short supply in most areas. This fall we can look forward to the best bird year since 1951. You can depend on this.

There are several factors that make up what is called a good hatching season, especially in this part of the state. Up until now these factors have been favorable for this spring and summer.

The factors that make up a favorable hatching season for bob-white quail are these. Under normal conditions quail will pair off and nest in the early spring. About 60% or more will usually be broken up. If the June weather is hot and dry these 60% or more birds on the range will not nest, however, if there is a cool, damp period in the summer and the grass greens up again, then these idle adult birds will again start nesting activity. This procedure will continue to repeat itself so long as there are pairs of quail that haven't successfully reproduced. The situation of this date is that there has already been one go-round on the nesting activity with another started due to this cool wet, season we have had the middle of June. One more wet spell along in July will fill out the necessary requirements for these birds for an almost ideal hatching period.

We have already had an early hatch this week I have seen two second hatch is in the making and the third will start in late July or early August if we have rain large broods of young quail. The

One pair of quail, contrary to popular belief, will raise only one brood per year. However, quail have been hatched from May until October in the Panhandle, but the peak months are usually June and July. According to the field technicians, "the accumulated nesting activity is what adds up to a large quail crop".

Not long ago a friend of mine said that if quail and bird dogs were mentioned less and other wildlife mentioned more in this column, the readers would appreciate it more. This possibly is correct but, after all, people usually talk or write about the subject that they are the most interested in. My pet hobby is raising bird dogs and training them.

Not only is the bobwhite and blue quail hatching in full swing, practically all other wild species that frequent the Panhandle are in the process of reproduction at this time. The other day I took a picture of a wild duck hen swimming in a bar ditch with five young ducklings. The location was about three miles southwest of the Plemons on the Phillips

road, and about three thousand miles south of the popular duck nesting grounds.

Each normal year there are a few brood of ducks found in this part of the state but more than 99% of the ducks fly to Canada and Alaska to do their nesting. **Know Your Local Laws for Handgun Hunting**

The June issue of "Texas Game and Fish" states, "Again the old question arises as to whether it is legal to hunt with a pistol. The Game and Fish laws place no restriction on your weapons for hunting squirrels."

"Means of taking deer however, vary in many counties. Some counties ban shotguns. In the counties which specify a rifle only, some ban .22's. Other county laws do not say it is unlawful to use handgun on deer, meaning of course a heavy caliber, preferably saguams.

State laws and many county laws prohibit the ordinary citizen from packing around a pistol, even when hunting laws have no such probation. Pack it if you wish, but it's a good idea to have a talk with the county sheriff beforehand."

## Washington News Letter From our Congressman Walter Rogers

**FARM BILL**

The Agriculture Committee of Representatives last week passed an omnibus farm bill to solve some of the problems which have a cultural segment. It was a highly important measure. In fact, the bill was passed in a hearing room at the capitol. The bill was approved and was sent to the House Committee. The bill is sometimes known as the Traffic Cop bill. It passes in the House in which legislation is presented to the House of Representatives. The bill was passed by a vote of 215 to 175.

controversy concerning the farm bill was, of course, renewed in the Rules Committee; however, it was voted out of the Rules Committee by a resolution authorizing the House to debate the measure for 5 hours. This Resolution was subject to debate, and the question was whether or not the House would adopt the Resolution and thereby clear the way for consideration of the farm bill. Tempers ran high, and there was much oratory. The matter was approached on a partisan basis, and it soon developed that the vote would be along Party lines. When the time came to vote on the Resolution, it appeared that the Resolution would be adopted, we could have considered the farm bill and it probably would have passed. However, the Republican Members of Congress, almost without

exception, voted against the Resolution, which was a vote against the farm bill. There was a split in the Democratic Party. A number of the Representatives from the big cities forsook the farm bloc and voted against the Resolution. This, of course, swung the pendulum against the farmers, and the result was that we lost the resolution by approximately 40 votes.

Mr. Benson, the Secretary of Agriculture, had attacked the bill as an "economic monstrosity" and had stated that if the bill was taken up and considered by the House, it would probably ruin his trip to Russia this year. Admittedly, there were some rough spots in the bill. These rough spots could have been cured by amendments, and the indications were that such amendments would be offered and adopted. The matter that concerned me was why so many Members did not want to debate the bill. It could have been debated and those who were not satisfied could have voted against it on final passage. However, what happened was that we were cut off from even

presenting the agricultural side of the picture. To me, this was not in keeping with what should have been done.

Let us hope that legislation concerning the vital problems of this great segment of our nation will be brought up again during this session so that the matter can be treated before adjournment.

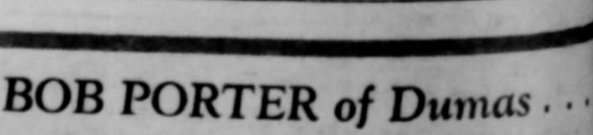

**Northern Natural Millio PLANT CONTRUC ADDITION TO PIPI BEING CONSTRUCT**

The Natural Gas Company of Nebraska has begun construction of a hydrocarbon processing plant in Phillips County south of Spearman.

The plant, located on an 80-acre tract adjacent to Northern's existing plant, is due for completion in November of this year. Engineering Company of Oklahoma is the contractor.

The construction call for the building of a 40 x 96 feet warehouse and office building, a 24 x 24 x 12 compressor building, a 24 x 24 x 12 building, two houses, and a building for the plant guards and piping for the gas extraction process. The estimated cost of construction for the overall project is about \$1,000,000.

The plant will have a maximum capacity to extract an estimated 10,000 gallons of gasoline a day from some 100 million cubic feet of recoverable natural gas flowing through the refrigeration plant.

Work at the Spearman site is being done under the supervision of John Scoville, a Northern employee acting as Chief Inspector on the project.

Scoville, a Northern employee since 1951, also served as Chief Inspector on the construction of Northern's carbon dioxide removal plant near Fort Stockton, Texas.
