

Bulletin On Small Grains Available

Small grains occupy a unique place in Texas agriculture because they are suited to so many uses and are grown from the 50-inch rainfall belt and mild climate of Southeast Texas to the 15-inch rainfall belt of Northwest Texas where winter temperatures are often very severe. They are used extensively as grain and forage crops in Texas. The combined acreage of wheat, oats and barley generally exceeds six million. Statewide small grain tests have been conducted to provide information on the best varieties to grow in the several areas, and to provide a means for final testing of experimental strains before they are named new varieties and distributed to growers.

Because of the wide diversity of climate under which the crops are grown and tests conducted, the state is divided into seven areas. Results and conclusions derived from these tests are summarized in a bulletin just released by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station entitled "Performance of Small Grain Varieties in Texas" 1949-57. Yields of experimental strains are not included in the bulletin; only yields of commercial varieties are covered. Some of the topics included are growing areas and test locations; climatic conditions and soil types; field design of tests and experimental data. It contains information on barley, oats and wheat. This 19-page bulletin may be obtained upon request from the Agricultural Infirmation Office.

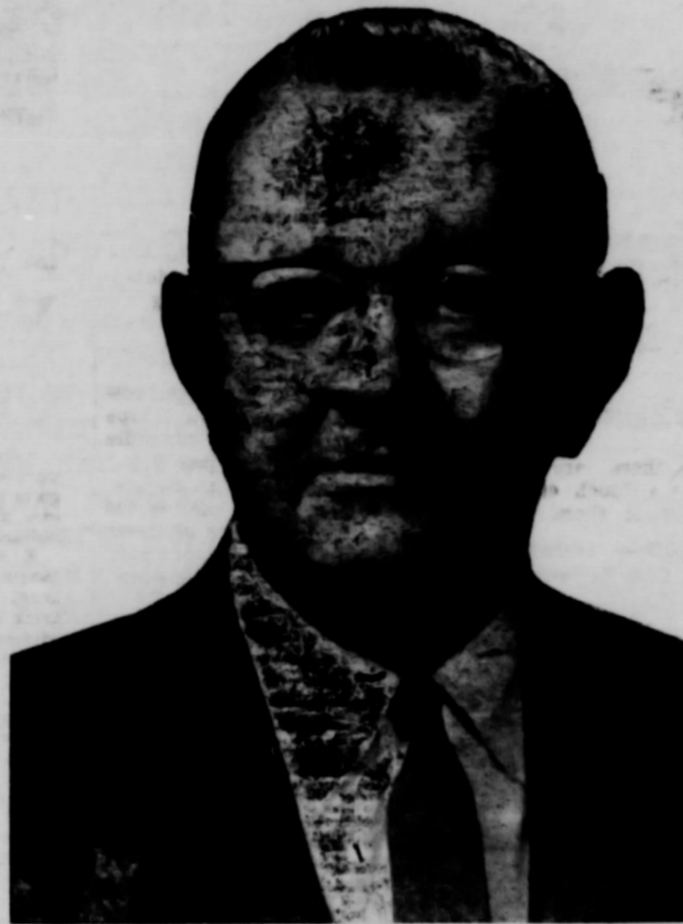

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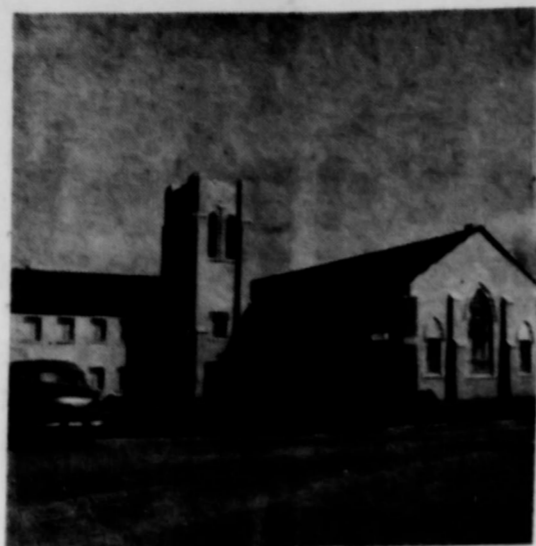

THE ANGELUS

One of the world's best-known paintings is "The Angelus" by the french artist, Jean Millet. The painting shows two French peasants pausing at their work in a field to pray. They have heard the sound of the Angelus bell in a distant tower and in humility and deep reverence they bow their heads in prayer and thanksgiving.

The Angelus is a devotion in honor of the Incarnation of Our Lord, recited at morning, noon and evening at the ringing of the Angelus bell. It takes its name from the opening word of the Latin form. "Angelus Domini nuntiavit Mariae" ("The Angel of the Lord declared unto Mary"). The devotion consists of the Hail Mary said three times together with certain versicles, responses and concluding prayer:

V. The Angel (Angelus) of the Lord declared unto Mary.

R. And she conceived of the Holy Spirit. Hail Mary, etc.
V. Behold the handmaid of the Lord.
R. Be it done unto me according to thy word.

Hail Mary, etc.
V. And the Word was made flesh.
R. And dwelt among us.
Hail Mary, etc.

Let us pray; pour forth, we beseech Thee, O Lord, Thy grace into our hearts; that we, to whom the Incarnation of Christ, thy Son, was made known by the message of an angel, may by His Passion and Cross be brought to the glory of His resurrection. Through the same Christ Our Lord. Amen.

This devotion developed gradually, probably from the ancient monastic custom of reciting certain prayers which include the salutation of the Archangel Gabriel to Mary. These words began to be used by the people as a daily prayer. By the fourteenth and fifteenth centuries it was in common usage throughout all of Europe and in the form which is used today.

We mention these few facts about the Angelus for this reason: Here at the Catholic Church at 9th and Roland, we are presently installing a Schulerich "Carillon Bells" instrument which will not only ring the time of Sunday and daily Masses, but also ring the Angelus three times each day. We felt sure that many of you would be curious as to the meaning of bells ringing everyday at 7 o'clock in the morning at 12 noon, and at 6 in the evening. We felt, too, that there would be questions asked. And for that reason we took the liberty of giving an explanation of the Angelus in this column.

We sincerely hope, too, that when you hear the sound of the Angelus bells it will remind you to pause for a few moments in your busy day and give thanks to God for the many gifts and blessings He has given us, particularly the gift of the Incarnation and the Redemption.

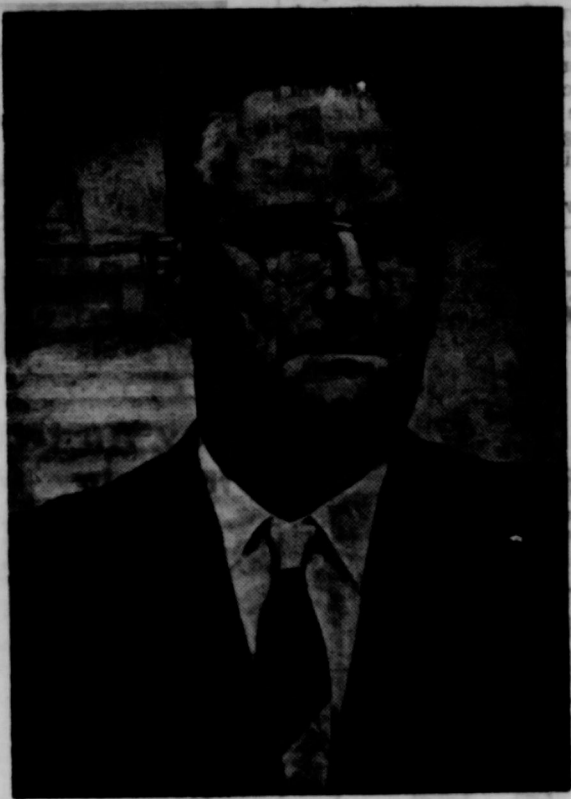

Certainly there has not been a district judge in this area that has worked harder to clear the dockets of our courts than Max Boyer has worked since he was appointed to fill out the unexpired term of Hon. Jack Allen. We believe that Hansford county will give Max an outstanding ma-

jority vote—but again we want to urge each voter to VOTE. It was the lack of votes in the second primary many years ago that defeated Max Boyer for State Senator. He had won the first primary with almost a plurality over the other two candidates. In the second primary hundreds of voters who voted for Max in the first primary, just did not vote in the second primary. Thus he was defeated. Let's not let this happen again. You need Max Boyer as your next District Judge—so turn out and vote in the July 28th, Democratic election.

College, says considerable progress has been made in the performance of poultry in the past 10 years and further improvement from breeding will be seen in years to come.

Krueger says the egg producer will find a larger number of breeders favoring smaller bodied birds in the future. This smaller sized bird — three and three-fourths to four pounds — will lay good-sized eggs and has less feed maintenance cost than the large bodied bird of today. Greater uniformity of egg size will be emphasized.

Too, Krueger says breeders will be selecting birds with longer livability and sustained production. Average production will continue to climb and breeders will begin to work on the preservation of egg quality through breeding, he adds.

He predicts that breeders of commercial broiler chicks will continue to select heavily for improved growth rate. Greater emphasis will be placed on market quality characteristics, such as breast width, length of keel, skin

color, fleshing color and general confirmation.

Broiler parent stock for the production of hatching eggs will change materially, he says. Higher and more sustained egg production can be expected, and high percentage of cornish breeding, with improvement in fertility and hatchability in broiler parent flocks.

The appearance of the turkey broiler and the need for greater efficiency is changing the turkey breeders approach, points out Krueger. Some breeders are now practicing early selection — 10-12 week — for growth rate, confirmation, finish and feathering, and early maturity or market finish is being emphasized. More white

birds will be raised — small sizes — and attempts will be made to improve fertility in breeder flocks.

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PANHANDLE OUTDOOR LIFE

In less than two months the dove season will be open. September 1 is the usual opening date and probably it will open the same this year as in the past. Large flocks of doves have been observed in many parts of the Panhandle this summer, which should add up to a bumper crop of young doves hatched. The hatching season is in full swing at this time and will continue in full swing until August and then taper off. There will be hundreds of doves hatched after September 1, however.

Mourning doves are usually quite particular, same as most birds, in the location of their nesting area. Doves prefer an area that consists of small trees and clean terrain underneath. Cemeteries have long been recognized by field men as choice nesting areas. A clean, quite secluded, well-kept area, with trees that have overhanging limbs from five to ten feet in height, near good feeding and watering grounds, is the perfect setup for a colony of doves to begin house-keeping. Such areas as this aren't in large supply on the high plains so many times doves will nest almost any place they can find. Many doves nest on the ground in wheat fields, stubble or on the prairies. The government shelter-belts have been the nesting locations of tens of thousands of these birds ever since they were planted during the dust bowl days.

There is one shelterbelt (tree row) east of Pampa a few miles that has furnished wildlife biologists and game wardens hundreds of young doves for banding

purposes. (Each year Game Department personnel attempt to band as many doves as possible.) Wildlife Biologist A. S. Jackson and Warden Jack Woodford have each banded more than 500 mourning doves in this particular area. The Ochiltree County was, for a long time, my favorite banding area. Another cemetery just east and north of Gruver is usually good for four to eight doves on each trip.

If a person filled a pocket full of bands and started out cross country with the idea in mind to band all young doves that could be found, the chances are there wouldn't be many bands placed upon the legs of doves in a day's time. However, searching in the key areas will add up to a successful day of dove banding. I know some banders who have utilized more than a hundred bands in less than a day. In fact, in my opinion, Jack Woodford has banded more doves for the last few years than have any two wardens in the state. This fact exists because of the previously mentioned tree row in Gray County that is almost a dove factory. It is without difficulty that 100 birds can be banded in a few hours time at this particular area.

Quail Progress
I have contended for some time now that there will be the largest quail crop of bob-whites in the Panhandle that we have had since 1951. It was interesting to know that someone else thought along the same lines. Jack Woodford, Game Warden for Gray, Carson and Roberts Counties, said today that it appears as though the bob-whites will really be in huge

supply in his district, come this fall. He will "not be caught with his plans down", considering the fact that he will have two high-powered bird dogs to shoot over this coming season. He has one pointer female by the immortal "Warhoop Jake", a nine-time champion (the best record of any living dog), and out of "Highland's Texas Dyan", a female for which the owner refused \$500.00. This bitch was raised by Sibley Jones of Perryton. Jack also has a setter female that is the tops of the Carl Duffield breeding, which is highly recognized in the National circles, together with nine setter pups.

The Wet Panhandle
For the last ten months or more the rains have been almost perfect, slow soaking rains that have penetrated the soil instead of washing the countryside away. Very few areas in the Panhandle there is not a great supply of stock water in the earthen tanks since the rains came slow but the grass and hillside are green. This has added up to near the ideal condition for wildlife in the Panhandle. There is a vast supply of insects for young birds and a huge supply of weeds for the antelope and the browse is more than plentiful for the deer population. Fact is, the young bucks will be putting on layers of fat as a result of the green range that they will browse this summer and fall and will be in top shape when the season opens in mid-November.

Panhandle Fishing
This is a horse of another color. Quite frequently I am asked, "Where can a person go and really catch a lot of fish around here?" Perhaps some think that since I am the Game Warden for

several counties in the Panhandle I should know. The bald-faced truth about the matter is that I do know enough about the fishing in these parts to understand that the general fishing prospects are slim, that is if a fellow wishes to fill the deep freeze. Some few fishermen nearly always have good luck on trips but on the average the trip could be placed in the recreation category. This doesn't mean that there isn't a barrel of fun available at all of the Panhandle lakes. Very few anglers will derive more genuine pleasure from a trip than will a boy who has been pulling out bluegill by the dozen for hours and has them all strung up on a stringer. The bluegill are more than plentiful.

Not long ago a fisherman said that if bluegill (perch) were properly cleaned and fried, and after this placed in a pressure cooker and pressured for a few minutes, they were delicious. The pressure cooker softened the bones so that they could be eaten the same as salmon—Eew since then I have intended to try this fried pressure method but haven't gotten around to it.
