Social Security And Self-Employment Tax For Farm Workers

Special Federal Social Security tax rules apply to farm owners, sharecroppers, farm workers, and farm crew leaders, Hubert B. Hamill, Administrative Officer of Internal Revenue for the Amarillo office, reminded today.

Employers of agricultural workers may be required to file Form 943 and pay Social Security taxes on wages paid to certain employees.

"Farmer's Tax Guide" which furnishes more detailed information on this subject is available upon request from the Internal Revenue Service.

Matt. 2:2 "Where is He who has been born King of the Jews? For we have seen His Star in the East, and have come to worship Him". Epiphany is a day set aside in January to celebrate the coming of the wise men to Jesus. It always is on January 6th. The wise men saw God "Light a Star" and followed the light to the Christ child. We do not know at what time they arrived after the birth of Christ, but the important fact is that they sought out Jesus that they might worship Him.

God ordained that His Church should be the guiding star—His church of all believers in Jesus Christ. Let us not forget the message we have to proclaim. God did not say the Church was to be any one certain group. God did say we were to be faithful witnesses of The Truth, Jesus.

Mrs. Virgil Mathews made this statement today as she accepted the Hansford County chairmanship of the 1965 March of Dimes, for the fourth consecutive year. "As a matter of fact," she said, "one might call certain birth defects perpetual epidemics since they are relentlessly transmitted from generation to generation. As for emergencies, is it not an emergency when 250,000 birth defect babies are born each year? Thousands of them doomed to a lifetime of mental and physical disability?"

"In the worst polio epidemic years there were around 5800 thousand cases, per year," she stated, "as compared to the 250,000 thousand cases of birth defects, is it not time we became alarmed?"

Through the 50 March of Dimes-financed centers and clinics across the country, trained medical teams are providing the best medical care available for birth defect children and working to develop new techniques which will enable many more of them to live a useful life.

Scientists supported by March of Dimes grants are also at work in a number of university laboratories in this country and abroad, seeking the causes of these fearful conditions and ways of preventing them.

The March of Dimes in the past six years has made important advances in the fight against birth defects. Much more remains to be done.

"The money remains in the county after the January Chamberlain," explained Mrs. Mathews, "is being used to a good advantage, we are helping out with some birth defect cases, and shall continue to do so as long as the need exists."

## Baptist Conference In Dallas January 18

More than 10,000 preachers and laymen from throughout the state are expected to attend the annual Texas Baptist Evangelism Conference in Dallas, January 18-20.

Sessions will be in the Memorial Auditorium, with the exception of a Tuesday afternoon session at the First Baptist Church of Dallas. The conference theme is "The Holy Spirit and Evangelism."

Some of Southern Baptists' foremost preachers and Bible scholars will speak, said Dr. C. Wade Freeman, director of evangelism for Texas Baptists.

Dr. Wayne Dehoney, president of the 104-million-member Southern Baptist Convention, will bring the closing address at the first general session on Monday, Jan. 18. Others speaking at the session include Gregory Walcott, lay evangelist and TV-motion picture actor; and the Rev. Eual Lawson of the Southern Baptist Home Mission Board's Division of Evangelism.

The conference will close at noon Wednesday with an address by Charles Howard, professor emeritus of Campbell College, Buies Creek, N. C.

Dr. Wayne E. Ward, theology professor at Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, Louisville, Ky., will speak at four of the sessions.

Other key speakers will include Evangelists R. G. Lee and Vance Haver; Dr. H. Leo Edleman, president of New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary; Dr. W. Fred Swank, pastor of the Sagamore Hill Baptist Church, Fort Worth and chairman of the Texas Baptist State Missions Commission; Dr. Ralph M. Smith, pastor of the Hyde Park Baptist Church, Austin; and the Rev. Harper Shannon, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Dothan, Ala.

Music will be brought by the Singing Churchmen; John McKay of Fort Worth, evangelistic music director; Mrs. Glorietta Alison of Baytown; Mrs. Virginia Seelig and Miss Joe Ann Shelton, both of the school of church music at Southwestern

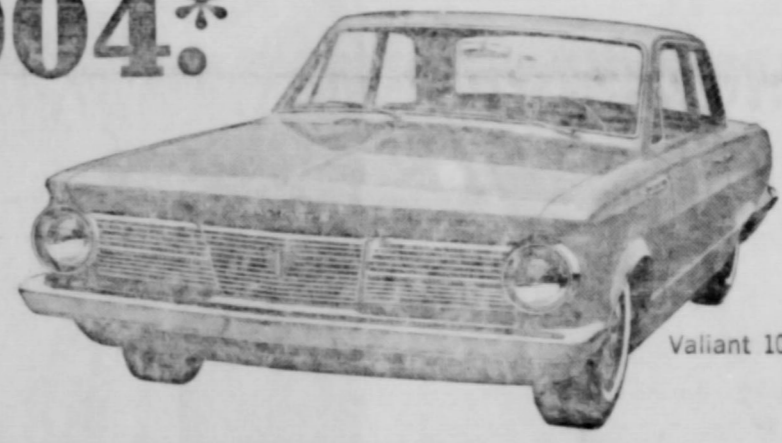

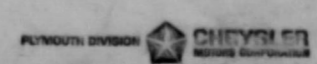

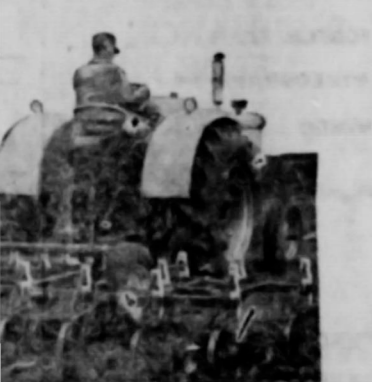
