NEW PLANT OPENS

Saturday Is Crazy Day In Spearman

Everyone will get off to a bang up Saturday with a fly in breast in the Ralph Blodgett hand at the Municipal Airport. Breakfast will be served at 7:30 a. m. and will be free of charge to the public. Everyone is invited to join in and enjoy the breakfast, following the breakfast immediately at 7:30 a. m. the fly day costumes will be judged by out-of-town judges. Every dressing in costume for the fly day promotion is urged to be at the Airport to be judged. Following the costume judging,

all employees will then return to town to their jobs and stores will open at 8 a. m. for all the sale specials which will be run by all the participating merchants until closing time. Promptly at 10:30 a. m. on Krazy Day there will be a remote control watermelon contest in the Plains Shopping Center and in Downtown Spearman, on Main Street. All watermelons will be cut identical sizes and any one can participate. The time will be limited for the contest, and winner will be chosen. From 8 to 12 noon judging of participating stores will take place here will be extra special bargains throughout the city. At 12 noon the winner in the store judging contest will be announced. The extra special event of Krazy Day will take place from 2 to 4 p. m. when the air show

will get under way at the Municipal Airport. 200 planes will participate in the very special air show. The area will be roped off for spectators to have a good view of all the acts. Police will control the area and ambulances and fire engine will be close by. It will be a thrilling show for the admission price of \$1.50 for adults and 50c for children. The show will last constantly for two hours, and some of the acts will be parachute jumps, transfer from car to air and plane to plane, also air to ground. The most spectacular event will be a jump from an airplane without a parachute. Be sure to attend all the Krazy Day events, October 2 in Spearman, beginning with the fly-in breakfast that will be free of charge. All eggs for the breakfast will be donated by J & L Farms and the meat is donated also.

A verdict of guilty was returned late Monday in the murder trial of John Lincoln Grissam of Spearman. The 84th District Court jury recommended the death penalty after deliberating almost 12 hours. Grissam, 34, charged with murder with malice in the Feb. 26 fatal shooting of Gruver merchant P.H. (Mickey) Westerfield, showed no emotion when the verdict was read about 11 p. m. "An appeal is customary in the death penalty," his defense attorneys stated immediately after the trial. Closing arguments were presented Monday morning and the jury began its deliberations at 11:10 a. m. The jury announced it had reached its verdict at 10:57 p. m. It marks only the second time in the history of Hansford County that a jury has recommended the death penalty. Grin Brown was tried in January 1961 for the murder of his mail-order bride. He was electrocuted the following year. In a written confession read to the jury Saturday by District Attorney Bob Galloway of Borger, Grissam said he shot Westerfield when Westerfield caught him burglarizing the Westerfield Dry Goods Store. State prosecutors Galloway and James Linn of Spearman told the jury the death penalty was justified. "There is no possible way you can put this man in prison for so many years that he won't get out," Galloway said. Galloway made the statement in his final argument after defense attorney Charles Ballman of Borger had argued in favor of a long prison term. "You can put him (Grissam) so far back in that penitentiary that he will never get out," Ballman said. "If you put him in the penitentiary," Ballman argued, "he will remember this crime every day, every week and every year. I ask you to give him a chance, a long chance — so he can make peace with his Maker." The other defense attorney, Don Reavis of Perryton, said in his argument, "I don't think you folks are going to adopt a vengeance theory in this case — an eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth. "Certainly to send John Grissam to his death will not erase the sorrow and heartache caused by Mr. Westerfield's death." He also argued that there was not sufficient evidence before the jury to make an "intelligent and rational decision on death as punishment," in Grissam's case. Ballman pointed out that Texas law only sets the guidelines for punishment in criminal cases and that the jury decides where, within those guidelines, the punishment should lie. The punishment for murder with malice in Texas can be death in the electric chair, life in prison, or any number of years in prison not less than two. Galloway said that the death penalty is justified so that Grissam cannot go out and kill again and so he can be an "example to other John Grissams." "This is not a matter of an eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth," Galloway said. "Law is not based on that. If it was, what a poor bargain the state would be getting in this case. "But the law is not based on vengeance. The basis for penalties for crimes is such that those who do not violate the law can enjoy their liberties more fully." The trial opened Sept. 29 and it took 4½ days to select a jury. Testimony began Friday afternoon and continued again on Saturday. Court was recessed Saturday night until Monday morning for the closing arguments. The jurors were Mrs. Russell Townsend, K. J. Galloway Jr., D. D. Stahlhut, Lee Keyes, Mrs. K. E. Seifried, Everett Vandenberg, Bobby Archer, Mrs. Robert V. Skinner, Clarence Pettit and Hugh Gilley, all of Spearman; J. B. Luttrell of Groves, and Mrs. D. W. Miller of a Phillips plant north of Groves.

Plane Crash Friday Claims The Lives Of Two Young Spearman Citizens!

Two Spearman men were killed Friday afternoon in a light plane crash on the Carl McDowell ranch, 12 miles Southwest of Stinnett. Freddy Jackson, manager of the Western Auto store in Spearman, and Wilburn McGuire, rancher both died in the flaming crash of their plane. The two men were flying an Aerona plane rented from Thompson Flying service in Spearman. Both men, still sitting in the cockpit were pronounced dead at the scene of the accident, by Hutchinson County Justice of the Peace Jake Early of Stinnett, acting as coroner. Thomas Ramby, Hutchinson County Deputy Sheriff said the men were helping herd cattle on the ranch at the time of the accident. Danny Jackson was the first to see smoke rising in the open range and went to investigate. The plane had completely burned when he got there, he said. Jackson said he used an emergency fire extinguisher from his truck to fight the blaze and also threw dirt on it with a spade. He sent one of his employees to alert authorities and the Stinnett Volunteer Fire Department rushed to the scene. The bodies were taken to Boxwell Brothers, Funeral Directors in Spearman. Wilburn McGuire was a former employee of the Globe News Publishing Co., having worked in the circulation department for more than a year. He began in the communications room of the department and later was named district manager, the position he left in early August to work fulltime at farming and ranching. Funeral services for Frederick Alvin (Freddy) Jackson 22, were held Sunday at 4 p. m. in the Spearman Church of Christ with Charles Milner pastor, and the Rev. Wesley Daniel, pastor of the Spearman Methodist church officiating. Burial was in the Hansford Cemetery. Born Dec. 5 1942 in Borger, Jackson had lived in Spearman all his life. He is survived by his wife, Kaydean, and a daughter, Jodie Jeanne of the home; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Dee Jackson of Spearman, and his grandmother, Mrs. Fred Brandt of Spearman. Funeral services for Wilburn McGuire were held at 2:30 p. m. Monday in the Spearman Methodist church with the Rev. Wesley Daniel, pastor officiating. Burial was in Holt Cemetery in the Holt Community. He was a member of the Church of Christ. Born October 18, 1940, McGuire had lived in Spearman most of his life. Survivors include his wife, Patten Anne and a son, Robert Barton of the home; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Marvin McGuire of Spearman, and grandparents, Mrs. T. J. McGuire and Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Bellows of Bonham. Both burial arrangements were under the direction of Boxwell Brothers of Spearman.

The announcement was made at a Chamber of Commerce luncheon, held at Gruenwald Restaurant in the Shopping Center, held to welcome the new plant and some of the personnel to Spearman. Following the noon luncheon the luncheon crowd, joined by other interested citizens, adjourned to the site of the new factory for official ground breaking ceremonies. Bruce Spencer, Jr. of Lubbock, Executive Vice President of the Gifford-Hill Western organization dug the first spadeful of dirt at the plant site. J. L. Brock, President of the Chamber of Commerce industrial committee represented the chamber by breaking ground at the ceremony. The new factory is a 13 acre location, on the Lee McClellan land on the Gruver highway. The location begins just across the highway at the Merl Beck home, and extends back East to approximately across the highway at the former Horizon Building. There will be three metal buildings constructed at the location, with the massive plant building, a large shop building and an office building. This plant will manufacture Lock-seal underground concrete pipe, and will fabricate gated aluminum pipe for irrigation purposes. The Industrial committee of the Chamber of Commerce has been working on this project for almost a year. The committee is J. L. Brock, President; Slim Cates, Vice President; J. D. Helms, Treasurer, and directors: Jet Mason, Max Baggerly, Dr. Damon Gregg, Don Floyd, Secretary. Already moved to Spearman and built a new home in the Blodgett-Lynn addition is Dean Mac Mauldin, who will be the head salesman for the new Spearman Plant. Also a Spearman citizen is Ray Salsman, who will be the new plant foreman. He and his family reside at 719 Steel Drive in the Blodgett Linn addition. At the noon program Wednesday Judge Helms expounded an official welcome to the Gifford-Hill Western personnel and pledged the cooperation of the civic organizations of Spearman as well as the citizenship of our city. Mayor Bob Vaughn welcomed the personnel of the new plant in behalf of the City. Vaughn also represented the city at the noon ground breaking ceremonies. He shoveled a spadeful of dirt following Bruce Spencer of the plant. The response for Gifford-Hill Western was made by Bruce Spencer, Executive Vice President of the Company. A minimum of 18 new families for Spearman is assured as result of this new factory. There is a possibility of approximately 30 new families that will be connected with the new factory.

Shown here is the Satellite two-door hardtop. Sedans, hardtops and convertibles will have a 116-inch wheelbase, and station wagons a 117-inch wheelbase. Fully unitized bodies with curved glass windows and fresh body lines make the new Belvedere look longer and lower than its 1965 counterpart. The standard V-8 engine in the Belvedere series has 273 cubic inch displacement with a two-barrel carburetor. Other engine options besides the 426 "hemi" are the 318 and 361-cubic inch V-8s using regular fuel, and a high performance version of the 383-cubic inch V-8. "You can't legislate Morality" is a dangerous half-truth statement. What is true about the statement? It tells us that true morality — the kind of right thinking & living that pleases God cannot be achieved by lawmaking. People can be forced to conform to law, but motivation and intention cannot be determined by force. We want people to do the right thing rather than to be made to do it against their will. This is true indeed. The fact is in human society there is no other way except through law and custom to legislate morality. The world may try persuasion and appeal to self interest or loyalty but these methods are limited. You don't hear people say "You can't legislate morality" when speaking of murder or theft or rape or mayhem. We are most happy to make them illegal to put them under threat of punishment. It is unlegislated morality that creates problems in human society. God has given the state (or governments) to legislate morality and enforce that which is best for our common good and temporal welfare. It is difficult to be told what one has been doing all along is now suddenly evil, wrong, immoral. If its wrong now why wasn't it wrong before? Why hasn't someone spoken on it before? These are the anguish-creating questions often asked. When the law affects our privilege, condemns our behavior, demands a painful review of what we have been in the habit of doing, then it is much easier to settle the whole matter by saying "Leave things as they are, after all you can't legislate morality." We should allow ourselves to be guided by Scripture as well as honest, soul-baring, searching examinations of morals. God has ordered government and law. So the Christian derives desire and strength to walk in the ways of the Lord from the Spirit's work through Word and Sacrament. Only the Gospel changes hearts, although Law can legislate morality. We need people's hearts changed so we obey God's ways gladly. Then peace will reign in the hearts of the people and races. Until this happens we will often find bitterness and morality that is confusing.

This week is National 4-H Club Week - a week when the nation salutes the 4-H Clubs for their active part in making better citizens for tomorrow.

There are some 2,250,000 boys and girls in the 50 states and Puerto Rico in 4-H Clubs, ranging in age from 9 to 17 years.

4-H members live in urban areas as well as rural. Each member conducts one or more projects involving personal responsibilities and learning to do by doing.

The 4-H Clubs place emphasis on development of the four H's - Head, Heart, Hands, and Health. Simply, this means that 4-H members learn to think for himself, think and care for others, use his skills to best advantage, and keep his mind and body fit for everyday life.

This is the aim of 4-H Clubs everywhere.

Do you know of a youngster who could be helped through the 4-H program? Help enroll him or her now in the largest youth training organization in the world.

If you own a vacuum cleaner, are you getting the best use from it? Too often, homemakers who have such equipment and attachments do not get the full value from the equipment, because they haven't learned to use it properly, or they don't take time to learn.

Actually, the time

element is an important consideration in owning a vacuum cleaner in the first place. If you take the time to learn to use attachments when you first get the cleaner, you will save time later on by making full use of those attachments.

Here are some jobs which can be done easily and quickly with a vacuum cleaner, perhaps you know of others:

1. Cleaning rugs and carpets (the first natural job of a vacuum).
2. Curtains and drapes - use small brush or upholstery attachment and adjust the vacuum control for gentle suction.
3. Upholstered furniture - watch for deepdown dirt as well as surface dirt - cleaner attachment should clean round and square edges as well as flat surfaces.

PLAN YOUR PIPELINE BEFORE INSTALLING

George Buzzard, Wesley Garnett and L. S. McLain are just three of the Hansford Soil Conservation Co-operators who have recently planned and installed irrigation pipeline on their farms.

Hansford County has developed into the leading irrigated county on the North Plains in the past three years.

There are 696 wells completed in Hansford County at present. Seventy permits are still out. This brings the total completed wells and permits to 766.

With the rapid development of irrigation, there has been increased interest in underground irrigation pipeline. Many Hansford Co. farmers are now replacing their open ditches with irrigation pipeline. For example, (3,308 feet of irrigation

pipeline were installed by Hansford County farmers in 1963; 84,151 feet in 1964 and 156,000 feet installed in 1965. The trend in installation of irrigation pipeline is on the upswing and 1966 should show an increase over 1965 in the installation of pipeline.

Most pipeline being installed is either rubber gasket concrete or plastic. Only 2,553 ft of mortar joint concrete pipeline were installed in 1965.

Hansford County farmers planning to install irrigation pipeline should plan the size of their pipe very carefully and keep future needs in mind. Some farmers are all ready realizing their mistakes in not planning ahead. The most common error is installing pipe of insufficient size to allow for the increase in the amount of water the pipeline might possibly need to carry if another irrigation well were to be drilled and tied onto the initial underground line. This is one example of the need for good planning on the part of the farmer before he installs his irrigation pipeline.

The Soil Conservation Service technicians serving the Hansford Soil Conservation District will be glad to assist the farmers in planning the irrigation pipeline that will best fit their individual needs. Contact your local Soil Conservation Service Office if you need help with this problem.

IRRIGATION WELL OWNERS

The Dowell Division of The Dow Chemical Company has recently performed eight experimental well treatments from Stratford, Texas to Perryton, Texas in the North Plains Water District.

The purpose of these treatments was to remove plant growth (such as algae and brown mold), bacteria, iron scale, and clay or silt from the gravel pack, slotted casing and pump column. All of these things are known to be causing a loss of water production.

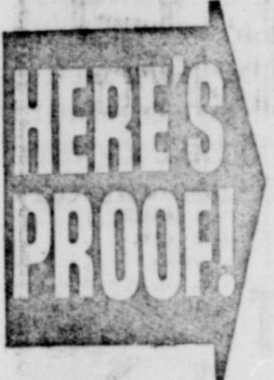
Most old wells which have declined over the years have been helped tremendously by these treatments.

Dowell is seeking at least a dozen more wells on which to further develop the process. Reasonable charges will be made for the treatment if good production increases are obtained. No charge will be made if increase is not substantial.

 - 2) Gravel packed
 - 3) 16-inch or larger casing
 - 4) 8-inch or smaller pump column
 - 5) Production off by 200 gpm or more

The development program will be started again on September 22nd. Wells which meet the requirements will be considered in the order that they are received until the program is closed.

Plymouth has a completely new series of Belvedere intermediate size cars in six body types and eighteen models for 1966.

They have a wholly new appearance, major chassis improvements and a wide range of new optional equipment. A production version of the famous 426-cubic inch hemispherical head V-8 engine used in racing will be offered in 1966.

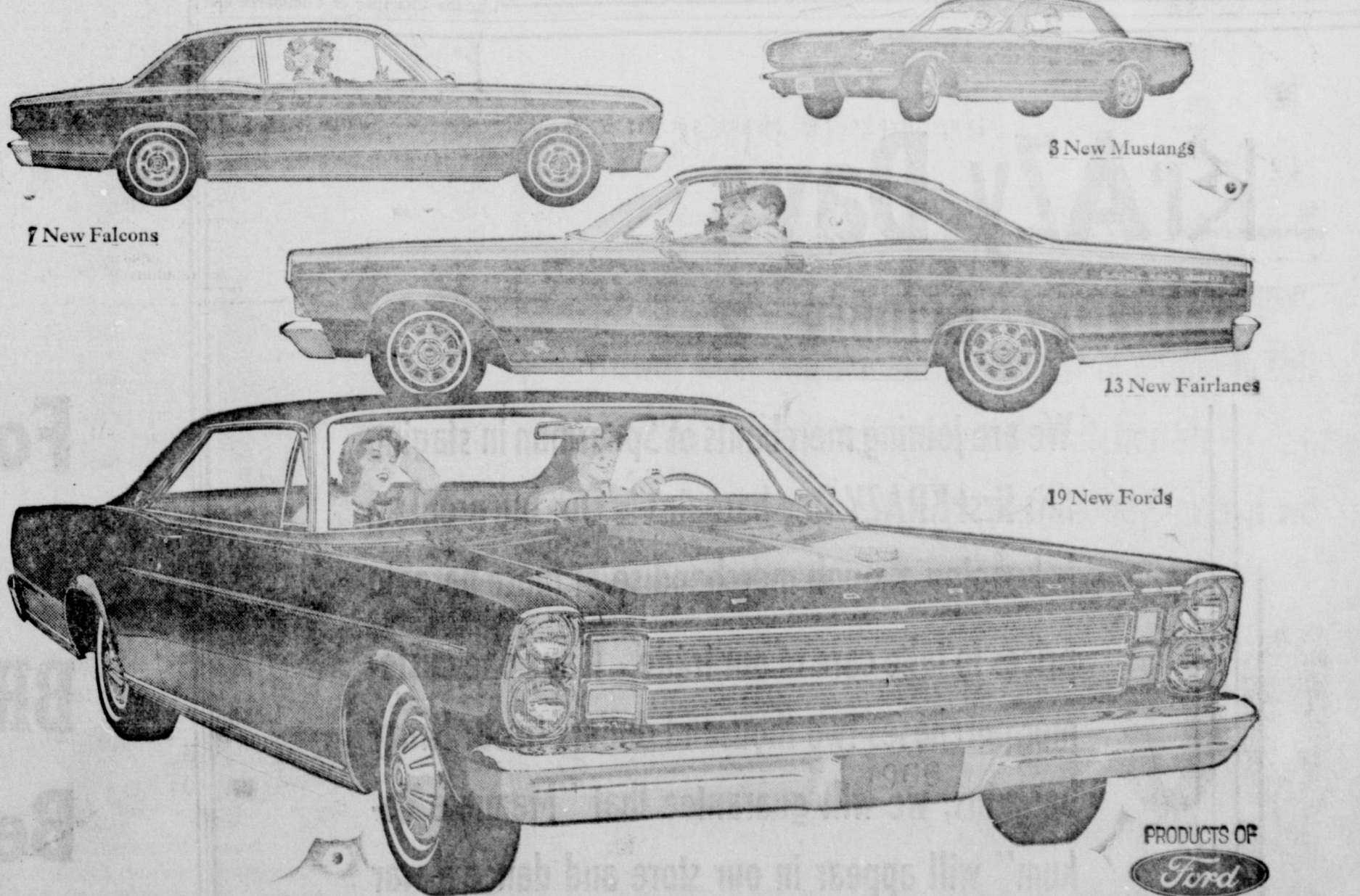

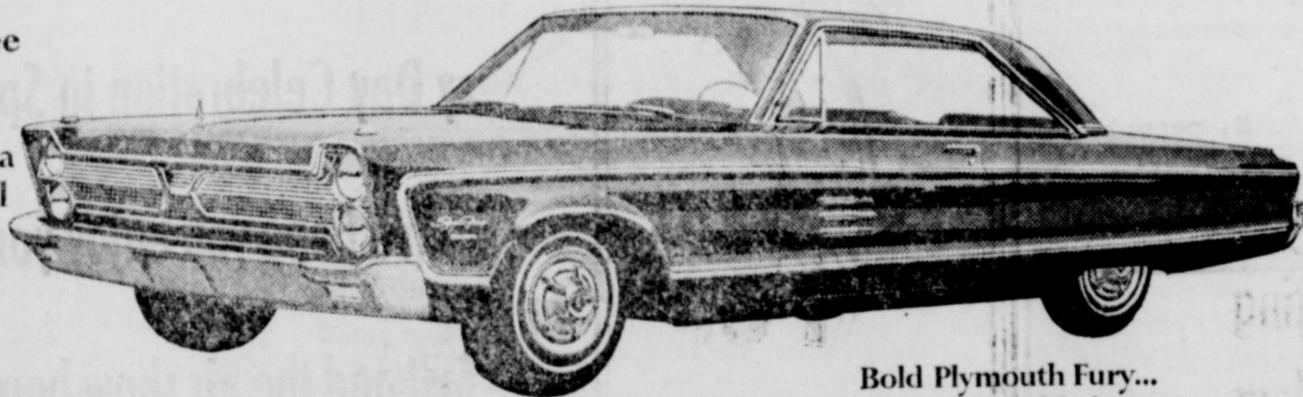

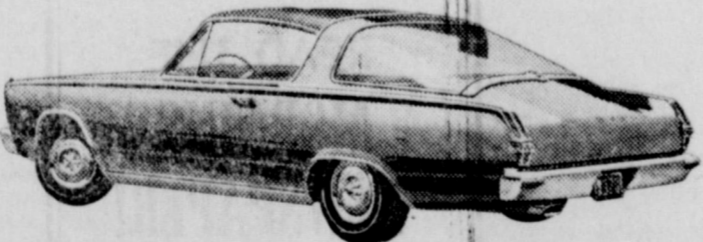

**Senator Tower
— REPORTS —**

Although I did not vote for the bill, I am proud to have seen it passed. I believe it is the most realistic farm bill we have achieved in the Senate in many years.

The cotton section of the Farm Bill is of particular significance for Texans. For years, because of the government intervention in the marketplace,

cotton was under a two-price system. This means it sold for one price here at home, and for another when exported. This artificial two-price system involved payment of subsidies at five points in the marketing chain.

The Senate adopted an amendment which I was proud to support assuring that a one-price system be maintained for cotton. This action was contrary to the cotton section reported by the Senate Agriculture Committee to which would have restored the old two-

price system under which the cotton industry was plunging toward disaster.

Our state is the leading cotton state, and it is most important to Texans that the cotton industry be rescued from its decline. It has been my continuing goal to achieve legislation under which the cotton can move into the market - not into surplus storage, under which cotton can move toward a competitive position with synthetic fibers.

I have offered in the Senate a resolution calling for complete re-study of the farm program. It is my feeling that politics must be removed from the farm program, if we are to reverse the trend toward higher prices for consumers, massive surpluses in storage, and lower returns for farmers.

Members of both parties assured me that the President will soon announce a National Commission on Agriculture which would bring about by executive order that which I proposed in my resolution.

A nonpartisan, dispassionate review of our agriculture laws is badly needed, and a commission on agriculture could go a long way in accomplishing this. I am hopeful such a study will lead toward a return to the free market and a reduction of federal controls.

SCIENCE PROGRAM
Screwworm problems are centered in two

areas of Texas, the Trans-pecos region & in counties southwest of San Antonio-- with the number of infections showing a slight increase with each passing week. Last week nine cases were reported in Texas: Brewster, 3; Presidio 2; Uvalde 3; and Kinney 1.

The situation is ever more serious in Arizona where 23 infestations detected last week put the state ahead of Texas in total cases for the year.

TREES FOR WINDBREAKS
Farmers and Ranchers may once again obtain planting stock for setting out in early 1966. Some 17 species of trees or shrubs will be available from the Texas Forest Service, at a delivered cost of \$1.50 per hundred plus

the 2 per cent sales tax. It is anticipated that the trees and shrubs will be shipped to landowners starting in mid-February.

The trees and shrubs may be used for wind breaks, soil stabilization, and Christmas tree plantings, but cannot be used for living screens or re-sold for shade or ornamental purposes. All seedling orders will be packed in moss and moisture proof paper and shipped prepaid direct to the purchaser. Orders for species must be in multiples of 50, and orders for less than 100 seedlings or seed (black walnut) will not be accepted. Coage orange is the same as common bois d'arc.

Trees available are: Austrian pine, black locust, black walnut, (Stratified seed), cat-

alpa, Chinese elm, cottonwood, loblolly pine, mulberry, osage orange, ponderosa pine, redbud, rose multiflora, short-leaf pine, slash pine, sycamore, euonymus, & buffaloberry.
Applications forms are available in my office.

Chrysler passenger cars, new from front to rear for 1966, have more powerful engine options, new interior seating arrangements and new equipment options.

There is a stronger separate styling identity for the four series which make up the 1966 Chrysler line—the luxury New Yorkers, the sporty 300s, the economical Newports and the new Town and Country series of station wagons.

The most changed in appearance of 1966 Chrysler is the distinctive 300 series. The 300 two-door hardtop has a new roof with a restyled rear window. A new hood, new front bumper, wrap-around taillights and bumper-installed front park and turn lights visible from the side are exclusive features of the 300 series. Chrysler's entry in the sports-type car market.

NEW EQUIPMENT OPTIONS
New equipment options include power front wheel disc brakes, an adjustable tilting and telescoping steering wheel and a rear seat air and heat system.

Bucket seats of a completely new design with pull-down center arm rests are standard in some models and optional in others. They are wider, have higher seat backs and provide easier rear seat entry and exit room for two-door models than the bucket seats in 1965 cars. Integral head rests of a new more attractive design are offered as an option.

MORE ENGINE POWER
A 440-cubic inch V-8 engine with a four-barrel carburetor is standard in the New Yorker, replacing the 413-cubic inch engine of 1965. It has the same compression, 101 to 1, and valve timing as the 413. With its larger displacement it provides improved stop-and-go performance, resulting from greater engine torque at low engine speeds.

A high performance version of the 440 engine with twin exhausts and a silenced twin snorkel low restriction air cleaner is optional on all models.

The standard engine for Newport and Town and Country cars is a 383-cubic inch V-8 using regular grade fuel. A high performance version of the 383 engine is standard in Newport and Town and Country models.

13 MODELS AVAILABLE
The model line-up for 1966 is the same as for 1965 except that two-seat and three-seat wagons, formerly available in both the New Yorker and Newport series, are now set apart in a separate Town and Country series.

Each of the two-door hardtops—Newport, 300 and New Yorker—has a separate and distinctive roof style, and all series have their own distinctive grilles, taillight arrangements and side trims.

New Yorker and Newport models also have new, more attractive hoods and all hardtops, sedans and convertibles have new rear quarter panels which contribute to a lower, sleeker look as the cars are seen from the side.

The Town and Country wagons have their own type of body ornamentation and taillight treatments. Wood grain appliques within body side moldings and on the instrument panel are standard.

SAFETY DOOR HANDLES
New features include six-way electric seat adjusters for bucket seats, safety-type inside door handles, modifications in shock absorbers to provide a smoother boulevard ride, a one-third increase in the thickness of secondary brake shoe linings to improve braking performance, improved luggage loading in hardtops, sedans, and convertibles, and a new full front compartment console optional in hardtops and convertibles with bucket seats.
