**Housing Survey Being Conducted**  
Pete Fisher, Chairman of the Housing Authority of Spearman has announced that the Authority is conducting a housing survey in Spearman to obtain information necessary for planning a local program of low-rent housing. During the next few days, Mr. Fisher said, representatives of the Authority will interview residents in certain areas to obtain facts about the dwellings and the families living in them. This information will be used to determine how many dwellings to plan, what sizes, and the income limits for eligibility. All information furnished by persons interviewed will be kept strictly confidential and will not be used for any other purposes.

Mr. Fisher stressed the importance of the survey to the success of the local housing program and urged that residents cooperate with the interviewers to insure complete and accurate survey results. The interview does not constitute an application for admission to low-rent housing, but all interested families who believe they are eligible will be given an opportunity to apply shortly before any such housing is ready for occupancy.

### All-Star Game Saturday Night

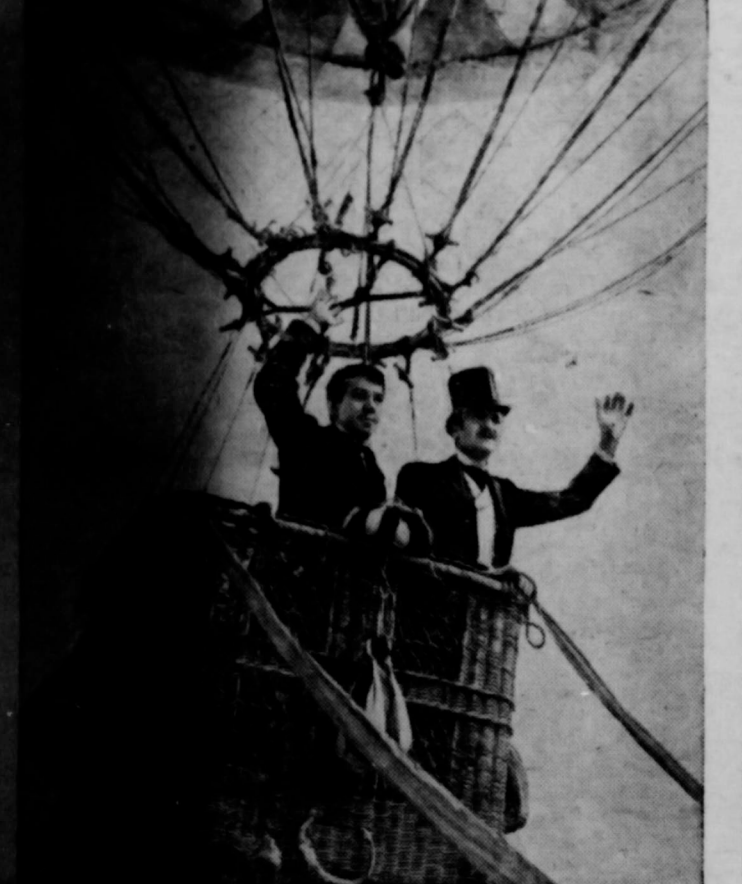

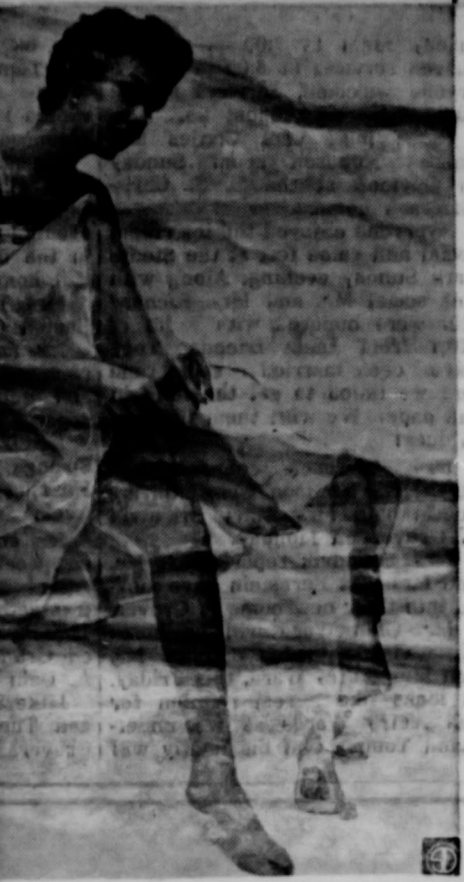

The Turkish irrigation engineer said agricultural commodities were exported and exchanged for farm machinery mostly from American manufacturers. He said Turkish farming is becoming highly mechanized except where the farms are too small or in the hill country where horses are more practical.

There is considerable freedom in Turkish agriculture. The extension service there recommends certain farm practices, but the farmer has the alternative to adopt or reject the recommendation. He added they are quick to accept new methods and that Turkish farmers are highly progressive. With the exception of experimental farms, almost all of Turkey's agricultural land is privately owned. About 30 percent of the farms are 70 to 80 acres, the remaining half are either smaller or larger, he said.

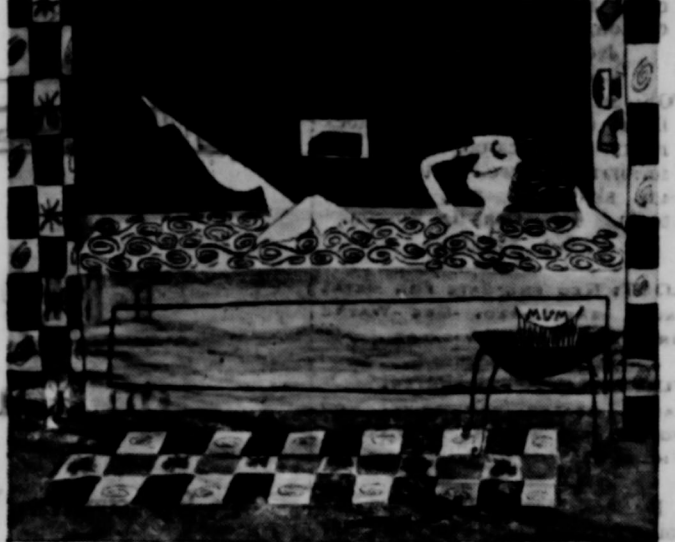

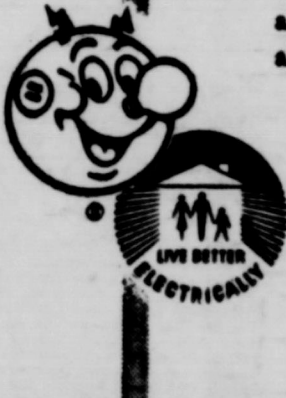

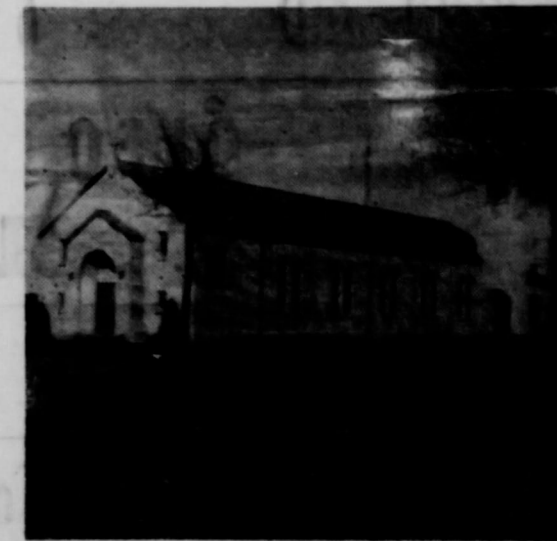
